## Canadian River Dam Receives Support Of 15 South Plains---Panhandle Cities

Representatives from 13 Panhandle and South Plains towns met in Plainview Tuesday to assemble a report showing a dam on the Canadian River is necessary to any possible future industrial development in this area.

Wednesday two other communities added their support to the measures, although they could not be present at the first meeting.

Ralph Douglas, Littlefield city engineer, represented Littlefield at the meeting. He told them daily requirements here average 900,000 to 1,000,000 gallons and that by 1970 it is expected 4 1-2 million will be needed.

The statistical information such as this that Douglas gave is being compiled into a single report which will be used to combat a report made by the Army Engineers which was unfavorable to the project.

Harry Burleigh, planning engineer for the Bureau of Reclamation, said the unfavorable report took in-

to consideration only the flood control and wildlife and the fish conservation aspects of the project.

O'Donnell, Amarillo, Lubbock, Borger Dimmitt, Floydada, Levelland, Pampa, Post, Plainview, Tahoka and Slaton representatives were present as well as Littlefield. Brownfield and Lamesa reported Wednesday.

By way of general information, speakers told the delegations that:

1. Water which could be supplied from the Canadian dam would be hard, yet up to all health standards; and without chlorine;
2. That the some 100,000 foot-acres of water made available from the dam would be more than adequate for present demands, and foreseeable future demands, of the water-hungry municipalities participating in the project;
3. That at least five years would be required for construction of the

dam and for work preliminary to actual use of the new supply by municipalities;

4. That planners must meet a June 1 deadline with designs on conduit to move water from the dam to the cities; and
5. That the dam itself would probably be located in the vicinity of Tascosa.

John McCarty of Amarillo, Burleigh, and others delivered messages on the general problems facing planners before the long-projected installation becomes a reality.

Of further interest to residents of towns on Highway 51 is the fact the Highway Association went on record over a month ago as favoring the dam in order to facilitate closing the missing gap in the highway because of no bridge across the Canadian River in the immediate vicinity of Tascosa where the dam is tentatively planned to be built.

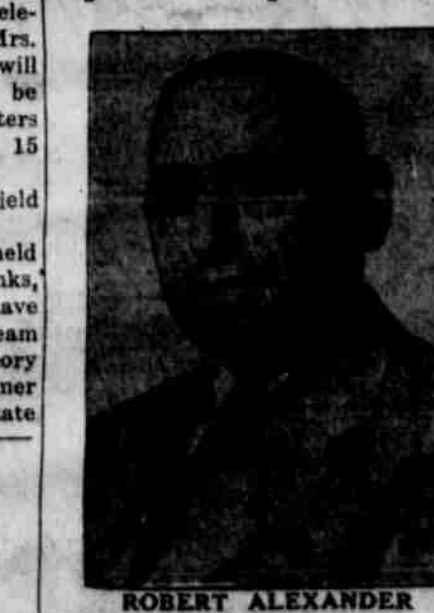

sons of above average size to ride in Chrysler's "chair-height" seats, an important factor in passenger comfort have been raised slightly both front and rear, further helping their occupants to ride in a natural and relaxed position.
Boardroom has been increased in the overall dimension parallel to the back of the rear seat, the place where this room really is needed. Rear doors in the sedan models are hung from the center post, making it easier for passengers to enter and leave the rear compartment and contributing to safety.
Another notable contribution to safety is an increase in the area of the windshield from 687 square inches to 851 1-2, a gain of 24 percent. The part of the windshield covered by the wiper blades also is increased from 348 to 502 square inches, a gain of 44.2. The area of the rear window likewise has been made appreciably greater also.
Use of the "Bustle Back" treatment of the rear end in conjunction with a completely new front-end styling achieves balance and symmetry in exterior appearance. The car seems to "hang together" better than ever before.
The new grille features two heavy chrome bars, sweeping across the front. Smaller vertical and horizontal bars are used. The hood has been newly designed and is ornamented by a new version of the typical Chrysler wings. A new medallion is placed on the front of the hood.
Newly-designed fenders blend in with body lines. They can easily be removed for repairs and they permit changing a tire or attaching chains with a minimum of trouble. Chrome fender mouldings serve as a rub rail to prevent the scraping of the fenders themselves. The front fender moulding extends from the forward point of the fender across the front to a point beneath the door handle. There is a skirt moulding on the front fender and a stone shield on the rear fender.
The front bumper extends around the front fender to give protection to sides as well as front. Rear bumpers are recessed in rear fenders and wrap around to the wheel opening. Both bumpers are of a new channel design and are heavier and more massive.
New headlights have a bullseye lens to give more light and cut down glare. They're placed farther apart, the better to define car width. Rectangular parking lights are recessed in the front fenders directly below the parking lights. The tail-lights have a long, sweeping chrome housing faired into the fender and placed higher to improve the vision of drivers of following cars. They are supplied with a plastic red lens and a large plastic light reflector.

