# Water Wins State Okay

Public Water Supply Approved.

Signs bearing this significant statement were going up on all highway entrances into Littlefield this week, climaxing a time-consuming project which the present city administration had pledged to accomplish during its tenure.

A letter to Mayor B.W. Armistead this week notified the city that it had qualified for state approval and could erect the signs denoting this fact.

V.T. Hancock, a representative of the State Department of Public Health, was in Littlefield Tuesday when the city erected its first sign on the Spade highway.

"The city has made more progress on this matter in the past year than any town I've seen in a long time," Hancock stated.

When the city council took aim on acquiring state approval a year ago, there were 11 deficiencies listed by a state engineer. Officials had hoped to eliminate these problems relatively fast, but repairs on two concrete reservoirs proved to be a tough problem. Costs of patching up the reservoirs were too high on initial studies, and it took some time to find more economical methods.

Other recommendations by the state which were accomplished before recognition was given: new well houses to protect water well facilities, elimination of a cross-connection between a city well and a cistern serving a city farm, abandonment of cesspools on the city farm and installation of a septic tank located a required distance from the city well, sealing of all pump bases at city wells, installing of accurate records indicating satisfactory chlorine residuals in the system, reports showing routine maintenance and upkeep of appearance around wells for 6-month period, and submission of a regular monthly sampling to the state.

Littlefield's water supply has been "safe" for a number of years, but it was not officially recognized by the state due to the deficiencies listed.

Dr. J.E. Peavy, commissioner of health, notified Mayor Armistead of the approval in a letter which stated, in part: "The division of sanitary engineering received a sanitary survey of the public water system operated by the City of Littlefield which revealed that all the requirements for State approved recognition have been met."

"As you are probably aware, the attainment of this recognition authorizes the local officials to erect "Public Water Approved" signs on highway entering your city . . ."

## Voting Spirited In City Elections

Members nabbed council at Olton and Anton, but were reelected in Lamb County and area in city elections Tuesday.

Angela voters chose their officials by write-in ballot. Candidates were unopposed, and a write-in drive for Amherst failed to

oust the incumbent there. Littlefield had no vacancies this year.

Mayor Lord Pryor and incumbent city commissioners E.L. Black and B.E. Clayton were reelected at Amherst. Pryor polled 55 votes and Bill Workman drew 27 in a write-in for the mayor's post. Total vote was 118 with Black receiving 113 and Clayton 115.

Sudan voters turned out in "good" numbers to reelect Joe Rhone as mayor and Marvin Tollett and Wayne Brown as commissioners. Total vote was 229.

Rhone defeated Kenneth Burgess in the mayor's race, 162-65. Tollett and Brown received 163 and 162 votes in the city commission race. Challengers were Arnold Reed 69, Calvin Jordan 38, and A.A. Pinkerton 19.

Challenger R.P. Jones polled 144 votes to defeat incumbent Louis E. Boothe in the Anton city council race. Boothe received 55 votes. Rudolph Shockley was reelected with 149 votes, and there were 10 write-in ballots.

Longtime Mayor George Broome was reelected at Anton without opposition, receiving 166 votes. There were 16 write-in votes, including 13 for Sid Landers.

One incumbent and two new candidates were named to council posts at Olton where 386 (See VOTING Page 10)

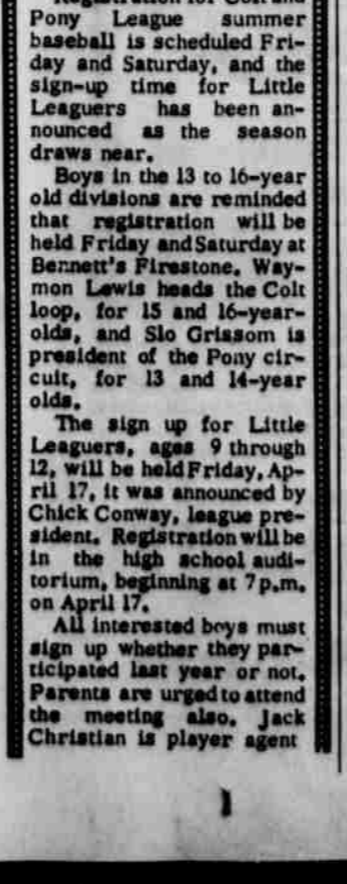
## Man Injured In Car Crash

Forty-one votes were cast at Spade where Tyson Nahers and Bill Thompson were unopposed for reelection.

