Passes Away Suddenly
As Result Of Heart
Attack Sunday Morning

Mrs. Ben Dolle, 70, passed away suddenly about 9:30 a. m. Sunday at her home of her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Dolle, seven miles southeast of Littlefield, as the result of a heart attack.

Although Mrs. Dolle had been in poor health for sometime, suffering from high blood pressure, she was not thought to be in any danger of death. She had eaten a hearty breakfast and was walking out in the yard, but a few steps from the back door fell over dead.

Funeral services were conducted Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock at the Sacred Heart Church, of which she was a member, with Rev. J. H. Higgins officiating; and interment, in charge of Hammons Funeral Home, took place in the Catholic cemetery.

Eight Vacancies On Teaching Staff Remain To Be Filled

J. S. Fikes has been elected principal-coach of the Littlefield High school.

Mr. Fikes is 25, single, and comes from a similar position with Hamlin High school. He was medically discharged from the Naval Reserve early in 1943, and is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, and has completed considerable work toward his M. A. degree. He is doing graduate work this summer, but is expected to arrive in Littlefield about August 21.

Eight vacancies on the teaching staff remain to be filled, six of which are in the high school, including English, science, commercial, band, with two utility, or combination teachers yet to be employed.

The primary faculty is complete, and the Central school needs only a fourth grade teacher and a utility teacher.

Registration for the fall term has been outlined as follows:
Seniors—Friday August 25—9 to 12 o'clock;
Juniors—Friday, August 25—1 to 4 o'clock;
Sophomores—Saturday, August 26—9 to 12 o'clock;
Freshmen—Saturday, August 26—1 to 4 o'clock.

High school students will register on Friday and Saturday, August 25 and 26. There will be no pre-registration for elementary students. Classes will begin at 9 a. m. Monday, August 28.

Mr. and Mrs. Davis are now living at Levelland, where he is employed in the oil fields.

Supply Of Cartons Now At Red Cross Office

Mrs. L. M. Brandon, Executive Secretary of Lamb County Chapter of Red Cross, announced Saturday that a supply of cartons, to be used by next of kin, for sending packages to prisoners of war had arrived. These cartons are free to parties having sons or husbands in Jap or German prison camps.

It is pointed out, however, that no packages may be sent until next of kin receive the labels to put on the packages. Mrs. Brandon states, however, that next of kin are urged to use these plain cartons, as boxes obtained from other sources usually have some printing on the outside, and these are not permissible, and will not be admitted to the prison camps.

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Tragedy Occurs Six Miles N. W. Of New Bern, N. Carolina

Remains Expected To Arrive Here Sunday; Funeral Probably Monday

The entire population of Littlefield and territory was shocked and grieved beyond measure to learn Monday evening of the tragic and untimely death in a plane crash Sunday afternoon of Cpl. Robert W. (Babe) Hammons, 19, of the U. S. Marine Air Corps, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Pryor Hammons of this city.

Loved and highly regarded by everyone here, where "Babe" had lived practically his entire life, his parents bringing him here at the age of six months, his death is being mourned by everyone over this area.

Possessing an exceptionally friendly and sunny disposition, "Babe" gained the friendship and love of everyone he came in contact with, and he will be sorely missed in the community, in which he was reared, attended the schools, and left as a brilliant young Marine to serve his country.

Six Killed In Crash

Cpl. Hammons, radio gunner on a B-25, stationed at Cherry Point, North Carolina, was one of six Marines, including two officers, who were killed when their Navy plane, which was attached to the Cherry Point Marine Corps Air Station, crashed six miles northeast of New Bern, N. C., Sunday afternoon.

The tragic news was received by Mr. and Mrs. Hammons here by telegram Monday evening about 6 o'clock. Particulars of the accident were not available.

Cpl. Hammons is reported to have been on his last routine flight previous to receiving a ten-day furlough, which was to take effect Tuesday morning. He had telephoned his parents Saturday afternoon to the effect that he was receiving a ten-day furlough, and expected to be home either Wednesday or Thursday of this week.

He reports to Santa Monica Sept. 10 for re-assignment.

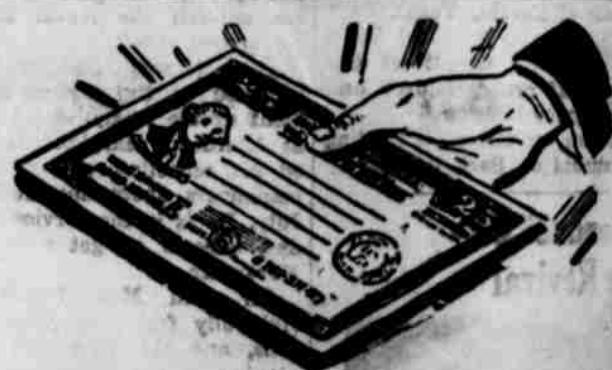

The romance of this popular couple dates back to their childhood days. They attended the local schools together and both graduated from the Littlefield High school at the same time, with the class of 1942.

Cpl. Hammons was born January 25, 1925, at Post, Texas, and is the son of a prominent pioneer family of this city, who have made their home here for the past 19 years, and have owned and operated the Hammons Funeral Home here for the past 15 years.

Enlisted in 1942
After graduating from the Littlefield High school, he attended Tech college during 1942, and enlisted in the Marine Reserve Corps in September of that year. In February, 1943, he applied for active duty, and was called into the service February 13, 1943. He had been in training one and one-half years exactly to a day, when he met his death on August 13.

He obtained his basic training at San Diego, Calif., radio schooling at Jacksonville, Fla., and flight training at Cherry Point, N. C., where he had since been stationed.

Cpl. Hammons was active in sports while attending Littlefield High school. He lettered in football for three years, and was captain of his team two years. He also served as captain of the basketball team, and lettered in basketball.

Brother Served in Marines
Besides his parents, Cpl. Hammons is survived by his brother, Pfc. Pryor Hammons, Jr., who has been in the service two years, and served 11 months overseas with a Paratroop Division of the Marines.

Pfc. Hammons took part in two major battles, and three or four minor conflicts.
