With two home-made harvesters I have been told that I was saving 98 per cent or better with these harvesters. You be the judge. You can also see the cotton unloaded by air suction out of harvesters into bins at the rate of ten to fifteen minutes per bale.



This mixture was sprayed and brushed over the cows' backs and loon until completely wet. This application should be repeated in thirty days if complete control is expected.






