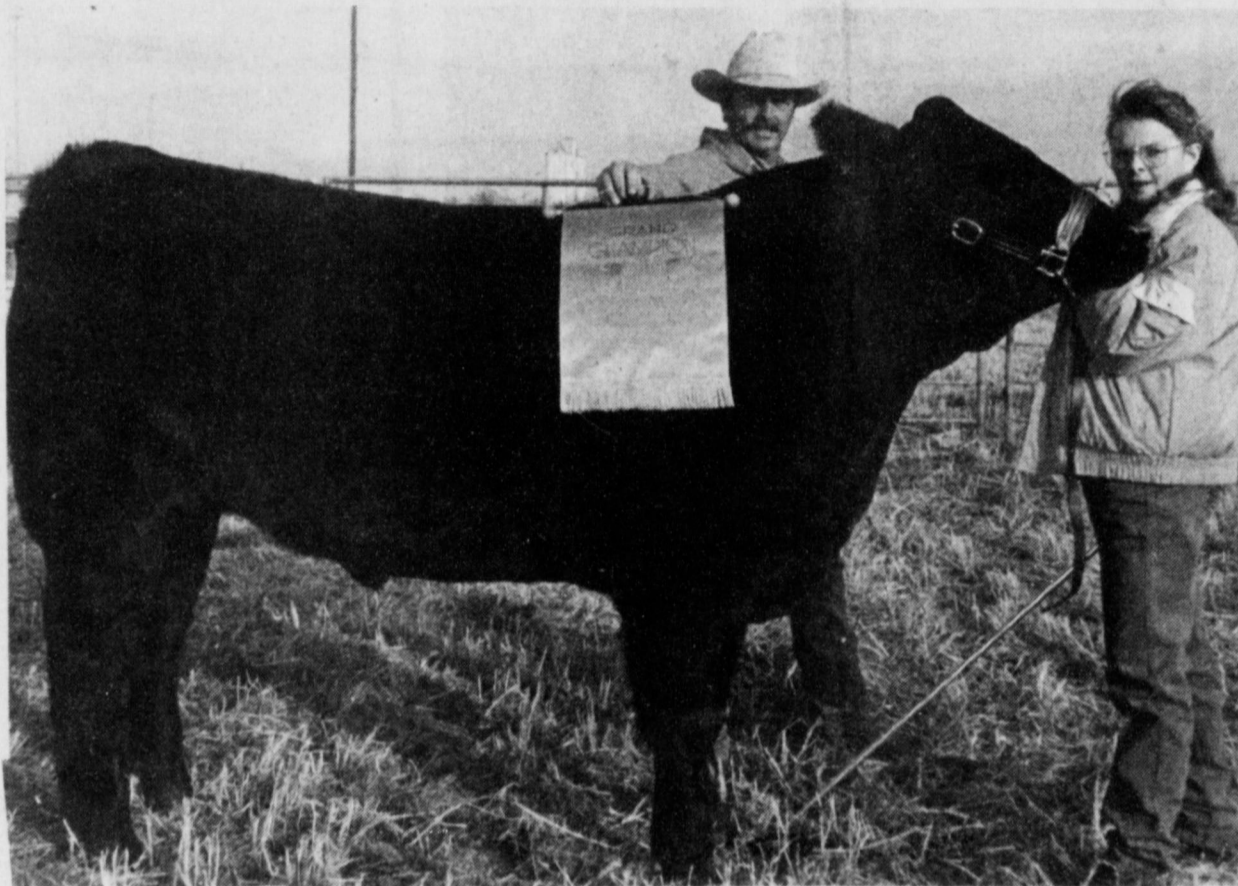

The Board of Directors of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District met at 7 p.m. Thursday in the hospital dining room of the hospital.

Brandon Durbin, a CPA from Lubbock met with the board and gave an in-depth audit report. Durbin also explained changes that could should be made.

A financial report for the past month was given by Richard Murphy, hospital administrator. Murphy, also went over the past due bills, explaining the process he hospital is going through to collect these bills.

