**Lt. Quentin Wright Is Supply Officer For B-17 Unit**

THE 325TH RECONNAISSANCE WING, England.—First Lieut. Quentin Wright, 26, of Paris, is one of the skilled men on the ground who make it possible for Eighth Air Force planes to remain in the air on their around the clock missions over Europe. As supply officer for his squadron, as well as technical supply officer, he handles replacement parts for B-17 Flying Fortresses, ordering them as needed and distributing supplies to keep operational aircraft in the air. B-17's and Mosquitoes from this base make lone missions over Europe and the North Atlantic, gathering weather data for future air and ground operations against the enemy. Mosquitoes are used as photographic reconnaissance planes as well, filming German targets by day and night to scout the way for Eighth Air Force heavies, then returning after raids to picture the damage done. Lieut. Wright, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Wright, 219 Lamar Avenue, Paris, is married to the former Miss Robbie Rivers, Box 1095, Littlefield. He is a graduate

of Paris High school and of Texas Technological college at Lubbock and was a clerk for the Agricultural Adjustment Association before entering the Army in May, 1941. Completing officer candidate school at Miami, Florida, he has been overseas since September, 1943. Two brothers are also in service. S-Sgt. Jerome Wright is with the engineers and Lieut. Col. Edgar Wright, Jr., is with the Infantry.

**T-Sgt. Carlyle Akers Enroute To States**

T-Sgt. Carlyle Akers, who has served seven months overseas in the European Theatre of Operations, as a radio operator in the Eighth Army Air Force, on a B-17 Fortress, is enroute to Fort Bliss reception center, and was due to arrive there approximately the first of this week. Pvt. Bryant is a brother of Sgt. Leonard Bryant, who was killed in action September 28 last. A telegram to this effect was only received by his wife, of Lum's Chapel, on February 1 of this year. Sgt. Bryant was a waist gunner on a

B-17. Pvt. Bryant didn't know until very recently of his brother's death. Pvt. Bryant, a resident of Littlefield three years previous to entering the service with the Marines on February 23, 1944, was employed by P. W. Walker Grain & Feed. He received his "boot" training at San Diego, and was sent to Jack's Farm, 12 miles east of San Diego, where he took tank training, and made a tank commander, following which he spent two weeks' furlough at home, and was sent to Oceanside, Calif.

He went overseas November 23, Thanksgiving Day, 1944, and arrived on Iwo Jima February 19. Mrs. Bryant and children, Marvin Wayne, aged 6, and Rita Ann, aged 2, are making their home on West 7th St. in the absence of Pvt. Bryant. Mrs. Bryant is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Sutton of Littlefield.

She received two very interesting letters from her husband from Iwo Jima, parts of which are published below:

"Dear Wife and Children:  
"Just to let you all know I am still O.K. Could be a lot better. How are you and the children by now? Fine, I hope. I received three letters from you since I got here, and I have been here since February 19. It seems like a long time to me though. I am in Iwo Jima Island, as I guess you have already guessed me being there. It sure is rough going here too, but I have been lucky so far. I am here with a bunch of my buddies from Jack's Farm at San Diego. We are all back in tanks again. We are in the Fifth Tank Battalion of the Fifth Division. So my address has changed up a lot now. I am 670 miles from Tokyo, so you see it's bound to be rough. You may wonder about this stationery, it is some Jap stationery that one of my buddies picked up. I have been trying to get me a Jap rifle, but haven't so far.

"I have been gone from the States over three months and have spent almost half of the time on a ship. I don't think I will ever want to get on another ship after I get home. This makes 18 days since we landed on this God forsaken island, seems like two months. This island is only 4 1/2 miles long and 1 1/2 miles at the widest place, but it has a volcano at the south end, and the north end is cut up in steep cliffs and peaks. So you see why it is so hard to take. There are a lot of places that we can't get in far enough with tanks to do any good. But I think we will be through with this island in a few days. I hope so anyway. It sure is peaceful now. We are back here at the Fifth Company, tanks parked; sitting in our fox holes, sitting here writing to our wives. The only thing to make me think of war are the heavy artillery firing about fifty yards from us. I haven't seen a Jap plane in the air yet, but have seen lots of them on the ground wrecked. I am writing with a Jap fountain pen. I found it in a cave, where we captured three Japs the other day. I have quite a few souvenirs to send you, Marvin and Rita, when I get back to a rest camp.

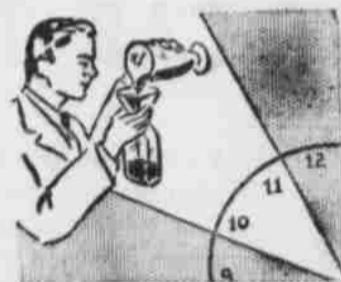

### Cruiser Helena Wins Navy Citation

President Roosevelt just recently issued a Citation to the USS Helena, which went down on July 6, 1943, in Kula Gulf, Solomon Islands, and all survivors from this ship are authorized to wear the President's Citation.

Granville Smith, S 1-C, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Smith, was on the USS Helena, and he was one of those who jumped overboard and swam to safety.

