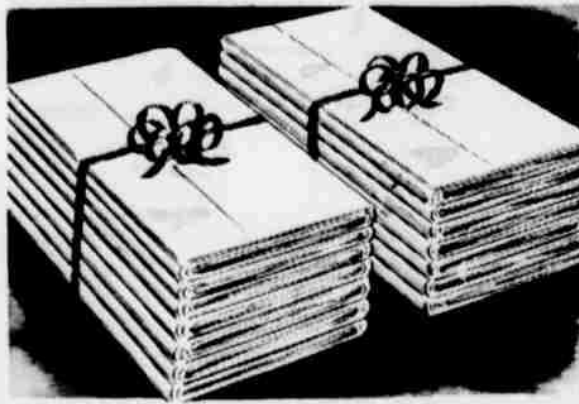

Windows Will Be Unveiled

Community Christmas Planning Planned 7 p.m.

Windows will be removed from the city's "Parade of Windows" at 6:30 p.m. Friday, marking one of the biggest events of the Christmas season.

Representatives of civic groups and churches will simultaneously remove the covers of the seventeen Christmas windows throughout the downtown area.

"Christmas for Christ" is the theme of all of the displays. A total of \$150 will be awarded to the top five winners chosen by out-of-town judges.

At the request of local ministers, local organizations are donating the empty store windows with religious themes for building floats for the city's Christmas parade. The parade will be a community Carol - Sing. Choir members from all of the city's churches, and the high school glee club will participate.

Country Club Remodeling Begins

During the past two years 76% of Lamb County farmers have participated in the voluntary program, diverting 52,000 acres from the 229,000 acres previously used for grain.

Application date for participation is expected to be set earlier this year, perhaps as early as January 15, 1963, Aten pointed out.

Littlefield is undergoing a thorough self-analysis. Under the direction of the priorities committee of the Chamber of Commerce, civic leaders will spend the next six weeks taking a hard look at the city's problems and recommending corrections.

This soul-searching project culminates a year of study and research on the Community Development Action program.

Thirteen committees were named at the Priorities Committee meeting Monday night. Kenneth Ware, president of the Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the committee, introduced Gene Garrison, manager of the organization, who discussed the research done this year and explained the crash program now underway.

"We want facts, not opinions," Garrison said as he explained the work of the committees.

"Persons with differences of opinions on civic issues are intentionally being placed on the same committees to encourage real discussions," Garrison pointed out.

"We just ask that the committee refrain from discussion until facts have been obtained. Only then can we have intelligent arguments."

At least 75 civic leaders will participate in the study that will seek information on all phases of community life from industrial development to the school system.

Ware set January 15 as the deadline for the work to be completed. The first committee meeting was held Tuesday.

Each committee is advised to meet only twice. At the first session each group will study information already compiled on the trouble areas. Responsibility for getting facts will be divided among the group.

Each member will report findings to the Chamber of Commerce office where the data will be compiled and mailed to each committee member. A second meeting will be called to discuss the facts and make recommendations to the Priorities committee.

