A pneumatic tube system is being installed at Penney's Store and will be in operation today (Thursday). This cash carrier system is manufactured by the Grover Company of Detroit, Mich., and sold by Frank E. Ware of Dallas, by whom it is being installed.

According to Mr. Ware, this is the fastest carrier system manufactured. Carriers will travel 30 feet per second, transmitting carriers from clerk to each station, with a total of six stations installed in the store.

The system is operated by two one-horse power blowers.

This cash carrier system will enable clerks to more quickly service their customers, and thereby save considerable time in shopping.

## Cloudburst East of City Sunday Halts Traffic

Rainfall of cloudburst proportions fell Sunday afternoon over an area from a short distance east of town on Highway 84 for considerable distance toward Lubbock, it has been reported. Five and six inches of moisture is said to have fallen within a short time. Water was reported covering the highway from fence to fence for about a mile distance. Santa Fe officials said a freight train was held up for an hour and a half while weakened roadbed was strengthened.

Highway patrolmen were called to the scene, near Rainer Switch, to direct traffic after cars had stacked up for nearly a mile, and several cars had drowned out or become stuck off the pavement.

The moisture was general over the area, with Littlefield and area receiving 1.37 inches, and other vicinities receiving light to heavy showers.

## Two Petitions For Paving Presented

Two petitions have been circulated calling for paving of country roads in the Fieldton area, both of which petitions have been signed by sufficient taxpayers and presented to Judge O. H. Dent, county judge, and no action has yet been taken by the county commission.

A number of Lamb County residents ask for paving of a road running from just north of Fieldton west to Highway 51, and two miles east of Fieldton, and then going from Fieldton south to connect with the road being built in Road District 1-A.

Another group asks for the paving of a road from Speers Gin on Highway 51, running east to Hart's Camp, and with an extension from this road north through Fieldton.

According to Judge Dent, the petitions will not be taken up by the commission before their next meeting on June 9.

Judge Dent also stated that county court adjourned Monday for a week, due to the fact that the jury men had so much pressing farm work.

## New North-South Bus Service Started; Serves Area Between Lamesa, Hereford

Littlefield and cities and towns up and down the line from Lamesa to Hereford are happy over the new bus service inaugurated by Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma Coaches.

The new service went into operation Tuesday, and enthusiasm at the establishing of the transportation facilities was evident on the up and down trip.

There will be one bus each way daily. Northbound, the bus will leave Lamesa at 10:40 a.m., arrive in Littlefield 1:10 p.m.; leave Littlefield 1:25 p.m., and arrive at Hereford 3:15 p.m. Southbound, the bus will leave Hereford at 3:40 p.m., arrive at Littlefield 5:30 p.m.; leave Littlefield 5:35 p.m., and arrive at Lamesa at 8 p.m.

Arriving in Littlefield on the initial trip northbound Tuesday were a number of citizens from towns south of this city. This party included W. A. Wallace, Lamesa, bus agent and hotel operator; Ross Woodson, Lamesa newspaperman; J. S. Elliott, Levelland druggist; J. S. Mansfield, secretary-manager of the Levelland C. of C.; Homer Winston, county judge of Terry county; and C. M. Owens, traffic manager for Texas, New Mexico & Oklahoma Coaches.

Clay Pack was the operator of the bus, and will be regularly employed as operator on the Lamesa-Hereford line.

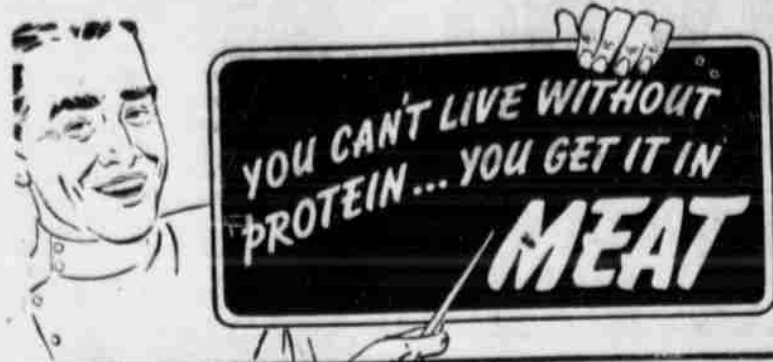

# Trading in Spot Cotton Increases; And Higher Grades Sell Freely

Some easiness cropped up at most southwest farm markets last week, but few products suffered much loss, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Light offerings of wheat and sorghums pushed prices up several cents early last week, and corn and barley followed, but later losses erased all gains, except on barley and sorghums. Wheat closed Friday at \$2.78 per bushel for No. 1 hard; and corn \$1.96 for white, and \$1.91 for yellow. No. 2 milo brought \$3.15 per hundred pounds.