Rachelle Harmon, Muleshoe Health Care Center administrator, approached the board asking for an increase in daily rates for residents of the facility. She stated that the increase was necessary to be in compliance with Medicare. Following a lengthy discussion, the board voted in favor of the increase. The new rates will go into effect March 1. "Patients will be given a 30 day written

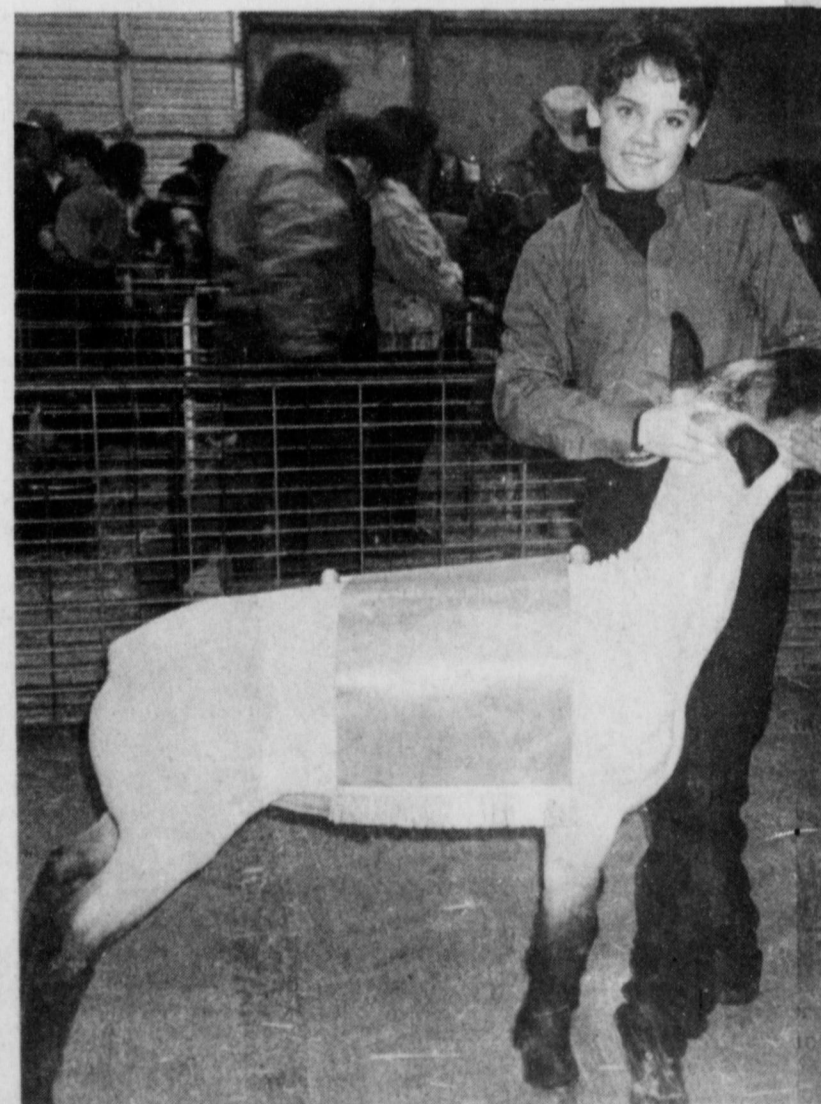

The honoree's corsage was made of socks and lace and the hostess gift was a baby monitor.

