\$16,500 Bonds

Appeal Is Made For
All Citizens to Buy
All Bonds Possible

Pat Boone, County Chairman of the Bond Committee, announced today that he felt the County had realized close to one-half its quota in War Bond sales, but that the drive was going slowly, and he was appealing to everyone to buy all the bonds they can.

Lamb County's quota is \$795,000, while Littlefield's goal is \$270,000.

Mr. Boone also announced receipt of a letter from the Treasury Department stating that Lamb County boys in the Armed Forces have bought \$16,500 in bonds in the War Loan, which goes towards the County's quota.

Mr. Boone added that if "our boys over there help keep America safe by both serving in the armed forces and also buying bonds, surely the people at home can buy sufficient bonds to put over the quota set for us."

AAA Payments to be Paid In Full

Rep. George Mahon, from Washington, states that the threat to reduce all AAA payments promised farmers on the 1944 program has been averted.

The situation came about because farmers in Texas and some of the Southern and Western states, through their enthusiasm to cooperate in the war production program, had soil conservation payments in excess of funds available to the Department of Agriculture. The fact that Texas farmers over-earned by 10 per cent would mean a reduction in all AAA payments promised to farmers.

To meet the situation, the House Representatives has now adopted legislation into law to provide for full soil conservation payments promised. Representatives of Georgia and Mahon of Texas, both members of the Appropriations Committee, took an active part in securing favorable action by the House. Adoption of the provision by the Senate is expected before the end of this session of Congress later this month.

Two More Wildcat Tests Underway

Two additional wildcat tests are being conducted in this area.

On Labor 17, League 698, Hockley County, 1 mile southeast of Poplar, 18 miles southwest of Littlefield. E. Constantine, Jr., driller of Dallas, is drilling, and is reported to be down approximately 3000 feet.

On Labor No. 2 in League 718, Hockley County, the Stanolind Company have erected a derrick, and are working this week in drilling this well.

It is the general opinion of those in the position to know, that this whole area of the South Plains is due to be a thorough test for oil.

Sgt. Al Claunch Missing In Action

Sgt. Oscar Allen (Al) Claunch, of the 334th Infantry Battalion, is reported missing in action in Germany November 26th, according to a telegram from the War Department received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Claunch, Monday. The message also stated that further information available would be sent.

Sgt. Claunch has been in the service two years, and overseas since September. The last letter received by his parents arrived Oct. 15th, and was written from Holland.

Sgt. Claunch is a brother of Busby Claunch of Littlefield.

Game Creates Much Popular Interest and Large Crowd Expected

The first Regional Championship game ever to be played in Littlefield will be unveiled here in Seely Stadium Friday, December 15, at 2:00 p. m. The Littlefield Wildcats will tangle with the Merkel Badgers who earned the right to play this Regional Championship game by defeating Pecos in a Bi-District game last week.

The largest crowd ever to see a game in Littlefield is expected to be on hand to see if the Wildcats can stop Merkel's sensational Billy Wayne Frazier—the highest scoring school boy back in the state.

The 180-pound powerhouse has amassed the amazing total of 233 points in 10 games this season, completing 23 of 62 passes, has a punting average of 43 yards. He threw four touchdown passes against Colorado City in closing conference game. He scored all 19 points in the Bi-District game against Pecos. He has averaged 11 yards per try at carrying the ball through his first 9 conference games. He operates behind a big powerful line with potent blocking from both linemen and backs.

