At a conference between General Malin Craig, army chief of staff, and Chairman McSwain (D-SC) of the house military committee, a decision was made to drive for funds to give the nation an air force "second to none."

McSwain arranged to go before a house appropriations subcommittee tomorrow to press for inclusion of money for 800 up-to-date-minute fighting planes in the war department's appropriation for the next fiscal year.

At a cost of around \$70,000,000 annually, including accessories and 800 ground equipment, he said, planes would have to be provided yearly for three years to meet what the war department considers minimum needs,


