WHEN YOU see that I'm writing today's column talking about ulcers, you may want to turn to another page right now. It seems that a big percentage of adults in this day and time have high tensions and pressures or have had an ulcer.

The subject of this column comes to mind after visiting a merchant down the street. This week told me he has an ulcer and he says it's a good thing... if they can be considered good.

Although, I have never experienced the pain of an ulcer, I know from talking to many who have them that worry is the big part in getting one. Persons who don't harbor little worries, are apt to "blow off steam" and say just what they think daily get by without ulcers.

The Plainview Daily Herald has a little article entitled "Learn to Let Go".... run it every month. Think I'll get them for a copy, believe me, a merchant friend and others who have or might be on the edge of having an ulcer would give much from reading it. Really, 95% of your worries are never true anyway!

The ulcer is a bigger hazard to the Soviet industry than it is here. American doctors and others have visited the Soviet Union to support this conclusion.

Leon Herman, a Soviet affairs specialist for the Library of Congress, discovered in a trip to Russia this year that eight of 12 Soviet plants he toured maintain special cafeterias where bland foods are served to their hidden managers and workers.

Mr. Herman says the stress of testing monthly production means undoubtedly is an important cause of the high ulcer rate. (See Town on Page 8)

B. A. Ball Dies, Funeral Today

Barry Allen Ball, long-time Fieldton area resident, was killed Tuesday afternoon in a school bus-pickup accident four miles west and one south of Olton. Ball, 74, died on the way from the scene to the doctor's office in Olton.

Three other persons were injured in the wreck which left the pickup demolished and extensive damage to the bus. Injured were the driver of the pickup, Ball's son, Vernon of Littlefield, James Daniel Steptoe, driver of the bus who is a teacher and coach, and Mary Helen Mack, a student and the only passenger on the bus at the time of the wreck.

The report said the impact sent the Ford station wagon out of control and it overturned numerous times. Mr. Holladay's body was flung from the car as it turned over and over.

A passenger in the Plymouth, O. L. Cohn, 50, escaped injury. He later was booked for drunkenness.

State police said the Ford station wagon was a total loss. Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the First Methodist Church, Carlsbad.

Holladay was born in Mexico, Texas. Upon graduation from Littlefield high school, he enlisted in the Air Force where he served with the 253rd AAF Base Unit, being discharged as a captain. He moved to Carlsbad from Lubbock in 1951.

Besides his wife and parents, survivors include one brother, Bobby G. Holladay, Austin, Texas; two sisters, Mrs. Hollis Smith of Littlefield and Mrs. Bud DuBois of Lubbock.

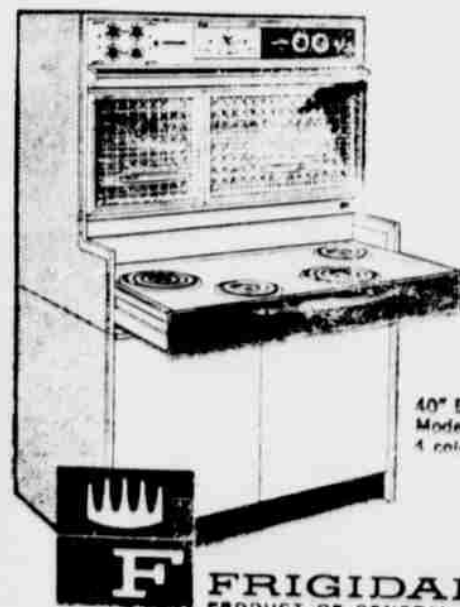

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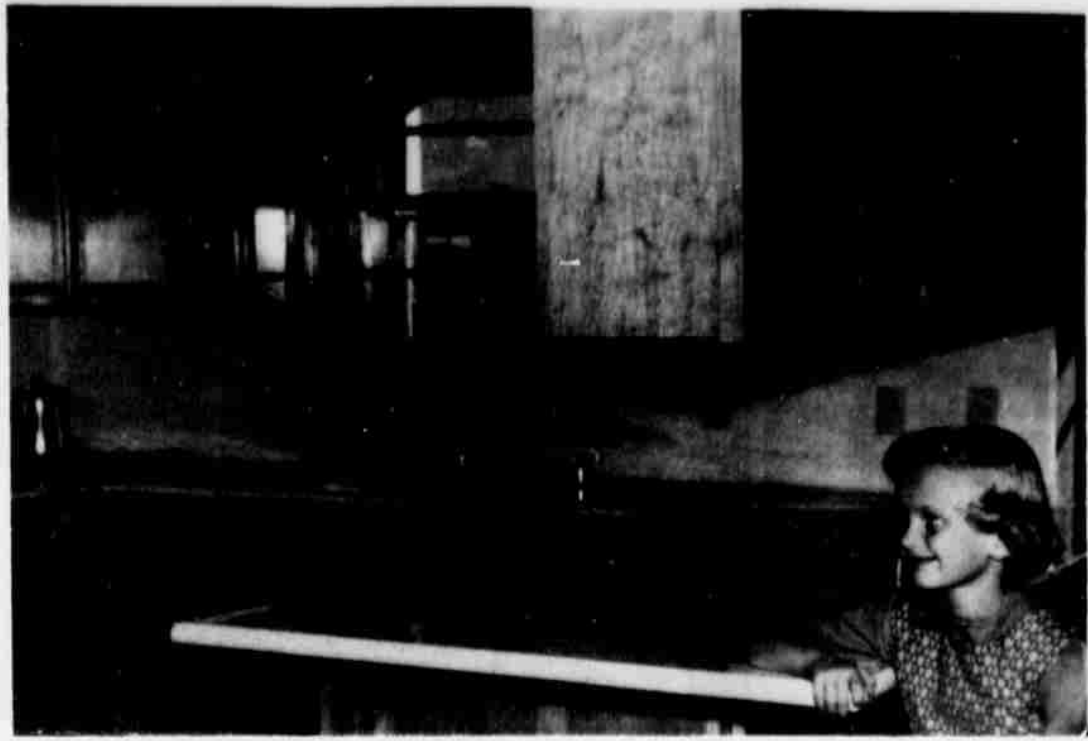

Classing Office Busy As Cotton Hits Gins

W. K. Palmer, Office - in - Charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing office, reported sample receipts were still increasing but at a very slow rate. Daily receipts are running about 8,000 samples per day, Palmer also reported that the quality of the grades and staple length declined over the past week.