Moderate quantities of milled rice moved to Cuba and domestic markets this week. Planting of the new crop made good progress. The downward trend in feed prices halted abruptly, as bran and shorts jumped \$9 to \$12 per ton, and other feeds held steady to strong. Alfalfa had not fully adjusted to the new crop basis; but prairie hay remained in urgent demand.

Egg prices dropped a cent or two in some areas last week, and mature poultry showed a slightly weaker undertone. Eggs averaged 36 cents per dozen at Fort Worth; 37 at Denver, Amarillo and San Antonio; 37 1/2 at Dallas, Fort Worth and New Orleans; 38 at Topeka and Oklahoma City; 44 at Shreveport; and 45 at Houston and Corpus Christi.

Diminished strawberry shipments from Louisiana brought lower prices last week and auction sales discontinued operation. Heavy supplies of snap beans at New Orleans sold lower. On Denver's wholesale market, cucumbers, strawberries, tomatoes and green corn weakened. In the lower Rio Grande Valley, larger quantities of corn and tomatoes loaded at reduced prices. Growers got 75 cents per bushel for white corn, 50 cents to \$1 per half bushel for bantam, and 5 to 7 cents per pound for tomatoes.

Trading in spot cotton increased last week in some markets. Higher grades sold freely, but lower classes met slowed demand. After rather wide fluctuations, Friday's prices stood at \$2.75 to \$4.75 lower for the period.

Butcher hogs closed last Friday about the same as a week earlier at most southwest markets, but some sows and feeder pigs weakened. Closing bulk prices on good and choice medium weights stood at \$23.50 at San Antonio; \$24 at Fort Worth and Oklahoma City; \$25 at Denver; and around \$23.50 at Wichita.

Sheep and lambs saw little price change last week, but San Antonio netted 50 cents advance on spring lambs, while Oklahoma City and Denver weakened some. Closing bulk of good and choice spring lambs brought \$21 to \$23.50 at Fort Worth; \$20 to \$22 at San Antonio and Denver; and medium to good \$19 to \$23 at Oklahoma City.

Early advances at southwest cattle markets were largely lost late last week, and some spots closed a little lower, but many classes ended up with some net gains. Bulk of common and medium steers and yearlings brought \$14 to \$18 at Houston; and medium grades turned at \$19.25 to \$20.50 at San Antonio. Medium and good steers and yearlings sold mostly at \$18 to \$23 at Fort Worth; and \$20 to \$23.50 at Wichita. Oklahoma City paid mainly \$19 to \$23.50 for medium and good steers.

