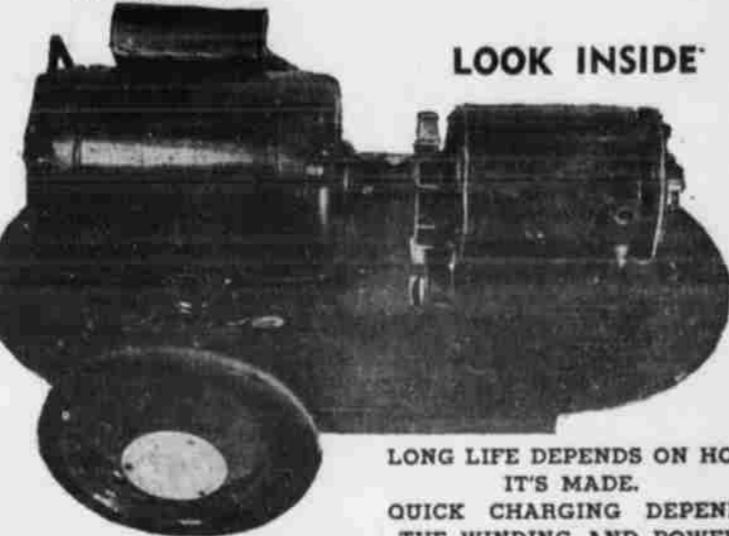

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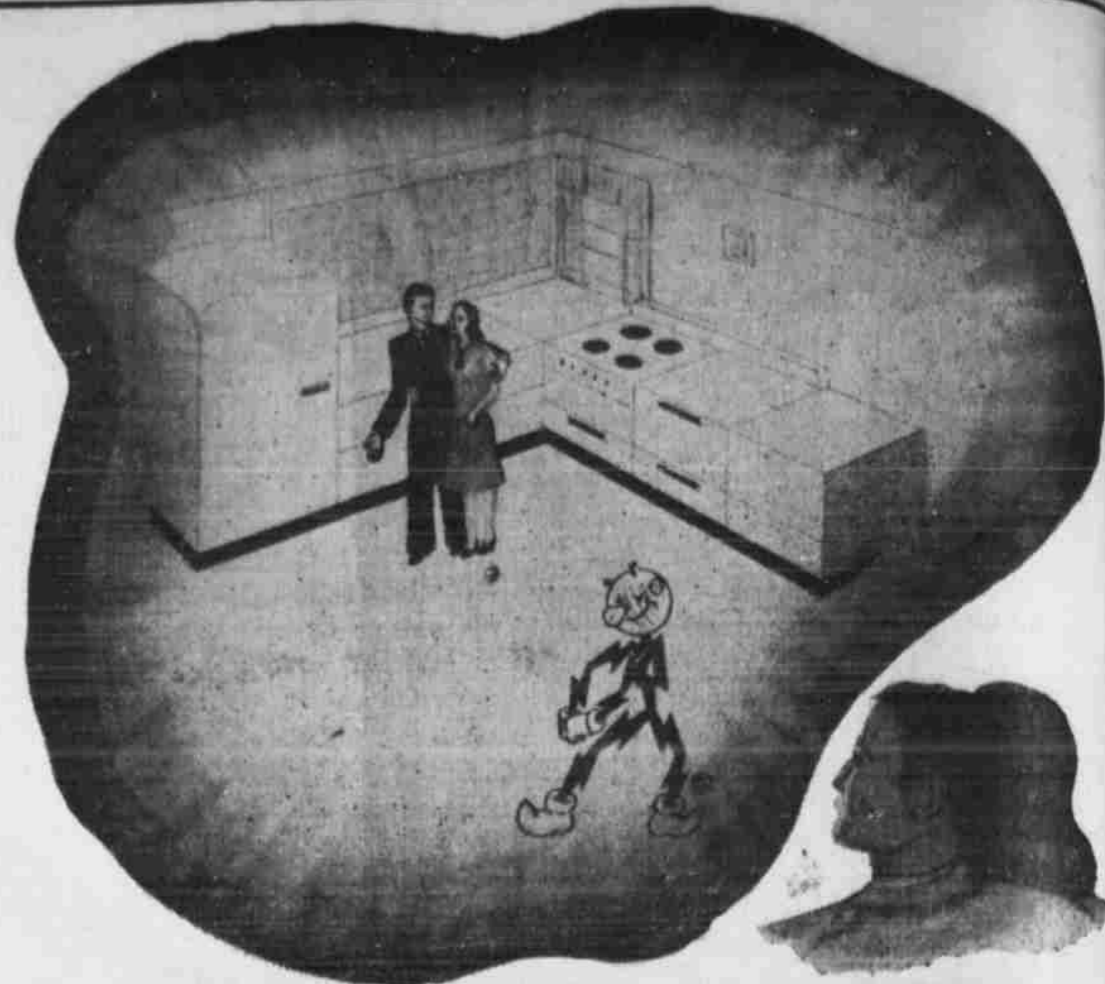