The Helena is believed to be the first ship the President has ever issued a Citation. Seaman Smith is now on shore duty at Newport, R. I., and his wife and daughter, Pamela Ann, left Saturday to join him.

Seaman Smith has been in service since December, 1941, and was overseas 17 months.

The following news item was recently published in connection with the USS Helena:

"The light cruiser, Helena, one of the finest ships of the fleet until a Jap torpedo sent it to the bottom of the Kula Gulf in July, 1943, tonight became the first naval vessel to win the newly created Navy unit citation.

"The new citation was established Dec. 20 by Sec. of the Navy James V. Forrestal with the approval of

the President. "All personnel serving aboard the ship during one or more of the Helena distinguished herself are authorized to wear the unit commendation ribbon. This includes those officers who were successively in command of the Helena during the fighting career:

"Capt. Gilbert C. Hoover, Bristol, R. I., who skipped the ship in the battle of Cape Esperance, Oct. 11-12, 1942, and the battle of Guadalcanal, Nov. 12-18, 1942. He shortly will assume duties as commanding officer of the naval ammunition depot at Earle, N. J.

"Rear Admiral (then captain) Chas. P. Cecil, Louisville, Ky., who commanded during the Helena's final engagement at Kula Gulf in the central Solomon Islands.

"The ship's citation commends her for outstanding heroism in action in the central Solomon Islands."

Seaman Smith has two brothers in the service.

S-Sgt. Ray Smith is a mechanic in the Air Corps has been in service since September 29, 1941; and was 27 months in South America. He returned to the States sometime ago and is now stationed at Hastings, Nebr. Mrs. Smith is employed as a supervisor in the Telephone office there.

Pvt. Hollis Smith is with the Infantry and somewhere in Italy. He has been in service since June, 1944, and in Italy since February 1, last.

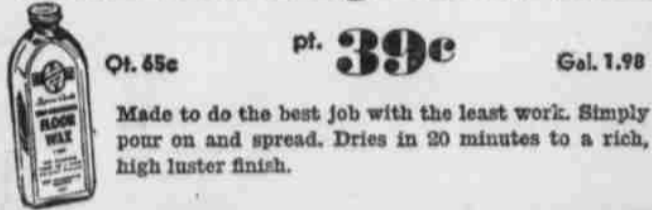

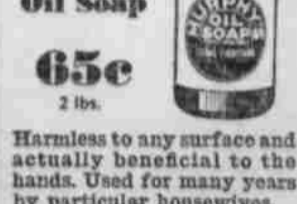

**James E. Hodges On Pennsylvania**

ABOARD THE USS PENNSYLVANIA, Somewhere in the Pacific. —Although Radio Tokyo has reported her sunk several times, the USS Pennsylvania is still very much afloat, as member of her crew, including James E. Hodges, Seaman First Class, USNR, son of Mrs. Alice D. Hodges, Littlefield, Texas, will testify.

The first public announcement of her record in the Pacific, made recently at Advance Pacific Fleet Headquarters, tells of her participation in 13 amphibious operations and of her part in the defeat of the large Japanese Naval force in the Battle for Leyte Gulf on October 24 and 25, 1944. The "Pennsy," as her crew knows her, has possibly shot more main battery ammunition at enemy positions than any other ship—more than 11,000,000 pounds. This old, broad-beamed Pearl Harbor "ghost," whose keel was laid on October 27, 1913, has covered nearly 100,000 miles of Pacific waters, from the Bering Sea to Southern Australia. For a period of four months she cruised in waters west of Tokyo.

The Pennsylvania's assignments against the Japanese began with the destruction of enemy installations on Attu. Since then she has been at Kiska, Makin Island, the Marshalls, Eniwetok, the Marianas and the Philippines.

Testimony of the accuracy of her guns came when a shore party during the invasion of Guam sent an urgent call for help in a designated area. When the echoes of the first four-gun salvo from her secondary batteries had died away, the shore party signaled, "Nice shot, Pennsylvania. Mission completed."

On the morning of January 6, 1945, this resurrected battleship began the shelling of Lingayen on Luzon. The Pennsylvania was the first to fire. For three days the Japanese threw all possible air power at the

invading forces, but at the final hour, troops and supplies streamed ashore unmolested.

The Pennsylvania's fire power has earned her a special place in Navy annals. Someone once wrote of her, "The old girl shoots so fast and so much that at times she looks as though she's afire."

And that may be the secret of the enemy claims that she has been hit and sunk several times.

**C. G. Barnett Buys Grocery Business From B. F. Rutherford**

The Whitharral business carries a full line of groceries, fruits and vegetables, operates wholesale and retail gas business, and a produce department, buying cream, poultry and eggs; and handles all kinds of feed and planting seeds.

Mr. Barnett will operate the business under the name of Barnett's grocery.

Mr. Barnett said he would appreciate the continued business of Mr. Rutherford's customers, and also invites his friends and other people of the area to visit his store for their grocery and other needs.

Mr. Rutherford stated he would continue to make his home in Whitharral.
