

Rogers Food Store Repairs Fire Damage, Will Re-Open On Friday

After several weeks of preparation, the Rogers Food store has announced its formal re-opening for this weekend, and grocery shoppers will find selections as fine as the store maintained before it was damaged by fire last Nov. 28, F. D. Rogers, manager, assured.

Complete repairs have been effected to the building located at 609 Gregg St. and a new stock of merchandise has been received and is now on display. An order for a special shipment of fresh vegetables has been placed, and they will be featured on Friday and Saturday during the re-opening observance.

In addition, the store has one of the largest stocks of canned goods and other main display items in this section, and a complete packaged drug department.

The meat market also has been reopened, and adequate supplies of choice cuts are available. The market is under the supervision of Gus Pickle, one of the best known butchers in Big Spring.

The store has resumed its free delivery service, Rogers advised, and is now operating on a schedule of two deliveries each day.

TIME TO BEAUTIFY

*Plan Carefully,
Then Choose Trees*

(This is one of a series of articles prepared with aid of the chamber of commerce beautification committee.)

"Only God can make a tree."

That's what the poet had to say about a tree. He might have added that God expects us to exercise some judgment about trees.

If you contemplate adding trees around your home, first decide

whether you are patient or impatient.

Should you want rapid growth, the Chinese elm stands up toward the top of the list. It offers quick growth, good shade, is easily established and grown. On the other hand it must be shaped frequently has a shallow spreading root system that makes it hard on grass and sewer joints, and needs close care for long life.

The same may be said in general about the Chinaberry either the umbrella or the conventional type. Less bothersome about roots, it is more brittle than the elm. The thornless honey locust is another good rapid growing tree and less susceptible to borers than black locust. A new type of Chinese date is said to be among the most rapid growing trees.

For those content to wait for a better product, the maple is recommended as a slow growing but beautiful tree. The live oak also is a fine tree, but exceedingly slow. Others which come on slowly but require less care and have less drawbacks are the Arizona ash, green ash, pecan, American elm improved black walnut, and Russian or non-bearing mulberry.

Apricots offer fruit and shade and are of medium rate of growth. The same is true of the sweet cherry (which does not pollinate and hence makes no fruit), and some types of peach and apple.

Dig a hole big enough for the roots of your tree plant. Don't plant over a couple of inches above the soil mark. Don't add fertilizer. Pack the dirt firmly around roots, either with water or the foot. See that it gets ample water until well established, and then that it never suffers for water or lack of care.

This is the first peanut shipment to be sent through this port for Britain, and was purchased by the British Food Mission, Wait said.

