Preference will be given to local services and locally purchased materials, the school board announced.

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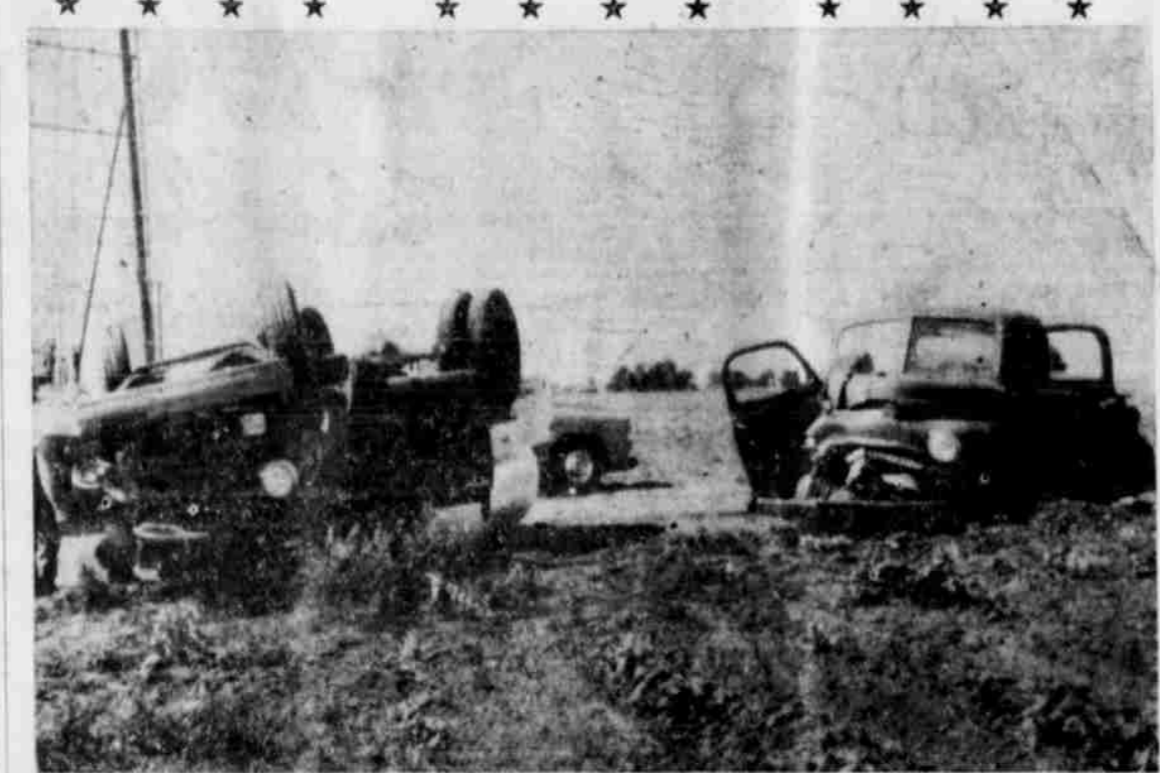

Two Children Still Remain In Hospital

A 43-year-old Spade woman, her three small children, and a Littlefield butane truck driver were injured Tuesday morning in a collision at a farm road intersection about seven miles north of Littlefield.

The woman, Mrs. Clarence Bundick, and her two sons, Mike, 3, and Pat, 2, and daughter Donna Kaye, 4, and driver W. E. Downs, 36, were taken to Littlefield Hospital.

Attending Physician Dr. F. W. Jones Tuesday afternoon described the conditions of four of the injured as good, but said that three-year-old Mike's condition was fair. The youngster was suffering from a concussion and marked abrasions over the head. He was unconscious when brought to the hospital.

The accident occurred about 9:30 a. m. Tuesday at the intersection of two dirt roads about one mile east of the Spade Highway and seven miles north of here.

A pick-up driven by Mrs. Bundick and a butane truck driven by Downs collided, overturning the heavy truck and pushing Mrs. Bundick's pick-up about 50 feet across the road and into a ditch. Downs was traveling west and Mrs. Bundick was going north.

Downs, employed by the Littlefield Butane Co., was delivering fuel in the area and his butane tanks were about half full. The tanks were not damaged, and fire did not start.

Mrs. Bundick was described as "frightened and highly concerned about her children" when she was brought to the hospital, but her injuries were limited to bruises of both knees and her left arm.

Her daughter, Donna Kaye, suffered a broken leg. Two bones in the leg were broken. Her condition was good.

Her youngest son, Pat, was released Tuesday afternoon after treatment of bruises.

Downs, also said to be in good condition, had lacerations about his face, a torn ear, and a bruised left arm.

Wreck And Tickets Keep Police Busy

Total damages of \$210.00 resulted from an accident occurring on XIT Drive at 6:10 p. m. Tuesday. If Citizens Work For Right-of-Way

State Highway Commissioner Marshall Formby told a group of Littlefield representatives Wednesday morning in Plainview that state money already allocated for widening part of Highway 84 "will be held for you as long as your citizens work toward buying right-of-way for the stretch."

