Lamb County Victory Loan Quota \$470,000

Bonds in Amount \$185,000 Are Included in Total

Organization Meeting to Be Held Thursday Afternoon, October 25

Boone, Lamb County chairman of War Finance Committee, announced Tuesday the overall quota for Lamb County on the Victory Loan drive, which opens Oct. 29 and Dec. 8, at \$470,000, of which \$185,000 are to be purchased in bonds.

Quotas for the various cities in the county will be announced at a future date. These figures are considerably less than the quota in the seventh loan drive. The overall quota for Lamb County in that drive was \$500,000, with an E-Bond quota of \$200,000.

Boone is calling a meeting of the various cities in the county for Thursday, Oct. 25, for the purpose of organization. The chairmen will be guests of the city club at their regular weekly meeting, following which the plan for the Victory Loan drive will be outlined and discussed.

E. Smith, Plainview, regional chairman, and George Benson, Lubbock, member of the state War Finance Committee, will be guest speakers at the occasion.

O. Stone will be co-chairman of the drive. Mr. Boone, as usual, in the vic-

lance of the drive.

Littlefield Motor Company Organized By Local Men

To Erect Building to House De-Soto and Plymouth Automobiles

Organization of the Littlefield Motor Company was announced Tuesday by John R. Mayo, speaking for himself and associates, F. E. Yohner and Morrow Mayo. The new company has been appointed authorized dealers for the De Soto and Plymouth cars.

A new modern building, constructed on scientific principles suggested by David Neil, engineer for the Chrysler company, which manufactures the De Soto and Plymouth cars, will be constructed at once on West Second street, opposite the Farmer's Cooperative Gin.

The new De Soto-Plymouth headquarters will be a one story, L-shaped, reinforced steel, brick and tile structure, 60x120. Joe Wells is the contractor on the job. The front section will contain a glass-fronted display room, complete parts department, offices, customer's rooms and other conveniences. Joe Bitner, well known Lamb County farmer, will be general new-car foreman in the new organization.

The entire service department will be under the direction of John Yohner, formerly of Littlefield, expert on De Soto and Plymouth cars. The service department will be modern in every respect.

"So far as possible," said Mr. Mayo, "this building will be built by Lamb County labor. If the many farmers who have been hit by the drought want to work on this building, they may contact Mr. Wells, contractor.

New High School Band Director Takes Over Work

Mr. T. Younger, new high school band director, arrived last week to take charge of both the Wildcat band and the junior band. Mr. Younger will devote his entire time to the development of the band and young musicians. Any pupil in school is entitled to start on an instrument and receive instruction from Mr. Younger. A junior band, or Central school band, will start as soon as sufficient musicians are available.

Earth Section Seeks New Roads

Residents of the Earth section presented a petition to the Commissioners Court at Olton Monday, asking for an election in that road district to vote bonds to build approximately 22 miles of hard surfaced roads. The court ordered a hearing on the petition for Oct. 31 at Olton.

The petitioners propose the construction of a road from the paving north of Amherst through Earth to the north county line; a road leading from the end of the Sudan road paving to the north county line, and a short road leading from the Spring Lake school to the north county line.

Littlefield has never had a post because of a limited number of overseas veterans. The Veterans of Foreign Wars was organized in 1899, and has posts in the larger cities.

He will be in Littlefield every Monday throughout the remainder of this month, and will make his headquarters at Ligon's Phillips 66 Service Station on Phelps avenue.

The first meeting of the local post will be held the last week of this month, at which time organization of the unit will be carried out.

Shortage of Fats

Local housewives are expected to save more used fats this month because of OPA's point increase, according to E. C. Munro of production and marketing administration.

OPA's action, increasing the bonus points from two to four red ration points per pound, emphasizes the serious shortage of industrial fats, he said, adding every single pound of salvaged fat is needed to span the ever-widening gap between what we have and what we need. Kitchens will remain our principal source of supply until imports of fats and oils from the Pacific are resumed, and this will take months, he continued.

Many everyday necessities in short supply are by-products of salvaged fats and they can be brought back sooner if housewives keep collections rolling from their kitchens to butchers. Some of these popular items for which demand is at high pitch include nylon stockings, soap and soap flakes, telephones, electrical appliances, tires and upholstery.

Drivers Licenses

Better check up on your drivers license. Under the impetus of mounting traffic fatalities, the Department of Public Safety is starting a vigorous enforcement campaign against unlicensed drivers, Director Homer Garrison said.

"This isn't a red tape or revenue proposition," Garrison said. "We are trying to keep people from being maimed and killed."

Estimating that Texas now has 250,000 drivers who either have no licenses or whose licenses have expired, Garrison said:

"The deliberately evasive person is likely to be dangerous, either because of known incompetence or, in the case of many new residents and new drivers, ignorance of Texas safety rules.

