Philosopher Claims Communist Powers Haven't Learned Much About Humans

Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm discusses a weighty matter this week.

Dear editor:
When Mr. Khrushchev's man in Washington, I forget his name, well, I haven't forgotten it but I can't spell it, was tell-

ing Mr. Kenney a while back that Russia had no missiles in Cuba, he knew at the time, as everybody knows now that he was lying.

Now you might think this would be embarrassing to the Russians, but on the contrary they just laugh about it. Lying is one of the handy devices the Communists use whenever they get ready, and they've found it works plenty of times.

The Communists have found out that telling the truth is in such high standing in the free world that you can gain lots of territory by deliberately abusing it. India is the latest country that can tell you about this at the moment.

But here's a point I'm afraid the Communists have overlooked. They know quite

a bit about human nature, but not everything. For example, if you can fool one group of people with a deliberate lie, what's going to keep one Communist from lying to another Communist? What makes one Communist assume another Communist doesn't have some human nature too?

I'm no more a candidate for the job of expert on international affairs than I am for an award as an outstanding farmer, but I have a notion the Russian and the Chinese Communists are now learning something about human nature, that if you can fool free countries by lying to them you can also fool other Communist countries with the same tool. This may explain why Russia and China aren't too happy with each other. One has believed the other when he shouldn't have. They've forgotten that a liar on one front is pretty likely to be a liar on another front.

When Khrushchev says Communism will dominate the world he's talking about Russian Communism. When the Chinese say the same thing, they're talking about Chinese Communism.

When a nation establishes throat-cutting as a national policy, it never knows when its own throat will be next.

Cover Is Key In Wind, Water Erosion Control

The Lamb County Soil Conservation District Supervisors emphasize that good crop residue management is using crop residues after harvest for soil protection and improvement. When harvesting, sufficient residue should be left on the field for protection from harvest to seeding time. When tillage operations are done they should leave as much residue as possible on or near the surface. Listing back into the stalks is a good dryland practice. On irrigated land it may be desirable to shred stalks early and anchor the residues in and near the surface soil by light listing or other tillage methods. On sandy land subject to blow-

ing, leave residues on the surface as a mulch and delay seedbed preparation until the end of the blow season.

On clean tilled land such as cotton where crop residues are not available to furnish protection mulching with cotton burs or a cover crop would be beneficial. A good conservation cropping system includes a high residue crop returned to the soil regularly in rotation with cotton.

Some of the benefits of good crop residue management are:
1. When used as a protective cover on the surface of the soil during the wind erosion period, it protects the soil from the erosive action of wind and water.

2. Improves the physical condition (tilth) in the surface of the soil by increasing the supply of organic material returned to the soil.

3. Increased the soil moisture holding capacity. Infiltration rates are higher and evaporation rates are lower.

4. Reduces the extremes in soil temperature.

5. Provides food for bacterial life in the surface soil.

6. Increases the pore space in the soil for more air and water.
7. Prevents surface crusting making it easier to get a stand.
The use of crop residues eliminates the risk of land blowing this spring. Residues or a cover are not temporary protection but listing or chiseling are.