Rev. McSpadden was born November 29, 1886, at Ferris, Texas, Ellis County. When just a child the family moved to Young County, Texas, and settled near Olney. On Sept. 6, 1908, he was united in marriage to Miss Willie Bearden. To this union were born four children, one son and three daughters. The son and one daughter died in infancy.

On November 22, 1926, his companion passed on to her reward.

July 24, 1927, he was united in marriage to Miss Lottie Hartley, and to this union one son was born.

Bro. McSpadden was converted at the age of 18 years uniting with the Cottonwood Baptist Church of Young County.

He is helping us take care of the sick and wounded soldiers evacuated from the Philippines and he is without doubt one of the best men we have. Mrs. Chaney received two letters from her son before she received a telegram from the War Department notifying her of her son's injury.

Pfc. Chaney has a brother and a sister in the service.

Pvt. Jack Chaney left here January 16, and is in Infantry training at Camp Hood.

Doris Chaney, S 2-C, entered the WAVES October last, and is in training at San Diego, Calif.

Lamb Co. Schools Benefit From Emergency Bill Passed

Provides Increase Of \$30 Per Teacher In Local Schools

Total Local State Aid Increased To Amount Of \$60,836

Every school in Lamb county is affected by the recent Emergency Bill that was passed by the State Legislature, and signed by the Governor, providing for increases in teachers salaries of \$300 per teacher for the rest of this school year. This bill or law also provides for an increase of \$30 per teacher on general expenses for running the schools. It also increases the transportation aid \$1.00 per month for every child transported to school for the last four months of the school year.

With 150 teachers in Lamb county, and over 2800 students being transported in 60 school buses in Lamb county, the increased benefits are as follows:

Teachers salaries increase...	\$45,000
General expense increase...	4,500
Transportation aid increase	11,336
Total State aid increase...	\$60,836

We, the school officials, and the patrons of Lamb county are justly proud of this long needed help for our schools of Lamb county, and are hoping that we can get a similar law passed during this present session of the Legislature for the next biennium as this is only an emergency measure affecting the rest of this school year, and the old salary aid law expires with this term.

We can all help our schools by writing to our representatives and senators, thanking them for the aid given to our schools, and also requesting that they pass a similar measure affecting the next biennium.

Buyers Of Cotton Seed Are Warned

Cotton producers of Lamb county should be careful about purchasing planting seed. The pink boll worm has been found again in some nearby counties. If these seed are purchased and brought to this county, Lamb county would be put on the quarantine list again.

The cooperation of every producer is needed if this pest is to be controlled. Seed may be heat treated, without damage to the germination, and control the pink boll worm. Seed bought from farmers can cause trouble.

Killed In Action

Mrs. Henry G. Pollard, Jr., of Littlefield received a telegram from the War Department Thursday night to the effect that her husband, Pvt. Henry G. Pollard, Jr., 21, had been killed in action December 1 on Leyte in the Philippines, and that a letter would follow.

Pvt. Pollard is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry G. Pollard of Bula. Relatives had not heard from Pvt. Pollard in three months. Much concerned over his welfare, they had written the War Department about three weeks ago, and Thursday received the above information.

Pvt. Pollard was a member of the 184th Infantry, 7th Division. He has been in service since December 21, 1943; and overseas since July 5, 1944.

His wife, the former Miss Ruby Fields, is employed by the Walters Corner Drug Store, and makes her home with her mother, Mrs. G. W. Fields. She had not heard from him since November 14.

Pvt. Pollard was a graduate of Bula High school with the class of 1940.

Pvt. Pollard had been in combat service on Wahu Island, before taking part in the invasion of Leyte on October 20.

Previous to entering the service he was engaged in farming with his father at Bula.