"Of those who have expired licenses, probably a considerable number have developed defects or attitudes, or records of traffic violation and accident, that gives them cause to fear examination.

"Of course, most delinquents are merely lazy and negligent.

"But whatever the reason, the impressive facts remain that 15 per cent of drivers cause 85 per cent of collisions, and unlicensed drivers figure in more than a proportionate share of them. As traffic volume and fatalities continue to increase, the citizen's obligation to comply with regulatory measures likewise increases. We are headed for a toll of ten lives lost daily to traffic in Texas and it will require drastic action to hold the figure that low when post-war traffic gets into full swing."

Leader Receives Letter from Cecil B. Oliver

The Leader was pleased to receive the following interesting letter from Cecil B. Oliver, MM1c, of the Seabees, which will be of interest to this newspaper's readers:

"Tinian Island
28th Sept., 1945

"Dear Editor:
"For some time I've been intending to write you, especially since the censorship was lifted.

"We, the Seabees, have done a great job of construction work here on Tinian, as well as the rest of the Marianas (Saipan and Guam).

"I have been attached to heavy equipment since we left the states and when they say the Seabees work I can back that up.

"When we landed here the last of December (they said the island was secured and our outfit alone accounted for over 200 Japs dead or captured in a three month period).

I ran a D. S. dozer off the ship and started to work clearing cane and trees away for a camp site. I only worked 59 hours without relief and as I would go by at noon (or meal time, chow is the navy term) they would throw me that well known little box called K rations and I would just crack the throttle a little wider and be on my way.

"I worked on the air strips in the day time and around the camp area at night trying to get a place cleared wide enough to spot the Japs when they entered our area sneaking around for food. But what burns me up is the army took all the credit for the work and we didn't get a darn thing for it. (They came

in about three months after we did and they got a star.) Even Betty Hutton beat the army here. She was the first white woman on the rock.

"I feel proud of our part in the defeat of Japan. You see it was down one of the very runways I had worked 12 hours per day on that those two B-29s lumbered along, gaining speed to carry those mighty atomic bombs to the Empire of the Rising Sun.

"For the past couple of months I've really been taking it easy. All the heavy equipment work was done and our outfit has been laying asphalt on the strips, taxiways, roads, etc., but I've been a hello girl on the PBX board. Yep, that's right.

"I had a little surprise the 16th. It was Texas Day on the rock and away I went to see if I could see some Littlefield boys. Who do you think I ran into. Sgt. Bob Armstrong (Ware's Dept. Store) who came here from India with the B-29s. To cap it off I ran into a couple of kids from Whitharral whom I had gone to school with (I finished when they started to high school), Lynn McDaniel and "Dude" Crews.

The strange part of that is they have been here longer than I have and we only live about a half mile apart, but neither knew the other was here, see? Well, they say it's a small world and I believe them. Ha!

"That's about enough of beefing for now, but by the time you get this letter I'll be on my way to Japan to do ONE more small job. When we will get back, well, no one knows, but for me I hope it's soon.

