

### Atomic Bomb Test Complete Success

The atomic bomb, its wrath pitted against a naval fleet Monday for the first time, sank five of Bikini's target array of seventy-three ships, wrecked six, damaged every other of the remaining vessels, surveys disclosed.

The second test, scheduled within three or four weeks, may take a far greater toll, was indicated by Navy Secretary Forrestal, radioed from the Flagship Mt. McKinley.

This second blast is to be set off under water, with the sea transmitting a terrific blow to the hulls of the test fleet.

Brig. Gen. Roger M. Ramey, air force commander, reported from Kawajalein, stating the first atomic bomb test "a complete and unqualified success."

A daughter, Mrs. Jack Dial, who lives at Lawton, Okla., arrived in Littlefield Saturday night, and is remaining with her mother until she is strong again. Their other child, a son, Cpl. John D. Newberry, is stationed in Alaska, where he has been since the first of the year. He has in service 1 1/2 years. Mrs. Newberry will be obliged to remain in bed at her home a week following her release Monday.

## Rains Bring Good Prospects for Crops in Lamb County

### Moisture General Over Littlefield Trade Territory

Varying quantities of rain, starting about 9 o'clock Thursday night, fell over the South Plains area, when Littlefield received .40 of an inch, according to the gauge at the West Texas Cottonmill.

Some areas reported cloudbursts, while others reported less than half an inch of moisture.

Rain is reported to have fallen from Post to Amarillo and from Lubbock to the New Mexico Line.

Cloudburst is reported north of Earth, where five inches of moisture fell while a strip six miles northwest of Littlefield only received a light shower. South of Littlefield two inches is reported, and farmers in that area report all the moisture they need for the present. Whitharral reports over two inches the past week, and a good cotton crop is reported all the way from Whitharral to Lovelland, and also from five miles north of Whitharral to Spade and including most of Spade. Five inches is said to have fallen at Earth with some hail. Good rains were reported also at Olton and Fieldton. Sudan received five inches; and Amherst 3 inches, with one inch at Spade.

Although the moisture in some parts of the county came too late for cotton planting, yet those areas have splendid prospects of good feed crops, including hegar and Martin Maize. Good crops of Alfalfa are reported in the northern part of the County, where also better wheat crops than expected are reported.

It was also predicted by a prominent farmer of this area Saturday that Lamb County would make from 35,000 to 40,000 bales of cotton, pending weather conditions were favorable.

## Littlefield Office To Make No Surveys For Present Time

### Sugar Rationing and Slaughter Control Programs Continue

An extension of the OPA until July 20 was voted overwhelmingly Monday night by the House, but the Senate leadership decided not to go along with that method of reviving price controls.

This senate-house difference meant that price controls which expired Sunday midnight, will remain dead until the two branches can agree on new extension legislation.

Stripped down to bare bones, OPA Tuesday set as its goal the revival of the same price and rent ceilings which went by the board at midnight Sunday.

Reports indicate that merchants for the most part retained the prices which the ceilings had imposed. Most of what break there was came in the field of rents.

President Truman meantime is urging on the people of the nation to "exercise self restraint" against skyrocketing of prices" until congress acts.

The local price control board received the following telegram Monday from E. B. Holloway, district director office of price administration: "The President has urged us all to remain at our jobs pending clarification of present situation and I hasten to re-emphasize his appeal.

According to general course of agency has authority to continue to operate within limits during an interim period and it is our duty to do so.

"Employees should not worry as to availability of funds for their pay during an interim period or any annual leave or other money due them by the government.

"Boards are to continue scheduling and holding conferences on alleged violations occurring prior to July 1, 1946. Settlements are to be negotiated and checks and files are to be sent to district office for approval.

"No surveys after June 30, until further notice.

"For your general information sugar rationing and slaughter control programs continue as in the past as they are under second war power act no price control.

"Clear up all backlogs and do any necessary office housekeeping other information will come to you as quickly as available."

