

WILL AMHERST'S ACTION HOLD WATER? DOUBTFUL!

Amherst's offer to the County of Lamb, in the way of court recondition, hold water?

It is noted that the deed to the County of Lamb, with certain conditions, for the Amherst Hotel for a court house, and has also contracted to remodel the building.

It is also noted that the deed to the hotel property from the City of Amherst to the County of Lamb was presented for filing, a deed was filed for record, covering the same property and conveying it to the County of Lamb.

Information is that the Amherst Hotel, which is a two-story building, is 75 by 80 feet.

The deed from the City of Amherst to the County of Lamb sets out the ground floor now occupied by the First National Bank and the Halsell Farms Co., is reserved for a period of 10 years. A sketch of the building shows the section reserved to be approximately 30 feet by 80 feet.

VIRTUALLY A LEASE

The reservation in the deed, and this reservation, it would seem, is virtually a lease, provides that the deed is null and void as to the County seat ceases to be in Amherst.

The foregoing facts are presented solely in order that the voters may be in general detail the offer which Amherst has made, in an effort to have the voters select Amherst as the new county seat.

The deed and contract are regarded by those skilled in the interpretation of law as being void on their face; in other words, documents which cannot be properly executed by any municipality.

The law and authorities on such deeds have been looked into, and it has been found that they are improper transactions for a municipality to engage in.

GIVING AWAY TAXPAYERS' PROPERTY

True, the deed from Amherst to the County of Lamb recites the usual terms of \$1.00 and other valuable consideration, but it has been found to be illegal for the officers of a municipality to deed away the taxpayers' property.

What would happen if it were legal for the officers of a municipality to deed away the real estate of such municipality? They might even decide to make somebody a present of a City Hall as a palatial home.

And further, the Supreme Court of Texas has held that votes obtained for the removal of a county seat, under such conditions as Amherst is attempting to do in this case, are illegal. The entire Amherst vote could be thrown out.

REMODELING CONTRACT FULL OF HOLES

And here is another danger in connection with the approving of Amherst as the county seat. In the event the officers of Amherst should carry out their contract with the County of Lamb to recondition and remodel the Amherst Hotel for court house purposes, any one taxpayer could require that the County of Lamb refund to the City of Amherst every dollar so expended. Further, should the County of Lamb accept the remodeled building,

ing, the county would find itself in the position of having to issue warrants or bonds to repay every dollar to the City of Amherst that was so expended. Other developments might also occur, for example, the voters might take recourse to the "Bond and Warrant Law of 1931", which is published elsewhere in this edition of the Leader. Such a happening would place the County of Lamb in a very embarrassing position.

LITTLEFIELD LEASE 100 PER CENT LEGAL

With the County of Lamb occupying the Littlefield City Hall as a court house jointly with the officers of the City of Littlefield, no legal difficulties could possibly develop because of the mere fact that there would not be any. The lease between the City of Littlefield and the County of Lamb is 100 per cent legal.

The Littlefield City Hall is a modern building built for a City Hall and therefore equally suitable for use as a court house. It sits off by itself, whereas the Amherst Hotel is part of a block of buildings.

Further, the Amherst Hotel has no suitable place for a jail.

In every detail the Amherst Hotel would prove a makeshift.

Spiking A False Rumor

False rumors have been circulated to the effect that Littlefield's City Hall is in danger of falling into the hands of bondholders, and that it would therefore be "dangerous" for the County of Lamb to occupy the structure as a court house.

The facts are published herewith for the information of the voters. Is there any better authority on the financial condition of the City of Littlefield than W. G. Street, secretary and treasurer of the city? Read a legal document which has been executed by Mr. Street:

THE STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF LAMB
CITY OF LITTLEFIELD

I, W. G. Street, secretary and treasurer of the City of Littlefield, Texas, do hereby certify: That the first of the City Hall bonds does not mature until January 15th, 1943; and that all interest on said City Hall bonds has been paid to January 15th, 1932; and that on this date there is enough money on deposit in the Sinking Fund, (which can only be used to pay interest and bonds) to pay the interest on the City Hall bonds that will be due on January 15th, 1933; AND ANY STATEMENTS MADE TO THE CONTRARY ARE ABSOLUTELY FALSE.

