Child Killed When Truck Passes Over Body

The body of nine-year-old Manuel Hinojosa, who was instantly killed when a truck ran over his body, on the E. W. Simmons farm near Circle shortly after noon Monday, was shipped to Portland, Texas, for services and burial.

The boy had evidently become tired and decided to take a nap, and curled himself up in a cotton sack, near a parked truck. It was reported that Antonio Moreno, of Sinton, who had just finished his lunch, got into the truck to move a truckload of cotton about 100 feet and paid no attention to the empty cotton sacks lying around on the ground until the truck passed over one and he heard a strange noise. Investigating he found that he had run over the sack in which the boy had fallen asleep.

Manuel was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Juan Hinojosa of Portland. The body was taken to Hammons Funeral Home, and was sent overland to Portland.

Lamb County Cotton Crop Is Estimated At 152,000 Bales

Lamb county are make quick work of the remaining 20,000 bales remaining, either already picked and ginned or to be ginned in the 1952 cotton ginning season.

They also report from that office that approximately 132,000 bales have already been ginned in the county thus far, and that a considerable amount of Lamb county grown cotton has also been ginned this year at gins outside the county due to crowded ginning facilities here the past few weeks. A lesser amount of cotton grown outside the county and ginned in Lamb county has added somewhat to the local ginning report.

From the above estimates, a Lamb county harvest of in excess of 152,000 bales is indicated.

Mr. Wright is a son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Glenn here, and a former Littlefield pioneer resident. He is a rural mail carrier out of Abernathy.

The couple's daughter, Mrs. Paul Trobisch of Pasadena, his brother Alph Wright of Odessa, and also Mrs. Wright's brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Glenn of Corpus Christi, and Mr. and Mrs. Glenn of Littlefield were all called to Lubbock to be at his bedside.

Turkey Patties
Broadcast: November 22, 1952

1 Tablespoon fat	1 teaspoon ground onion
2 Tablespoons flour	½ cup soft bread crumbs, 2 days old
½ teaspoon salt	½ cup corn flake crumbs
few grains pepper	1 cup turkey or chicken, cooked or canned
1 cup Fat Milk	¼ cup condensed cream of chicken soup
1 cup finely cut turkey or chicken, cooked or canned	

Melt fat in saucepan. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Stir in gradually cup milk. Cook until very thick, stirring all the time. Stir in turkey, onion and bread crumbs. Chill. Shape into 8 small patties. Roll patties in corn flake crumbs. Dip into ½ cup milk. Save any milk that is left. Roll patties again in crumbs. Brown on both sides in ½ inch hot fat. Mix soup and milk left from dipping patties. Heat soup steaming hot, but do not boil. Serve over patties. Makes 4 servings.

An ordinance defining certain words and phrases and providing for permits and permit fees for radio and/or television antennae structures and regulating structural features and location of said structures and declaring anchor points located on public property, for guy wires of such structures, public nuisances, and providing for the removal thereof and a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Littlefield, Texas:

SECTION X: PENALTY: That any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00, and each day which said violation is allowed to exist shall constitute a separate offense.
