



ing of a new oil field in Littlefield, which was the first official statement the company has released since the local well was brought in the first of October.

According to the Texas Company report, oil was struck in the San Andres lime in two zones, 3952-3984 feet and 4000-4020 feet. On a swabbing test, the report continued, the discovery well produced at the rate of six barrels of oil an hour.

Listed as owners of the well are the Texas Company, 50%; Stanolind Oil and Gas Company, 25%; and John Murchi-son, 25%. The pool is described as a rank wildcat located 13 miles north of the Anton

Pool Believed Good

Unofficial reports describe the local pool as the best San Anformation on the Plains. with a larger amount of gas than most San Andres pools.

The Littlefield well is believed to be in the northeast section of the pool. In a test well drilled a short distance southwest of town by the Humble Oil Co. in 1945, oil was found at 4,120 feet. The major company drilled on to 9,162 feet in search of a deep pool. When they were unable to find the deep oil, they considered it impractical to make a producer from the shallow pool, due to the softness of the formation.

Another well, drilled three miles north of Littlefield in 1947 by J. W. Murchison, was acclared a dry hole.

Optimism Running High Optimism is running high among local people who are keeping in close touch with daily developments. From unofficial sources, reports have been made that three more wells are expected to be started in the immediate future.

Tex Harvey, state oil man, is expected to drill about one-half mile east of the test well. The Peyton Packing Company is reported to be preparing to drill the first floor. on the north 80 acres of their 230 acre holding northeast of



Get Set For Winter Dairy

only a short time away, the production of many Texas dairy herds may be vitally effected by the amount of feed put into storage before "Jack Frost"

makes his official appearance. In citing management practices that may mean success or failure for some milk producers, R. E. Burleson, extension dairy husbandman, urges dairymen to lay in an adequate roughage supply. Two tons of good quality hay or one ton of hay and three tons of silage should be in storage for each cow in the herd, Burleson says.

Take steps to conserve feed. A little time devoted to repairing mangers, hay racks and feed troughs will save feed stuffs that most likely will be welcomed before spring. Even the best hay, the specialist points out, loses its attractiveness to dairy cows after being trampled and kicked around in the sand, dirt and mud. Palatability can be maintained and waste losses prevented by using a good hay rack.

And finally, horns have no place in dairy herds, regardless of the season. Not only can dairy animals be handled easi-er, but dehorned cows can be housed and fed in less space, Burleson adds.