Sewell Well Makes 200 Barrels Daily

We are going to have turkey for supper tonight. We have a radio and get news reports. Some of the large stations are coming through from the United States.

"Oh yes, I have seen the sun today. The sun doesn't shine much over here as it's cloudy most all the time over here. I am feeling fine today. I will be back with my company in a few days. I will close as it's about supper time. I will write again in a few days.

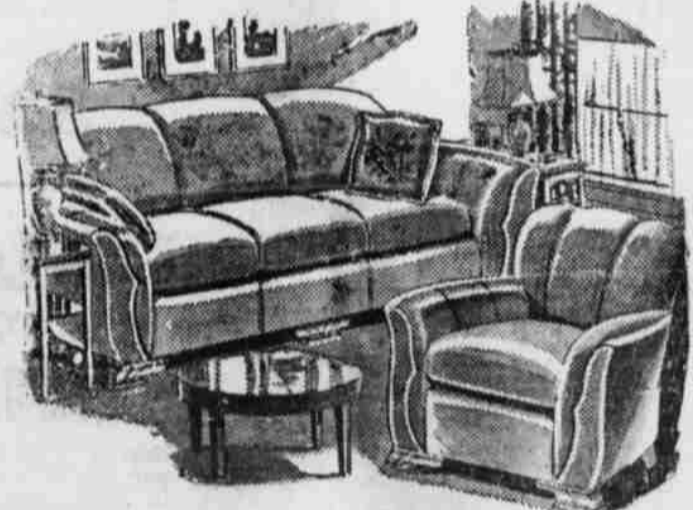

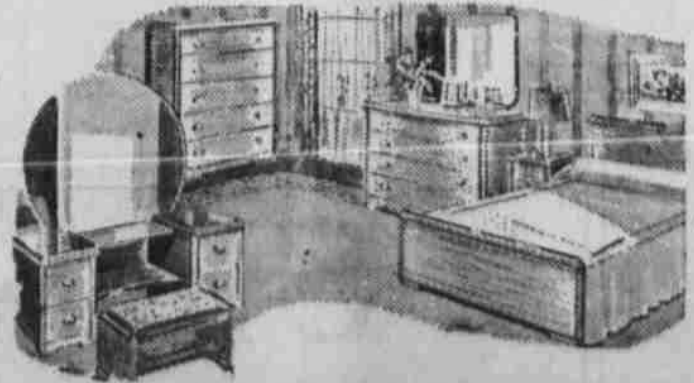

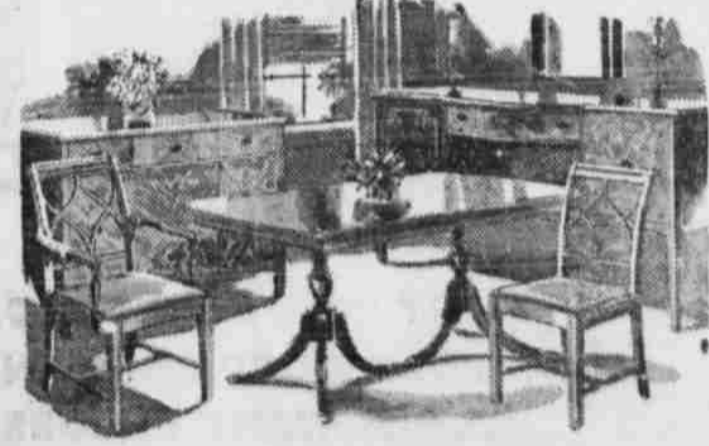

high strength transmission line from the company's Amarillo generating plant through Canyon and Hereford. The new line from Amarillo to Hereford is constructed with a substation capacity of 8,000 kilowatts (10,720 H.P.) and is expected to be placed in operation about May 1. New generating capacity for the South Plains and Eastern New Mexico at the Denver City and Clovis plants totals 15,000 kilowatts (20,100 H.P.) and with the 8,000 kilowatts (10,720 H.P.) available over the Amarillo-Canyon-Hereford transmission line, new capacity for this region will total 23,000 kilowatts (30,820 H.P.).

Other construction underway and previously announced consists of a new transmission line from near Plainview to the Aiken REA substation. A new transmission line from Clovis will increase the capacity into Portales. Several of the company's distribution substations are being enlarged to meet the present and future needs for electric power throughout this section.