I further certify that all bonds, interest, salaries and expenses owed by said City and due up to and including March 1st, 1932, have been paid.

The records disclosing the above facts are open to investigation by any interested citizen of Lamb County.

J. M. Tunnell Buys 10-Acre Tract On Levelland Highway

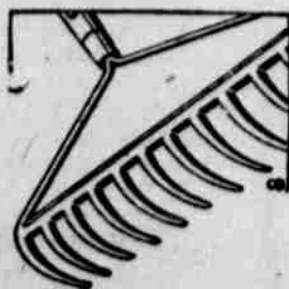
J. M. Tunnell has purchased a ten-acre tract on the Levelland highway in the College Addition and will build a home there in the immediate future.

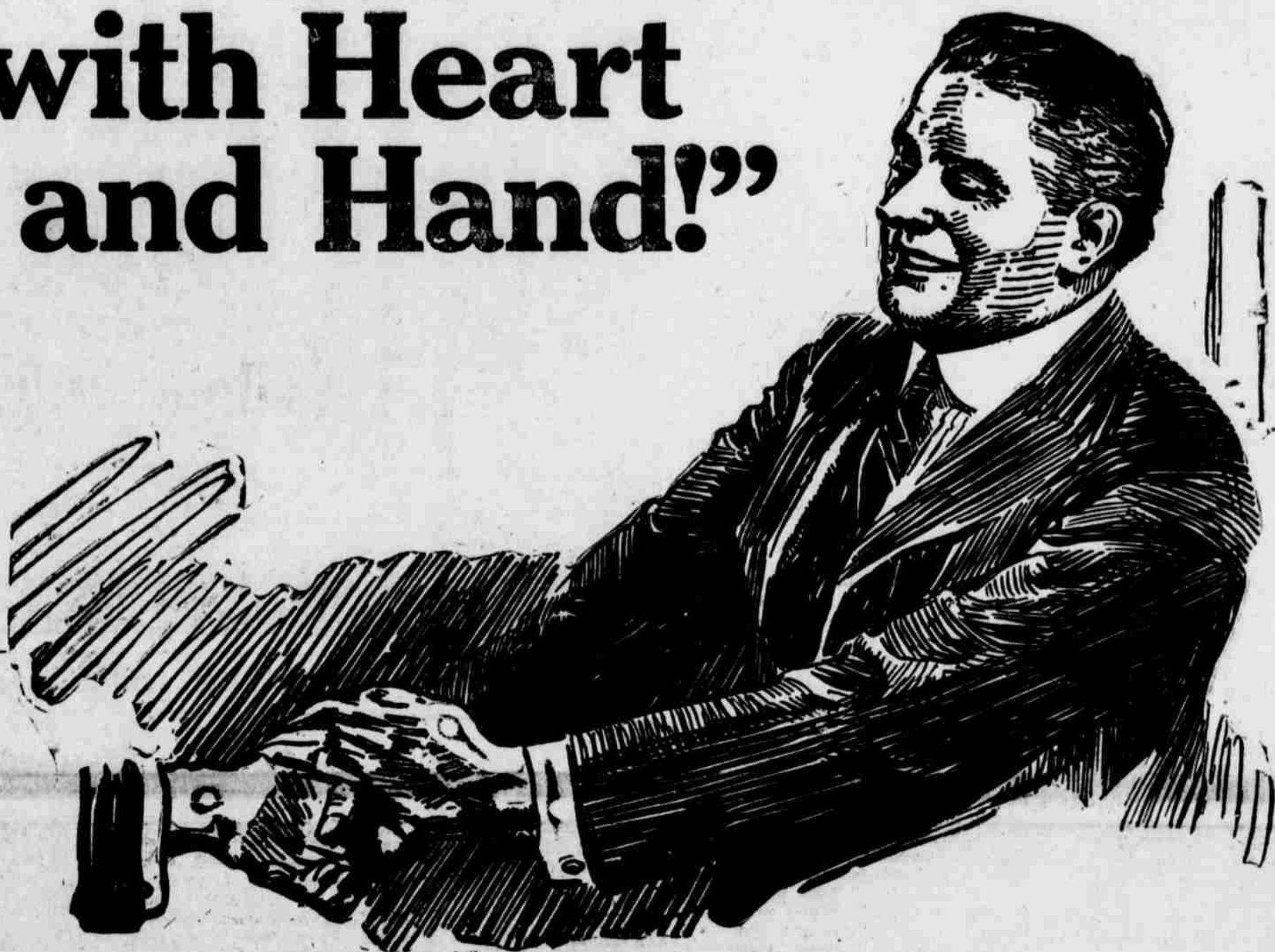

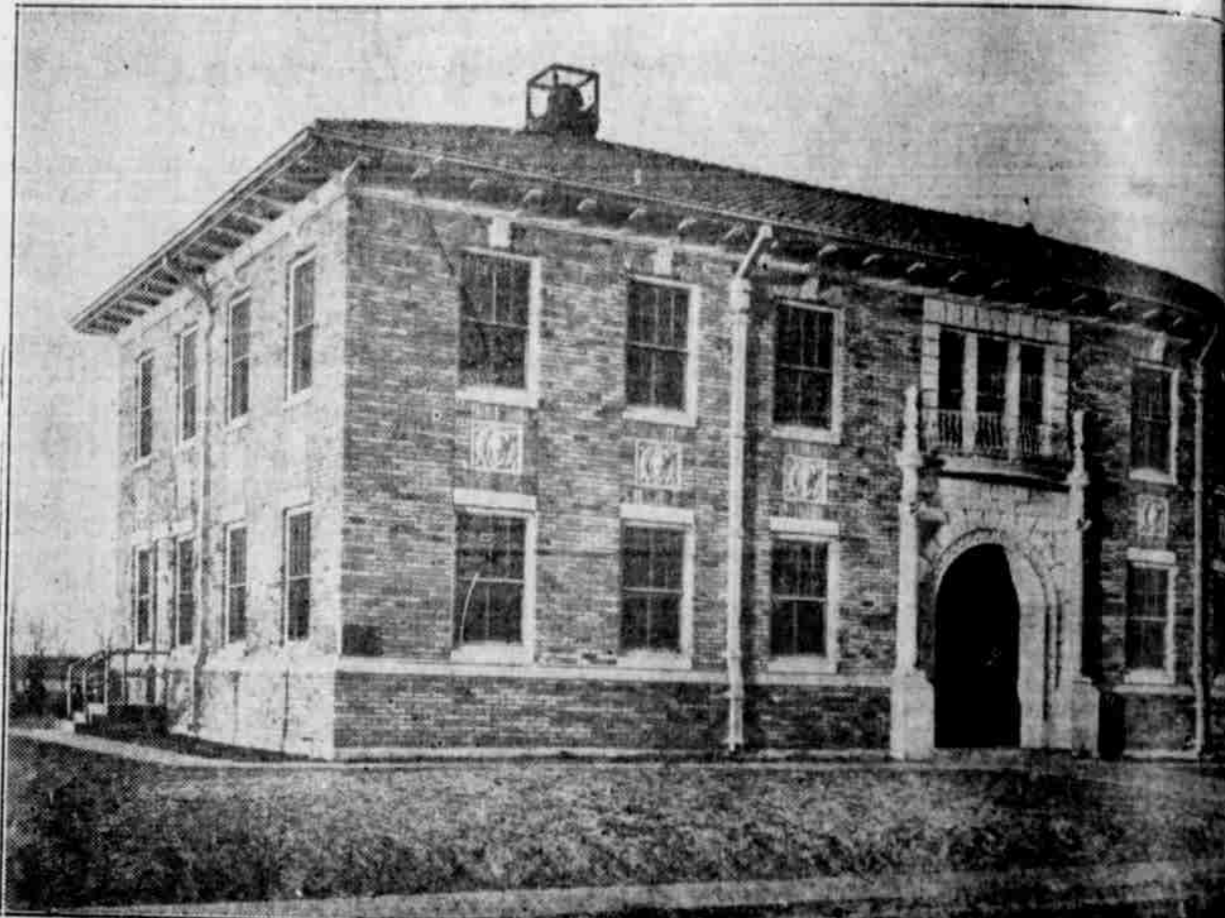

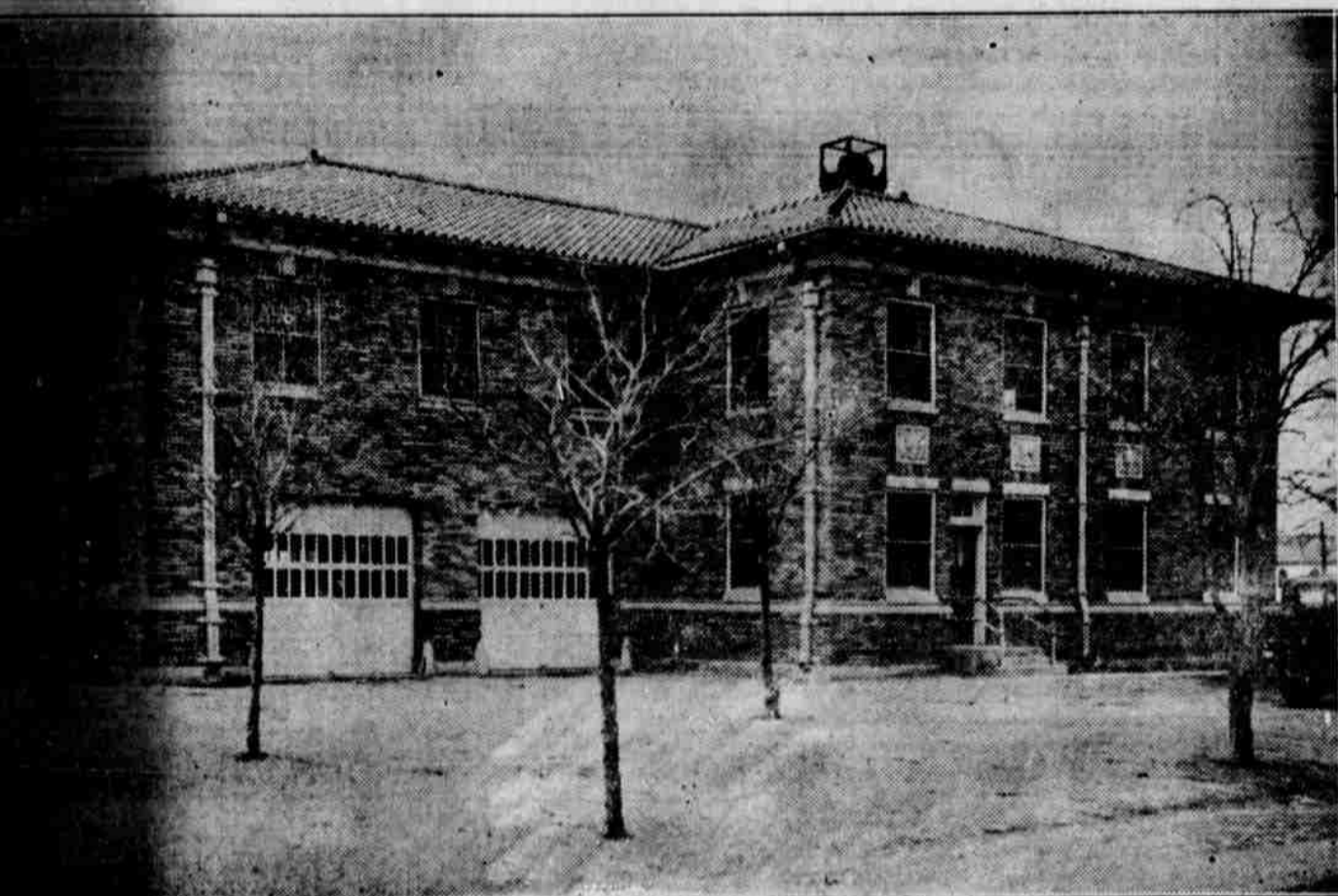

issues so long as the present distress-

"We the undersigned citizens of
Littlefield, Texas, wish to state that
under present conditions we consider
the burden of taxes too heavy, and
that we would strongly oppose any
additional taxation at this time. Our
property is taxed not only for state
and county and school purposes, and
to retire outstanding county warrants
and bonds, but in addition thereto we
pay taxes for the city government

to exist."