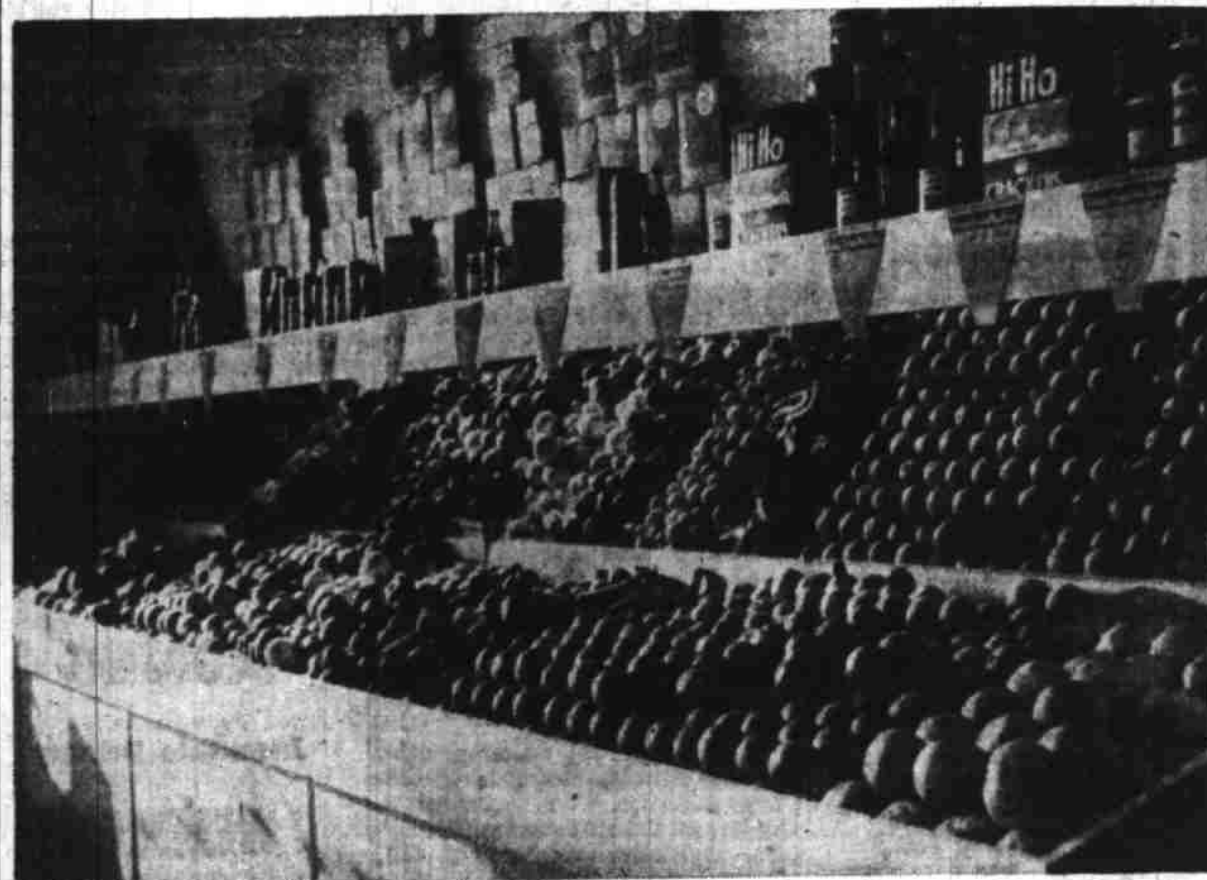

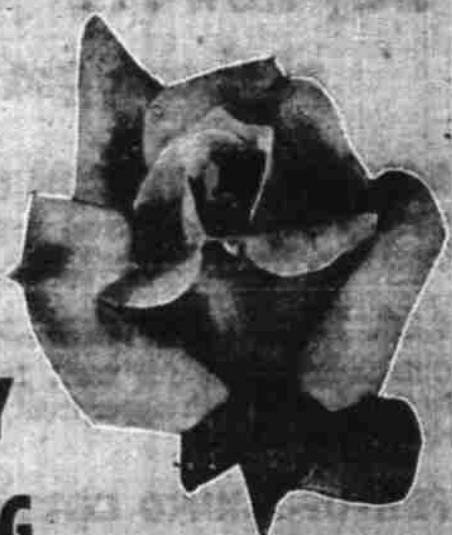

Variety Of Cookies Makes For Flavor Treats, Pleasing All People's Tastes

Cookies in the cookie jar are a symbol of good eating. Some like cookies crisp and crunchy, others like them thick and chewy, still others like them popping with fruit and nuts — but most everyone likes cookies in some form or another.

The following cookies are the kind guaranteed not to remain long in that cookie jar. They'll be the delight of youngsters when school is out, and of oldsters when it's time for a milk-and-cookie snack before bed. Pecan Delights will satisfy the heart of those who like their cookies popping with nuts, while Cocoanut Squares are for those who prefer the chewy variety. Semi-sweet Chocolate Drops are for those ever-present chocolate lovers.

2 cups brown sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 eggs
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup chopped pecans
Cream bland lard; add brown sugar and vanilla and continue creaming. Beat eggs. Add to creamed mixture and beat well. Sift together dry ingredients and add. Add pecans and mix well. Drop by teaspoons onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes.

