Littlefield and Lamb county joined with the nation Saturday afternoon in homage to Franklin Delano Roosevelt, president of the United States, who died Thursday afternoon at Warm Springs, Ga., where he had gone for a rest.

All business establishments in Littlefield were closed from 2 to 4 p. m. Saturday (the period of the funeral service in Washington) and the flag at the post office was at half mast and will remain in that position for the 30-day period of mourning.

All over the world millions mourn for the man who symbolized for them the ideals and aspirations of the United States.

Burial of the nation's chief executive took place Saturday morning. He was laid to rest in the garden of his Hyde Park home.

Harry S. Truman, vice-president, was sworn in as president of the United States at the White House Thursday in the presence of high government officials.

Catapulted to the highest office in the land by the death of Mr. Roosevelt, the president seized his first opportunity to address a joint session of Congress shortly after noon Monday.

President Truman pleaded with Congress and with all Americans to help him carry out the war and peace ideals of Mr. Roosevelt.

When the late chief executive took office 12 years ago he voiced his own deep faith that "the only thing we have to fear is fear itself."

So remembering the teachings and admonitions of a great leader, the nation stalwartly carries on, solidly behind President Truman, in whom they have unwavering faith.

## MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

The representatives of the United States and other families of the United Nations, who will assemble in the City of San Francisco on April 25th to work out a Charter for a World Organization for the establishment of a just peace among nations and the prevention of future wars, do now and will then need the prayers of all the people of all America to guide and direct them to a successful completion of their labors, to the end that the future generations of Americans will never again be forced to submit to the horrible experiences of war and heartbreaks such as we are enduring today.

THEREFORE, I, Beeman Phillips, Mayor of the City of Littlefield, Texas, by authority of the City Commission and by virtue of the authority of my office, do hereby proclaim and designate the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. to 11 o'clock A. M. of April 25th, 1945, as an hour of prayer to our God for divine guidance of our and other nations' representatives at the Conference, and recommend that places of business in the City be closed at that hour, that prayer services be held in the Churches of the City, that the people of the City attend such services, and that all the people of our City join with all the other people of this and other freedom-loving nations in an earnest and fervent prayer to Almighty God to give the representatives at the conference vision and power to devise means to remove and forever end the cause of war.

Housewives Urged To Save Fats

Housewives, Army mess sergeants, cooks and KP's are doing a landslide business of turning in used kitchen fats but collections must continue on the upgrade if this year's goal is met, Dan L. Boyd, District Representative, WFA's Office of Supply, said today.

nized the importance of used fats to the war program and are saving millions of pounds yearly, he explained.

In a recent statement to the WFA representative, Col. Luther G. Weatherly, Eighth Service Command Quartermaster and director of salvage and redistribution, pointed out "Grease for Glycerin" had been a byword in every army installation in the southwest ever since housewives were asked to turn in used fats to

their butchers. Last year, he explained, more than 6,500,000 pounds of used grease were earmarked for war uses from army kitchens in the five-state area of Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico, and collections are continuing.

In all army kitchens in the Eighth Service Command, Col. Weatherly said "No amount of grease, however small, is wasted. Ammunition is needed too badly overseas."

Greatest untapped source of used fats is the civilian kitchen from which still larger quantities must come this year if the goal is realized, Boyd said. For every pound turned in, housewives are paid two red ration points and four cents cash.

### Advertising Most Necessary To 7th War Loan Drive

The Leader Saturday received the following letter from the Treasury Department, Washington, in connection with Seventh War Loan advertising to the fighting forces, the most important war activity providing the money to carry on the war. These two constitute the nation upon which victory rests. Other war efforts fall below in the list.

The letter is to warn you that there can be no anti-climax in the newspapers' war financing program. The glorious record which we have is to be recognized at the close of the space which you have can later sell, can spare for purpose, will be needed to meet bigger quotas of the Seventh—and until the last fighting pins his ancestors.

Do not yield to any temptation to devote to other purposes, even to war activities, that space or which you have committed in the past to the support of war financing—nor otherwise commit yourselves to the end that War potentials to the end that War space would be less than the amount your newspaper supply possible.