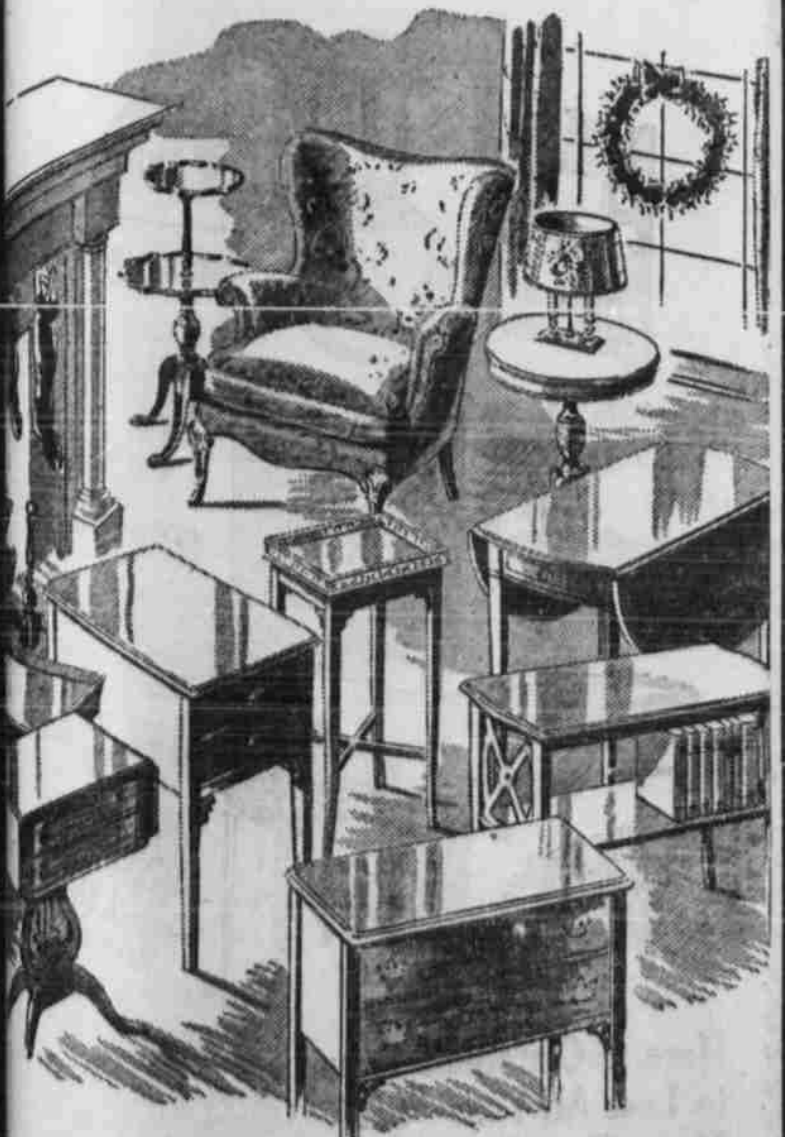

Junior Red Cross Enrollment Ends; Is Great Success

The final check on the Junior Red Cross Enrollment Campaign has been made and figures show that a total of \$581.05 was given by the pupils of Lamb County schools. Springlake was the largest contributor with a total of \$229.34. We are proud of the gifts made which show an increase over last year's enrollment of \$164.43. Last year only six schools were enrolled, and this year all ten of the schools participated, making Lamb County 100 per cent in school enrollments, and every pupil a member. The ten

Perhaps some would like to know how this money is used. The greater part will go to the Children's Fund which helps children both in this country and abroad. It was started in 1919 and has ever since been maintained by voluntary contributions from the American Junior Red Cross, raised entirely by young people.

Examples of its use are: For plastic surgery for children whose faces had been disfigured in a bus accident; children of settlers in Matanuska Valley in Alaska are enjoying a library of more than three hundred volumes; the sensitive fingers of blind children in schools all over the United States "read" the stories in braille which the fund has helped to bring to them. For work abroad it has helped to establish homes in England to shelter children rendered homeless by air raids; milk for children in France; clothing and medications for Poland aided a medical program in China.

Awarded War Dept. Citation

15th AAF In Italy.—Sgt. Alvin B. Barker, son of Mr. Albert J. Barker, of Star Route No. 2, Littlefield, is serving as chief cook with a Bombardment Group, which was recently awarded a second War Department citation for outstanding performances in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations.

He is now authorized to wear an oak leaf cluster on his Distinguished Unit Badge. This second citation was for the daring and successful attack on the Concordia Vega Oil Refinery at Ploesti, Rumania. The first was for an attack on the railyards at Bucharest, Rumania, during which 40 enemy aircraft were destroyed.

At Ploesti, despite an unusually heavy smoke screen which had caused other units of the attacking force to seek alternative targets, the — stayed on its course and dropped its bombs on the refinery with exceptional, devastating accuracy. Three bombers of the group were lost to the heavy anti-aircraft fire of the enemy.

The twice-cited group has made more than 175 attacks against widespread targets in the crumbling Nazi empire.

Gee went through New Guinea and the Dutch East Indies, and part in three major battles. He was awarded the Purple Heart for wearing the Purple Heart for receiving in the Dutch East Indies a ribbon for Pearl Harbor; a ribbon for New Guinea, a Good Conduct badge, as well as a Blue Infantry badge.

