

To what end is suggested by the remarks of Chancellor Hitler, in which he suggested what Germany might do if she possessed the mineral and agricultural resources of Russia. That, coupled with his demand for a return of the German colonies taken away by the Treaty of Versailles, comes very close to being an actual threat

Russia today has the largest standing army ever known in the history of the world and one of the best equipped. Russia fears attack both from the West and from the East. Japan is reaching farther Northward and Westward from Manchuria, and the day seems not far off when the Soviet Republic will be fighting for its life on both fronts. Italy and France both seem to be watching for the time and the opportunity to dismember Spain and parcel it out between them. Britain's colonial empire is threatened by all these developments. In the event of another great war, it seems impossible that England can stay out. And it is far from impossible that the United States would also find itself involved.





Littlefield School District covers one hundred and eighty-eight square miles of territory. The present enrollment to date is twelve-hundred and eighty, including about forty colored pupils. Of the present enroll-ment about six hundred sixty-seven ride school buses. These come from distances ranging from one to eighteen miles, Seventeen new all steel maroon

and white buses each having a capacity of forty to forty-five pupils transport those living at a distance of one mile or more.

An indebtedness of about one-hun dred and seventy-nine thousand dollars for buildings has been reduced in the last five years to about twenty thousand dollars. The school refunded all bonded indebtedness of the district in 1933 by which the district was saved twelve thousand dollars in bonds and the interest was reduced from 6 per cent to 5 per cent. Such a reduction over the per-iod of the life of the bonds which is forty years, will save the district a net total of forty thousand dollars. A stinging north wind that caused the mercury to fall to 58 degrees Saturday night swept over this section of the South Plains, Rain Sunday fell here measuring about half an inch adding to general discom-

A low temperature of 38 was recorded by the thermometer at the West Texas Gas Company for Tuesday at 8 a. m. as the lowest for the past week. Other records for the week: Thursday last, low 64, high 70; Friday low 59, high 75; Saturday low 58, high 67; Sunday low 42, high 45; Monday low 40, high 60; Tuesday low 38 and high 60; Wednesday low 41 and high 74.

The low temperature gave a threat of possible damage to both cotton and grain sorghums, the beginning of this week. However, with the rise in temperature and the sun shining all fears are abandoned.
