## WPA WORK STARTS HERE

**CITY RESERVOIR BE ENLARGED; GIVEN WORK**

Synopsis  
City project to increase City Water Storage 55,000 Gallons

The City WPA project for enlarging the Waterworks Reservoir at the pump station, got underway Monday morning, with Joe Wells, Littlefield contractor, in charge of the work for the City, and Travis Jones as WPA Superintendent and timekeeper.

This project calls for increasing the height of the walls five feet, and a new concrete roof on the whole reservoir, which will increase the water storage capacity of the city by 55,000 gallons.

This project calls for 19 men for 30 days, eleven of whom went to work Monday morning.

According to W. G. Street, City Secretary, additional men will be put to work as soon as available.

### APOPLEXY FATAL TO MRS. ALLIE GADY THURSDAY

Mrs. Allie Gaddy, 66, wife of J. W. Gaddy, passed away suddenly at the family residence near Goodland, Thursday evening, December 19, about 8:15 o'clock. Apoplexy, from which she had only been ill a couple of hours, is reported to have caused her death.

She had been a resident of Goodland section for the past eight years, with the exception of about three years spent in Lubbock. She came to this section from Crosbyton, where she had lived for many years.

### LAYING OF 400 FEET OF WATER LINE STARTS MONDAY; TO EMPLOY 42 MEN

The WPA City project covering the laying of 400 feet of two inch water line, and other city improvements, got underway Monday.

J. E. Foust is foreman for the City on this project, while Travis Jones is Superintendent and Timekeeper for the WPA.

This project calls for the laying of a two inch water line starting at the Legion Hut and going South along Westside Avenue to West Seventh Street, and then connecting with the new water line laid last Spring by Forney Engineering Company.

"This will eliminate two existing dead ends, and will give a complete circulation to the water in that section of town," said W. G. Street, City Secretary.

"Under the project," Mr. Street said, "the City will remove and clean out every culvert in town and some of them will be repaired and others replaced."

"The City will haul dirt and caliche and fill in the holes and low places in the streets, cut weeds, and cultivate the city parks."

This project calls for 42 men for thirty days, eight of whom started work Monday.

The cleanup campaign, which is also included in this project, got underway about ten days ago, but was discontinued on account of shortage of labor, and will be finished as soon as men are available for this purpose, which is expected to be in the near future.

Plans Underway To  
Give Nation "Second  
To None" Air Force

At a conference between General  
Malin Craig, army chief of staff,  
and Chairman McSwain (D-SC) of  
the house military committee, a de-  
cision was made to drive for funds  
to give the nation an air force "sec-  
ond to none."

McSwain arranged to go before a  
house appropriations subcommittee  
tomorrow to press for inclusion of  
money for 800 up-to-date-minute fig-  
hting planes in the war department's  
appropriation for the next fiscal  
year.

At a cost of around \$70,000,000  
annually, including accessories and  
ground equipment, he said, 800  
planes would have to be provided  
yearly for three years to meet what  
the war department considers mini-  
mum needs.

The department, with \$17,500,000  
available, now is preparing to let  
contracts for a fleet of powerful  
bombing and pursuit planes. It placed  
\$2,500,000 order for 100 attack  
ships yesterday.

Plainview Editor  
Victim Of Accident

R. S. Norman, editor of the Com-  
munity Weekly at Plainview, died in  
the hospital at Teague Saturday  
night, December 14, from injuries  
sustained in a fall while on a hunt-  
ing trip near that city earlier in  
the day.

Funeral services were conducted  
at Teague Sunday, December 15.  
Mrs. Norman and their children,  
Brents, Jim and Reta Jane of Plain-  
view, going to the central Texas  
city for the sad rites.

Mr. Norman was crossing a creek  
on a foot log which gave way be-  
neath him. He attempted to jump  
to the creek bank but failed to  
make the distance and fell back-  
ward about fifteen feet upon the  
rocks in the creek bed.

He was carried about a mile to  
an ambulance and taken to the hos-  
pital. He was dead before members  
of his family arrived from Plain-  
view.