Gee was on guard duty on Biak Island in the Dutch East Indies on Oct. 1, Pfc. Gee was attacked by a Jap who slashed him in the left arm, right side and across the forehead, cutting the flesh from his skull. Gee succeeded in driving the sword from the Jap and killing two Japs. He, however, lay on the ground all night and was picked up in the morning by the Medics. He was a patient for months in a hospital in New Guinea, where he had skin grafted on the top of his head, and his wounds treated.

Gee brought home the sword which he killed his attacker with in defense.

Gee has two brothers in service. Hollis Gee is an Anti-Aircraft Gunner in the Army and is overseas. He served two years in Puerto Rico, and returned to the States last Christmas, and is now back overseas.

L. L. Gee is in the Infantry, has been in the service six months, and is stationed at Fort Ord, Calif., but is believed to have left the Continental United States.

Right To Wear Wings And Boots

At Benning, Ga., Nov. 25.—J. A. Stubblefield, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Stubblefield of Littlefield, Texas, has won the right to wear "Wings and Boots" of the United States Army Paratroopers. He completed four weeks of jump training during which time he made 12 jumps, the last a tactical jump at night involving a combat parachute landing.

Jumping at the Parachute School has been steadily developed to a science. American paratroopers have been recognized throughout the world for their heroic actions against the enemy.

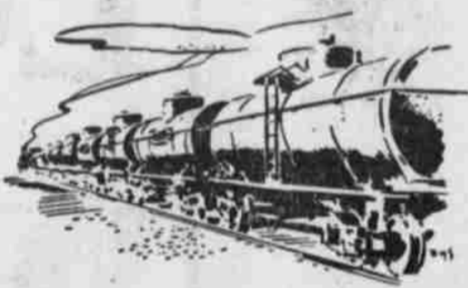

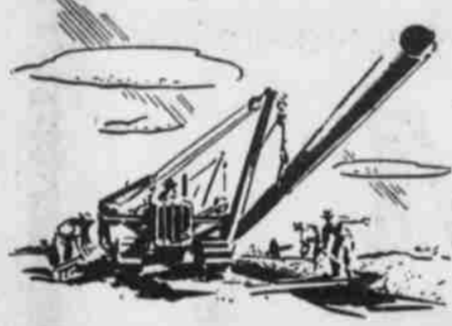

With South Plains Men In the Armed Forces

Hitchcock, Texas.—A veteran of 32 months' duty overseas and of three of the toughest fights in Marine Corps history, Private First Class Arvin Aaron Williams, 21, now is on guard duty at the Naval Air Facility here. The young Leatherneck is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James T. Williams and the husband of Mrs. Pauline Gilmore Williams, all of Earth, Texas. Having fought at Guadalcanal, Tarawa and Saipan, Williams selected the Saipan operations as the toughest engagement in which he took part. It was on Saipan that he received a

wound in the right knee. At Tarawa, Williams said his narrowest escape from death came in hand-to-hand combat with a Jap officer. The Japs had emerged from their command post after Marines laid siege to this stronghold. The officer emerged swinging his sword and struck hard at Williams. The Marine ducked the sweep of the cumbersome weapon and cut the officer down with his bayonet. On Saipan, Williams saw Japs commit suicide with hand grenades placed on their bodies in preference to capture. He took part in the rescue of many natives, "hidden in caves, who had been told weird tales of American cruelty.

Headquarters, Eighth Air Force Fighter Group, Southern England, Nov. 20 (Delayed)—U. S. Mustang fighters went in at 5,000 feet and circled Leipzig's heavily-defended airfield ten miles west of Augsburg. Nearly a mile below, dispersed and camouflaged, were 44 twin-engined Messerschmitt 261s — Germany's prize jet propelled fighters.

Again and again the fighters climbed and dived. When it was over, at least 40 German jets had been destroyed.

There was no element of surprise in the raid, carried out Nov. 18. Mustangs of the Fourth Fighter group and of the 355th group leisurely circled the field to spot gun positions before boring in.

Three jets were left blazing or exploded by Capt. Gerald Montgomery of Littlefield, Tex., whose wife lives at Fort Worth, Tex., but the slender, slow-spoken Texan also barely escaped disaster.