YOU ARE PROTECTED AGAINST BOND ISSUES

Legislation passed at the last ses-
sion of the legislature, known as the
"Bond and Warrant Law of 1931,"
safeguards the taxpayers of a county
against the issuance of bonds for
construction purposes, without their
consent.

Outstanding sections of the law are
herewith published for the informa-
tion of voters:

Excerpts from Art. No. 2368-A, re-
vised civil statutes of Texas, com-
monly known as "bond and warrant law of
1931," being an act passed by the
Forty-Second Legislature of the State
of Texas, effective May 26th, 1931.

Section 2 of said article provides:
"That no county or city in this State
shall make or enter into any contract
for the construction of any public
building requiring an expenditure in
excess of \$2,000.00, and thereby
create an obligation of any nature up-
on such county or city, without first
submitting such proposed contract or
agreement to competitive bids. That
notice of the time and place when and
where such contract shall be let shall
be published in such county once a
week for two consecutive weeks prior
to the time set for letting such con-
tract, the date of the first publication
to be at least fourteen (14) days
prior to the date set for the letting of
such contract; and that such notice
shall be given by posting notices at

the courthouse door for at least four-
teen (14) days prior to the time for
the letting of such contract.

Section 4 of said article provides:
"That if, by the time set for the let-
ting of the contract, as many as ten
(10%) per cent in number of the
qualified voters of the county, peti-
tion the Commissioners' Court in writ-
ing to submit to a referendum vote
the question as to the issuance of
bonds for such purpose, then such
Commissioners' Court shall not be au-
thorized to make any expenditure, nor
to award any construction contract
unless the proposition to issue bonds
for such purpose is sustained by a
majority of the votes cast at such el-
ection." Said article further provid-
es "that, in the absence of such peti-
tion of ten (10%) per cent of the
qualified voters of the county, the
Commissioners' Court may at its dis-
cretion also submit such question to a
vote of the people."

Section 2 of said article provides:
"Any and all such contracts or agree-
ments hereafter made by any county
or city in this State, without comply-
ing with the terms of this Section,
shall be void, and shall not be enfor-
ceable in any Court of this State, and
the performance of same and the
payment of any money thereunder
may be enjoined by any property tax-
paying citizen of such county or city."

EIGHT YEARS AGO IN LITTLEFIELD

(Excerpts from Littlefield Leader)

A prairie fire, starting in the sand hills about 20 miles north of Littlefield, swept over nearly 25 sections of land last Monday, destroying grass and fences in its onward rush.

THE RETURNS ARE GREAT LONG AFTER THE COST IS FORGOTTEN

South Plains, Incorporated, still is receiving replies from a two-year advertising campaign which ended in December, 1930. Many of the letters even contain coupons carried in national and sectional farm magazines months ago.

The organization placed the South Plains of Texas before ten million readers, received 30,000 replies and brought 800 farm purchasers—a survey showed that at least this number of farmers bought property in this section after reading the advertisements—to the South Plains. The advertising bill was slightly less than \$25,000.

Inquiries about farm life here came from every state in the union, and from the Philippine Islands, New Zealand, Mexico, Cuba, Spain, Brazil, Argentine, Holland, Australia, Porto Rico, Santa Domingo, Canada and even from Soviet Russia.

Hundreds of farm owners in other sections have indicated by their letters that as soon as they can dispose of property where they now live they will sell and purchase South Plains farm lands.

The survey which was made showed that the 800 farm buyers gave 675 orders to lumber companies. And, of course, they bought groceries, clothing and other necessities. Money was put into circulation—these new settlers became consumers immediately.