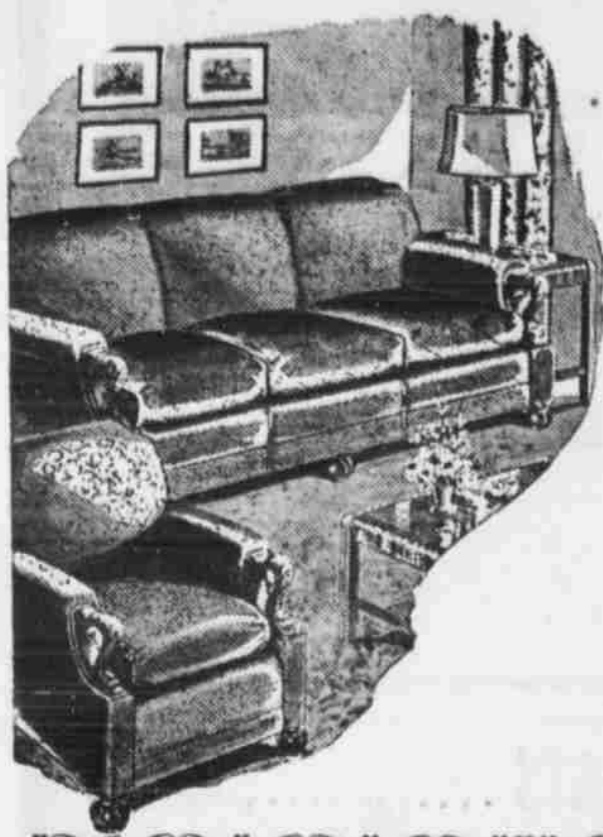

## Staff Sergeant Pat Boone, Jr., Has High Praise For Red Cross Service Clubs

LONDON. — Distantly connected with the great Daniel Boone, Staff Sergeant Pat Boone, of Littlefield, Texas, not long ago was riding range for his father on their ranch just over the New Mexico line. Then he settled down to his studies and entered the University of Texas. Three years of learning and the Army claimed him. So, at 22, he drifted into American Red Cross Rainbow Corner in London recently on a seven day furlough.

Boone is in the Reinforcement Command and has been busy handling men, weeding them out, ship-

ping them to the Continent. The only son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Boone, Pat, Jr., plans to return to the University of Texas to take his degree after the war. Then he is going to hit the open spaces again and go into the cattle business in a big way with his dad. "I must say that the American Red Cross has been a great help to me overseas," said the sergeant. "I wouldn't have the fun I am having in London on leave were it not for the Red Cross clubs which seem to be located at the right places to catch a tired G.I. sightseer."

## Returns From 17 Months Combat To Die In Plane Crash

Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Bryce attended the funeral of Lieut. James Bryce Sunday at Altus, Okla. Lieut. Bryce was a nephew of C. F. Bryce of Littlefield.

Lieut. Bryce was 23 years old, a Navy Pilot, and veteran of two combat tours in the South Pacific; was killed in an airplane crash in California April 10. Lieut. Bryce had reported for duty at the Long Beach, Calif., Navy airbase April 6, after completing a 34 day furlough granted him when he returned to the States early in March from his second tour of combat duty. Lieut. Bryce had a total of 17 months of combat duty. His first tour of combat included raids on Raboul, when that base was at its height as a Japanese stronghold. His last tour carried him into the Philippines area, and the China coast. He was shot down by anti-aircraft fire November 19 off the China coast, but was rescued by an American submarine, after spending three hours in the water. He was aboard the submarine for 24 days before reaching Pearl Harbor and rejoining his carrier based squadron. He had 10 Jap planes to his credit, six of them shot down in aerial combat and four destroyed on the ground. He bagged three planes in one engagement. His combat decorations included the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, Purple Heart and Air Medal, and several campaign stars.

Lieut. Bryce was born in Altus, Okla., August 4, 1921. He attended school there; completed college in 1941 and in July of that year entered the Navy Reserve and began his training in November, 1941. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Bryce, two sisters, Mrs. Robinette Tucker of Glendale, Calif., Miss Sue Bryce of Altus, Okla., and five brothers, Thurman of Duncan, Okla.; Owen Bryce of Altus; T-Sgt. Gene Bryce of Lubbock Army Airfield; Ens. C. F. Bryce, who is completing his training as a Navy Pilot at Miami, Fla., and Warren Bryce of the home address.

### In the Armed Forces With South Plains

6TH ARMY GROUP, Germany.—The big 240-mm. howitzers of the 697th Field Artillery Battalion, which fired their first round on Italy's Cassino front over a year ago, recently sent their 20,000th round—representing 7,300,000 lbs. of shell—crashing into German positions fronting U. S. Seventh Army troops in General Jacob L. Devers' 6th Army Group.

These 240's helped destroy the famous Sinsierhoff fortress, bastion of the Maginot Line before Bitche, France. The battalion's observer went forward with infantry troops and was fired on by the fortress's gunners while directing fire from a position 1,000 yards away. Twelve direct hits reduced the 10-foot concrete walls and brought the surviving Germans running out to surrender.

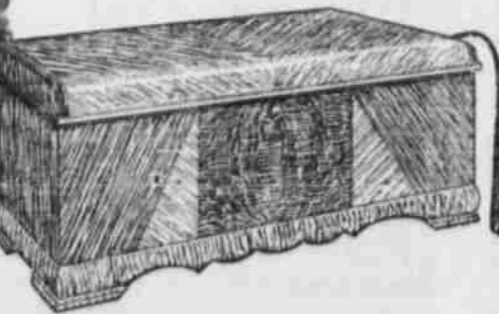
