Williams, with a vote of 82; and Wayne George, with 75 votes. They defeated Joe Ashburn, who received 72 votes, and Ray Stephenson, with 51 votes, both of whom sought re-election to the board. A \$10,-000 bond issue was approved 101-99 by voters in the district. The funds are to be used for construction of a new school gymnasium and homemaking cottage.
