# Man Injured

Bernie B. Brown, 20, of Littlefield was still unconscious Wednesday morning in Medical Arts Hospital after he was seriously injured in a 3-vehicle ac-cident on the Lubbock highway Monday night.

Brown apparently was attem-pting to avoid a collision of two other vehicles when his 1960 car went into a broadside skid, went off the pavement and hit a cul-

The accident occurred 2.5 miles southeast of the city limits on US-84 about 9:35 p.m. Monday. Brown, employed by Lone Star Electric, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C.R. Brown of Littlefield. He resides at 921 W. 7th St.

Highway Patrolman Weldon Parson investigated the mishap, He indicated a 1960 pickup driven by A.C. Kuykendall, 41, of Rt. 1, failed to yield the rightof-way as he started north across the highway rom a farm road.

Kuykendall's pickup hit the side of a 1961 car driven by Darrel D, Huber of Albuquer-que, N.M. The patrolman said Brown apparently was behind Huber, or trailing, and both

Investigation indicated that the car-pickup collision forced the car into the left-lane, and Brown lost control of his car while trying to avoid the colli-sion. Parson said Brown's car apparently never made contact with either of the other vehicles.

Kuydendall was ticketed for driving without a driver's license and for failure to yield right-of-way. Further charges are pending.

### Man Fined In **Accident Case**

Madison A. Wynn, Fort Sum-ner, N.M., pleaded guilty to a charge of negligent homicide in connection with a fatal cartruck collision and was fined \$500 plus costs in county court Monday.

Wynn was driver of a trucktrailer which collided with a car driven by Willard F. Hea-thington of Muleshoe in a March 23 accident near Amherst. Heathington was killed almost instantly in the crash.

Signs bearing this signifi-cant statement were going up on all highway entrances into Littlefield this week, climaxing a time-consuming project which the present city administration had pledged to accomplish during its tenure.

A letter to Mayor B.W. Armistead this week notified the city that it had qualified for state approval and could erect the signs denoting this fact,

V.T. Hancock, a representative of the State Department of Public Health, was in Littlefield Tuesday when the city erected its first sign on the Spade high-

"The city has made more progress on this matter in the past year than any town I've seen in a long time," Hancock

When the city council took aim on acquiring state approval a year ago, there were Il deficiencies listed by a state engineer. Officials had hoped to eliminate these problems relatively fast, but repairs on two concrete reservoirs proved to be a tough problem. Costs of patching up the reservoirs were too high on initial studies, and it took some time to find more economical methods.

Other recommendations by the state which were accomplished before recognition was given: new well houses to protect water well facilities, elimination of a cross-connection between a city well and a cistern serving acity farm, abandonment of cesspools on the city farm and installation of a septic tank located a required distance from the city well, sealing of all pump bases at city wells, installing of accurate records indicating satisfactory chlorine residuals in the system, reports showing routine maintenance and upkeep of appearance around wells for 6month period, and submission of a regular monthly sampling to

Littlefield's water supply has been "safe" for a number of years, but it was not officially recognized by the state due to the deficiencies listed.

Dr. J.E. Peavy, commissioner of health, notified Mayor Armistead of the approval in a letter which stated, in part: "The division of sanitary engineering received a sanitary survey of the public water system operated by the City of Littlefield which revealed that all the requirements for State approved recognition have been

"As you are probably aware, the attainment of this recog-nition authorizes the local of-ficials to erect "Public Water Approved" signs on highway entering your city . . .

### March Water **Usage Jumps**

City water usage, boosted by the coming of spring, averaged more than 1 million gallons per day during March, a montly report issued by the water department reveals.

Peak day came on the last of the month with 1,804,000 gallons going through city taps March 21, Low usage occurred March 8 when only 686,000 gallons were taken.

Total of the month was 36,-671,000 gallons compared to slightly more than 24 million for February. The March rates were higher since the city raised the rates to pay for a water improvements bond.
