LEGAL NOTICE

S. J. R. No. 8
A JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Section 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or

pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members"; and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D., 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the

With South Plains Men In The Armed Forces

**With South Plains Men
In The Armed Forces**

Mrs. R. A. Brotherton had not heard from her son, Cpl. Jack Brotherton, since March 24th, until last week when she received a letter dated April 21st. In which he said he had been moving so fast he had not had time to write. He is with a Cavalry Rcn. troop in Germany.

His sisters, Betty and Margaret, received last week a beautiful costume French doll from him from Paris.

Mrs. Brotherton also heard from her son, Robert Al Brotherton, radio man 3-c, last week, the letter was written May 2, and was the first

letter she received since March 24. Seaman Brotherton had been on Okinawa. He said in his letter that he had not been in port and had not had a chance to write. His base is at Pearl Harbor.

Cpl. Tom D. Brotherton, another son, has also been playing a very active part in the war. He is with a Troup Carrier Command of the Eighth Air Force. He wrote his mother that they had evacuated some French prisoners of war from Germany and took them back to France, who had been prisoners five years. These prisoners had been farm laborers.

Cpl. T. E. Sandefer, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Sandefer, and brother of Miss Rosa Lee Sandefer, who

has been stationed at the Presidio, San Francisco, California, arrived home Wednesday of last week on a furlough, and will spend until May 24th here.

Cpl. Sandefer was overseas 30 months, and has been in the States the past five months.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—Robert S. Henderson, 24, of Sudan, Tex., has been promoted from sergeant to staff sergeant. Sgt. Henderson is tail gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress that participated in Eighth Air Force bombing attacks on targets in Nazi Germany. Sgt. Henderson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Claudies M. Henderson, Sudan. His wife, Mrs. Barbara J. Henderson, and son Robert live

in Canadian, Texas. Before entering the Army Air Forces in September, 1941, the sergeant was a student at Oklahoma A. & M.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER STATION, England—Putting the sting into P-51 Mustang fighter planes and keeping it there is the Army Air Force assignment of Sgt. Bobby W. Armstrong of Littlefield, Texas, who as an aircraft armorer in Co. I Group is responsible for the good condition and functioning of the 6 caliber .50 machine guns on one P 51 Mustang fighter plane. Sgt. Armstrong removes each caliber .50 machine gun after a mission (if the guns have been fired) cleans it, inspects it, adjusts its parts, re-installs it, and then loads its maga-

zines with a fresh belt of ammunition. Sgt. Armstrong was a student in Texas Tech, Lubbock, before entering the Army Air Forces. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Armstrong, Star route 2, Littlefield, Texas.

Sgt. Raymond L. Dean, son of Mr. and Mrs. John R. Dean of Sudan, who has been in the European theatre ever since Patton's third army, with which he is in the transportation division, invaded Normandy, had some experience capturing Nazis toward the end of the war in Europe. Recently he discovered that one of the trucks in his outfit was not along, so he went back to find out what the trouble was and found that truck loading Nazis who had popped up in the road to

surrender. When they started to where the rest of the trucks were, they flushed some Nazis by the time they reached them they had captured 19 Nazis. Sgt. Dean attended Texas Tech the year after it was founded, was on the Dean Bros. ranch at Okla., before going into the three years ago. He is a brother of Kirk Dean and nephew of C. E. Dean, all of Littlefield.

Mr. Lehman says that his hens stopped eating eggs when he started using this mixture in the nest.

According to Lem Weaver, County Agent, most poultry flocks do not have access to green pasture during this dry period. Two pounds of green alfalfa hay per day per 100 hens will increase the vitality of the poultry flocks.