The first advertisements were placed in December, 1928, and the last in December, 1930. The readers were invited to send for a copy of the book "Farm Life on the South Plains." A questionnaire from the organization followed each inquiry. A typical advertisement read in part:

"What the South Plains offer you: Fertile, virgin soil at \$30 to \$50 per acre, pure water near the surface, quick growing season and complete crop diversification, ideal dairying, cattle and hog raising conditions, hospitable people and a forward-looking spirit, and room to expand and excellent education advantages for your children.

We Think— That Littlefield and district should conduct a similar campaign. Every penny invested by the people of the Littlefield territory in such a campaign would return immense dividends. Is there any way in which a special advertising campaign for the Littlefield section could be put over? What do you think?

Among the dramatic "high spots" are the child's caring for the old fighter in the gambling hall, the purchase of the race horse, the race at Caliente, the dramatic meeting of the champion and the child's mother, the fight with the Mexican police, the pathetic prison scene, the big prize fight and the heart-grIPPING death scene and finale.

Dramatic Prison Scene

One of the most dramatic scenes occurs in a Mexican prison, when Beery tries to send the child to his mother, even to the point of using force—and, later, the pathetic return of the runaway. Vidor's intimate human touches are notable throughout the entire production.

He is also survived by an aged sister in Kentucky, but she was unable to attend.

His first wife died December 16, 1921, and was buried at Archer City, Texas. Brother Ellerd was a great home lover and would not break up his home to live with his children.

He was married again to Mrs. A. J. Cockerham of Amherst, Texas, on the 21st day of May, 1928, at Clovis, New Mexico, and has made his home here since that time. The late Mrs. Ellerd, who has operated the City Hotel since the early days of Amherst, survives him.

He was a veteran of the civil war, having enlisted in Company K Alabama Volunteers, early in the war at Libanon, Randolph county, Alabama. He was wounded in the left leg June 27, 1862, at the battle of Gaines Mills. He was discharged November 1, 1863, having become totally disabled from his wound, which was troublesome until death.

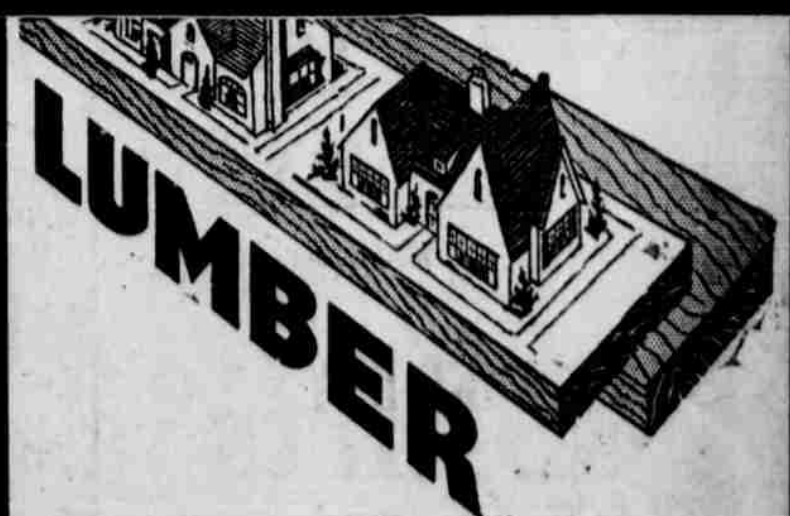

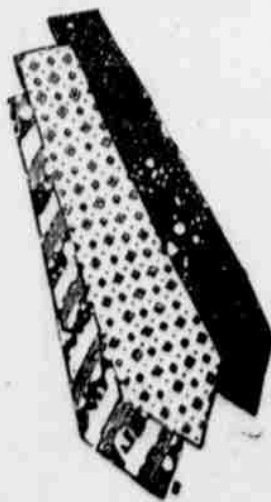

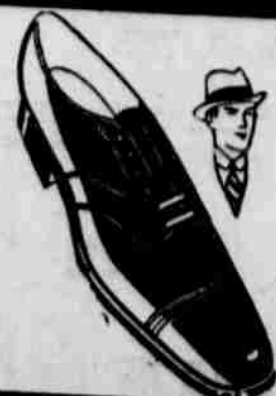
