States Civil Service Commission has announced, at the request of the Postmaster General and in accord ance with an order of the President,
an open competitive examination. an open competitive examination.
To be eligible for the examination, an applicant must be a citizen of the United states, must reside within the
delivery of this post office, must have
so resided for at least two years next preceding the date for close of re ceipt of applications, must be in good
physical condition, and within the prescribed age limits, Both men and wormen are admitted
Under the terms of the Executive
order, the Civil Service Commission will certify to the Postmaster General the names of the highest three qualified eligibles, if as many as three are qualified, and the Postmaster
General will, Alect one for nomina General, will alect one for nominaby the Senate is the final action.
Applicants will not be required to Applicants will not be required to
assemble in an examination room for asscmblastic tests, but will be rated on their education and business training and experience, The Civil Serviec Commission will make inquiry among
representative local business and prorepresentative local business and pro-
fessional men and women concerning the experience, ability, and character of each applicant, and will assign
ratings upon the evidence secured. ratings upon the evidence secured.
The Commission states that nothing will be permitted to appear in the report which might even suggest the

In 1931 the ginnings were 327,761 bales. Seven counties showed gains: Bris coe, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Gaines, Lamb and Lubbock. Total for the state was $3,449,595$
bales, as compared with $4,541,685$ bales last year. The loss was slightly more than a million bales.