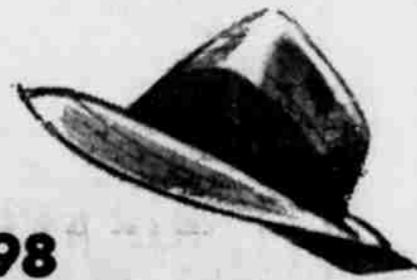

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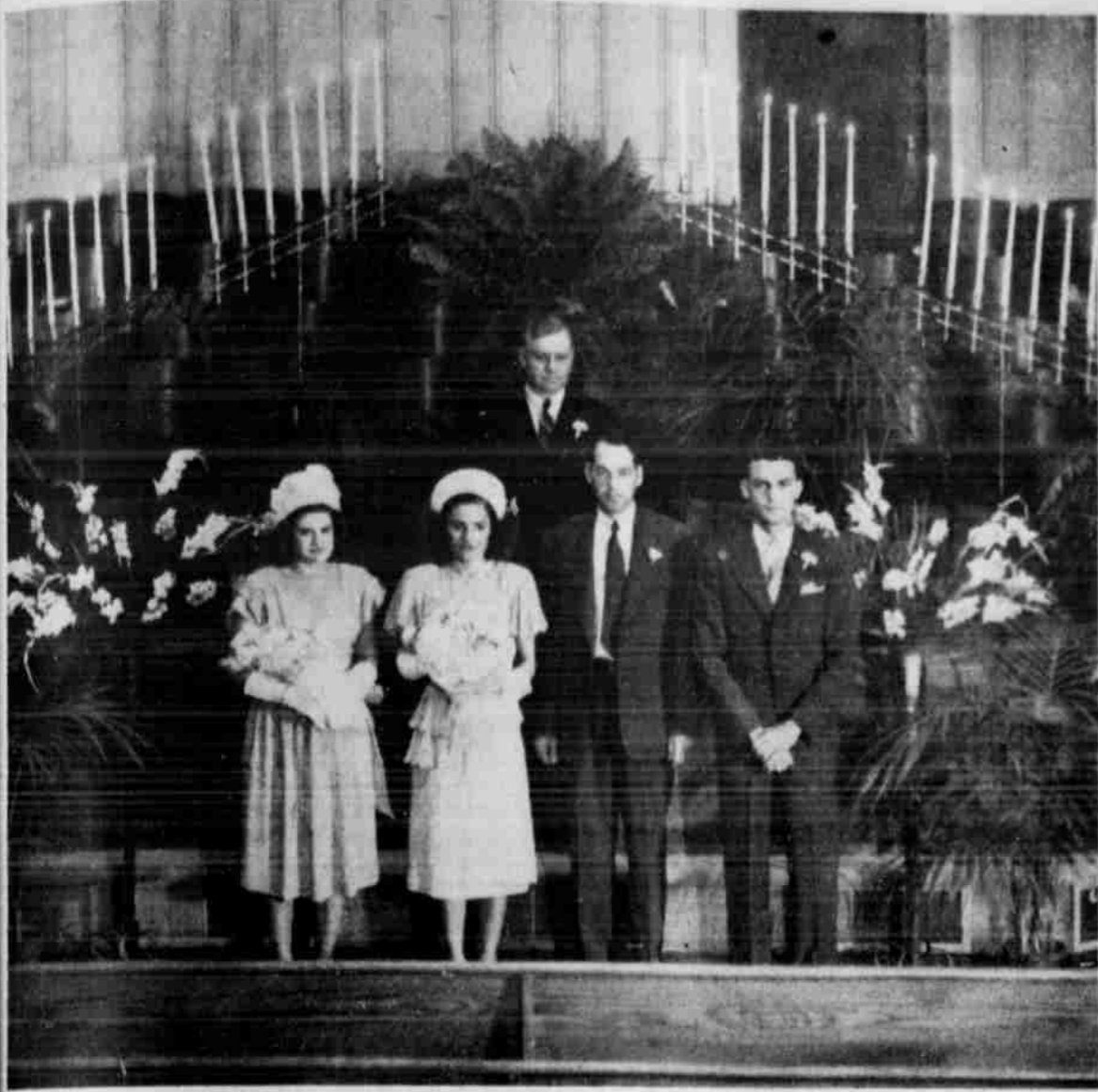

## New and Faster Train Goes Into Service May Eighth

Courier-Nurse service and a complete range of sleeping car accommodations including drawing rooms, compartments, bedrooms, roomettes, open section berths and streamlined coaches, will feature the new and faster Diesel-powered train, The Grand Canyon, which will be placed in service on the Santa Fe June 8, H. C. Vincent, traffic manager, Amarillo, said today.

As originally announced the train will replace the present Grand Canyon Limited and will make available to the Texas Panhandle and New Mexico a much faster train, without extra fare, between Chicago and the Pacific Coast.

When the new train enters service, two of the sleepers in the train will be of the heavyweight type but the balance of the equipment will be streamlined. T. B. Gallaher, prominent in railway activity in this territory for a number of years before becoming head of the passenger department, declared it was the aim of the railway to provide as much improved service for this territory as soon as possible and to meet the summer travel season season. That is the reason, he said, that the new Grand Canyon will be placed in service before a complement of streamlined cars is available. Delivery of some of the cars has been delayed but the train will be completely streamlined as soon as necessary equipment is received. This is expected before the summer is out, he said, tax included. Reserved seats added.

The new train will provide a service of 48 and three quarter hours between Chicago and Los Angeles and 48 hours eastbound. The time between Chicago and San Francisco, westbound, will be slashed more than fifteen hours.

The Grand Canyon, Train No. 24, eastbound—Leave San Francisco 8 a. m.; leave Los Angeles at 1:30 p. m.; arrive Belen, N. M., 11 a. m. following morning; arrive Clovis, N. M., 3:45 p. m. (MT) and leave 4:55 p. m. (CT); arrive Amarillo 6:50 p. m. and leave 7 p. m.; arrive Pampa 8:05 p. m.; arrive Kansas City 7:05 a. m. following morning, and leave 7:30 a. m.; arrive Chicago 3:30 p. m.