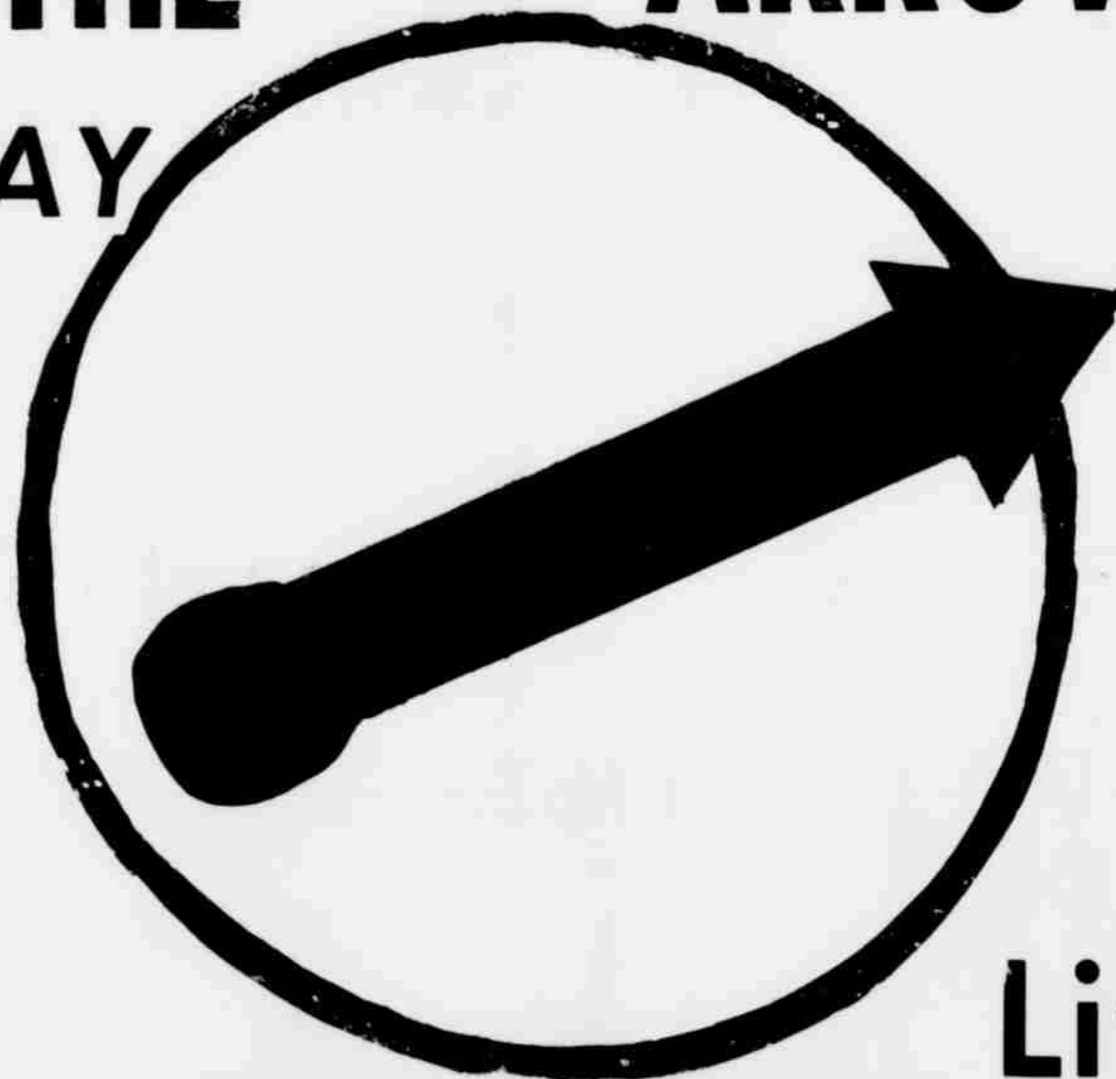

PRESIDENT Kennedy believes in sharing his wealth with those less fortunate, to the sum of \$100,000 per year. In fact since 1947 he has contributed all of his government salaries to charity.

In line with this, informants say, the President will contribute his \$100,000 presidential pay to charities this year, as he did last year.

The President is doing the same as another wealthy president before him, Herbert Hoover, did three decades ago. Of course, the President is able to pay his own personal expenses because of identical trust funds set up by his multi-millionaire father, Joseph Kennedy, for all his children, in 1926, 1936, and 1949.

And the President pays quite a bit of taxes along with the rest of us . . . at the time of his inauguration, his press secretary, Pierre Salinger, told newsmen that the President had an income of \$500,000 a year, about \$100,000 after taxes, from the trust fund investments.