"I was diving on a ship which was smoking heavily," he said, "when suddenly I realized that more bullets were hitting it than had any business to. I pulled back on the stick to come out of my dive and at the same moment another of our planes came out of the smoke from the opposite direction. We passed so close that I could hear his propeller.

"That should have told me my luck was running out, but I made still another pass. When I was 50 feet off the deck a burst of flak hit me and I felt the stick go loose in my hand. I thought sure the ship would go out of control, but somehow I got out of there. The flak had carried away half my tail surfaces, and I could maneuver up or down only about ten degrees, but I made it back to base."

Two planes each were credited to Capt. William C. Anderson, 3rd a pre-war farmer whose parents live near Calvert, Tex., and to Lt. Carl G. Payne of San Antonio, Tex.

Payne, an accounting clerk before he became a flier, riddled a shack on the field in his first pass. "I picked out a jet on the second pass," he said, "and held my guns down, firing until the plane exploded." On the third attack he flew in behind a smoke screen from

burning planes, and although low in ammunition caught a ME-262 squarely and saw it explode.

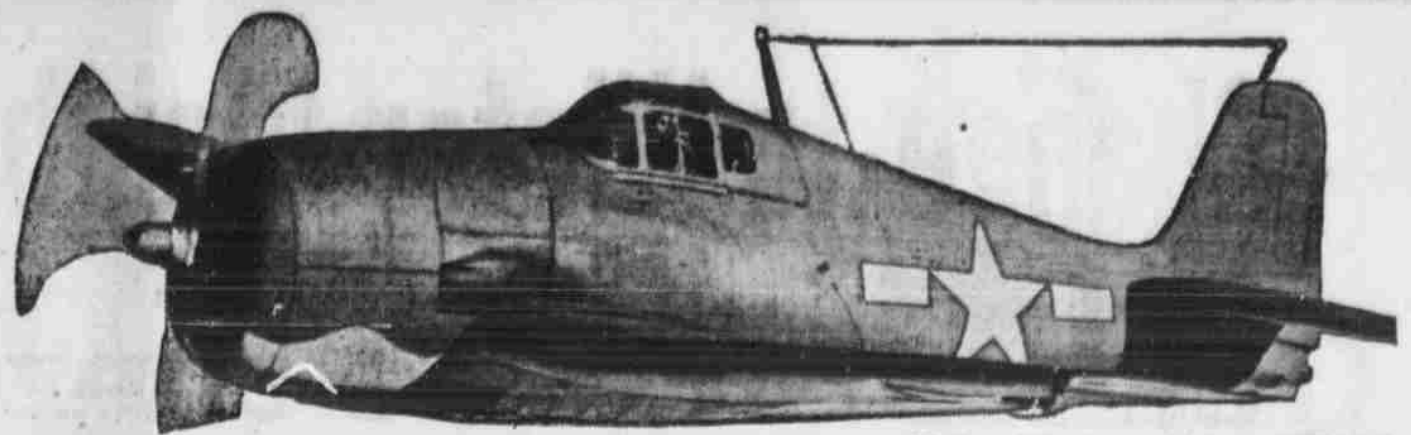

Demonstrations Given On Control Of Cattle Grub

On Tuesday, Nov. 21, the County Agent gave demonstrations on the control of cattle grub, at the farms of M. P. Reid and Paul Vause, north of Littlefield.

A mixture of five parts of derris cube (5 per cent rotenone) and ten parts of weatable sulphur mixed with water at the rate of one pound for each sixteen gallons of water was used. This mixture was sprayed and brushed over the cows' backs and loon until completely wet. This application should be repeated in thirty days if complete control is expected.

The following are some facts as to the Why's of Grub Control:

1. Texas cattle slaughtered annually, 2,000,000 head.
2. Slaughtered cattle grubby each year, 840,000 head.
3. Grubby cattle discounted one-half to one and one-half cents per pound or an average of \$3.86 per animal.
4. Average of two pounds meat per grubby animal destroyed.
5. Total pounds of meat lost in Texas each year, 1,680,000.
7. Leather lost each year, enough to furnish shoes for 1,000,000 soldiers for one year.
8. Approximately 15 per cent more feed required for grubby cattle.
9. Corn belt feeders are demanding grub-free cattle.
10. Reduction in milk flow, approximately 25 per cent.
11. Total loss to Texas farmers each year, approximately \$5,000,000.