Formby was speaking of approximately 12 miles of Highway 84 between the east county line and a point two miles east of Littlefield for which the state has already appropriated funds.

Littlefield citizens, wondering where the county stood after voters defeated the \$800,000 highway right-of-way bond issue Saturday, asked Formby whether the state will help buy right-of-way in the future. Formby said the Highway Commission is going to ask the state for about \$10 million to help pay right-of-way costs.

Asked whether it is advisable for Lamb County to buy right-of-way at this time for the 12 miles in question, Formby stated that the "sooner right-of-way money is available, the sooner the highway department will be able to start."

He added that the highway department already has enough right-of-way available to keep the department busy for the next two years.

The highway commissioner pointed out that 22,000 miles that comprise our primary or trunk system (of which 84 is a part) would require in construction money along a sum in excess of \$2 billion to bring it up to standards for the traffic of this day.

Formby stressed that the highway department will work where highway right-of-way is first available.

He said he did not know whether counties that purchase right-of-way now will be paid back when the state begins to share the cost.

Finishes Second In School Littlefield Officer Gets Police Training At A&M

"When men who have a total of 425 years of experience are teaching you, some of it is bound to rub off on you."

So says R. J. Dunson, Littlefield police officer, who recently completed a four-week Texas Municipal Police Training Course at Texas A&M in College Station. Evidently some of that experience did rub off on the young

Littlefield policeman. He finished second in a class of 17 officers from all over the state.

Dunson, who has been with the local police department six months, was the second local policeman to attend the A&M school. Officer Cox completed the course earlier in the year.

The school is designed to train officers in all types of criminal law.

"We studied liquor law, traffic law, narcotics law, all types of criminal investigation — the works," Dunson said.

Among other things, Dunson studied racial tendencies, public relations, case preparation and public speaking — and went on tours through the state prison at Huntsville and the Department of Public Safety at Austin.

One of the experiences he had, Dunson says, was two nights of work with homicide squad of the Houston Police Department.

One night produced a real example of on-the-job training, if you can call live gunfire on-the-job training.

Another trainee and Dunson actually witnessed a woman shoot her husband as they turned the corner of a Houston street. The woman surrendered quickly, without trouble, Dunson said.

Social Security Payments Jump 30% Over 1954

Social Security payments totaling \$292,811 went to 7145 people in the South Plains Area in the month of December, 1955, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security office. This was an increase of over 30% over payments at the end of 1954.

In making this announcement today, Hutton said that many persons think of the old-age and survivors insurance program as providing protection only for older men and women. He made it clear that it is also a program benefiting youngsters. At the end of 1955, nationwide, about 1,275,000 children under age 18 were receiving monthly benefit payments under the social security law. Of these, 120,000 were being paid monthly dependent's benefits because of the retirement of an aged parent; the others were receiving survivors benefits as children of a deceased parent. Hutton pointed

out that about four times as many orphaned children are receiving benefits under the old-age and survivors insurance program as are being helped under the Federal-State program for aid to dependent children. Nationwide, almost 300,000 mothers of children under age 18 were receiving monthly survivors insurance benefits under social security at the end of 1955.