## How Poison Ivy May Be recognized

With the advent of summer and the ensuing exodus from city to country resorts and picnic spots, the annual problem of ivy poisoning is once more making its appearance.

In order that city dwellers may guard against this poisonous plant by instant recognition of it, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, has issued the following statement: "Poison ivy may be recognized by its leaves and its fruit. Each leaf is divided into three leaflets, the margins of which vary from smooth to more or less notched outlines. The small greenish flowers appear in May or June and the fruits which are the size of a small pea are pale green and poisonous when immature."

The symptoms of ivy poisoning range from slight redness and itching to exaggerated swelling and blisters, accompanied by severe burning sensations. There are all gradations between these extremes. In mild cases the skin is covered by numerous small blisters containing a colorless serum which is not poisonous. The poison cannot spread from broken blisters but pustules may form and infections result as secondary consequence. Recovery usually occurs in from 10 days to three weeks. Occasionally a persistent skin inflammation follows.

Dr. Cox advised persons planning picnics and out-door excursions to learn to recognize poison ivy and thus be able to avoid it. Prevention is much easier to accomplish than relief from ivy poisoning.

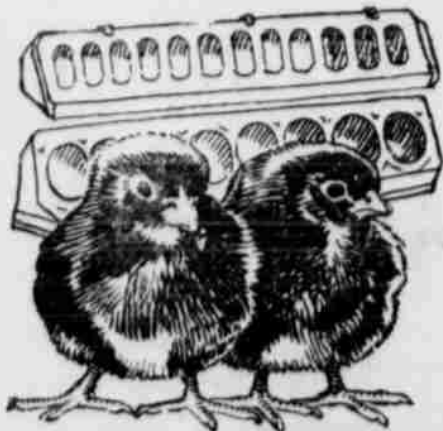

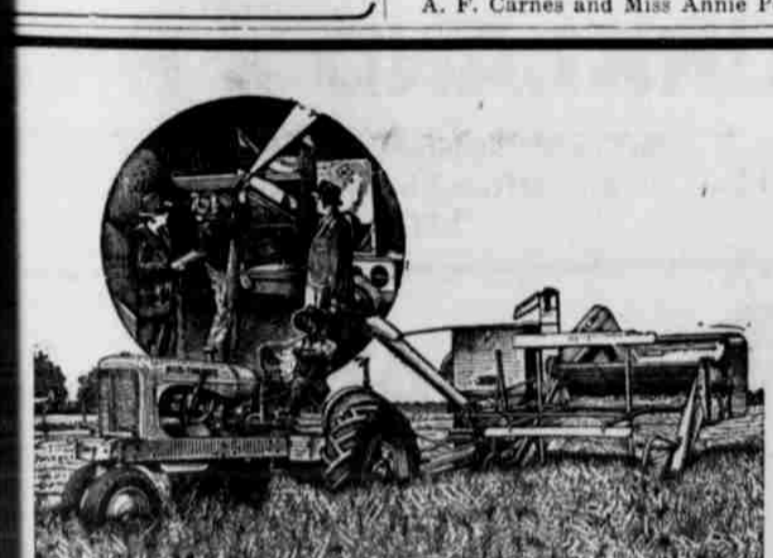

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4**

Proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of two new sections to be known as Sections 17 and 18 providing a special fund for the payment of Confederate pensions and providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for a five-cent reduction in the maximum allowable state tax on property; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read as follows: "Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven (7c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove levied. "Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Five (5c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings, or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each such institution of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bonds or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum and shall mature serially or otherwise not to exceed ten (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest. "Funds raised from said Five (5c) Cents tax levy for the ten (10) year period beginning January 1, 1948, are hereby allocated to the following institutions of higher learning, and in the following proportions, to-wit: Per Cent of total Institution John Tarleton Agricultural College ..... 5.72107 North Texas Agricultural College ..... 6.17028 Texas State College for Women ..... 11.52992 Texas College of Arts and Industries ..... 4.75551 College of Mines and Metallurgy ..... 4.71936 Texas Technological College ..... 16.54877 East Texas State Teachers College ..... 8.10657 North Texas State Teachers College ..... 12.64522 Sam Houston State Teachers College ..... 5.55068 Southwest State Teachers College ..... 6.78474 Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College ..... 4.55414 Sul Ross State Teachers College ..... 2.15315 West Texas State Teachers College ..... 5.41643 Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas ..... 5.34416

of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes. "All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at a special election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1947, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five (5c) Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. 9-4to

## Five New Petroleum Tests Slated For The Anton Area

### Drilling To Start In A Big Way In Near Future

New locations for wildcats have been staked and contracts let for the drilling immediately of important tests in South Lamb County, southeast Hale County, and other locations.

