

Social Security payments totaling \$292.811 went to 7145 peop'e in the South Plains Area in the month of December, 1955, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security office. This was an increase of over 30% over payments at the end of

In making this announcement today, Hutton said that many persons think of the old-age and survivors insurance program as providing protection only for older men and women. He made it clear beque in the home of his mother, that it is also a program benefiting youngsters. At the end of 1955, nationwide, about 1,275,000 children under age 18 were receiving monthly benefit payments under the social security law. Of these, 120,000 were being paid monthly dependent's benefits because of the retirement of an aged parent; the others were receiving survivors benefits as children of a deceased parent.