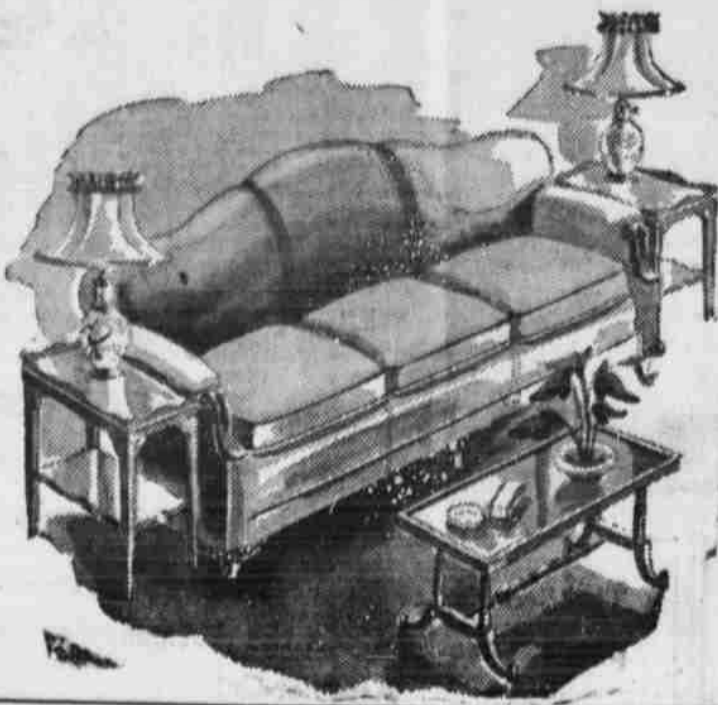

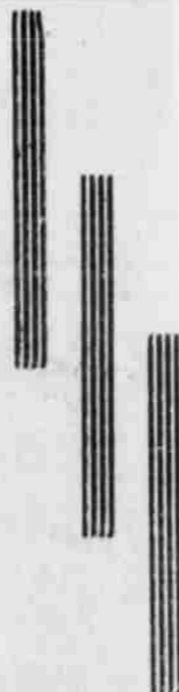

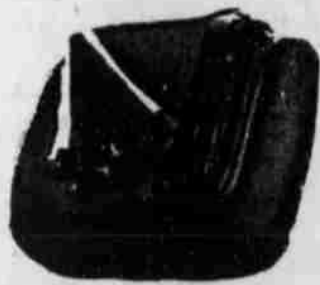

refrigerator preferred.  
For roll biscuit, combine about 2-3 cup milk (enough to make a soft dough) with 2 cups of mix. Turn out on slightly floured board. Knead very lightly about 18 strokes. Roll to 1-2 inch thickness, cut with biscuit cutter first dipped into flour, place on baking sheet either ungreased or only slightly so, and bake in hot oven (450 to 485 degrees F.) for about 12 minutes.  
For drop biscuits: Combine about 3-4 cup milk (enough to make a little softer dough than above) with 2 cups of mix. Mix lightly. Drop from a spoon about an inch apart on baking sheet. Bake as for roll biscuit.  
For muffins: Combine 1 slightly beaten egg, 1 cup milk, and 2 table-spoons sugar. Add to 2 cups biscuit mix and stir only until dry ingredients are moist. Fill well-greased muffin tins about 2-3 full. Bake in hot oven (400 to 425 degrees F.) about 20 minutes.  
This recipe makes about 1 gallon of mix which will keep in the refrigerator at least a month. Whole wheat flour may be substituted for white flour.

### Organizations Seek To Halt Certificate Abuse

Five leading veterans organizations have agreed to support efforts of the War Assets Administration to wipe out abuses of certification to buy surplus property, Hamilton Morton, regional director, Fort Worth, announces. The agreement was reached following a meeting in Washington of the veterans policy committee of the WAA, consisting of representatives of the organizations and WAA officials.

Joseph F. Carroll, director, compliance enforcement division, had uncovered indications that a small minority of veterans had acquired surplus property for others after certifying that the property was for their own use.

Under WAA regulation, any evidence of irregularity in the acquisition of surplus property is reported to the Department of Justice. Investigation is thereupon taken over by the FBI and prosecution by the Department of Justice.

Some of the cases which the Department is now preparing to prosecute involve dealers who have induced veterans to obtain substantial amounts of property for the dealers, certifying that it is for their own use in setting up or maintaining a business.

### Collecting Emergency Food Is Explained

**COLLEGE STATION.**—The plan for Texas rural women to process and ship surplus home grown products in cooperation with the national emergency food collection has been announced by Maurine Hearn, state director for women and state demonstration agent for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

"Food conservation is just as important as it was any time during the war," Miss Hearn said, "and, judging from inquiries received from many Texas counties we believe the plan will meet the approval of 4-H girls and home demonstration club members throughout the state."

