LEADING MEN AT AGGIE MEET TO BE IN LUBBOCK

The speakers that will address a gathering of South Plains bankers, business men, farmers, and housewives January 28 and 29, at Lubbock will discuss many subjects that are of the most practical value to everyone in this section, according to A. H. Leidigh, dean of agriculture of the Texas Technological College.

L. A. Hawkins, a practical farmer and horticulturist, will discuss fruit, potatoes, gardens and similar subjects. He made a special study of horticulture at the University of New Hampshire and Oregon Agriculture College.

Mrs. Gordon W. Randlett, who has had 13 years' experience in home and school work at Farmers' Institutes under the direction of agriculture colleges, will discuss home conveniences, poultry birds, home canning, health and sanitation.

E. T. Ebersol, master of agronomy and consulting agriculturist for four years instructor in crop production at the University of Illinois and who has had 17 years of extension work and teaching will discuss soils, crops, community building, live stock, co-operative marketing.

Seventeen reels of agricultural moving pictures, demonstration material, large illustrated charts and lantern slides will be in the charge of Herman G. Janssen who will assist the speakers in illustrating points brought out in their lectures.

The meeting will be of great practical value to the entire South Plains and Lubbock has issued a cordial invitation to every one to attend. A program committee headed by A. H. Leidigh, dean of agriculture of the Texas Technological College will make out the program which will be of the most practical value to this section.
