Seek Loan

The delegation emphasized to the subcommittee that they are seeking an interest bearing loan and not a gift to finance the project which would aid in conservation of West Texas' disappearing water resources.

The bill if approved bythe subcommittee will still face the task of getting approval by the whole ommittee, the Senate and finally the White House. Its chance of gaining final approval during the present session of Congress are slim according to most observers.

In stressing the need for the project Mayor Gene Klein of Amarillo told the subcommittee that cities and towns of this region are reaching into agricultural areas for well sites for domestic water supply.

He pointed out that every four to six wells meant another section of land taken out of irrigation permanently.

On Borrowed Time

Texas Senator Lyndon Johnson appeared before the subcommittee and referred to the region a bove the Caprock as living on borowed time. He listed the resources and potentials of the region but said the riches could nat offset the poverty of Northwest Texas' water supply.