Cocoanut Squares
Yield: 25 squares
1 1/4 cup bland lard
1 1/4 cup sugar (white or brown)
2 eggs
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups shredded cocanut
1 1/4 cups sifted flour
1-2 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped nut meats
Cream bland lard and sugar until fluffy. Add flavoring and eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in cocoanut. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Blend in dry ingredients and nut meats. Pour into 9x9x2 inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 30 to 35 minutes. Cut into squares.

Semi-Sweet Chocolate Drops
Yield: about 4 dozen 2-inch drops.
1/4 cup bland lard
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup corn sirup
1 egg
2 cups sifted flour
1-2 cup cocoa
1-2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt

Limits Removed On Cocoa Imports

U. S. Department of Agriculture last week removed all important restrictions on cocoa beans, cocoa butter and unsweetened cocoa powder. This action followed termination of the war food order which controlled domestic distribution and use of cocoa during the war years. Since 1942 importers have been required to obtain a license from the U. S. Department of Agriculture in order to bring these products into the United States. Cocoa beans have been—and still remain—under worldwide allocation by the International Emergency Food Council.

1-2 cup buttermilk
Cream bland lard, sugar and vanilla. Beat in corn sirup. Add egg. Beat well. Sift together flour, cocoa, soda and salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with buttermilk. Drop from teaspoon on cookie sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes.

Bargains Not Confined To Fresh Citrus Fruit

Citrus fruit bargains these days are not confined to fresh oranges and grapefruit. On the canned goods counter, thrifty homemakers will find plenty of orange and grapefruit juice at reasonable cost. Canned grapefruit segments are a good buy, too.

Luxury item, climbing in popularity, is tangerine juice which made its first appearance last year (production totaled half a million cases out of the total citrus juice pack of 65 millions) and is scheduled for increased supply in 1947 because the fresh tangerine crop is the largest ever.

All these canned citrus items offer busy homemakers a quick, yet economical, way of keeping daily meals high in food value. Like the fresh fruit, they are rich sources of vitamin C and contain some minerals and vitamin B1. Orange juice, like fresh oranges, also has some vitamin A; this is probably also true of tangerine juice.

Extra Special Bargains To Be Had In Juices

In some areas of the country, canned citrus juice is now selling at less than a cent an ounce, according to marketing specialists of Department of Agriculture Production and Marketing Administration. The supply is bountiful because of a carryover from last year and a normal pack to date.

For the homemaker who prefers to squeeze the juice herself from fresh grapefruit or oranges, here's what the January crop report says about supply. Orange production for the 1946-47 season is expected to be more than 118-1/2 million boxes—18 per cent larger than production in 1945-46 and nine per cent more than the previous record in 1944-45. Grapefruit production is estimated at more than 66-1/2 million boxes—66 per cent above average.

The price of fresh oranges and grapefruit has topped downward in recent weeks too, so fresh juice is also a bargain.

Give Simple Dishes A Party Touch

For a holiday, or just for the fun of going well by your friends, simple entertaining is the best kind. Still you want your simplest dishes to have a party touch. So I'd like to suggest a menu which will fill the bill in every respect.

MENU FOR PARTY SUPPER

Meal-in-a-Dish
Quick-Frozen Peas
Tangerine Eggnog Pie

Meal-in-a-Dish
3 tablespoons butter or margarine

1 2-3 cups canned button mushrooms
1 1-3 cups dried chipped beef
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1-2 cup cream or top milk
2-3 cup chopped ripe olives
Buttered toast or baking powder biscuits.

Melt butter or margarine in a skillet. Add mushrooms, beef (which has been soaked half an hour in water and then well drained), flour, paprika and Worcestershire sauce and cook, stirring constantly until mushrooms are heated through. Add cream and cook and stir until slightly thick. Remove from heat, add olives and stir to blend. Serve hot over toast or biscuits. Serves four to six.

