

# Why Littlefield Needs Improved Sanitation

The campaign to put sanitary conditions in Littlefield on a par with economic progress appeared as a pressing necessity as medical and members of a Chamber of Commerce committee continued to study the problem of sanitation in Littlefield.

The sanitation program, was instituted as the result of protests from C. members and citizens who resent to the city's obsolete methods of garbage collection and street cleaning as detracting from the attractiveness and efficiency of Littlefield as well as presenting a serious health hazard.

**Danger Cited**

Medical members of the committee said that the recent epidemic of polio might easily be attributed to unsanitary conditions.

Dr. C. E. Payne, committee chairman, made four suggestions which

the committee recommended as part of any sanitation measures obtained.

1. Daily garbage collection in the downtown district.
2. Twice weekly garbage collection in residential districts.
3. Enforce a ruling that all wet garbage must be kept in covered containers.
4. Allow no overnight parking which could interfere with the efforts of street cleaners.

In outlining the need for an adequate sanitation program for Littlefield, Dr. Payne emphasized that medical knowledge of polio-infantile paralysis demands the use of rigid sanitary precautions in controlling the spread of the disease.

Although polio is generally regarded as a warm-weather disease, one school-age child has been stricken with infantile paralysis here in Littlefield this fall.

An increase in postal receipts of some 27 percent has been noted through the months of August, September and October in 1947 over 1946, according to Postmaster W. D. T. Storey.

Postal receipts for this period totaled \$8,678.08 for 1947, or a total of \$1,866.45 increase over last year.

With both city routes well organized along with parcel post, there has been a nice increase in incoming and outgoing mail.

Parcel post has risen to a new high, according to Postmaster Storey. In one instance one entire trip was required to make a complete truck load of parcel post to one merchant.

Melvin E. West has been employed as City mail carrier. Mr. West is a veteran, having seen service in the Navy.

# Variety Store Takes Long-Term Lease on Phelps Ave. Frontage

One of the most important real estate transactions which has taken place in Littlefield in some time is that whereby L. B. Stone has leased to Sprouse-Reitz, Inc., of Portland, Oregon, for 15 years, the building on Phelps avenue now occupied by Nelson's Hardware.

The Sprouse-Reitz Company are a large mercantile concern specializing in five cents to \$5 merchandise.

Mr. Stone will start extensive improvements to the building soon after January 1, 1948.

Mr. Nelson will move his business to a location at Third street and LFD drive, which he purchased recently.

The contract calls for the Phelps

avenue building to be ready for use by the new tenant as near June 1 as possible.

The present Phelps avenue building has a frontage of 50 feet and a depth of 80 feet. It will be extended to a total depth of 125 feet, and will be entirely modernized. Improvements will include a modern front and special lighting.

It is significant to note that a firm of this size is opening stores in Texas, and it is another expression of the high standing occupied by Littlefield among the outstanding small cities of the state. In fact, the Littlefield store will be the first store established by the company in Texas with a frontage of 50 feet. However,

the West Coast concern plans to invade Texas on a large scale, and will establish stores as leases are available.

The company's colors are pale green with walnut trim, and this treatment will be carried out in building and equipping the local store.

Establishment of the new store is another step forward in the progress of Littlefield as a shopping center.

James I. Grandy, district supervisor for Sprouse-Reitz stores, said that he is highly pleased with Littlefield.

The manager of the local store will move his family to this city as soon as housing can be obtained.

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—Is Veterans Administration doing anything to keep abreast of improvements in prosthetic equipment so that we veterans may get the benefit of them?

A—Veterans Administration employees who aid disabled veterans in selecting and fitting artificial arms, legs, eyes and other devices are going to school to learn the latest developments and improvements in the prosthetic field.

Q—I received an overpayment in subsistence allowance after I left school. Will I have to refund the amount I received to the Government?

A—Yes. Q—I am being rehabilitated under Public Law 16 and I would like to know what medical treatment is available to me?

