**Traffic North On LFD Drive; South On XIT Drive**

Continued traffic congestion on the three Main streets of downtown Littlefield, Phelps avenue, Littlefield Drive, and XIT Drive, which congestion had been amplified the past ten days, has forced the City Commission to take some action to relieve the same.

An ordinance has been proposed which will make one-way streets out of both XIT Drive on the west side of Phelps, and Littlefield Drive on the east side of Phelps, into exclusively one-way streets. Southbound traffic only will be permitted on XIT Drive; northbound traffic only on Littlefield Drive.

The matter of taking such action, has been discussed in past council meetings for several years, but no action was ever taken.

A few years ago, parking on the two mentioned streets was curtailed, by limiting parking to one side of the streets only, but the congestion has continued. The congestion is made acute through the fact that all other streets intersecting the two enter at angles.

The one-way provisions will affect the streets only between Highway 84 and 6th streets, according to present plans.



## New Ceiling Price Regulation Covering Re-sellers of New Passenger Cars Issued

The approach of winter, a recent norther and the rush of motorists to prepare their cars for cold weather brought the reminder from the Lubbock District Office of Price Stabilization that the ceiling prices of antifreeze must be posted by all retailers.

W. O. Daniels, chief of the fuels and chemicals section of the Lubbock district OPS, said the ceiling prices of antifreeze are:

Type S, one gallon or more, per gallon \$1.50; less than one gallon, 40 cents per quart. Type S is volatile antifreeze containing one or a combination of the following: synthetic methanol, synthetic ethanol, synthetic isopropanol and similar synthetic alcohols, except type SC.

Type SC, one gallon or more, per gallon \$1.40; less than one gallon, 35 cents per quart. Type SC is diluted synthetic methanol product containing more than 3 per cent by volume.

Type P, one gallon or more, \$3.75 per gallon; less than one gallon, \$1.00 per quart. Type P is permanent antifreeze consisting principally of glycol compounds.

Quoting the regulations, Daniels said sellers of antifreeze "must post your ceiling price for each type and brand of antifreeze which you sell where it can be plainly seen and read by the buying public. This must be marked 'OPS Ceiling Price \$—' (filled in with correct price) and may be posted on the shelf, bin or rack where your antifreeze is kept."

The regulation also requires sellers of antifreeze for a period of two years to keep records of all purchases, showing dates of purchase, name and address of supplier, quantity, and type of antifreeze bought and the price paid.

Mrs. Johnnie Sewell, 721 Phelps Avenue has received word that the body of her son, Pvt. Leonard Sewell, has been shipped from Korea and will arrive in San Francisco, Calif., this week aboard the Santa Clara Victory, the Department of Defense announced Monday. The ship was due to dock within a few days.

Pvt. Sewell was killed in action May 29th, according to word received from the War Department, by Mrs. Sewell, last June 12th. The notification from the War Department was the first to come to a Lamb County home, announcing the death of a local soldier in action in Korea.

Mrs. Sewell said Monday that she was planning a military funeral, and that services will probably be held at Littlefield Drive Church of Christ.

Pvt. Leonard T. Sewell, enlisted in the army in March, 1950, at the age of 17.

He was born in Oklahoma in 1932, but came to Littlefield at an early age, and attended school here, enlisting in the service before he had completed high school work.

He was sent overseas in August of last year, direct to Korea. A month later he suffered a leg injury, and was hospitalized for three weeks, and then returned to active service.

Mrs. Sewell said Monday that she had notified her daughter, and that she is expected to arrive for the funeral services.

## Use Of Child Labor During School Hours Reported Violation Of Law

Government officials Monday reiterated that use of children in West Texas for cotton picking during school hours is in violation of the law.

The Labor Department's stand was reviewed by William R. McComb, head of its wage, and hour public contracts division, in a conference with Representative Ikard of Texas.

McComb said the department had restituted the law and is still of the opinion stated on previous occasions: There is no administrative leeway permitting employment of children under 16 during regular school hours.

He added that the only situation in passage by Congress of legislation amending the existing statutes.

Along with several other Texas members of Congress, Ikard last week discussed the situation with McComb. He resumed the conference this week after receiving more than a score of telegrams over the weekend from his district.

"These telegrams point out the desperate plight the farmers are finding themselves in," said Ikard. "They noted that unless they can get pickers they stand to lose a big part of their crops, and many farmers are dependent solely on that source of income."

Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa, one of those who have been discussing the problem with Labor Department officials, has introduced a bill to permit employment of the school children for harvesting the crops, leaving it up to local school authorities to determine attendance requirements.

Children of migratory farm workers have been employed for years. The custom was challenged last year by the Labor Department. This year it is sending agents out to order the children away from the fields.