All products must be canned under supervision to be accepted by UNRRA. Canned foods should be put in No. 2 tin cans. Processing time tables found in Extension Service publications B-101, B-86, C-223 and C-224 should be followed. Any of the following canned foods will be accepted: meats, including chicken; ranchstyle beef and beans; concentrated vegetable soup; grapefruit juice; English peas, field peas, corn, snap beans, sauerkraut, tomatoes, and fruits.

Counties who have no surplus fruits and vegetables to can may ship dried peas or beans in bushel-size cotton or burlap bags.

Containers of home canned foods should be marked before processing to identify the contents. A recommended method is the use of a rubberstamp and special ink. Cans processed by club members or others under supervision may carry the Texas 4-H Pantry Label with the name of the product typed or legibly written with water proof ink on each label.

Food must be packed in shipping containers and shipped freight collect to the National Shipping and Warehousing Officer, Emergency Food Collection, 100 Maiden Lane, New York, 7, New York.

More detailed information about collection and shipping can be obtained from the local county home demonstration agent.

### Breakfast Quick Bread Is Family Treat

**COLLEGE STATION.**— Many housewives these days are faced with the problem of making a quick bread for breakfast when they are unable to buy bread for the usual toast. Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, says that hot biscuits or muffins can be prepared with almost as little effort as toast if one learns the secret.

A biscuit mix which can be stored in the refrigerator and quickly made into biscuit or muffins in Miss Lawrence's answer. The recipe is: 12 cups sifted flour, 1-3 cup double-acting baking powder, 4 teaspoons salt, and 1 to 1 and 1-2 cups fat. Sift flour and measure. Add baking powder and salt and sift the three together. Cut in fat until mixture has a fine even crumb. Place in a closed container and keep in a cool place,



# Veterans Have Priority For New Construction

your new home or remodeling project is still in the planning stage, you can't materialize for a while unless you are a veteran. The Veterans Emergency Housing Program No. 1, has taken care of that. Here are the facts:

**YOU CAN BUILD IF:** (1) Material which is an integral part of the building unit was on the site before July 26, and construction was underway at that time. A housing unit,

incidentally, includes farm homes, but other farm buildings have different restrictions. (2) Preference ratings have been issued under priorities regulation No. 33. (3) You can get authorization from the Civilian Production Administration.

**YOU CAN'T BUILD IF:** (1) Work hasn't begun or material isn't at hand. You may have your basement excavated, but you can't finish unless some of the foundation has been poured.

**YOU CAN REMODEL IF:** (1) The total cost of remodeling is less than \$400. This includes any house, farmhouse or other structure (such as barn or garage converted to housing) on residential property, designed for occupancy by five families or less. (2) The tearing down is done, the building up has begun, and material for completing the job is at hand. (3) It is a maintenance job—repainting, repapering or installing replacement parts in existing equipment which won't alter structure containing it.

**YOU CAN'T REMODEL IF:** (1) You can't meet the requirements listed above.

(1) Houses for veterans are permitted only under unusual hardship circumstances. But no priorities for materials will be granted. More than half of the material allotted will go toward veteran's housing; for any of

the remainder you'll save to compete against all other construction authorized.

—Now let's define the terms "cost" and "job." Cost is the over-all price of a job, including contractors' fees, paid labor, and the value of all equipment, materials and fixtures, incorporated into the structure. Job is a related series of operations performed together. The work might be what you do: For farm housing, separate contracts are let to cover various parts of the work, it is still considered one job. And no job can be subdivided to evade cost limitations. Here is What You Do

If you still think you can get an authorization for your project, here is what you do: For farm housing, application should be filed with your county agricultural conservation committee. For urban or suburban housing, file your application on form CPA 4386 with the local FHA office.

In each FHA city, a CPA construction office is set up with a citizens' advisory committee established in each office. It will be the responsibility of members to "screen each project in the light of the peculiarities of the local situation." They will approve your project only if they decide it is essential under existing con-

ditions and that work can't be put off. Otherwise, expect a rejection. If your project is rejected, you'll have to wait. And even if you get approval, the recommendation is subject to review by regional CPA and FHA representatives in the light of over-all supplies.

### To Have New Stadium At Tech By Fall

LUBBOCK—Hopes that Texas Tech's new \$300,000 stadium may be completed for use this fall have been revived by recent progress, which includes employment of architects and engineers, and indication the government will release needed materials.

