

The old building is to be euipped with sanitary closets that will need considerable water. The new building will not only have sanitary water closets, but shower baths requiring a great deal of water, and this will be supplied by a modern automatic force pump that will work at any and all times and not by a windmill that sometimes don't run. No saving can therefore be expected from this source

(3) JANITOR It will not cost any more to have the buildings careft for if located half a mile apart than if on the same grounds. A \$75,000 .building will require all the time of a good man wherever it is located. (4) TRANSPORTATION The Board expects to spend a great deal of time between now and the opening of school next September, working out a system of transportation that will be as nearly perfect as is humanly possible. The children are be ing transported this year at a cost of \$22.50 each, for the entire nine months-very cheap indeed. Next year we hope to lessen that. There is room for argument as to whether it will cost more if the buildings are separated, and it may do so, but you are to consider whether the advantages to be gained will not outweigh the added costs.






