## All April Sales Of **Bonds Credited On** 7th War Loan Drive

The Seventh War Loan Drive will open May 14, and continue until June 30, 1945. The goal for the entire county has been set at \$14,000,-000,000, of which \$7,000,000,000 is to be raised directly from individ-