Lubbock architects and engineers are drawing plans for the new structure, following visits to stadiums in Fort Worth, Dallas, and other cities, to obtain ideas.

Plans call for dressing rooms, offices, classrooms and storage space on the east stand; and for utilization of space under the west stand for storage and classrooms. Rest rooms and concession areas also will be in each stand.

The new stadium, to seat 15,000 persons, will be located northwest of the present football field, Mosley Jennings, director of Tech's athletics, has announced. It will be of concrete and steel and will be so constructed that enlargement would be easily possible.

Plans also call for construction of a new street from the stadium area to the main section of the campus; and for erection of adequate parking space. Most of the present stands will be raised. The present field, surrounded by a track, will be used for practice.

The new stadium will be known as the Clifford and Audrey Jones Memorial Stadium, honoring Dr. Clifford B. Jones, president emeritus of Tech, and his wife.

### DATES GROWN IN VARIOUS SOILS

Dates have been grown in South Texas on dooryard palms raised from seed for at least 50 years. Commercial varieties, however, have been planted only within the past two decades at the Weslaco and Winter Haven experiment stations of the Texas A. & M. College.

Experimental plantings of commercial varieties of dates have been possible of date culture and of Winter Haven since 1932. Knowledge gained through these tests, of the possibilities of date culture and of the varieties best suited to South Texas conditions have been summarized by E. Mortensen, superintendent of the Winter Haven station, in a report released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Mortensen lists climate as the chief limiting factor in date culture. A less relative humidity with high summer heat is needed for setting the fruit. Rains at ripening time cause various damage to date fruits. It is necessary, therefore, to grow varieties that will tolerate rainy conditions, or ripen off the palm indoors; or concentrate on varieties that will ripen in July or August, ahead of the normal South Texas September rains.

Mortensen discussed 16 date varieties which he recommends for culture in the Winter Garden district. Mention also is made of 12 seedlings which show promise. Unselected seedlings should be grown only in dooryard plantings, or as ornamentals, Mortensen said.

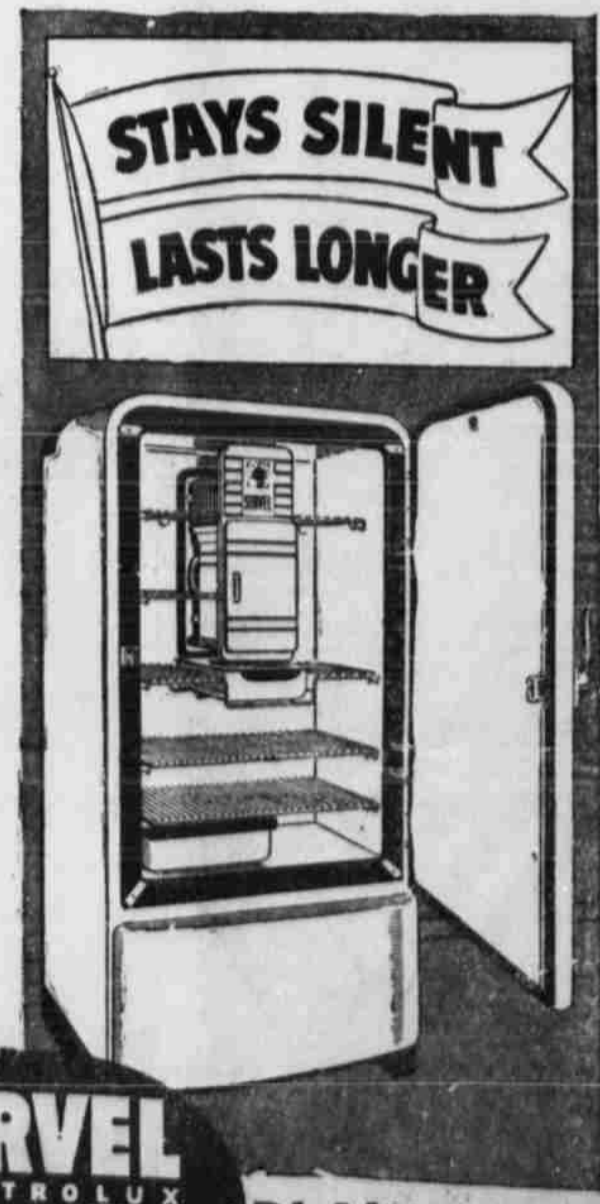