"Tell all the fellows around Littlefield hello for me and

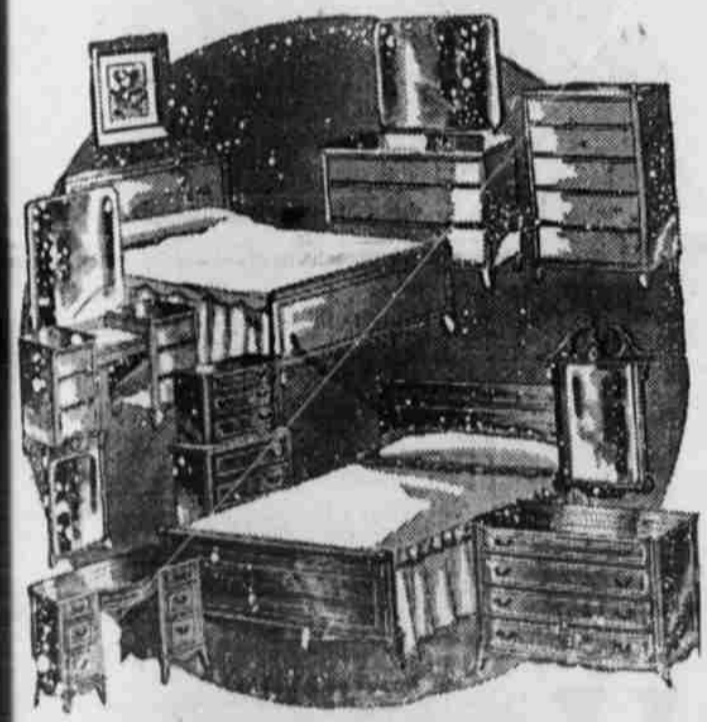

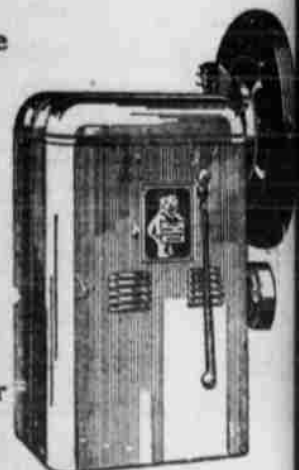

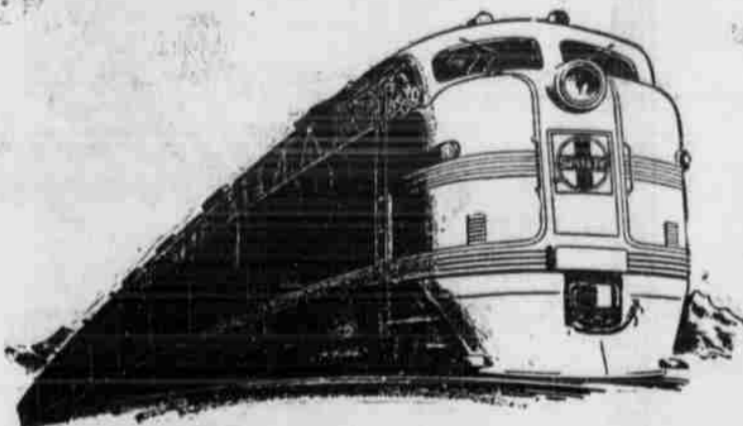
McFARLAND AWAITING TRANSPORTATION

McFarland.

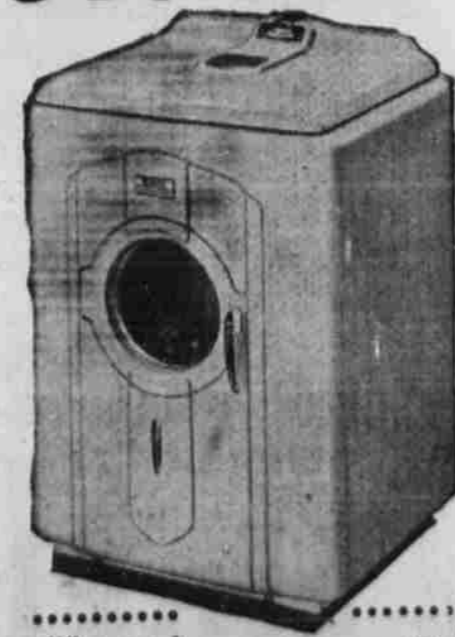

Donald Britt Wears Two Bronze Stars

OKINAWA, Sept. 14 (Delayed)—The saws of carpenters as well as bullets, won the war in the Pacific. Technician Fifth Grade Donald Britt's "weapon" is a skill-saw. Construction instead of destruction is his business. He is in charge of the carpenter shop of an engineer aviation battalion on Okinawa.

Britt has been overseas 15 months and wears two bronze stars for his participation in construction of B-29 airfields on Guam and Okinawa. He has just received the unit "Meritorious Service Wreath" for performance of exceptionally difficult tasks in the Pacific area.

"Air raids," he said, "and Japanese snipers kept our work from becoming monotonous." His job made possible those frequent 500 plane raids on Tokyo that finally brought the Japanese to their knees.

Cpl. Britt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Britt, Rt. 1, Amherst, Texas. He was employed by the Kemp Lumber Co., Clovis, N. M., prior to his induction into the army at Clovis in September, 1943.

ABOARD THE USS IOWA OFF HONSHU (Delayed)—William Duncan Rains, 1st, S2c, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Rains, 506 West Third street, Littlefield, Texas, fought aboard this 45,000-ton battleship when she and other Third Fleet battleships, cruisers and destroyers staged a daring midnight bombardment of industrial targets on this main Japanese island, just 70 miles from Tokyo.

Standing only a few miles offshore, the Iowa hurled more than 200 tons of flaming projectiles at war factories.

A few days before this crowning achievement in her wartime career, the Iowa's big guns wrecked the port and industrial city of Muroran on Hokkaido, northernmost of Japan's large islands.

Since she was launched nine months after Pearl Harbor, the big battleship has taken part in virtually all naval action in the island-to-island conquest of Jap-held Pacific territory. She was in on initial strikes at the Marshalls, air strikes at Truk, the Carolines, Marianas, Formosa, New Guinea, actions in the Philippines and at Okinawa.

ULITHI ATOLL, Western Caroline Islands—Guy V. Gage, S1c, USNR, Littlefield, Texas, on duty with Standard Landing Craft Unit 34, the boat pool here, can feel pride and satisfaction at news of the fleet's entrance into Japan, as the unit provided supplies and did repair work for the fighting ships.