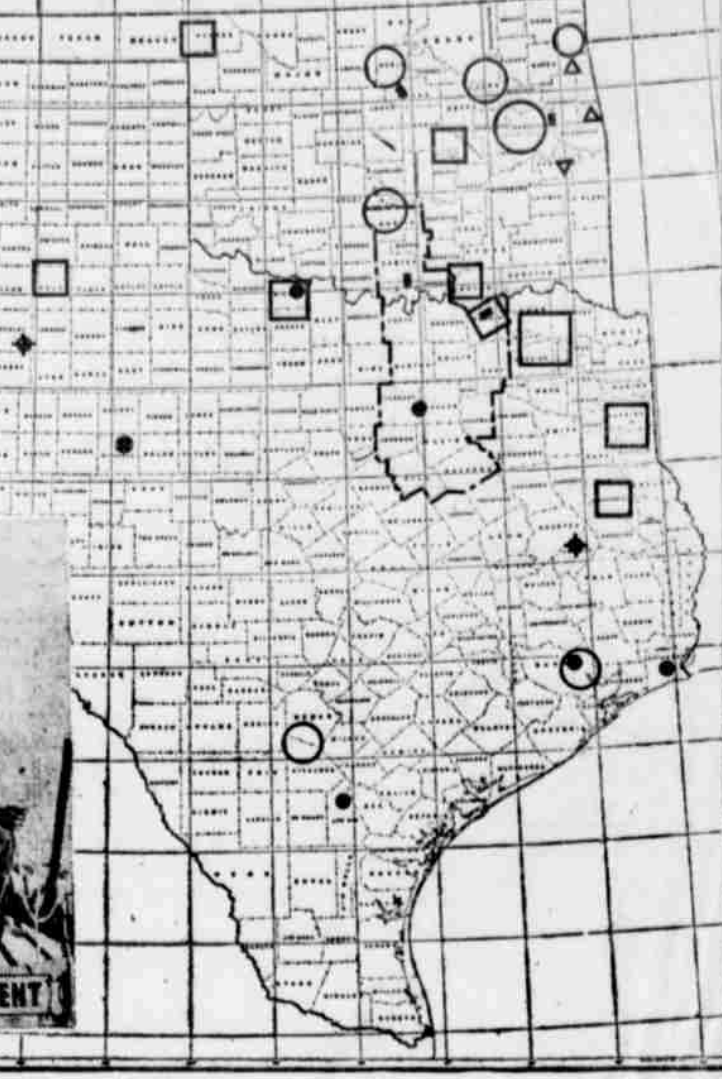

Surveys have been authorized in seventeen areas of Texas and Oklahoma, leading to development in some of these areas of land projects where tenant farmers and sharecroppers will be given an opportunity to purchase homes.

Community projects, in which a single tract of land will be subdivided into 100 or more farms, are being considered for Oklahoma in Bryan County, in North Central Oklahoma and at Laverne, Texas community projects considered are in Delta County, the Wichita River Valley, Harris County, Hale County,



Fannin County, and Central East Texas.

Area projects, in which individual farms are scattered over several adjoining counties, are under consideration in Oklahoma near Muskogee and Tulsa, in the Washita River Valley and in the Indian lands of the Ozarks. An area project for Texas is under consideration in the coastal prairie south of San Antonio.

The area enclosed by a broken line in North Texas and Southern Oklahoma will be the location of farms for 265 selected tenants, if

the project is finally approved.

Subsistence homesteads shown on the map are "inherited" by the Resettlement Administration from the Department of Interior, and are occupied by 328 families employed in cities near which the subsistence tracts are located. Only a few acres are included with each home.

Texas Rural Community projects were also inherited by Resettlement. At Woodlake in East Texas 100 families had been placed on 15-acre tracts. At Roppsville, Texas, near Lubbock, 120-acre farms are being opened to 33 families.

Guiding Principles Of Curriculum In Texas

When a group of people decide that something should be done, they usually decide on some guiding principles that will determine how they should do the thing and on what basis they should proceed. The following are the guiding principles set out by the Texas State Curriculum Revision Committee:

(1) The curriculum should provide educative experiences adapted to the fundamental needs of each child of whatever race, type, or mental aptitude.

(2) The curriculum shall provide educative experiences for effective participation in social life and which will serve to perpetuate and improve the ideals and practice of our democratic society.

(3) The curriculum shall be conceived as a body of dynamic experiences. (4) The curriculum shall be conceived as a program of study and activity subject to teacher guidance. (5) The curriculum revision program shall be conceived as an experimental program. (6) The curriculum shall not be subverted to special interest.

The principles shall guide the type of educative experiences provided for your child and mine during the next decade. Each and every parent should study them in order that he or she may be in touch with the program.

Each week for the next six weeks an explanation of one of these principles will be explained in this column by Supt. A. B. Sanders.
