Ercanbrack Home Burglarized; Many Personal Belongings Taken

W. H. Ercanbrack of 12 miles southwest of Littlefield in Oklahoma Flats community reports that when he arrived home Monday night from a month's trip visiting friends and relatives in South Texas and Oklahoma, he found that thieves had broken into his home and carried away considerable personal belongings.

Mr. Ercanbrack, in an interview with a Leader reporter, stated that all clothing of his left in the home was taken, as well as the bedclothes, cooking utensils, shot gun, cedar chest, and even to his Bible. Mr. Ercanbrack added that he "hoped they

would read the Bible". Entrance was gained by breaking a lock to his home.

A report of the burglary was made to both Lamb County Sheriff's department, and to the Sheriff of Hockley County, as the Ercanbrack home is in Hockley County.

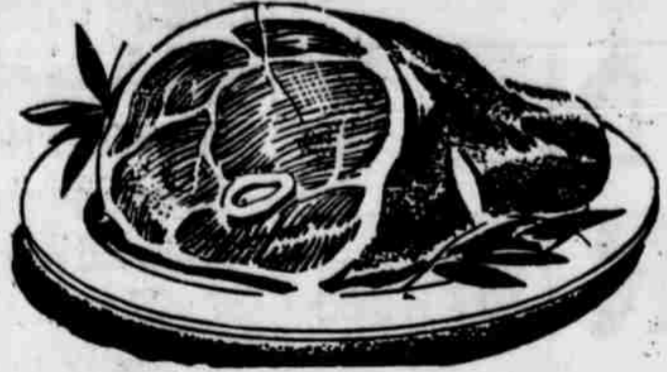

Easter Ham Loaf
Broadcast: April 16, 1949

1 lb. ground smoked ham* 1/2 cup catsup
2 cups corn flakes 1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup Pet Milk 4 slices canned pineapple
1 slightly beaten egg No. 2 can peas

Turn on oven; set at slow (325°F.). Grease well, then dust with flour a quart ring mold. Mix ham, corn flakes, milk, egg, catsup and pepper. Using a spoon, press into prepared ring mold. Bake until firm, or about 1 hour. Turn out; garnish with halves of pineapple slices. Fill center of ham ring with creamed peas. Makes 4 servings.

*Boiled or baked ham can be used if baking time is reduced to 35 minutes. A 12-oz. can of luncheon meat also can be used.

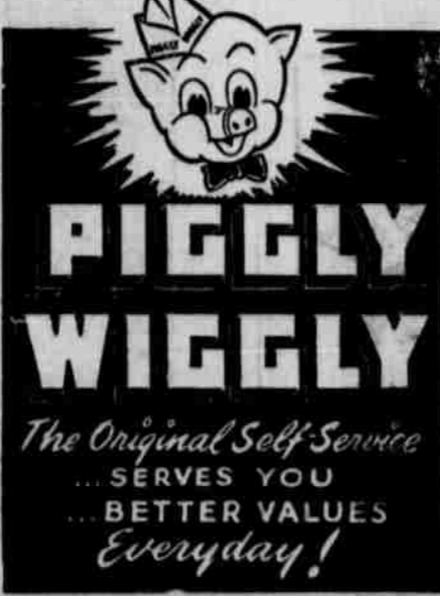

Denton Civic Boy Choir Coming To Littlefield

Now on a three thousand mile tour of six states, the Denton Civic Boy Choir will be presented in concert at the First Presbyterian Church of Littlefield, at 8 p. m. this Friday, under the auspices of the church.

This newest addition to the American concert field, the Denton Civic Boy Choir, is also probably one of the youngest in organization. Founded in 1946 by its present director, George Bragg, it has become one of the country's outstanding choirs.

Boys forming the choir range in age from eight to fourteen years. The choir is non-denominational and is open to any boy whose musical and academic ability can meet the requirements.

