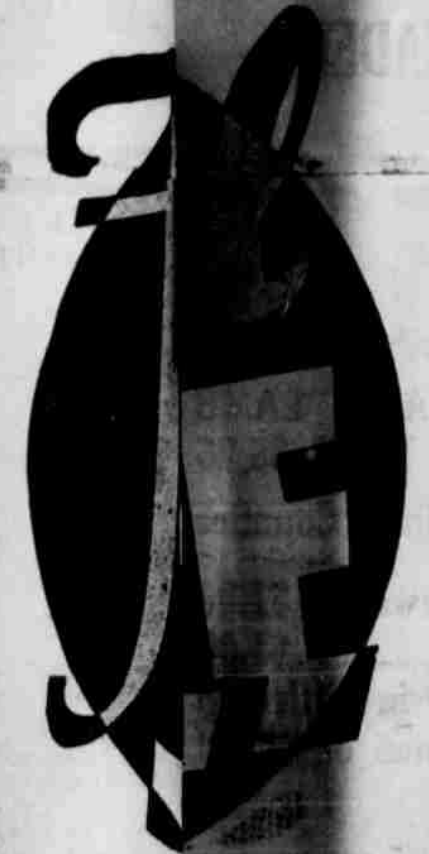

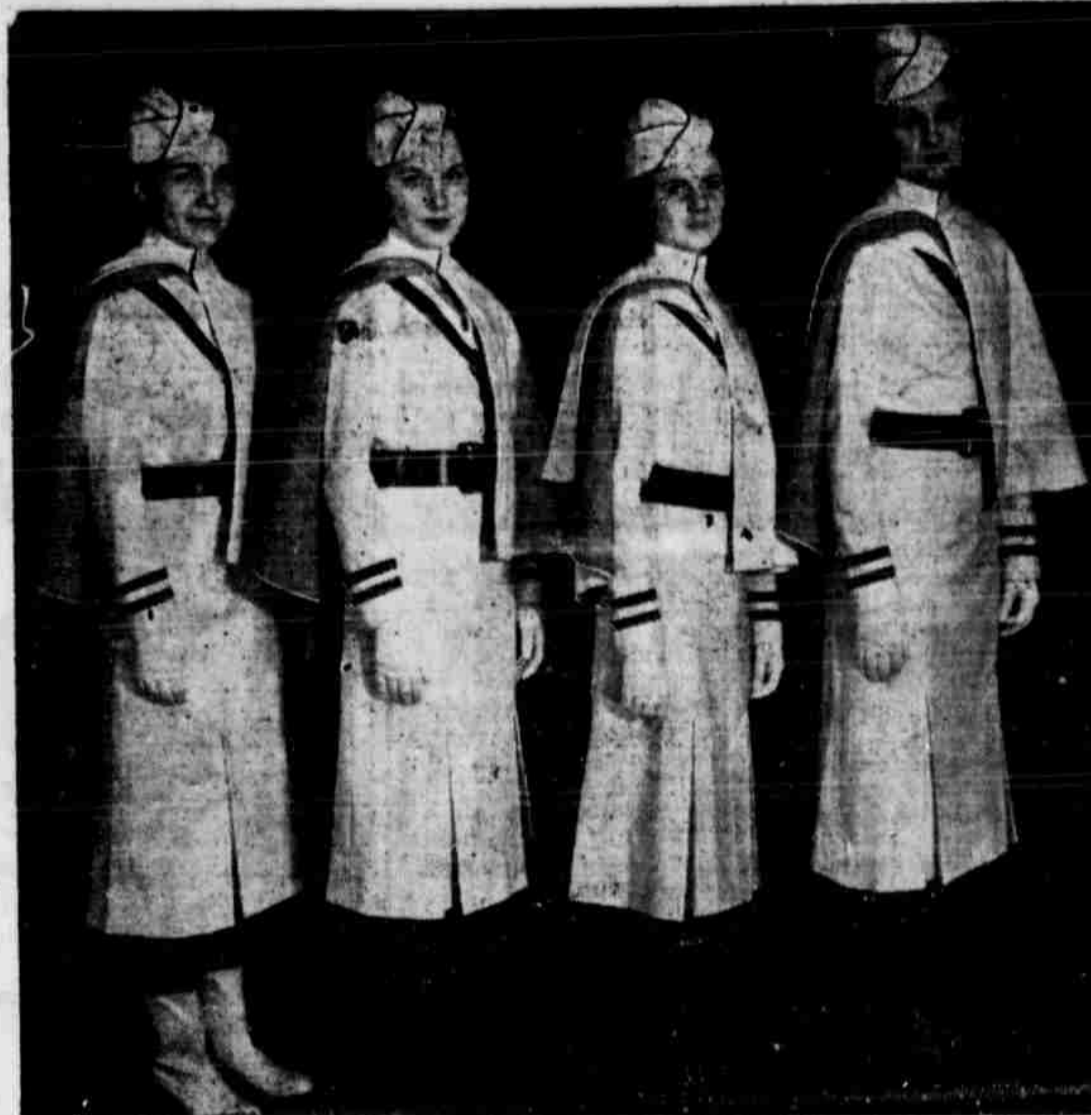

Extended 30 Years

\$105,000 Saving To City

Mr. Street added: "This means a saving to the City of approximately \$105,000 effected in this way—that the old bonds drew 6 per cent interest, while the new bonds will bear 4 1-2 per cent, and all past due interest under the agreement was reduced 25 per cent."

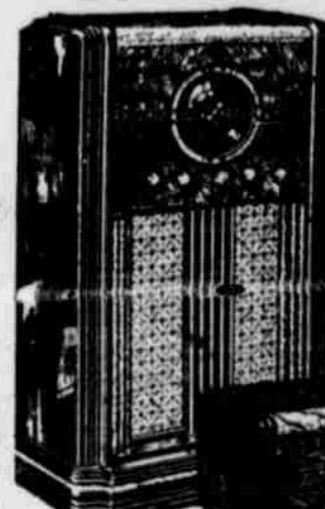

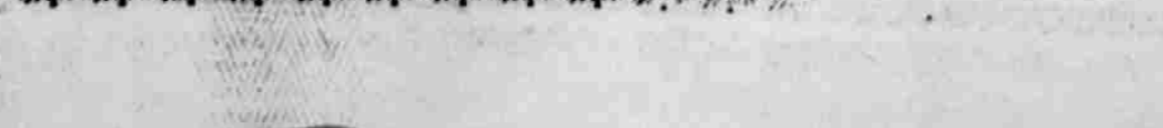

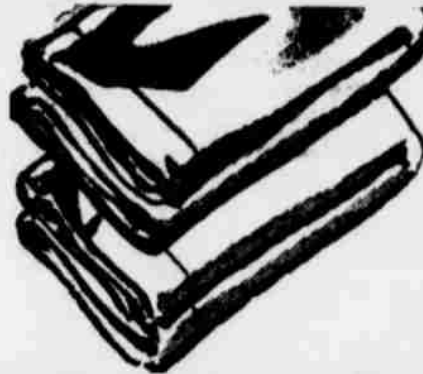

Want Economy Of Govt.

Economy in government and the elimination of useless bureaus and commissions was given a "very full discussion," O'Daniel said. This phase of his program was endorsed, he said, with the understanding that the subject will be given thorough and thoughtful consideration, to the end that no worthwhile state services are crippled.

O'Daniel presided at the session, but said members of the board did most of the talking.

The letter from Governor-Elect O'Daniel inviting Mrs. Fleming to be one of his board of advisors follows:

"During my campaign for Governor, I stated that if and when I was elected, I would like to select a group of business men and women from various sections of the State, and experienced in various lines of business and invite them to gather and counsel and advise me.

"I have now reached the stage where I desire some counsel and advice and I have, therefore, selected you as one of the group and hope that you will be able to accept my invitation to come to Fort Worth Monday, December 8, and meet this group, at the Texas Hotel at 10 A. M.

"You have been selected by me without the aid of outside suggestions, and because I personally believe you to be a wise and successful business woman.

"There is no political significance to the selection, as you will occupy no official position, but will act merely as an individual citizen. You will not serve for any

particular length of time, as different citizens will be invited in for different conferences, and you have been selected only for this particular conference.

"Because you are not an elected officer, and because no individual or organization has even recommended you to me, you will occupy that enviable position of being able to freely express your personal ideas on the matters to be discussed, and that is precisely what I desire.