The Lubbock office classed 55,200 samples for the week ending November 9. The Lamesa office classed 13,900 samples and the Brownfield office classed 15,800 samples.

For the year the Lubbock office has classed 138,450 samples and has a carry-over of 6200 samples. The Lamesa office has classed 42,700 samples and has a carry - over of 2,000 samples. The Brownfield office has classed 46,300 samples and has a carry-over of 3,500 samples.

A year ago all three offices had classed 566,000 samples and had a total carry-over of 12,200 samples.

The amount of Low Middling and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted cotton classed increased this week with 8 percent Low Middling and 12 percent Strict Low Middling Light Spotted. A week ago percentages were 3 and 6 percent, respectively. Strict Low Middling and Middling Light Spotted continued to account for the majority of the cotton classed with percentages of 26 and 37 percent. Only 8 percent of the cotton classed was Middling.

Staple length decreased this week with an average staple length of 30.2 thirty-seconds of an inch. Last week it was 30.4 thirty-seconds of an inch. Fifteen - sixteenths of an inch accounted for 58 per cent of the cotton classed. Twenty nine thirty - seconds of an inch was 12 per cent and 31/32 was 22 percent.

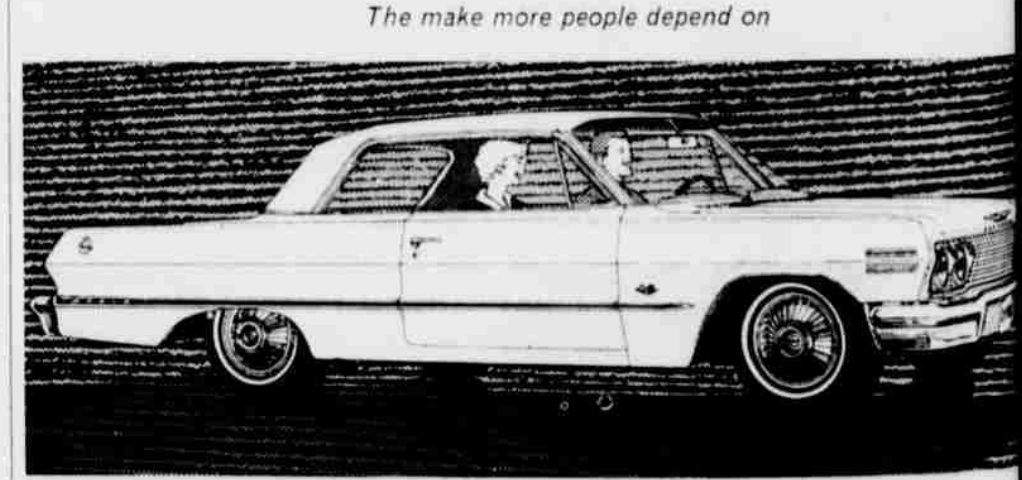
Micronaire readings show some decline, but are still very good. Three percent of the cotton classed was in the range of 3.0 - 3.4. Eighty eight percent of the cotton classed had a micronaire of 5.4. There was a 5 percent or better cotton found in the ton classed.

The Lubbock Cotton Classing office reported 22,400 bales chased for the week ending November 9. This was 5,000 more than the previous week and compares with 58,000 reported for the same week year ago.

Cotton prices remain steady over the past week. Middling 1 inch is quoted at 15.00 which compares with 15.00 a year ago. (Continued from Page One) incidence in Russia. He points out that a Soviet manager who produces one per cent below his monthly quota receives only 70 per cent of his base pay. If the manager exceeds the quota by one per cent he gets a 40 per cent bonus.

U. S. health authorities lay the ulcer problem in Russia to other factors, too, notably tensions arising from cramped living conditions.

NATION'S BUSINESS is an interesting magazine and usually makes pretty logical forecasts about what to expect in all types of business. Unfortunately it doesn't say what the future of the newspaper is, but it does make these predictions about how the average consumer will spend his money in 1970: less for food, more for housing, more for household operation, the same for clothing and shoes more for autos, more for medical and dental care, more for recreation, less for furniture and appliances, more for gasoline and oil, less for alcoholic beverages, more for interest on personal debts, less for tobacco products, more for personal care.

BOY, IT'S surely hard to buy anything on credit in this town since I announced that I had sold the paper and was leaving town. I'll make myself a note right now to make the announcement AFTER I leave town at the next place I live.

I WAS up on the North Plains last weekend and visited in the little town of Gruver. Here's a little town that will make a large town someday. . . it has an economy of wheat, cattle, oil, gas and now they're finding irrigation water.

But there's one weakness that the town will have to overcome. . . it has a brand new clinic, completely equipped and is unable to get a doctor to move there and run it.

In the meantime Gruver's citizens must go to Perryton, Spearman, or Guyton, Oklahoma for medical care.

This situation is true of many smaller towns in this area, and logically it is a problem that can only be solved when more and more high school graduates make the big decision to become doctors to the extent that there are enough to supply the smaller town.