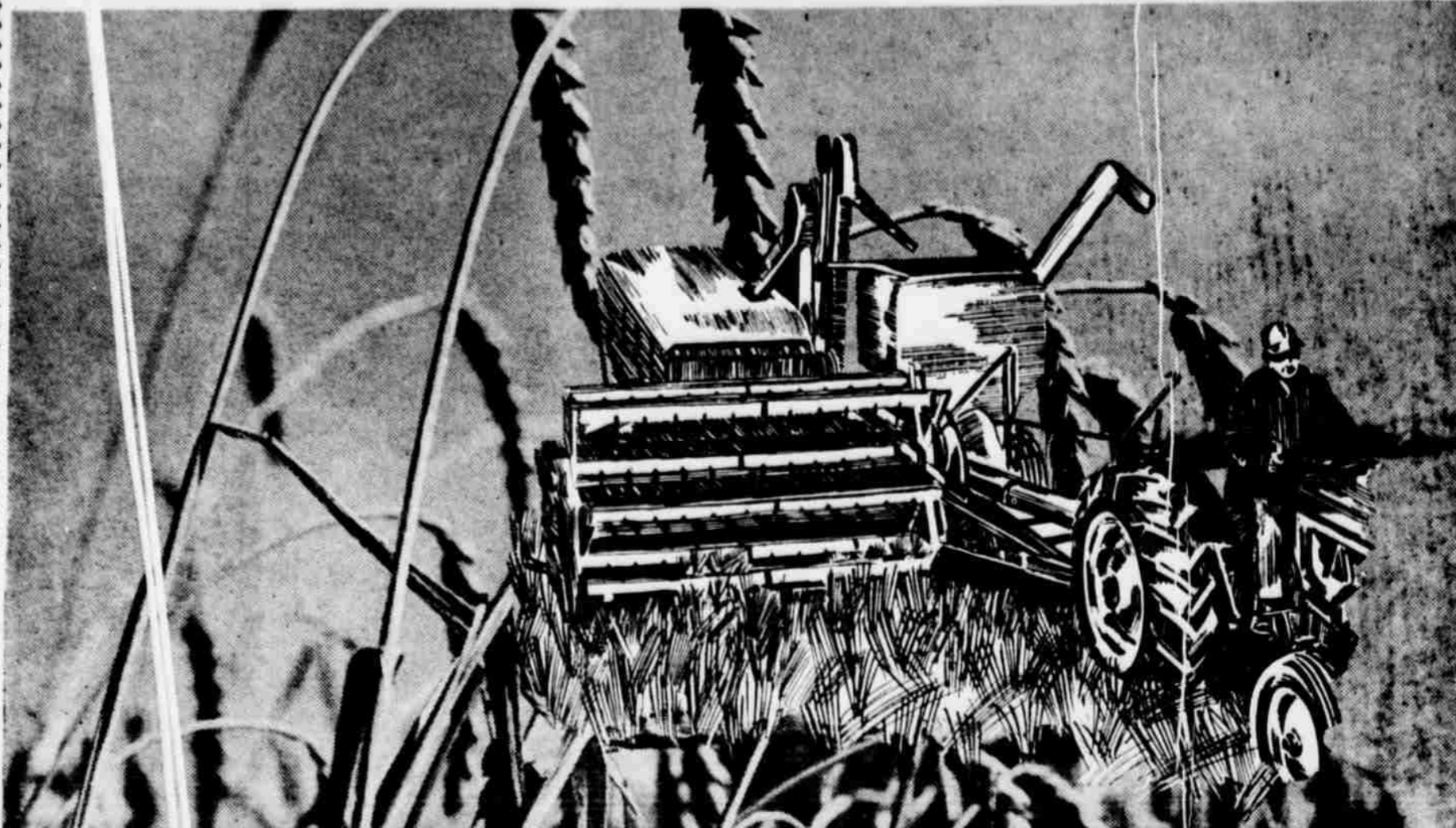

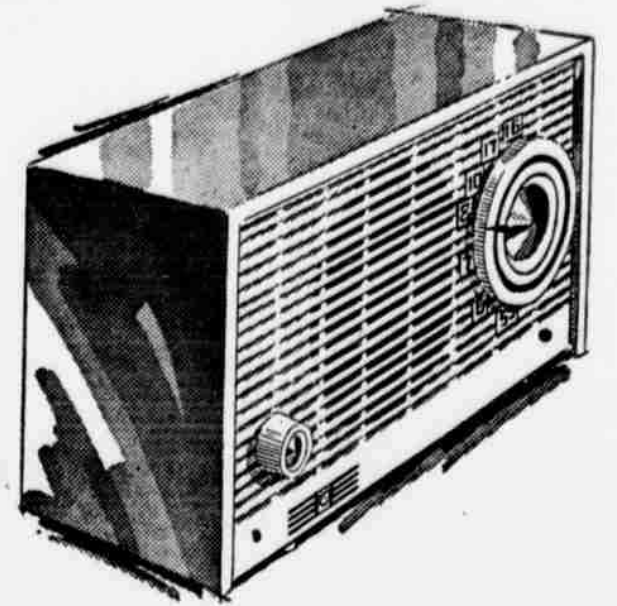

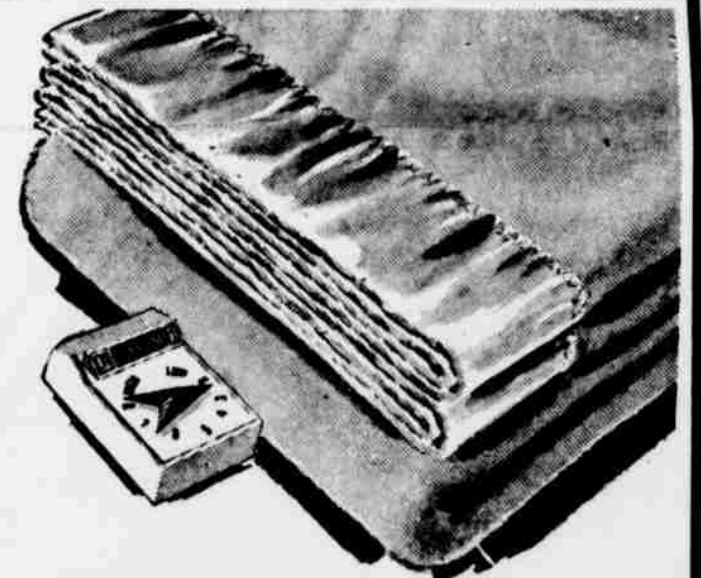

MORE JOBS, BUT LESS EMPLOYMENT

"Water, water, everywhere, and not a drop to drink." The classic phrase of literature expresses, perhaps better than any other, the situation faced today in the labor market of America. Idle millions of people have established a new unemployment record in the nation, while harassed employers search frantically for capable help. Nor is the circumstance limited to the cities, where it gets more recognition, but is found in such places such as Hereford, where restaurant owners, and cafe operators lead the van in a parade of people who are looking for capable, interested employees.

Meanwhile unemployment files grow and expand, classified pages scream for employees -- and would be employers continue to pull their hair in huge numbers.

What causes such a situation? The answer is not easy, in part, it no doubt can be traced to the compensation available to unemployed people: it is also traceable to lack of education and training on part of the would-be job seeker.

Mostly, though, it seems to stem from an attitude of independence on the part of the job hunter, made possible by the two above reasons. Too many would-be employees these days lay down the terms of their employment, rather than conform to policies of the firm from which they seek employment. Others feel that certain types of work are beneath their dignity and pride, and this feeling extends to the point of accepting a federal unemployment dole rather than accept certain types of positions.

Meanwhile, the condition is becoming worse instead of better. In a few scattered areas, such as West Virginia coal mine district, there is possibly a drastic need for employment, but for the most part the great American unemployment problem is a far cry from conditions existing back in the 1930's. To say the least, these few persons who are willing to work hard, apply themselves to their jobs, conduct themselves in a dependable manner and make an effort in behalf of the firm which provides their livelihood, are forging ahead faster than any other group of people in the history of America. They are thriving in a fast era of security, advancement and well being.

The whole circumstance is probably an example of the "gnawing evils of socialism" about which we hear so much. While it is possible to enjoy one's work, it is also probable that very few people in this country work for the sheer enjoyment of their toil. Most people work because of the rewards involved and, if they get near the same reward without working, it is only logical that the circumstance will continue to become more complicated and more hopeless.

We have long complained about Uncle Sam's role as international benefactor, but we are beginning to wonder if it is not better to throw away millions on other nations, rather than upon ourselves. Otherwise, we may soon "kill the goose which lays the golden eggs."
