

How Much Of Your Income Really Goes For Taxes?

What today's taxes mean in dollars and cents to the average American family, is revealed in an article in the March 17 issue of Newsweek Magazine.

The average American is paying 32c out of very dollar he earns for direct or hidden taxes, the story discloses, basing its data on the results of research by the Tax Foundation.

No longer can the lower income groups feel com placent that "taxes are for the rich" . . . for the large corporations . . , and for the people who can best afford them. It is the American consumer, at every income level, who is shouldering the load.

On a \$3,500 annual income, the average family pays income taxes amounting to about \$300-while "hidden" taxes of which they may or may not be aware eat up a grand total of \$798.

This year and next, at current tax rates, the taxpayer will be paying between 22 and 89 cents. His income is higher, which means a bigger take for the govern ment while his dollar continues to buy less and less.

It is no longer a joke that in somecases a rise in income puts the taxpayer in the next tax bracket. For the \$25,000-a-year man, each additional dollar where his additional dollars actually cost him money. nets him but 60 cents. For a \$100,000-a-year man. each new dollar means but 22 cents.
