## West Texas Chamber of Commerce To Have Two Day Session

Thirty minutes after the sound of the gavel opening the 33rd annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, October 19-20 in Mineral Wells, committee men and delegates will convene in seven separate open panel meetings to map and plan the organization's 1951 program of work.

First session is a general assembly at 2:30 p.m., Thursday, October 19. WTCC president J. M. Wilson, sr., of Floydada, has called the group meetings for 3 p.m. to permit all West Texans attending the convention to have a voice in determining the future activities of the regional chamber.

Wilson has appointed group leaders to direct the meetings as follows: Industrial, E. L. posals, recommendations, and suggestions for the coming year's program of work to the Board of Directors at a later session.

Registration for the meeting is scheduled to begin at 11 a.m. on Thursday in the lobby of the Baker hotel.

At 7 o'clock in the evening a barbecue dinner honoring local chamber of commerce managers and wives has been planned, with Hubert M. Harrison, general manager of the East Texas Chamber of Commerce, delivering the principal address. Harrison will talk on the proper relationship between regional and local chambers of commerce.

Following the barbecue the program calls for dancing on the roof of the Baker hotel from 9 o'clock until midnight, with music furnished by Johnny Jordan's orchestra.

Activities for the second day, Friday, October 20, include a special breakfast for WTCC past presidents, board of directors' meeting and noon luncheon.

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## Recipes Used at Furr's Super Market Five-Day Free Cooking School

**Royal Two and One Pie**  
1 pkg. Royal lemon dessert, 1 pkg. Royal vanilla pudding, 2 eggs (separator), 1/4 c. lemon juice, grated rind of one lemon, 1/4 c. sugar added to stiffly beaten egg whites. Prepare pudding, using 3/4 cups milk. Add 2 egg yolks when cooked. Prepare lemon dessert using 1 1/2 c. boiling water. Add juice and grated rind. Cool to quake consistency. Fold cool lemon gelatin mixture into cooled pudding. Add stiffly beaten egg whites with sugar added. Pour into baked pie shell. Garnish with bananas and whipped cream.

**Royal Coconut Whip**  
1 pkg. Royal lemon gelatin, 2 c. hot canned pineapple juice and water, 1 c. shredded coconut, 1 c. canned crushed pineapple. Dissolve gelatin in hot pineapple juice and water. Chill. When slightly thickened, place in bowl of ice and water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream. Fold in 1/2 c. of the coconut and the pineapple. Turn into lg. or individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold in individual nests, made of remaining 1/2 c. of coconut. Top with whipped cream. Serves 8.

**Quick-Royal Chocolate Tapioca**  
Cooked in two cups of liquid Starlac and garnished with whipped cream.

**Vegetable Shortcake**  
2 c. sifted flour, 3 tsp. Royal baking powder, 3/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 c. lard, 1 tsp. chopped parsley, 1 egg well beaten, 1 c. Starlac, 4 c. frozen vegetables (carrots, peas, celery, lima beans), 1/4 c. vegetable stock, 2 tsp. melted Blue Bonnet margarine. **Crouton Dumplings**  
1/4 c. Blue Bonnet  
Fry 1 c. cubes of Meads Fine bread (white) golden brown. Sift

2 c. enriched flour, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. Royal Baking powder, 2 eggs beaten light and 1/2 c. Starlac. — Stir into flour. Add fried bread crumbs to cover completely. Put 2 qts. of water in wide dish with 1 tbsps salt, bring to rapid boil. Shape dumplings size of walnut—drop in water, cover and boil 7 min. Drain, serve with browned Blue Bonnet margarine. Crouton Dumplings left over, slice and fry in savory fat with a few onions. Before measuring shortening dip spoon in hot water and it won't stick.

1/2 c. water

2 eggs

First bring water to a boil in saucepan on high. Second, add butter or margarine and stir until melted. Third, switch to low, add flour and salt, stirring vigorously. Cook until mixture draws away from the sides of the pan. Remove and cool 1 min. Fourth, add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Fifth, on greased baking dish, drop batter by (tbsp. 2" apart. Sixth bake in a 400 degree oven for 40 min. Seventh when cool, fill puffs with custard of Royal vanilla. (Yield: 8 medium sized puffs.)

1/2 c. flour  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 tsp. nutmeg  
2/3 c. applesauce  
1/2 c. chopped nuts

Empty contents of pkg. of white cake mix into bowl. Mix in flour. Add spices and blend well. Stir in the nuts, then the applesauce. Drop from teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 12 to 15 min. Yield: Five doz. cookies.

**Vegetable Pie with Peanut Butter Crust**  
3 tbsps. Blue Bonnet margarine  
5 tbsps. flour  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. celery salt  
1/2 tsp. paprika  
3 cups. liquid Starlac  
16 small white onions cooked  
1 c. cooked peas  
1 c. cooked string beans or lima beans  
3 cooked carrots, sliced 1/2" thick

Melt Blue Bonnet, add flour. — Stir until well blended. Add seasonings. Add milk slowly, stirring constantly until smooth and thick. Bring to a boil 2 min. Add vegetables. Pour into lg. baking dish and cover with the following crust.

**Jumbo Peanut Butter Crust**  
1 1/2 c. flour  
3 tsp. Royal baking powder  
1 tsp. salt  
4 tbsps. Peanut Butter  
1/2 c. liquid Starlac  
2 strips raw fat bacon

Serves 6  
Fowl, about 5 lb.  
Salt, 3/4 tsp., and a little for final seasoning  
Water, 1 1/2 qts.  
Peeled onion, 1 med. sized  
Celery, 2 stalks and 1/4 c. chopped

Peppercorns, 6  
Tomatoes, 6 med. sized or 1 No. 2 can

Mushrooms, 1/3 og. can sliced or 1/4 lb. fresh  
Butter, 1 1/2 tbsps.  
Pdrd. marjoram, 1/4 tsp.

Pass bird over an open gas flame, quickly turning until all hairs are singed off. Wash bird well inside and out. Pluck out all pin feathers. Dry. Remove any extra fat. Rub entire bird with salt. Place in kettle, add water, half of onion, celery stalks and peppercorns. Cover. Bring to boil slowly. Turn heat very low and cook until chicken is tender, from broth and strip meat from bones in large pieces. Strain broth. Measure 2 c. and put in kettle. (The rest can be kept in the refrigerator and used as desired.) Add chicken meat to broth in kettle. Chop remaining half of onion. If fresh tomatoes are used, scald, peel and chop them. For canned tomatoes, this isn't necessary. If fresh mushrooms are used, slice them. Melt butter in skillet. Add onion, celery tomatoes, green pepper and mushrooms. Cook over low heat for 5 min., stirring gently. Stir in mar-
