

Sgt. R. L. Gibson Veteran of 26 Combat Missions

EAGLE PASS ARMY AIR FIELD, July 29.—The War Room at Eagle Pass AAF Central Flying Command advanced single engine pilot school is filled with material and the history of the AAF in the South Pacific operations. It's all old to S-Sgt. Dale E. Bordner, 41, 3345 E. Chillicothe, Ohio, son of Mr. R. L. Gibson, Littlefield, Texas, who, though they are on-the-line training in air maintenance and awaiting engine to a primary flying school, are veterans of this war. Sgt. Bordner wears the Purple Heart, the Silver Star, the Soldier's Medal and Presidential citation. A pilot and waist gunner on a B-26, he was shot down over Rabaul, New Britain. Although wounded, he made his way to shore with other survivors of the crash and spent the next 10 months evad-

ing Japanese in the jungles of the Jap-held island; eating snakes, grasshoppers, worms and weeds, before he was finally rescued by a PBY flying boat. Sgt. Gibson is a veteran of the bombing of Hickam Field, Hawaii, by the Japs on December 7, 1941; of the battles of Midway Island, Guadalcanal and Bougainville. It was over Guadalcanal that Sgt. Gibson, tail gunner on a B-17, shot down two Japanese Zeroes after he was wounded by shrapnel from 20 millimeter aircraft cannon. Sgt. Gibson, who holds the Silver Star, Purple Heart and a Presidential citation, is a veteran of 26 combat missions. After recovering from their wounds, malaria, dengue fever, and, in Sgt. Bordner's case, malnutrition and hookworm, the two men were returned to the United States for pilot training. Both hope to return to the Pacific area, Sgt. Gibson as a fighter pilot, and Sgt. Bordner as a pilot of a medium bomber.

Virgil McMillan Severely Burned

Virgil McMillan, 44, of six miles west of Olton, sustained severe burns on his chest, neck and arms Friday afternoon, when the irrigation well engine backfired, as was filling the tank with gasoline, causing the fluid to catch fire, throwing the flames over him. Mr. McMillan was brought to the Shotwell Hospital by his son, and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil McMillan, about 2:30 o'clock the afternoon. He was reported Saturday by the hospital as doing nicely.

She suffered the stroke the Sunday morning previous to her death, and remained in a coma until she died.

Transfer Of Trial To Plainview Is Said Likely

State Vs. Thomas On Docket For August Term Of Court
The next term of Court opens Monday, August 7, when the Grand Jury will convene, and a light docket is predicted by Sheriff Sam Hutson.

Sheriff Hutson, however, stated that a retrial of the case State vs. Dr. W. R. Newton, would come up at the August term of Court at Olton, but most likely will be transferred to Plainview. It was his opinion that when Court opens at Plainview on Monday, September 4, that a date would be set for the retrial of this case.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals June 14 overruled the State's motion for a rehearing of the case of Dr. W. R. Newton of Cameron, whose seven year sentence for alleged assault to murder Dr. Roy E. Hunt of Littlefield, had been set aside and a new trial ordered. The Appeal Court had reversed and remanded the case last March 15, but a rehearing was requested by Dist. Attorney H. M. LaFont.

Judge C. D. Russell of Plainview moved the case of Mrs. Newton, on his own motion, to Hale County, when her case was called at Olton. Her trial at Plainview, Hale County seat, will not be called before Dr. Newton is retried, officials have indicated.

The case of State vs. Thomas will also come up in the August term of court, but it is the opinion of law enforcement officers that this case will be transferred immediately on the Judge's motion to some other county on change of venue.

Simplified Forms May Be Used For Inspection Records

Operators of commercial motor vehicles were informed today by Richard E. Wood of Lubbock, district manager of the Highway Transport Department of the Office of Defense Transportation, that they may use simplified forms of their own making in keeping tire inspection records of vehicles covered by certificates of War Necessity.

Records of miles traveled, motor fuel consumed and inspections were said by the district manager to be more necessary today than ever before.

Truck, Bus Tire Allotments Cut

The August allocation of heavy truck and bus tires for civilian needs will be 60,000 casings as compared with the July quota of 135,000, the Office of Price Administration has announced.

Despite an emergency situation reported by truck and bus operators, the War Production Board ordered the deep slash at a special session at which members agreed the Army's requirements for heavy tires "must be met at all costs."

The board said the decision was necessary even though it "involves serious risks in the field of absolutely essential civilian transportation."

Bus and truck operators had advised their services might have to be curtailed unless they received more tires.

WPB said the supply is not expected to improve substantially in September.

Army officials stated, WPB reported, that any diversion of heavy tires to the home front might require modification of military plans, "slow up American offensives and prolong the war."

The August quota is the smallest since the start of rationing. Allocations of the last four months have averaged 125,000 to 130,000 tires, while the Office of Defense Transportation estimates that a minimum of 165,000 large-sized tires are needed each month of the current quarter to keep the present number of trucks and busses on the road.

fore but use of ODT forms, heretofore required, will not be necessary.

Operators, who still have Forms 17 and 17-A on hand, may continue to use them until they are exhausted if they desire. However, no new ones will be supplied.

Records are subject to periodic inspection by ODT officials. Information required includes a record of tire inspection for each vehicle, date of inspection, inspection station number, county and state, serial number or brand of tires requiring service and description of the required services, certification that such service as was required has been performed. Tires must be inspected every 5,000 miles or every six months, whichever comes first.

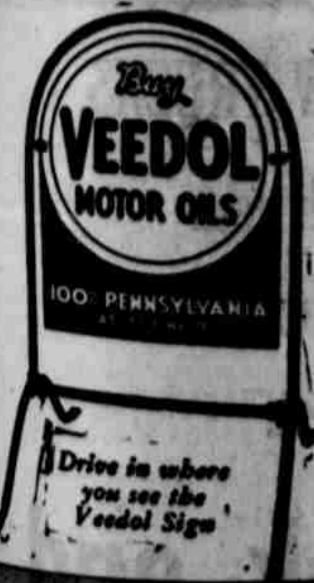

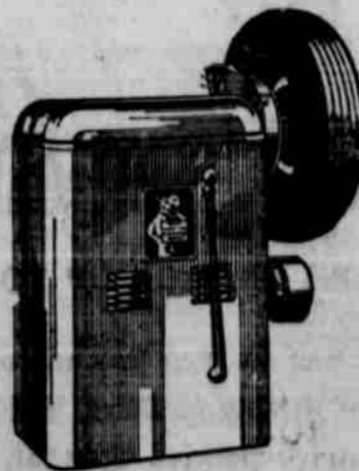

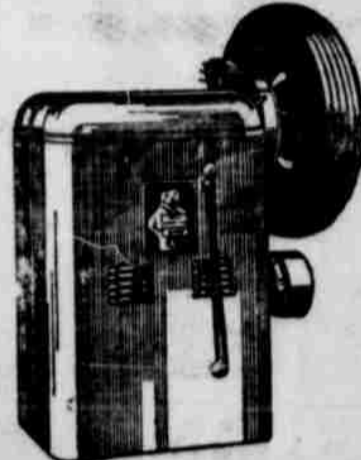