Five new locations are reported being staked in the Anton area in southeastern Lamb County.

Sunray Oil Corporation No. 1 Algie C. Gipson, in the southwest corner of Labor 18, League 685, State Capitol Lands Survey, Abner Taylor original grantee, located five miles south of Littlefield, is one of the new south Lamb County projects.

It is contracted to 6,500 feet to test through the zones which produce in the Anton field of southeast Lamb County, and the Irish field in southwest Hale County.

Guy Mabee Drilling Company has also been awarded the contract to drill this wildcat. The rotary rig will be moved to the location in a few days.

The Sunray prospector is on a checkerboarded spread of approximately 1,300 acres, which that concern took out of a block worked up

son of Midland. In the Anton area of Lamb, Hale, by R. R. Herrell and J. C. William-Lubbock and Hockley counties, the recently-organized Anton Oil Company, which has headquarters in Fort Worth, has announced locations for five explorations, to be drilled in that area in the near future.

Anton No. 1 Stephenson will be 660 feet from south and west lines of the northeast quarter of section 31, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey. Anton No. 1-B J. B. Tucker will be 660 feet from south and east lines of southwest quarter of section 3, block 1, R. M. Thompson survey.

Anton No. 1 A. L. Reese will be 660 feet from north and west lines of section 118, block A, R. M. Thompson survey.

The three above listed locations are in southeast Lamb county.

In southwest Hale county, and between the proven area in the Anton field and the oil wells in the Irish field, to the east, Anton No. 1 Myatt will be 660 feet from south and east lines of section 15, block DT, HE&WT survey.

Anton No. 1 Lusk will be 660 feet from south and west lines of section 15, block DT, HE&WT survey.

Each of the prospectors are expected to drill to around 6,000 feet, with rotary, starting at once. Standard-Fryer Drilling Company of Dallas and Bruce Sullivan of Fort Worth have been awarded contracts to drill some of the Anton explorations.

All the new projects are on leases recently sold by Humble Oil & Refining Company to Gerge Etz of Lubbock and E. R. Robertson of Fort Worth.

That deal covered approximately 10,000 acres of proven and semi-proven leases, together with six producing oil wells in the Anton field.

Consideration on that transaction was reported by unofficial sources to have been \$150,000, plus a one-sixteenth over ride to be paid out of production.

Ertz and Robertson, along with J. R. McCoy of Lubbock and Roy Crawford and W. H. (Bill) Robertson, both of Fort Worth, have formed the Anton Oil Company, primarily for the purpose of developing the Anton area properties.

As the first quarter of 1947 closed out, Texas farmers were still on the crest of prosperity in terms of cash income computed by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Dollar value of March income reached \$77,373,000.

March intake almost doubled February's total and rose 36 per cent above the March, 1946, level, placing the Bureau's seasonally-adjusted index at 342.1 (Base: 1935-39—100). February's index stood at 241 and in March, 1946, at 252.2.

The all-time high volume of cattle moving out of Amarillo placed the Northern High Plains farm cash income for the first three months almost 100 per cent above income for the same period last year. Other districts reporting gains were the Western Cross Timbers (53 per cent), East Texas Timbered Plains (49 per cent), South Texas Plains (45 per cent), Red Bed Plains (34 per cent), Coastal Prairies (33 per cent), Southern Texas Prairies (29 per cent), Southern High Plains (19 per cent), Black and Grand Prairies (16 per cent), and Edwards Plateau (10 per cent).

Declines were registered in the Trans-Pecos district, where unusually small livestock shipments brought the three-month income figures down 46 per cent from the first three months of 1946. And in the Lower Rio Grande Valley income dipped 23 per cent. Cumulative income total for January, February and March reached \$195,808,000.

In February-to-March comparisons the Northern High Plains saw March farm income almost triple February's total. A gain of 122 per cent was marked up in the Southern High Plains and jumps were registered in five additional districts.

Compared with March, 1946, only three districts showed drops in farm

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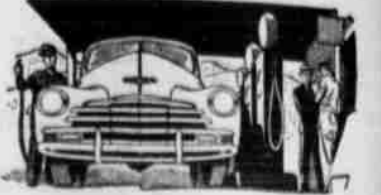