Olton drew the largest county turnout other than Littlefield. Incumbents O. J. Neeley and Winston Bley were reelected as 357 citizens cast ballots. Neeley had 232 votes and Bley 231. Trailing were Earl McClain with 154 and James Hall with 91.

Pigrum lost a stride just before the three hit the tape at almost the same time. When the judges got through talking things over, it was Andrews, Littlefield and Denver City, in that order.

The Wildcats go to Monahan Saturday for their final competition before entering the District 1-AAA contests at Amarillo April 18.

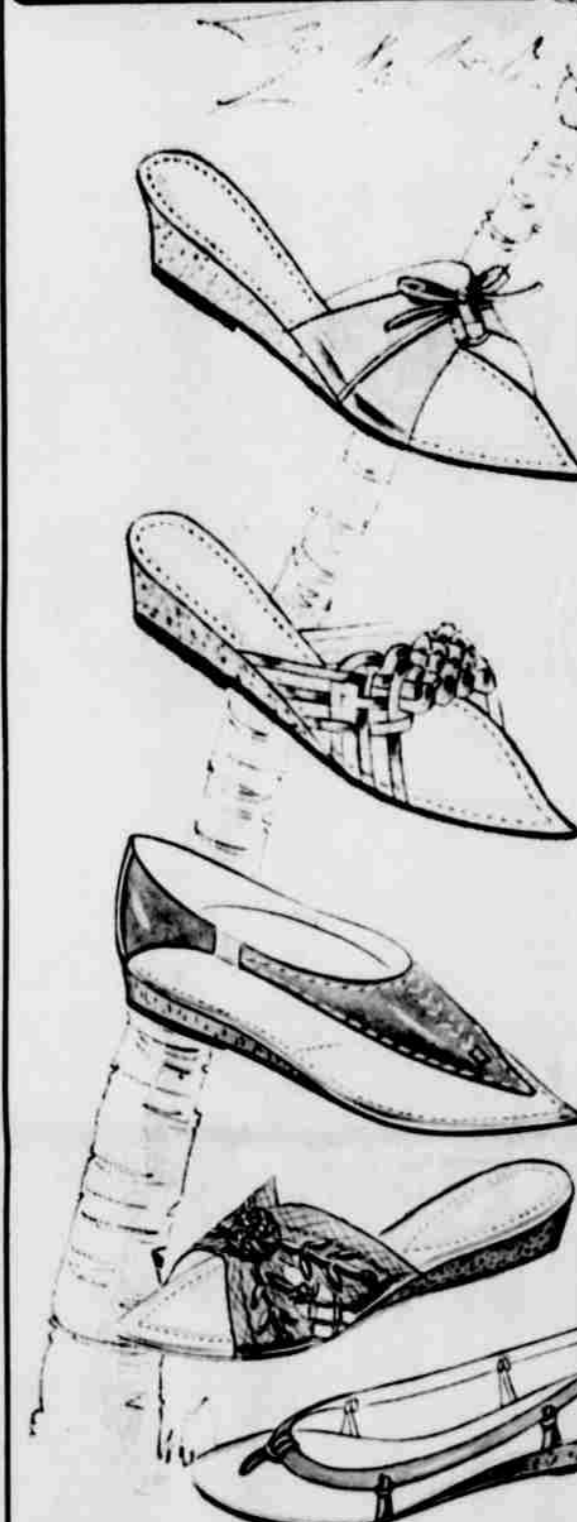
Thirty-eight bands from area high schools presented concert selections and played unfamiliar music in sight-reading contests. They had competed in marching earlier in the year.