The base, built despite adverse weather conditions, hazardous coral reefs and rugged shore conditions, was said to be the model of advance base construction in the Pacific. Here every major fleet unit had boats and pontoon barges assigned for its use in procuring supplies, sending men to recreational camps and to important operational meetings and for ferrying crippled planes from carriers to an island air strip.

One night in March a Japanese plane mistook the small island for a carrier, suicided in, killed three men and wounded many others.

The unit regards with special pride two commendatory dispatches received in its 10 months' service. One of these was from Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz and the other from Commodore O. O. Kessing, former atoll commander.

OKINAWA SHIMA (Delayed)—Pfc. Travis Flowers, of Littlefield, Texas, was promoted to the grade of corporal, it was revealed recently. Cpl. Flowers has been overseas for the past 17 months, and has seen action in the Marianas and Guam, the Philippines on Leyte, and the Ryukyu Islands on Ie Shima and Okinawa. He holds the Philippine Liberation ribbon, three bronze battle stars and the bronze arrowhead award, given for participation in the initial assault phase of an amphibious operation. Before his promotion to the rank of an assistant squad leader, Cpl. Flowers was a heavy equipment operator in his company, part of an engineer combat battalion.

Before his induction at Fort Bliss on July 3, 1942, Cpl. Flowers worked for the Lee Moore Construction company as a heavy equipment operator. He attended Anton High school in Anton, playing varsity basketball. He left school in 1932 to work in Anton and Littlefield. After his discharge from the army, Cpl. Flowers hopes to have his own farm back in Littlefield. His mother, Mrs. Vera Flowers, awaits his return at their home.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—"It is impossible to say any battle was any worse than any other, but there isn't any doubt in my mind but that I was more scared at Pearl Harbor than I ever was after that," said Delbert William Bawcom, Chief Carpenter's Mate, of 1026 Sunset Terrace, Amarillo, Texas.

Bawcom was aboard the USS Sumner, a geodetic survey ship on Sept. 7, 1941. His ship wasn't hit in the attack and went to sea shortly thereafter. In her Bawcom participated in the invasions and battles at the Solomon Islands, Tarawa, Eniwetok and Iwo Jima.

"It was a near miss as far as the ship was concerned," said the Chief. "But three of us were hit by shrapnel. We were just getting underway when the air raid started and the bomb hit the water near our fore'side deck.

"Iwo Jima was the toughest fight we got in, I suppose. We were there nearly two months and during that time our ship was hit by the Jap shore batteries. We lost one man killed and six or seven injured."

Before enlisting in October, 1941, Bawcom was employed as a construction worker by the E. R. Goforth Company at Amarillo. He plans to go back to his old job. He is the husband of Mrs. Ida A. Bawcom of Littlefield, Texas, and the son of Mrs. W. L. Waggoner, of Hylton, Texas.

Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Vaughn of Lubbock, and brother of David Vaughn of Littlefield, who returned recently from two years overseas, is visiting his brother and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. David Vaughn, nine miles southwest of Littlefield.

Cpl. Kenneth Houk, who has been stationed on Guam, wrote recently that he was coming home and later he wrote that he was awaiting transportation. He is with the Signal Corps of the Aviation division. The Houk family are looking for him home most any time.

"the eyes of the First Army" until General Hodges forces cut through the remnants of the Wehrmacht to link up with the Russians.

The following is a letter from Pfc. Albert W. Stephens to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Stephens of Olton:

Somewhere in India Dear Folks: I will try to write you a few lines, explaining a few things I couldn't until Wednesday noon.

About my work: As you know I am in the quartermaster corps. We have 80 to 100 men to oversee 20 warehouses. We have three warehouses for shoes, three for khakis and three for work clothes. I am in the work clothes department. About three weeks ago we received 30,000 jumpers and jackets, all one size. We also have 100,000 caps. We ship enough to China to keep 75,000 in supplies.

I am about three hours flying time from Calcutta and about five from Kuanming, China. I've heard that we are not far from Burma. That's as near as I can give to my location at this time.

All the labor here is done by Indians. Sometimes it is hard to understand them and make them understand us.

A few weeks ago we had to measure all the buildings at the Chbov airfield. Had to tell how good they were and what they were made of. We all thought it was to balance lend-lease with Britain, as the orders came from Washington.

It is threatening rain. I hope it rains so it will be cooler. I have seen it 122 in the shade here. I

will begin to get cooler by the middle or last of October, but not cold enough to freeze, but cool enough to sleep and feel well.

I boarded a ship at Los Angeles May 7 but did not sail until May 10. We stopped at Perth and Melbourne, Australia. Arrived at Calcutta, India, on June 15 and arrived at this base on June 30.

I hope everything there is O. K. I am fine at the present.