### Local Situation

J. D. Jordan, local manager of Texas Employment Commission said that the child labor law was keeping several crews from coming to Lamb county. However, he added that schools have made provisions for transient students. Littlefield schools have made provisions to take care of the influx of students. Paul I. Jones, principal of the primary department stated that a letter from the State Education Agency at Austin was received granting permission to organize a special class in the morning for transient people—dismissing them at noon to work in the cotton fields. He said that as yet it hadn't been necessary to organize a class but if the influx continues to be as great as it was Tuesday a special class will be organized.

The local Dunbar school has been dismissed for an indefinite period. Spade schools are meeting for half day sessions. Classes begin at 7:30 and continue to 12:30 enabling students to get in a full day schedule.

Pep schools have been dismissed until the rush season is over.

Bula schools begin at 8 a. m. and continue through to 1:10, and dismiss for the remainder of the day—getting in a full day schedule.

Total ginnings for Lamb County for the 1951 season, up to late Wednesday afternoon totaled 17,145 bales, as announced by J. D. Jordan TEC manager.

## Mrs. Max Wood Presented Award By Southwestern Law Journal

Mrs. Max Wood, of Perryton, daughter of Mrs. S. R. Rumbach and a former local resident, who received a LL.B. degree from Southern Methodist University in June and who is a member of the Texas Bar, has recently been notified that the law faculty at SMU has selected her as the recipient of the award made annually to the student editor of the Southwestern Law Journal, "who makes the outstanding contribution to the Journal, both quality and quantity considered."

The award was made on the basis of work Mrs. Wood did on the survey issue last year, the work she did on the indices, and the article she prepared on the Texas Certificate of Title Act. The award received was a set of Vernon's Annotated Texas Statutes, presented by the Vernon Law Book Company.

## November Quota Only Three Men

Selective Service headquarters at Muleshoe, announced this week, that only three men are scheduled for induction from this area, in November, for the armed forces.

They also announced that all married men (without children) will be called up for physical examinations during November and December, under the recently enacted changed laws.

The new law provides for calling these married men on an equal basis with unmarried men, and age (not married status) decides the order in which they are called. As an illustration, a married man, aged 21, would be called before a single man, aged 23, etc.

## Charles Joplin and Dewey Yeager To Sing in Tech Men's Glee Club

Two Littlefield students at Texas Tech will sing this year in Tech Men's Glee Club, a 42-voice all-male organization from the Tech Music Department.

Charles J. Joplin, Jr., and Dewey W. Yeager, both of Littlefield, will make several trips with the singing organization under the direction of Raymond Elliott, assistant professor of music at Texas Tech.

ents of six children, all under twelve years of age, who were at home when the accident occurred.

The Fulbrights by whom they were employed, knew nothing of the accident until hearing of it on the radio. They at once went to the nearby house occupied by the family, and found none of the children at home—found a pathetic little note which read: "Our parents are both dead and we have gone to live with our grandparents."

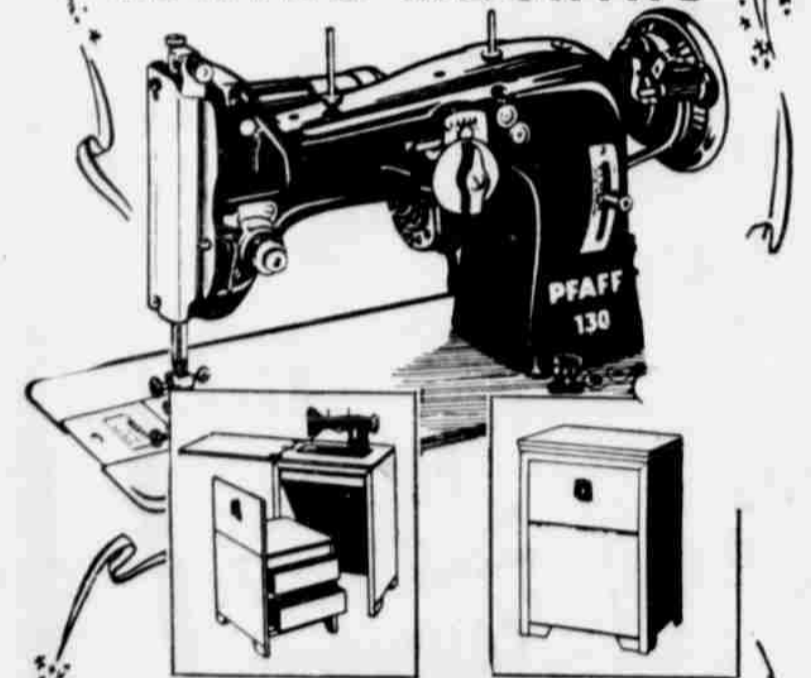
