Fort Bliss Lease 300,000 More Acres

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 22-(UP)-Fort Bliss, the nation's largest cavalry post where thousands of soldiers will be trained in the national defense program, had its beginning as a center for troops sent here to protect this border town from Indians almost a century ago.

In recent years the war department has spent millions on new construction at the post, and its new residential quarters and barracks are unsurpassed. The future size of the post is uncertain, but it seems destined to grow.

Ft. Bliss had its origin in 1848 Dragoons were sent here, although civil war the post was burned by retreating confederates.

Today the fort has almost 5,000 to several thousand national guardsmen temporarily stationed there. army is now in the act of purchasing 52,000 acres north of the present site. Plans call for the leasing of 300,000 additional acres.

Fort Bliss has over 3,000 horses and the only horse-drawn field artillery - the 82nd - in the army.

It has seen exciting days, such as those during 1916-17 when President Wilson called out 60,000 national guardsmen during Mexican border troubles. The 60,000 men were quartered at the fort in tents.

At present the fort is headquarters for the first cavalry division,

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

Bonds Amounting To \$300,000 Needed To Construct Highway

A petition was circulated Wednesday and today, among the property owners in the south part of Lamb county and will be presented at a special session of Commissioner's Court probably Friday, asking that

a Road District be created in the south part of Lamb County, and calling an election for the purpose of voting bonds for hardsurfacing the east-west highway.

50 Citizens Must Sign It will be necssary that the petition be signed by 50 property

owners and tax-paying voters. It is being circulated by officials of the Chamber of Commerce, of Littlefield.

The proposed road district starts at the east line of Lamb County, about four miles north of Little-NUMBER 31 field, extending west to approximatly three miles south of Amherst, or seven miles south of Sudan to the west county line.

Bonds in \$300,000 Needed

If the district is created, and an election for the voting of bonds is called by the Commissioners' Court, the election will probably be held in the very near future. Bonds amounting to \$300,000 will be needed to build the road, purchase rightof-ways, and pay engineers fee.

It was reported that if the bonds were voted, the state highway department will build the road, and eventually pay off the bonds.

The east-west highway was planned several years ago, when officials from Floyd, Hale and Lamb counties asked the state highway department to survey and designate the road as a state highway. State engineers made a survey, but the road was not designated as a state Members of the committee in highway. However, if bonds are voted for the build the survey will be changed.

Road Starts East of Spade

The proposed highway in Lamb county will start at the east county line, four miles due east of Spade, continue through Spade and will include Oklahoma Avenue, into Littlefield, west on ninth street, and continue on the Pep highway, reaching the west county line several miles north of Pep.

Lamb 4-H Club Members **Compete In Calf Contest**


