### Agricultural Program For 1937 Has Been Planned

General plans for the 1987 Agricultural Conservation program have been approved by the Secretary of Agriculture after conferences of representative farmers and Extension staff members had gone over the 1936 work and suggested needed changes

Cotton and wheat, peanuts and rice, the crops listed as soll-depleting in which Texas is most interested, have been subject to very few changes in the revision.

Cotton is again rated at five cents a pound and the base will be determined in about the same manner as in 1936 but with provision for adjustments such as those indicated by measurements made in 1936, The maximum cotton acreage upon which payments will be made for soil-conserving crops is 35 per cent. of the base.

Peanuts have a 15 per cent limit and a 1.25 cent per pound payment.

Rice has a 20 cents per hundred pounds payment which will be con-, certain ditioned on carrying out practices or growing certain specified soil-conserving crops or both.

Reduction from general soil-de-pleting base will be approximately the same; with the 15 per cent limit still applying.