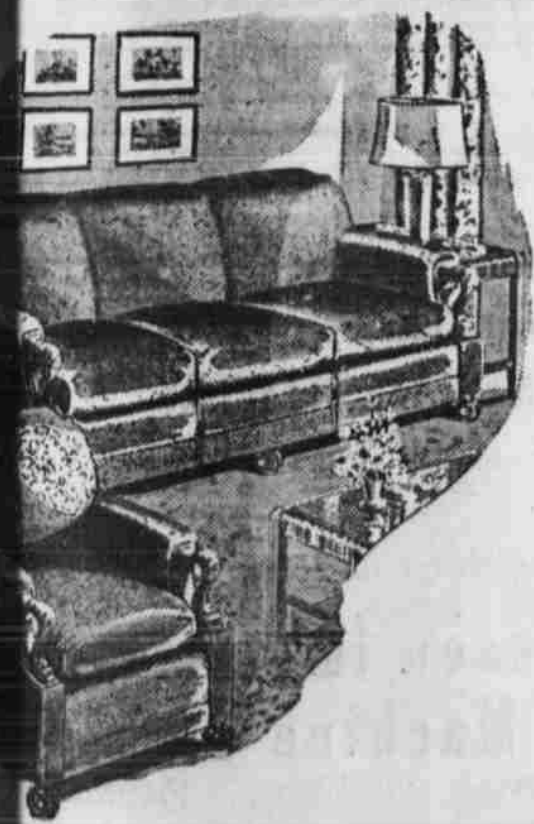

More Blessed To Give Than Receive

While expressing "joy and a feeling of thanksgiving" at the end of war with Germany, Judge Ben H. Powell, president of the United War Chest of Texas, has called on all Texans to continue their home-front war work until the final and conclusive defeat of Japan.

"While the surrender of Germany fills us all with joy and the feeling of thanksgiving, and while the defeat of this aggressor nation means a great deal to the world in many ways, it can have no immediate effect on the need for support of the agencies of the National War Fund, which are represented by the United War Chest of Texas," Judge Powell declared.

"I certainly hope there will be no decrease in the interest which the people of Texas have always felt in the United War Chest of Texas, even though the war with Germany has ended.

"In the first place, the need of the down-trodden people of Europe for food and clothing is more pressing than ever. I think it is generally conceded that the people of this country are the only ones who are able to bring them the relief they need and must have.

"Furthermore, we must never forget that the United States is still engaged in a terrible and vicious war with another powerful aggressor nation—Japan. No one can foretell when this war will end.

"As long as our war with the Japanese is in progress, and as long as our troops remain on foreign soil, we must continue to serve them, through USO, War Prisoners Aid and other National War Fund agencies.

"The war in the Pacific will continue to be a very difficult undertaking, even though we have

experienced most unexpected progress in recent months. I definitely urge the people of Texas, who have been so tremendously loyal to our efforts in the past, to continue to support our work until the need for this relief is actually at an end.

"Let us remember, always, that it is more blessed to give than to receive. It is inconceivable to me that we might make any mistake in continuing our work on behalf of our fighting men and our allies. But, even if it could be said that it would be a mistake to continue with unabated zeal as we have in the past, let us remember that if we are to err, we certainly should do so on the side of mercy and charity."