The choir was originally subsidized by Denton's Junior Chamber of Commerce however, within a year and a half, the choir had become so popular in the town that it became a civic project.

It began touring in 1947 and continued through 1948 with such success that the choir attracted the attentions of a number of concert agencies. From then on, it was a matter of conscientious training and hard work.

Decided Increase
Over Same Period
Last Year Noted**

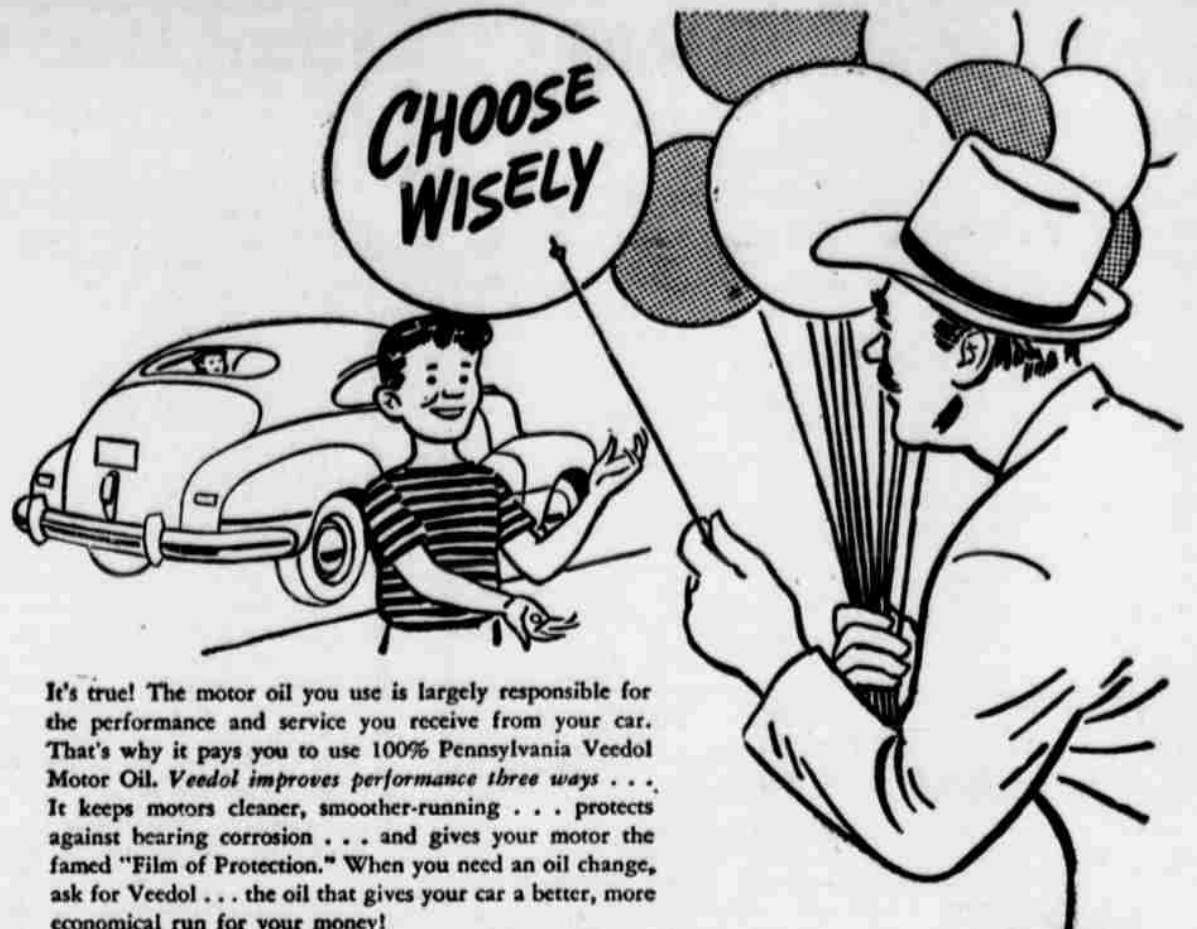

Revival Underway At Church Of The Nazarene

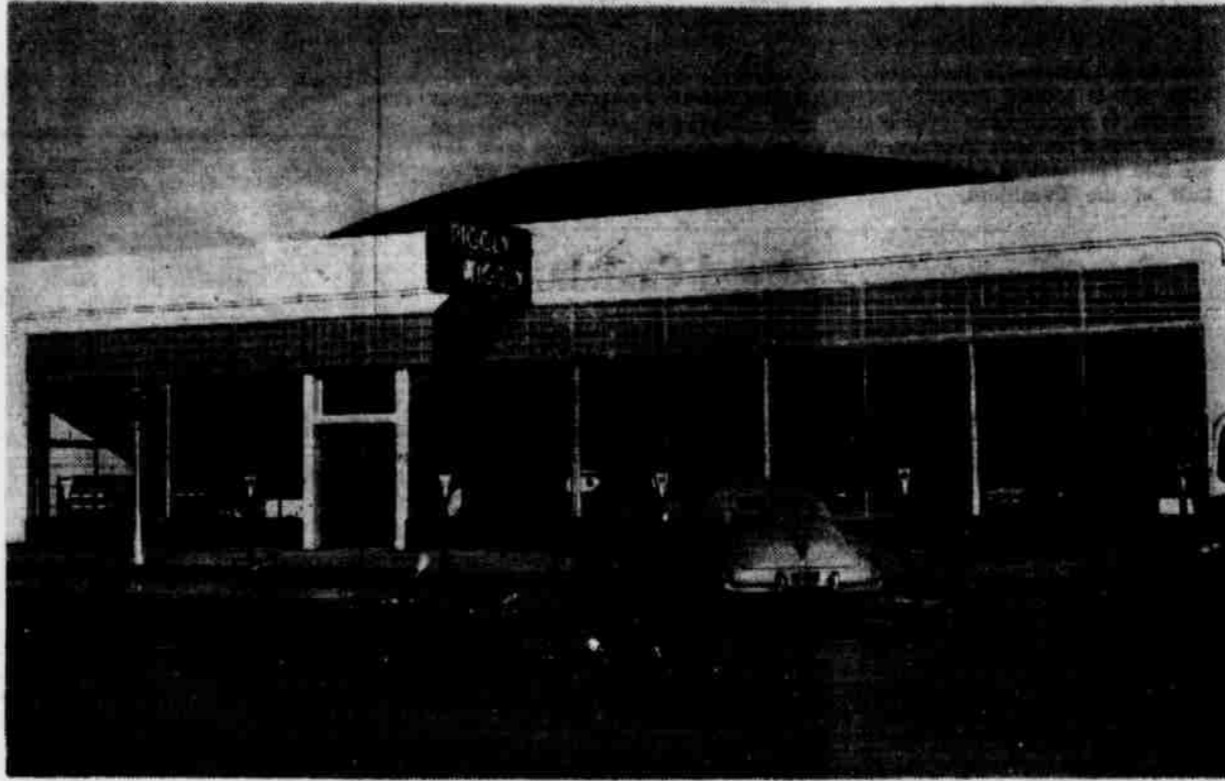

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Extensive Cotton Mechanization Program Seen For South Plains

The South Plains will be the scene this year of the largest scale mechanization of cotton farming in history. Present estimates are that the mechanization process in the area will involve the purchase of upwards of \$4,000,000 worth of new farm equipment, with a strong possibility that the figure may go considerably higher.

It will mean that the South Plains will have the largest concentration of mechanized farming equipment of any cotton growing region of comparable area in the world.

In the prospect are seen both problems and opportunities.

One of the problems is the cut that would result in retail business if machines, rather than field hands, harvested the area's cotton crop each year. The 50,000 to 60,000 cotton pickers who have flocked to the South Plains each fall have caused booming business. This business would be lost if machines replaced them.