A—Under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 16) you are entitled to any kind of medical treatment needed (hospital or out-patient) to prevent interruption of your training.

Q—How and where do I apply for hospitalization for a service connected disability?

A—See your nearest Veterans Administration contact representative or apply at a VA regional office or hospital. A letter addressed to the nearest VA office will suffice. In case of emergency, you can telephone the nearest VA office collect.

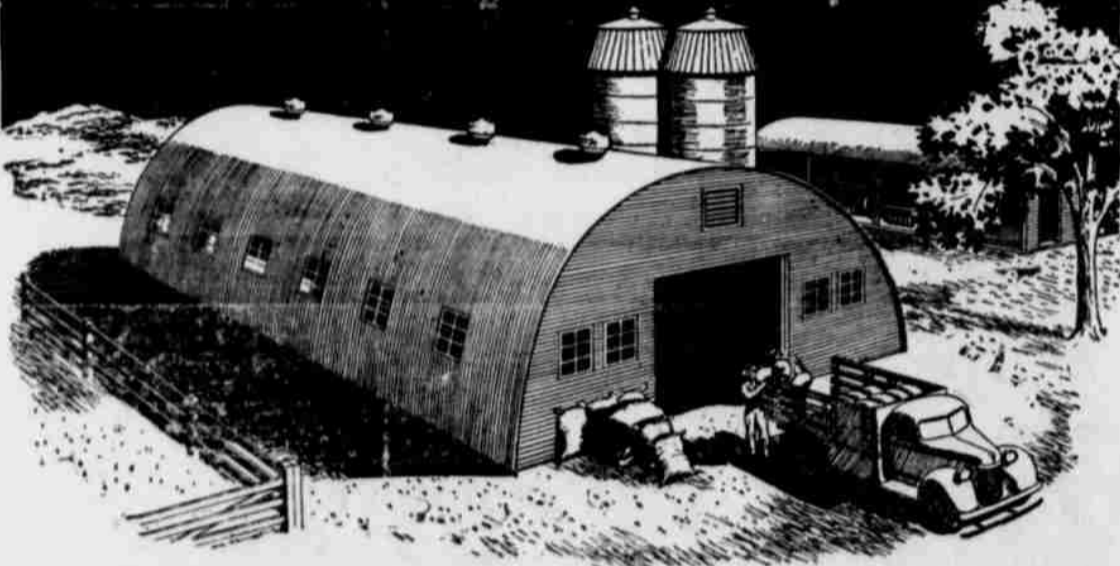

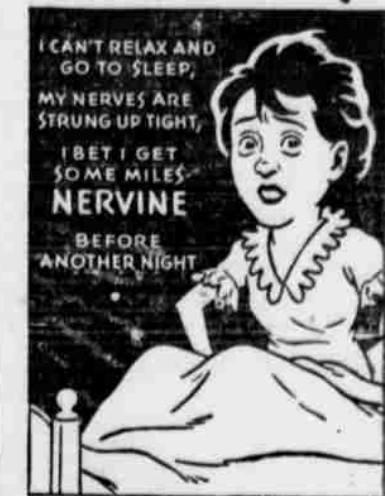

ed up for freezer locker this year. The home preparation of poultry for the freezer locker is comparatively easy. The main thing to remember is that no time should be lost between killing and freezing. It is very important that the birds be well-bled. The temperature of the scalding water should be 128 deg. F. Pierce the brain, just as though the bird was going to be dry-picked. The feathers will pull a little easier and the skin will be in better condition for storage.

Tie the wings and legs down on birds for roasting or baking, to make a more compact package.

If the bird is to be stewed or fried, cut it ready for the pan. It is more easily done before packaging than after freezing.

Good packaging of poultry for the locker is essential. Many users have found that sealed cellophane bags or tight cartons are the best ways to preserve quality.

If the temperature of the freezer is maintained at zero deg. F., well-packaged poultry can be kept six to 12 months.