Tangerines are one of the nicest of citrus fruits and they're plentiful this year. They're not only good to eat in the hand, but can be used in more ways than most of us think of. This pie is easy to put together, and tangerines are the easiest of fruits to handle—their skins zip off and the sections fall apart most conveniently.

Tangerine Eggnog Pie
1 tablespoon plain gelatine
1-4 cup tangerine juice
4 eggs, separated
1 teaspoon grated tangerine rind
2-3 cup sugar
1-2 cup heavy cream
3 tablespoons sherry or sherry flavoring
1-2 cup tangerine sections, cut in half
1 9-inch baked pie shell
2 tablespoons finely shaved sweet chocolate

Soften gelatine in tangerine juice. Beat egg yolks slightly; combine with tangerine rind and 1-3 cup of the sugar in top of double boiler. Cook over hot (not boiling) water until slightly thickened, stirring constantly. Add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Chill until mixture begins to congeal. Beat egg whites stiff and gradually beat in remaining sugar. Whip cream stiff and fold into chilled gelatine mixture with beaten egg whites, sherry or flavoring and tangerine sections. Pipe mixture into baked pie shell, garnish top with chocolate and more tangerine sections and chill until firm.

Lady, Keep Those Bottles Moving, Urges Milkman

Homemakers can do themselves and the dairy industry a good turn by keeping milk bottles in circulation. It's estimated about 25 million empty bottles have accumulated in American homes. C. M. Evans, chief, dairy branch, Dallas area office of U. S. Department of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration, says these bottles are greatly needed to keep milk moving.

Replacing them is difficult under present conditions. Production of new bottles is running far behind demand because soda ash, one of the principal materials for glass manufacture, is very short. Also, the situation on cars for transporting either raw materials or finished bottles is tight. Not before the end of 1947 can we expect as many new bottles as are needed.

And, just to get an idea how many are needed, the dairyman must have about eight bottles for every one in consumer hands. He has to keep some on the way to retailers and homes, while others are being washed and filled.

A little more arithmetic gives the answer to just how much homemakers can help by turning in bottles on which they've paid deposits. Each has a life expectancy of 30 to 40 trips, which means 25 million idle bottles can deliver a lot of milk if put to work.

Justice Of Peace Collects \$5,000

The Justice of Peace's office collected a robust \$5,006.10 in fees during 1946, considerably in excess of the total for the previous year, JP Walter Grice announced this morning.

Aggregate for 1945 came to around \$3,500, Grice said. Grice experienced his busiest month in May last year when 40 assorted cases were tried in his court, at which time \$489 was paid to the county in fines.

In March, however, \$682 was collected in 20 cases completed by the court.

The Justice of Peace also officiated at 125 marriages during the 12 months' period.

Glamorous Peach

The peaches you canned last summer can be used to make luscious peach melba. This dessert was originated in the early 1890's by the famous chef, Auguste Escoffier, in honor of the noted opera singer, Mme. Melba. Planning the menu for a party Mme. Melba was giving, the chef concocted the dessert of peaches, drawn sugar, and ice cream. On a later occasion Escoffier improved the dessert by adding puree of fresh raspberries, mixed with a little sugar. Over this he sprinkled some finely shredded fresh almonds.

Howard county has been allocated \$74,600 for soil conservation work for the current year. M. Weaver of the AAA office announced today. The figure is slightly in excess of the 1946 allotment.

1. Construction of diversion terraces.
 2. Construction or enlarging drainage ditches.
 3. Construction of earthen dams or reservoirs for livestock water or erosion control.
 4. Drilling or digging wells for livestock water.
 5. Field strip cropping not on the contour.
 6. Deep plowing of sandy cropland to prevent wind erosion.
 7. Contour farming intertilled crops.
 8. Leaving on the land as a protection against wind erosion the stalks or stubble of sorghums or millet.
 9. Elimination of destructive plants on non-crop pasture and range land.
 10. Growing a green manure or summer crop of summer legumes.
- Community and county committees are prepared to take over conservation problems with farmers and ranchers at any time. The county committee—composed of Willis Winters, R. D. Anderson and Melvin A. Loudamy—sessions the last Friday of each month at the AAA office to discuss common problems.
- Weaver drew attention to the fact that contour farming has been approved rather than contour listing. Land owners should go to the AAA office for approval of practices prior to March 1, he stated.