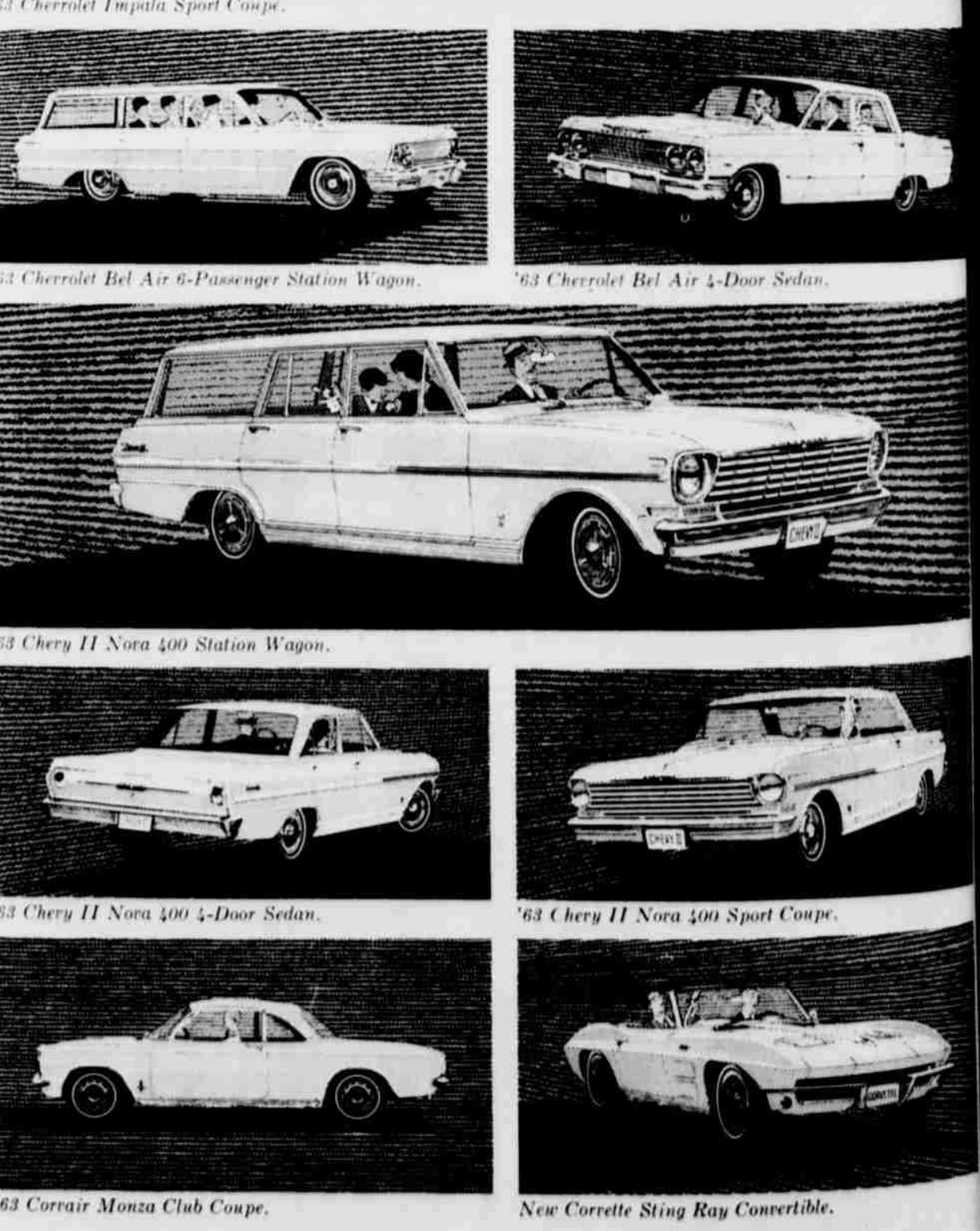

The Priorities Committee was extremely grateful to the 28 people who attended our regular committee meeting Monday night. Their attitude in accepting our method and procedure of analyzing and working on community problems was gratifying.

Most of the people who attended the meeting will work as fact-finders on various committees, dealing with the large number of potential problem areas presented.

The principles and procedures for problem-finding, problem-analyzing, and problem solving we are using, are not untried. They were adopted from a program developed by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. These methods have proved workable in Erie, Penn., Tampa, Florida, Amarillo, Texas, Rapid City, South Dakota and Point Pleasant, W. Virginia. The population of these towns range from 5,000 to more than 125,000.

The principles and procedures through which this technique can be applied to other communities, have been carefully worked out. They are contained in the 7 pamphlets of the Community Development Series, published by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. An actual demonstration is described in detail in the Erie Work Book for Community Development Action. Our committee has studied all of this material, plus, studying additional materials and spent a lot of time adopting this program to our community.

This is a self-help plan that works. To assure ourselves that it was workable here in Littlefield, we applied our learning and adaptation to the Chamber of Commerce itself. The result was an organization structure designed for better communications, more clearly defined lines of responsibility and more effective leadership.

This is a program designed to enable people to help themselves deal effectively with a wide variety of problems. The program simply establishes some common-denominator procedures which will mobilize the human resources of the community and enable the various organizations and interested people to work together.

The common-denominator is desiring to have a better community in which to live and work. The principles and procedures are nothing more than a set of ground rules which if accepted, will allow people of divergent views or with personality clashes, to work together efficiently and effectively.

This community is extremely fortunate in many ways. Two of these are: First: We have a tremendous economic potential. Our future within reasonable limits, is to be determined by what we as a community desire and are willing to work for.

Second: We are lucky to have a large number of people who are capable and willing to spend some time planning and working to improve our community and build a better business climate.

Our past history would indicate we have, to a degree at least, overlooked a lot of our potential. Also, sad to say, we have overlooked a lot of our good, capable and willing-to-work-people in our community building efforts.

The Priorities committee wants this to change. The Board of Directors want to change. The indications are that it is in the process of changing now. We are real happy with our future outlook.