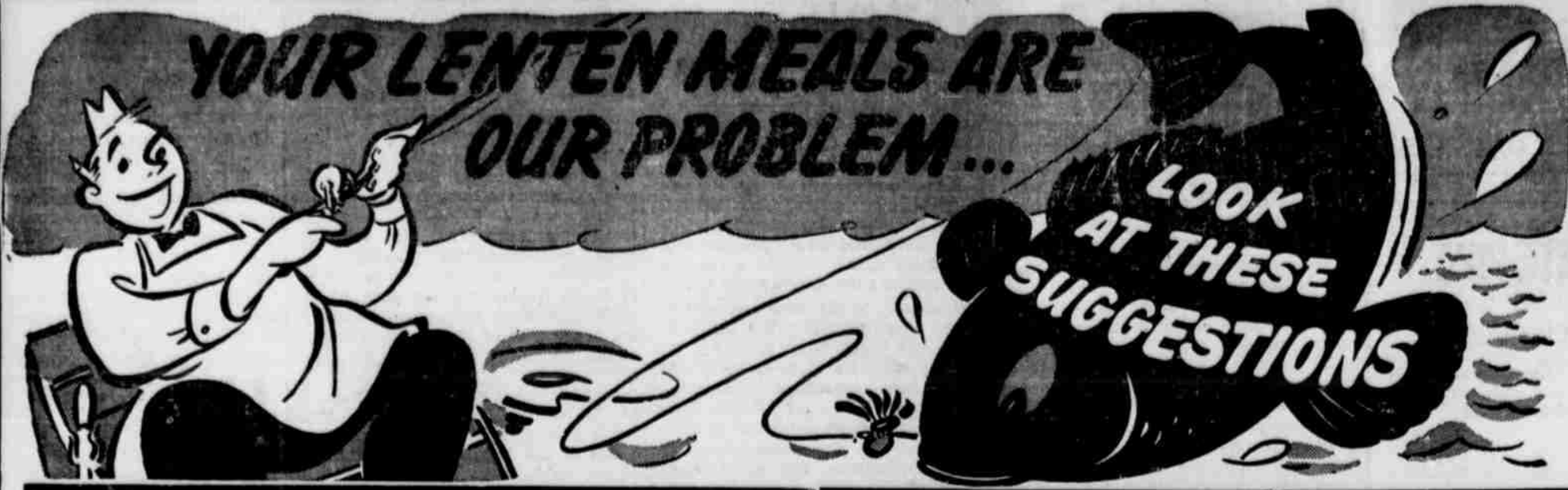

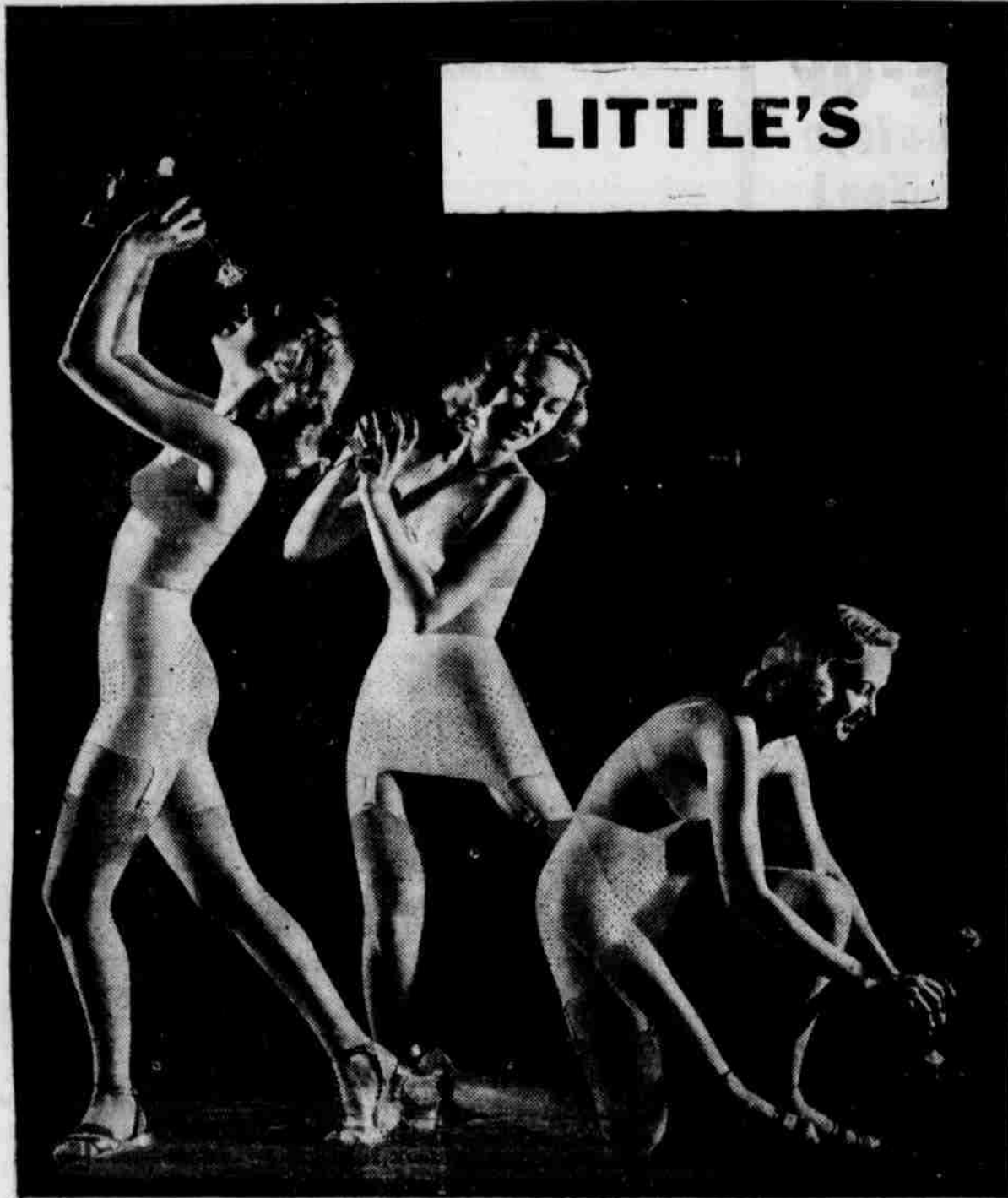

## County Commission Appears Before House Committee On Road Bill No. 59

A group from Lamb County left Sunday for Austin to appear before the House Committee in support of Bill No. 59, sponsored by the Judges & Commissioners association, Farm Bureaus, Rural Carriers association, Rural Roads association, etc.

This bill would levy a one cent tax on every 1000 cubic feet of natural gas produced in Texas to finance an extensive road improvement program.

Large Revenue For Lamb  
According to Judge Otha Dent, if this bill passed, it would mean a revenue of between twenty-two to twenty-five million dollars to the State of Texas, and about \$200,000 for Lamb County, which would be used to improve and build roads.

Judge Dent states that better than 85% of Texas natural gas is used outside of the State; that Oklahoma, Louisiana, and certain other states have a tax on gas produced in their states; and that some of the states levy a tax on gas produced in Texas after they receive it.

Included in the group from Lamb County going to Austin were; Judge Otha Dent and Commissioners George Brown, L.R. Tarpley, Roy Gilbert and Fred Wilson.

Judge Dent stated Saturday that he expected four cars to go from Lamb county; and ten cars from Hale.

I was out here on the Bull Lake the other day trying to get a whiff of spring, noticing a certain warmth to the sunshine that means me and my cows just about has the winter whipped, with one-fourth of a bale of Johnson grass hay still left to carry through a sudden March blizzard, which is a great satisfaction, and stumbled on a copy of Dallas Morning News with the wrapper still on it and while that paper makes better fire-wood if you leave it rolled up, I opened it anyway, putting intellectual nourishment ahead of physical comfort, and sat down and read where Herbert Hoover and his commission is getting ready to reorganize the Federal government, to make it more efficient.