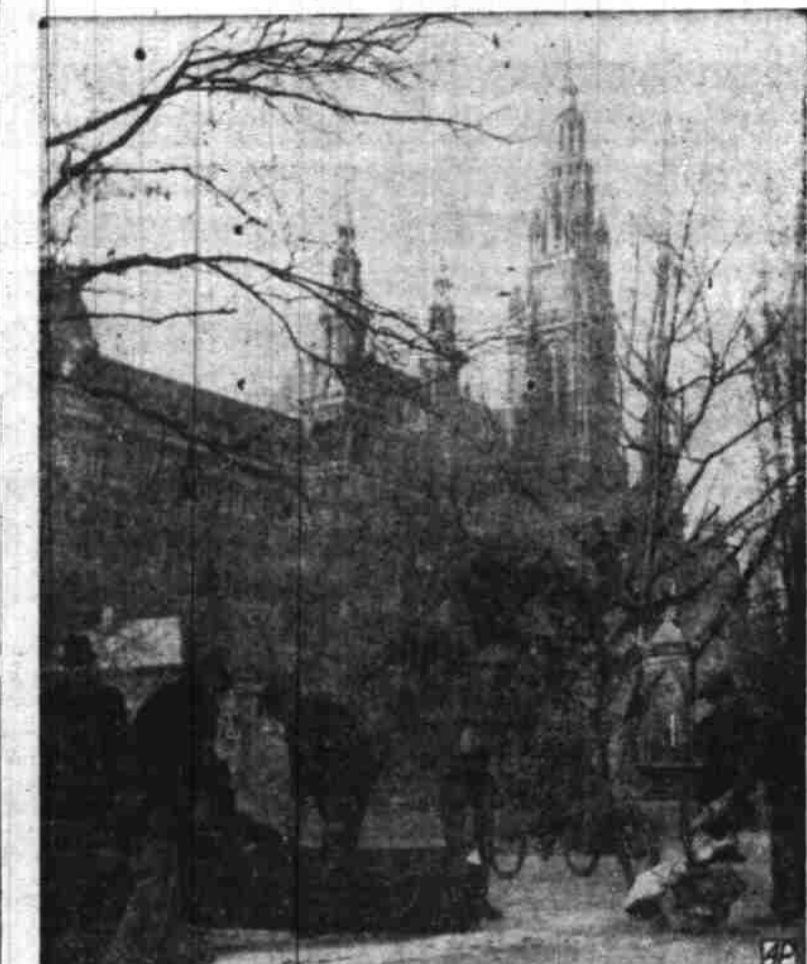

Boat's Seizure Checked By US State Department

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (AP)—The state department officials today were checking the reported seizure of a Port Arthur Texas, fishing boat by unidentified persons in the Gulf of Mexico near Alvaro, Oregon, 25 miles off the shore of the Yucatan peninsula.

Undersheriff Art Jewett of Inyo county says Edward H. Evans, 35, signed a confession that he killed Moore, 64, last week after a dispute in a Pasadena cafe, where Moore appeared to serve a writ on Evans' sister, Mrs. Eleanor Madres, the proprietor.

But Evans was quoted as saying he was too drunk to remember where he buried Moore's body or burned the car. Search earlier had centered in the hills near here, but discovery of the car in the north broadened the possible scene to include hundreds of square miles. Jewett said Evans only recollection was that the burial took place in "rolling hills."

Rep. Combs (D-Tex.) who asked the state department to look into the matter, said he was told that a vice consul at Vera Cruz is enroute to the area where the seizure is supposed to have taken place.

The United States embassy at Mexico City also has asked the attorney general of that Republic to look into the situation, Combs said.