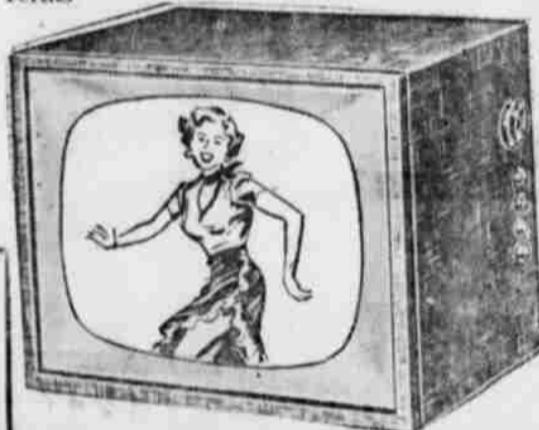

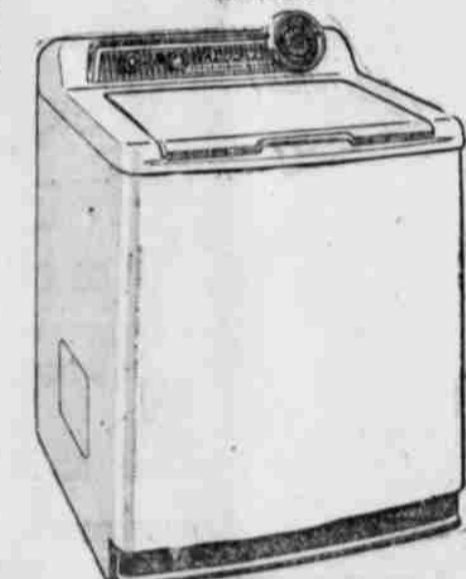

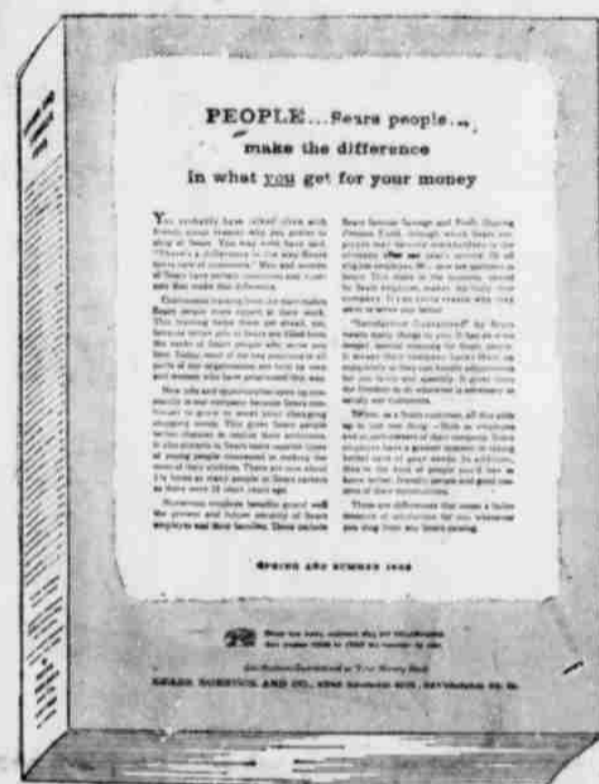

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE
1 1/2 cups biscuit mix 3 tablespoons water
1 tablespoon sugar 2 cups sweetened, mashed strawberries
3 tablespoons Fat Evaporated Milk

Mix biscuit mix and sugar in a bowl. With a fork, stir in the milk and water. Turn out on lightly floured board. Pat into a round. Knead lightly 10 times, or until smooth. Roll 1/2-in. thick. Cut into 4 rounds with a floured 3-in. cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheet in 425 oven (hot) about 10 minutes or until brown. Break open the shortcakes and put together with strawberries. Top with whipped topping (see recipe below). Makes 4 servings.

WHIPPED TOPPING
1/2 cup Fat Evaporated Milk 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
4 teaspoons granulated sugar 2 teaspoons lemon juice

Chill milk in ice tray of refrigerator until almost frozen around edges. Then put it into a small col bowl with sugar. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Add lemon rind and juice and whip until stiff. Serve on Strawberry Shortcake (see recipe above). Makes 4 servings.

that state right-of-way buying would not begin for some time. First funds will be used for projects where road rights have already been secured by local agencies.

GOVERNOR SEEKS DROUTH AID
Free livestock feeds for Texas farmers hardest hit by drouth is being sought by Gov. Allan Shivers.

Shivers has submitted a contract to the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture to secure surplus federal grain. It would be distributed by the State Welfare Department.

Farmers receiving the free feed would be barred from commercial sale of livestock, poultry or products.

Ten counties have been certified by the state as eligible for such aid. They are Karnes, Jim Wells, Wilson, Goliad, Frio, Live Oak, McMullen, Atascosa, Gonzalez, and Bexar.

Shivers also announced he had negotiated for reduced freight rates for ranchers in 80 drouth-stricken counties to ship cattle to outside pasturage.

FINAL TURNPIKE CONTRACT
Last contract needed to complete construction of the Dallas-Fort Worth toll road was awarded last week by the Texas Turnpike Authority.

It was for \$1,175,804 in paving. Unless a steel shortage develops, completion of the \$58 million road is expected on schedule by July, 1957. It will be Texas' first toll road.

Present plans are to charge passenger car 50 cents, trucks \$1.25 for the 30 mile drive.

MORE SALK SHOTS
The U. S. Public Health Service released 229,599 shots of Salk Polio vaccine for use in Texas.


Texas Health Commissioner Henry A. Hollie advocated removal of the voluntary age restrictions on use of the vaccine. At present, vaccine is available only to children under 20 and to expectant mothers.

Meantime the State Health Department sent a four-man team of experts into the Brownsville-Matamoros area to study the threat of yellow fever. The department said "the inexorable advances of jungle yellow fever from Panama toward Mexico and the Gulf Coast of the United States is causing qualms of uneasiness."

IMPROVEMENT IN ORDER
State Auditor C. H. Cavness suggested in an audit report on the Insurance Commission that this big state agency improve its personnel methods. He said he found the commission's rental contract for space in an office building owned by an insurance company "not out of order."

SHORT SHORTS
Texas Law Enforcement Foundation's \$40,000 "Travelab" will begin touring Texas next fall. A 55-foot "rolling classroom" on newest crime detection methods it is designed to further the foundation's program of enlisting citizen support for good law enforcement. . . . Despite reduced purchaser nominations, the Railroad Commission increased the allowable Texas crude oil production for July by 70,973 barrels over June, after four successive monthly cuts. Authorized July flow is 3,322,043 barrels daily. . . . State Agricultural Commissioner John C. White reported the Lower Rio Grande Valley may equal its last-year cotton production of 32,000 bales, but reported disastrous drouth conditions in the area around Austin to Alice.