Now I don't care much what they do to the federal and state government, even imagine the county government could stand some improvement, it makes mighty good readin to hear about plans for makin



government more efficient, but I would like to suggest to them experts that they shouldn't forget that whatever system they install, they still gonna have about the same crew doin the operatin, and there is some folks who just ain't subject to much improvement; whether they're on a hand-car or a streamliner, they get about the same distance. 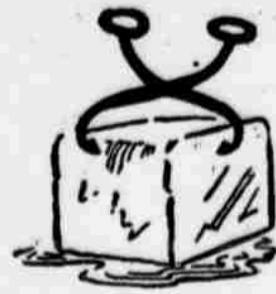

Marine Master Sergeant Charley Louis Pryor, jr. of Whitharral, who in the last seven years has been half-way around the world and back as a Leatherneck, last week left the Dallas Marine Corps recruiting office for duty with the Second Marine Division F.M.F., at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

MSgt. Pryor took his wife, the former Jimmie Jean Hooper of Whitharral, with him to the new duty station.

Departure of the Pryor from Dallas concluded 33 months of recruiting duty there for the sergeant. The Dallas duty was subsequent to service MSgt. Pryor spent with Marine detachments on board ships of the Navy and three and a half years of imprisonment under the Japanese.

As a recruiter in Dallas, Pryor stressed travel and education as two

of the several advantages of Marine Corps duty. On both subjects the sergeant was conversant by virtue of his personal experience.

The fact that MSgt. Pryor can recount in detail the many Oriental and South Pacific points he has visited and observed under conditions other than as a POW, speaks for travel.

As for education advantages of the Marines, MSgt. Pryor has good first-hand "scoop" for all who inquire into it.

Prior to the sinking of the USS Houston, and capture of survivors by the Japanese, Pryor was studying toward a Certified Public Accountant rating through the Leatherneck's own Marine Corps Institute correspondence school.

Imprisonment deferred study. After he regained his freedom, the Leatherneck industriously plunged into to review and more study on the fundamental preparatory subjects. Last winter he completed his first leg on the rating and successfully passed several hour examinations given in the Dallas Marine recruiting headquarters.

But "book learning" isn't all the sergeant followed in off-hours. As a student in the Whitharral high school, Pryor was an ardent sports participant. He covered the football, track and baseball plane.

In prison camp, he organized and participated in whatever sports time would allow.

On recruiting duty in Dallas, Pryor was one of the softball team's mainstays during the 1947 and 1948 seasons.