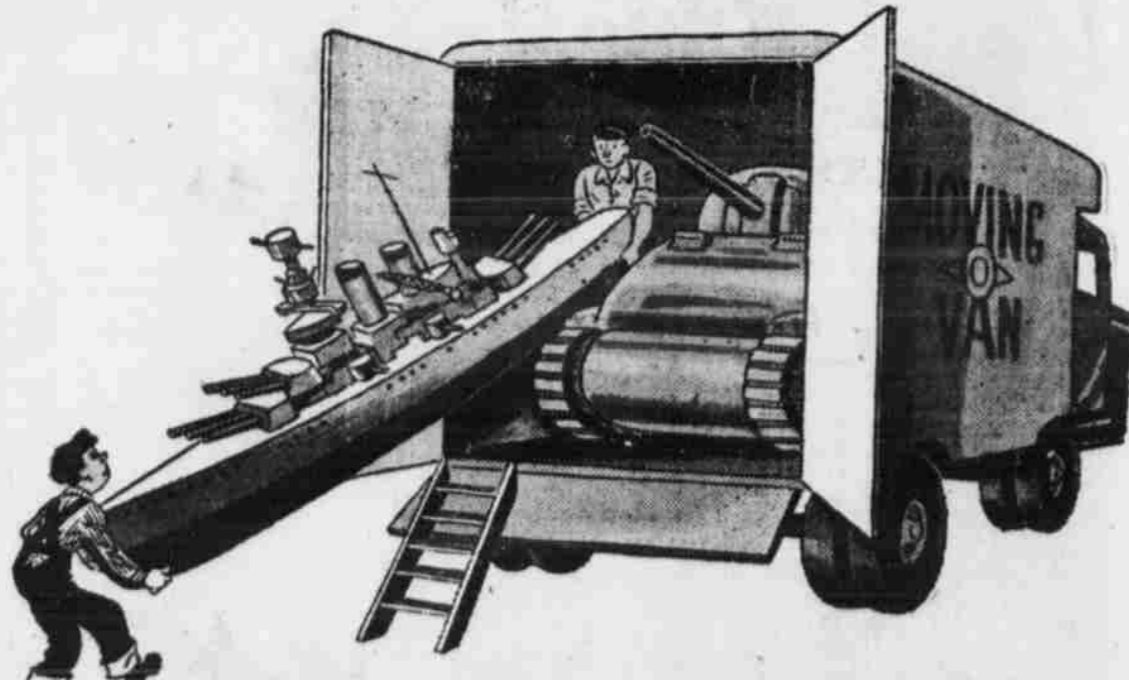

Buford Humphries of the Corps, took part in 69 bomb runs over Ewo Jima before the bombs could go in and take the life every morning, as the reports that the bombing raiders were over the island, the cement ways shattered by the American bombers the day before, were rebuilt by the Japs. This would cate the hard, trying job the American fliers have ahead of them in the fight against Japan.

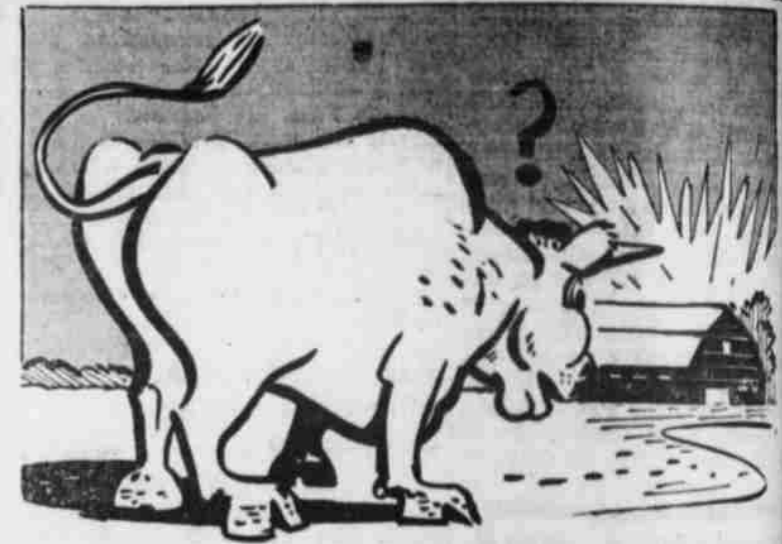
The 479th Fighter Group, of which Sgt. Armstrong is a member, is in the 2nd Air Division based in England.

I. B. HOLT, COUNTY JUDGE, presiding; and H. A. HYSINGER, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1 SAM CEARLEY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2; E. C. ROSS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3; E. L. YARBROUGH, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4; and among other proceedings had, were the following:

There came on to be heard and considered the petition of J. R. Dean and seventy-six other persons, as resident property taxing voters of ROAD DISTRICT NUMBER 4 OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS, praying this Court for an order for an election to determine the following proposition:

WHETHER OR NOT the bonds of the said Road District Number 4, shall be issued in the principal sum of TWO HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND (\$248,000.00) DOLLARS for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and which bonds are to bear interest at a rate not exceeding Four Per Centum (4%) per annum, and are to be issued in such denomination and payable at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, but not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from the date thereof; and that at such election there shall also be submitted to the qualified property taxing voters of the said Road District Number 4, the question as to whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied on all taxable property within the said Road District Number 4, for the purpose of paying the interest on the said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption or payment thereof at maturity.

Eagan. Since that time relatives of Capt. Eagan have been hoping to learn he was alive.

"We found the Japanese captain at daylight only two feet from Sgt. Morash's foxhole," Pfc. Walker Walker said. "He must have had more than a dozen bullet holes in the stomach and chest."

Pfc. Walker is a veteran of three invasions and many ensuing land campaigns in the Philippines.

He landed Jan. 9 at Lingayen gulf on Luzon, participated in the battle for caves and tunnels of the Zambales mountains dominating Clark field.

Pfc. Walker was among the first troops ashore March 18 in the invasion of Panag. He landed with assault waves 11 days later at Pulpandan on Negros.

He is entitled to wear the Philippines campaign ribbon of liberation with one bronze star, the Asiatic-Pacific theater ribbon and the combat infantryman's badge.

Before entering the army June 13, 1941, he was custodian for Littlefield public schools.
