Littlefield City Officials Elected To Serve Out Another Term

Littlefield voters re-elected unopposed candidates, Mayor A. C. Chesher with 80 votes, and Commissioners Les Hewitt with 63 and Lon Campbell with 64 votes Tuesday in the city election.

Mayor Chesher is thereby commencing his third term of office, having first taken office as mayor on July 30, 1945 to fill the unexpired term of Beeman Phillips. He was re-elected in April 1947, running against Allan McDonough.

Commissioner Hewitt will also be serving his third term. He first took office Feb. 6, 1946 filling the unexpired term of the late E. J. Foust, and was re-elected in 1947.

Commissioner Campbell is the senior member of the group, first taking office in July 1944 to fill the unexpired term of Beeman Phillips. He has been re-elected three times, in 1945-47-49.

Much has been accomplished under this administration with an improved garbage service, putting in of traffic lights and parking meters, improved water works and an extensive paving program to mention only a few of their accomplishments.

R. W. Bodger was presiding judge at the polls over the election during which 65 votes were cast. City Secretary W. G. Street reported there were no write-in votes.

Littlefield High school principal E. U. Bussanmas will have overall charge of the day's activities. Superintendent Joe C. Hutchinson is director general for District 4-A.

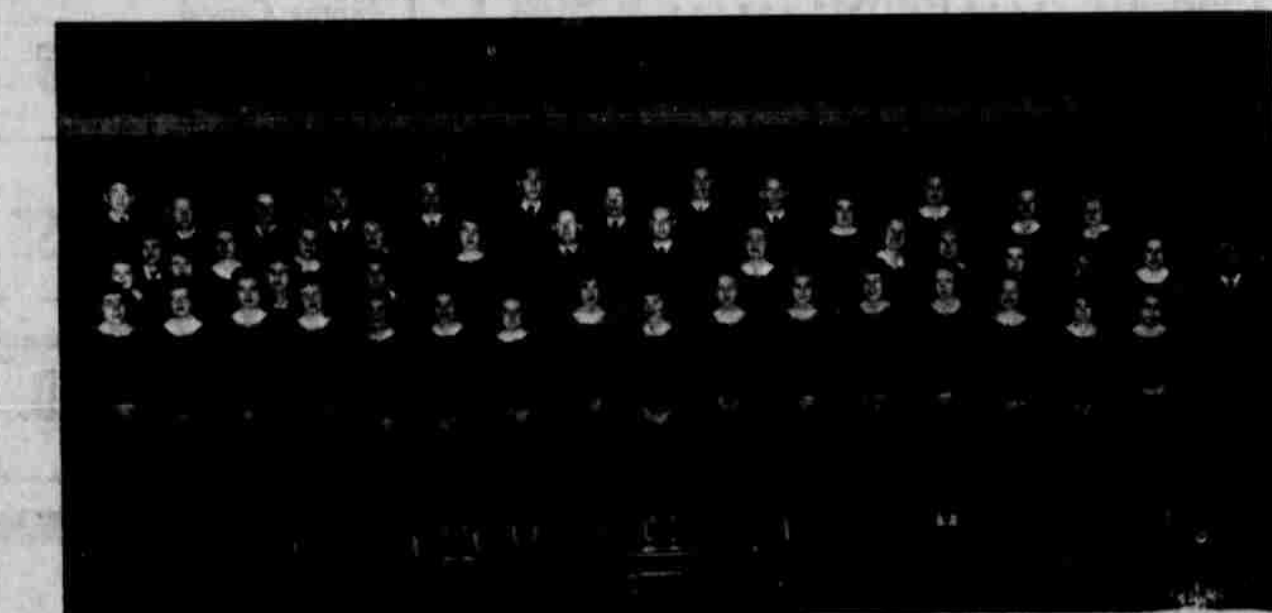
Number Of Voters Turn Out To Elect Johnson And Hoover As School Trustees

The bride wore a navy blue suit with accessories, and carried a white Bible topped by an orchid, from which hung white satin streamers.

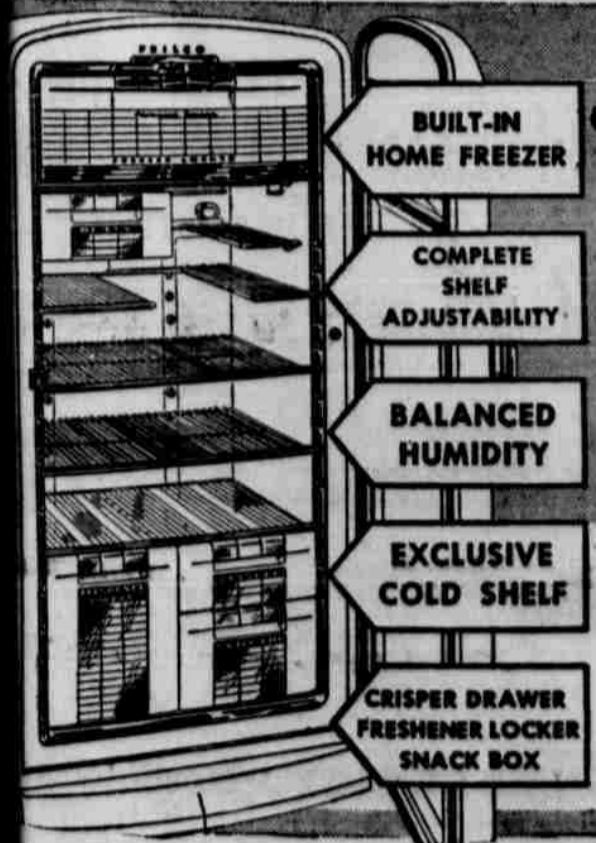
Mrs. Jack Aduddell, sister of the bride, served as matron of honor. She wore a pink gabardine dressmaker suit with navy blue accessories.

four years. He was sent to Europe in April of 1944 and two months later was shot down when piloting a fighter plane over Normandy, France. He was severely burned by flames from his plane and was in hospitals for four months before being sent on to the prison camp. When he came home from Germany there were more months in hospitals for Allan to recover from the results of the burns and malnutrition.

"Released from the Air Force in May of 1946, Allan entered the Conservatory and UC in September of that same year. He is majoring in composition with Peter Froelich as his teacher. When he finishes his course next year, Allan would like to teach music and continue his study of composition. He is married and has a little son, David, who is three months old today. They live at 69 Craft St., Winton Terrace. The baby and his mother, Mata Dell, arrived in Cincinnati a month ago from Texas, where David was born, two days late for Christmas, in his parent's home town of Littlefield.