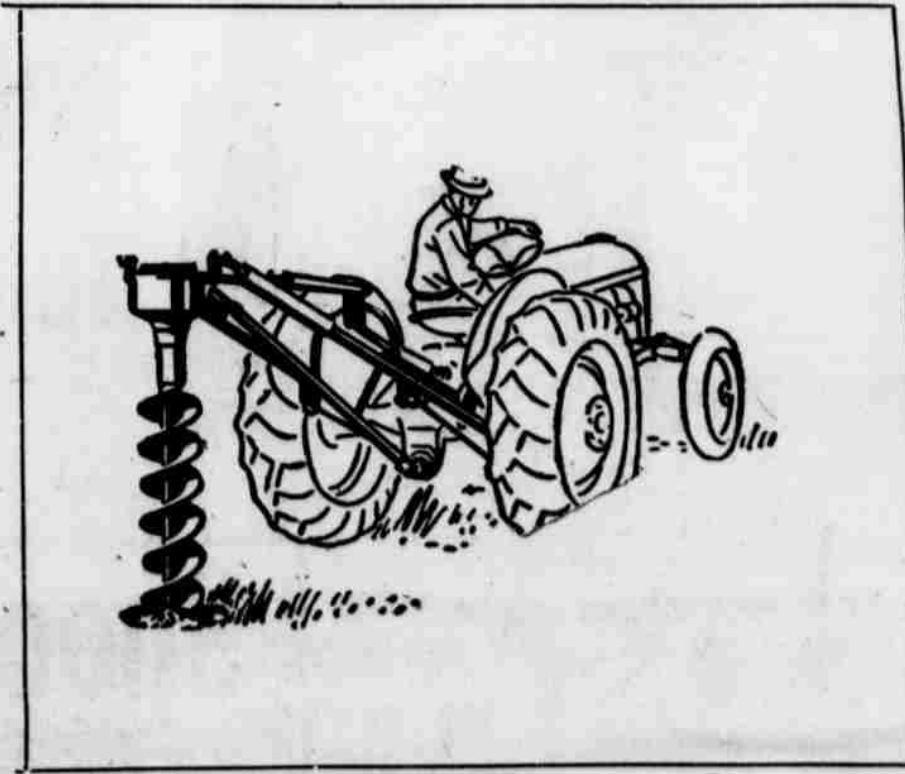

### WTCC claims complete victory in Fight to gain fair State Water Code

A complete victory for West Texas in its fight for full protective measures in the new Texas water code has been announced by President John D. Mitchell of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Mayor Lawrence Hagy of Amarillo, and R. M. Wagstaff of Abilene, co-chairman on the municipal water rights committee of the organization.

WTCC protective amendments have been adopted to the proposed new code under an agreement in Austin last week between WTCC Manager D. A. Banded and officials of the Texas Water Conservation association. This agreement was presented to sponsors of the bill in both House and Senate and now must come up for consideration.

In a report sent out from WTCC office in Abilene to more than 100 mayors and chamber of commerce managers in West Texas, support of the new bill was urged. President Mitchell also praised the work of the committee in bringing about the compromise agreement.

In the letter from Hagy and Wagstaff it was pointed out that amendments offered by WTCC to the bill will prevent previous appropriations of water from becoming unalterable vested rights.

"Those who want all previous appropriations of water to be vested right are going to oppose these amendments and the task now for us is to remain forever vigilant in retaining these protective amendments in the bill and enact it into law," the letter said. "With our amendments and with the bill reorganizing and strengthening the board of water engineers and the cancelling of old unused water appropriations making it available for our cities, the bill now is a good document which, if enacted in a law, will be most beneficial."

The letter than calls on chamber of commerce and city officials over West Texas to write their senators and representatives in support of the measure. Senators Cousins and Husbands have introduced it as SB 225 and Representatives Tippen and Brooks have offered it as HB362.

Mitchell, in a general letter to all WTCC directors and local chamber of commerce presidents, praised the work of the committee, which is a sub of the Water Resource and Development commission, which has been set up in the 1949 work program. He also asked continued support of the measure.

The compromise in Austin this week came after numerous committee sessions between officers of TWCA and WTCC. Previously the West Texas organization had offered 17 amendments to protect domestic water rights in West Texas. In the final conference, four amendments were agreed upon which attorneys say will provide these protective and recapture rights.

One of the victories was a definition of the appropriative right in Section 4, which confined all future appropria-

tions to water in excess of that already appropriated. This amendment now provides "appropriative right is the right to divert or take and put to beneficial use, pursuant to the procedure prescribed by laws of the State of Texas and this act, any of the waters to which this act and former statutes apply."

Priority likewise was defined in the following: "priority of an appropriative right, which relates to the time and legal conditions under which the right accrues, is the superiority of the right over all appropriative rights that attach to the same sources of water supply, whenever the quantity of water available is not sufficient to satisfy all such rights."

The amendment gave first in time priority to the water.

Section 13, is amended by striking out six words, which will clarify the laws concerning the utilization of a channel to prevent its use for storage purposes and prevent dams on lower reaches from being a barrier to building dams on the upper reaches.

Section 43 is amended by interpolation of the words "for the purpose of storing," and before the words "water for any of the purposes set forth in Section 12," the following words, "not to exceed 500 acre feet," which likewise prevents lower dams from withholding water from upper dams.

In the opinion of Banded as expressed to J. E. Sturrock, manager of TWCA these amendments will give full protection for continued municipal use of water in the area where it falls instead of perpetuating the "first in time, the first in right" provisions called for in the original measure as proposed by TWCA.

Mrs. Harrell is the former Miss Jerry Robinson.

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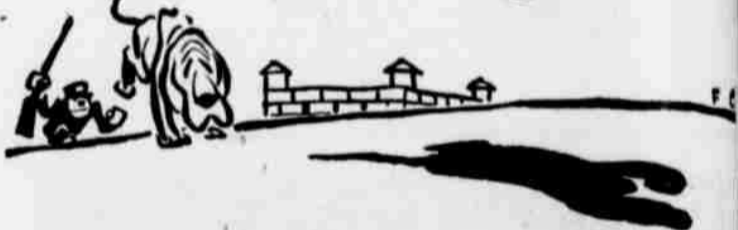
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