Local Couple Receives Letter Regarding Brazil Situation

A first-hand account of the political situation in Brazil was recently received by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Keeling.

The letter below was written by Mrs. R. K. Blankennagel, long-time friends of the Keelings, enroute to the states by ship. The couple had lived in Rio de Janeiro for over 10 years where Mr. Blankennagel was a geologist for an oil company. This was the first letter the Keelings had received from them in two years.

Dearest Dottie & Ray -- Just a note to let you know we have finally left Brazil -- bag and baggage. Brazil is going Communist as fast as possible. I wouldn't want to be around for the Jan. 6 elections. Have wanted to write you many times and let you know what was going on there -- but thought it smarter to wait until I got safely in the U.S.A. Brazil has many sides -- and the present political situation is one side we want no part of -- too bad, Rio is the most beautiful city I have ever seen.

In comparison to other voyages this one is like being on a ghost ship. There are only 32 passengers -- about 10 of whom are children. Many cancellations were made in Buenos Aires because of the Cuban blockade. Today is our last in the South Atlantic Ocean. After midnight we'll pass between the Island of Trinidad and Tobago. Sunday will be spent on Curacao. The men are not exactly unhappy about arriving in Curacao on Sunday -- the wives won't find many shops open. Hope to arrive in New Orleans the 15th -- unless, of course, we are delayed around Cuba.

Have met 2 Cuban couples -- lovely people -- who had to leave Cuba with absolutely nothing. Just as though they were going for a stroll -- they walked out, leaving their home, jewels, bus-

ness, car parked in the driveway. One man said he heard there were 12 Cuban families living in his new home -- just finished it -- with marble stairs, fountains, etc. The only thing we left behind was our Norge clothes dryer -- which is nothing in comparison. We could not take our car out (bought it last December -- only 2000 kms on it) -- but did sell it for half price. But we have our paintings and other things in the hold of this ship. My best jewelry I left in the safety box last year when we were in N. J.

Must dash -- fire and boat drill scheduled shortly. Will write again when we get an address.

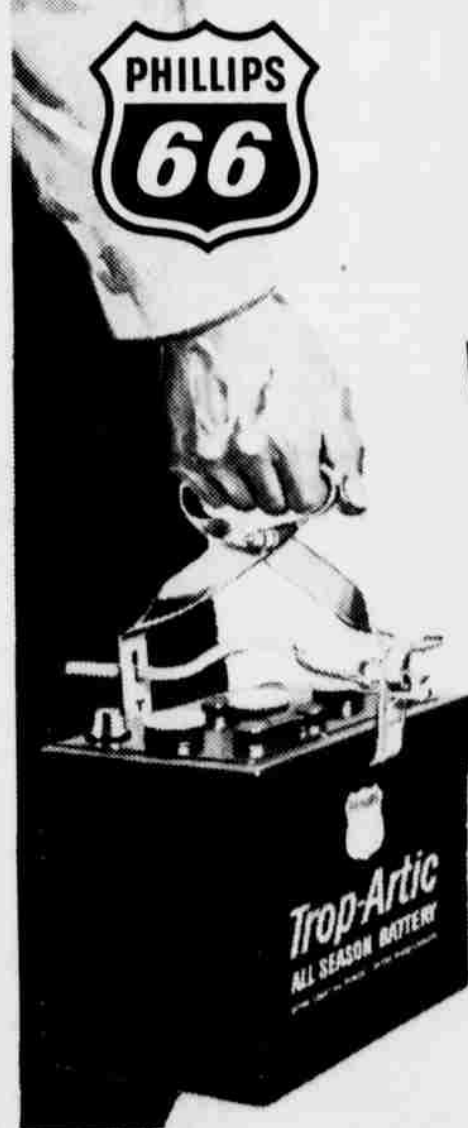

For at least 100 years, mechanical inventors, engineers, geniuses and just plain farmers tried to develop a mechanical cotton picker.

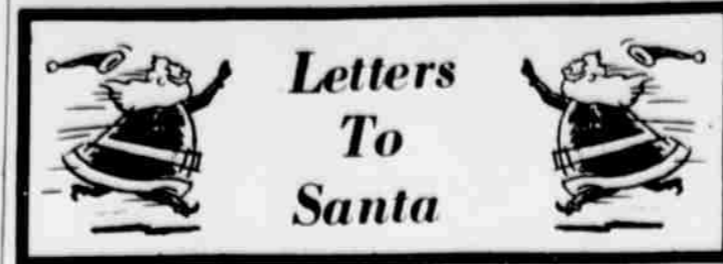