"In business I have always had the benefit of counsel and advice of my associates, and as Governor I want that same kind of counsel and advice.

"Out of these conferences from the suggestions and assuming, of which I give to the Government, but something new. I want State of Texas a better administration and hope that is your duty as a citizenate with me in this. "I regret that there is no provision your expenses—the contribution to the government."

### FARM-TO-MARKET PROJECT PLANNED TO HOT-TOP ROAD FROM AMHERST TO EARTH WITHIN NEXT FEW MONTHS

A farm-to-market project will probably be created for the hard-surfacing of the highway from Amherst to Earth in Lamb County, Judge L. R. Crockett reports, after meeting with the State Highway Commission in Austin last Wednesday. The road already has a caliche base, and to put hot-top on the highway would improve it very much.

County spokesmen from all parts of the state learned from the Highway Commission Wednesday that the major portion of \$900,000 fund for secondary or farm-to-market roads would be spent next year for surfacing those arteries on which base work is completed, according to an Associated Press report.

At a hearing for delegations seeking road improvements, Harry Finnes, a commission member, said secondary funds for the next fiscal year, which begins July 1, 1939, were approximately 40 per cent less than those for the current year.

He emphasized that the commission must order the major expenditures for paving existing roads to prevent deterioration. If more grading and drainage work were done on proposed routes, he explained, that those now in existence would deteriorate rapidly, causing a loss in investments.

### Showdown On 13 Cent Cotton Expected At Next Senate Session

A showdown in the senate at next session is predicted by Senator Pittman (D-Nev.) on his proposal to give cotton farmers almost 13 cents a pound for their surplus crop by trading it for silver on the world market.

An administration supporter and chairman of the senate committee on foreign relations, Pittman said his proposal would be a form of "controlled inflation."

Definite assurances have been received from some cotton states senators they would support the idea, the Nevalan added in an interview. (Cotton now is bringing about 8 1/2 cents a pound.)

Pittman felt sure of backing from the dozen or more senators who formed the "silver bloc" several years ago and helped pass legislation giving the president power to devalue the dollar.

With support of both of these elements, the senator continued, he thought there was a good chance the senate might adopt his proposal.

As he explained the policy, 10 pounds of surplus cotton would be sold to foreign buyers for an ounce of silver, now worth about 43 cents on the world market.

The treasury, under the present

law, could issue \$1.29 in currency against this ounce of silver, and it would pay the cotton grower that amount for the portion of the crop sold abroad under this arrangement.

The treasury now issues currency only in the amount it has paid for the silver.

Pittman estimated his proposal would require issuance of approximately \$900,000,000 in new currency. He insisted, this would be only a form of "controlled inflation" because this amount would represent only a small increase over approximately \$6,000,000,000 of currency now in circulation.

He thought if this cotton surplus sale idea were put into effect it would bring a revival of world trade because other countries would be forced to raise the price of silver to meet this nation's competition. That would increase the purchasing power of silver-holding countries such as India, and immediately spur all trade, he contended.

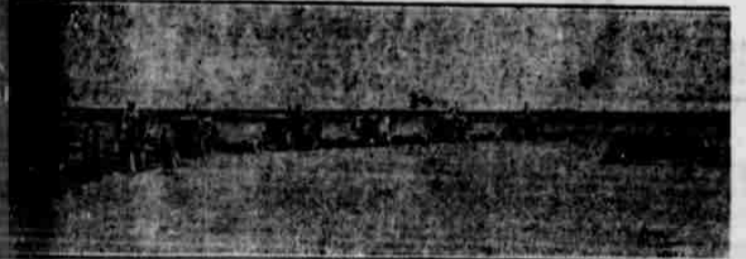

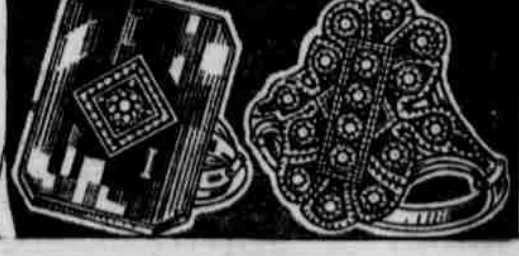