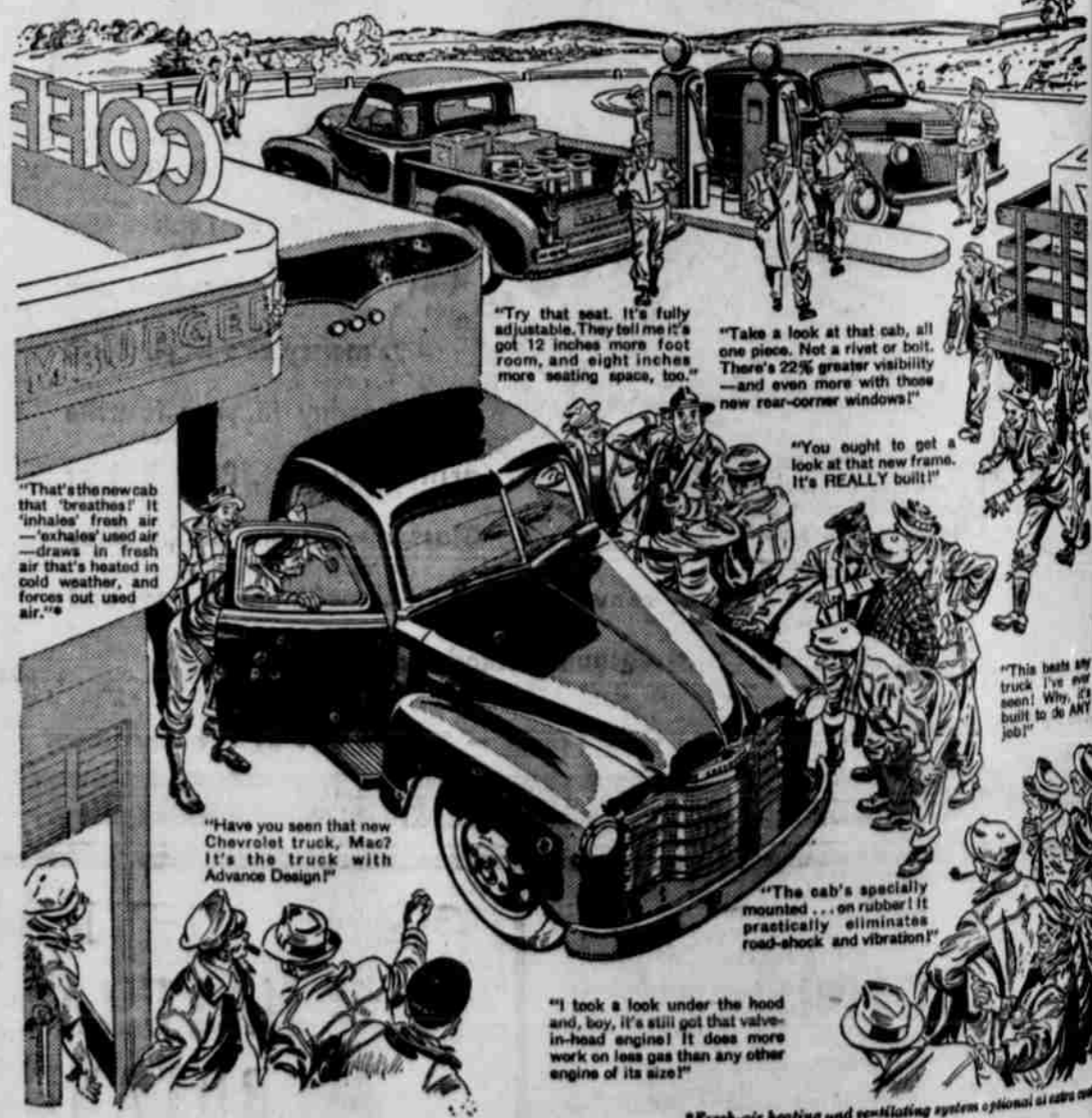

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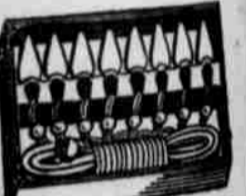
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