One of the opportunities is the possibility of attracting to Lubbock and the South Plains plants for building such machines. Some such plants already are in existence. The possibility that these might be developed into an industry of giant size has been receiving the serious study for some time of such organizations as the chamber of commerce.

At present and in the past, cotton farmers here and elsewhere have relied almost entirely upon field labor for two of the most important and most difficult jobs in producing a crop. These are chopping and harvesting. Chopping involves the thinning out

of newly sprouted cotton plants, so they won't grow too thickly to choke each other, and the elimination of weeds. It is laborous work which, traditionally, is done in most cotton fields by hand with a hoe. Harvesting, of course, means the collection of the staple from the fields. Machines have been developed to do both of these jobs.

One is popularly known as the "rotary hoe". Towed by a tractor or other motive power, an operator can "chop" as many as four rows of cotton at a time.

Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experimental farm at Lubbock, estimates there are approximately 1,100 of these hoes on the South Plains now. They are relatively inexpensive. A standard four-row hoe can be bought for about \$110.

They have been in short supply. But representative dealers say they are more plentiful this year.

They estimate that the number on the South Plains will be at least doubled this season. Need for them will begin soon after the 1949 crop is planted. The period of heavy planting in this area usually is between April 20 and May 20.

The other machine expected to figure in the strong trend toward mechanization is the harvester. They are of many types. Some which pick the cotton clean are expensive—\$5,000 or more.

But those used almost exclusively on the South Plains are known as "strippers." They don't pick the cotton clean, but the modern gin takes care of that. Their cost is not prohibitive, ranging now from about \$900 to \$1,250. One will

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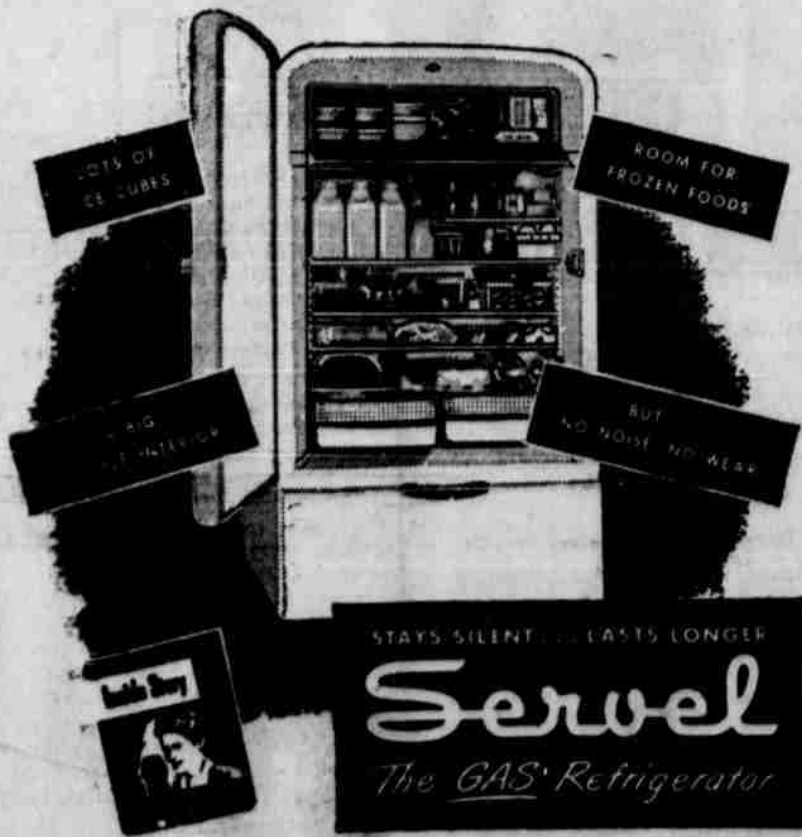
