

DIAL TELEPHONE SYSTEM UNDER CONSIDERATION FOR SUDAN, TERRITORY

The installation of a new dial telephone system is now being considered for the city of Sudan, which, if accepted and completed, will be similar to that now being installed in a large number of the towns on the South Plains, by the Southwestern Associated Telephone sys-

F. L. Butler, special agent for the telephone company was in Sudan on Wednesday and Thursday of this week in the interest of the new type telephone exchange and stated the following information for the benefit of those who do not thoroughly understand the new proposed set-up:

"A new dial telephone system is being discussed and will be installed if appproved by the present subcribers. All telephones will be hand sets, commony called French type and will consist of only two types of wall and a desk handset. Any subcriber can have either type telephone in either class of service. telephone in either class of service at the same price.

The dial equipment and telephones will be the latest type and design that are manufactured today and all equipment will be installed new giving Sudan one of the best systems that is available.

"The rate schedule will be al tered though not increased, only slightly in some cases."

The new system if installed will have a two party selective ringing service that is being used in a number of exchanges at present and gives a fine type of service and at a very nominal cost.

Amherst has accepted the new rate schedule and immediate steps are going forward for installation of the new system. Several other towns have recently been converted to dial systems or are under construction at this time with an early date of completion contem-

One Variety Goes To Town-

Farmers are "going to town" with the one-variety cotton movement as the acreage in the cotton producing states increased from 394,000 acres in 1931 to nearly 3,000,000 in 1939.

In 1931 about 90 per cent of the cotton planted in one-variety communities was located in the irrigated valleys of California, Arizona, and New Mexico.

Texas led the parade in 1939 with 415 of the 1,486 one-variety communities and almost a third of the total


In 1938 USDA marketing special-

ists selected 3,854 bales of cotton from one-variety communities in an export demonstration program to show foreign spinners that America was reentering the quality cotton field.

Last year 12,602 bales were selected from five one-variety areas, of which more than 5,000 came from the Victoria section.

The big development in Texas during 1940, according to M. C. Jaynes, specialist in cotton work with the Texas A. and M. Extension Service, will be the establishment of a number of central marketing points where even-running lots of cotton from one-variety communities will be offered to buyers.