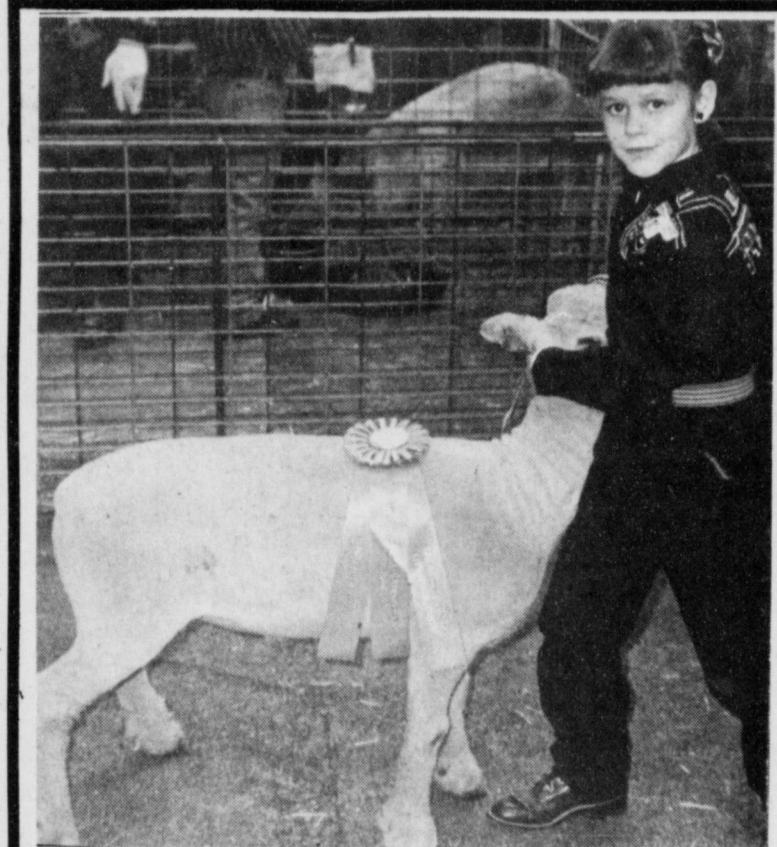

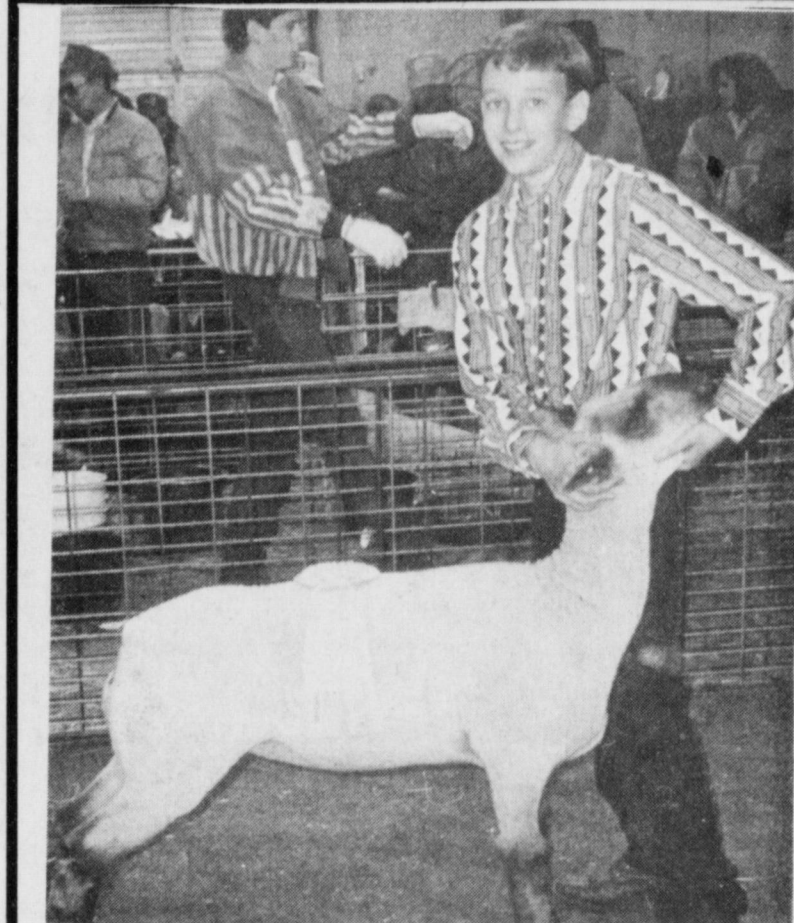

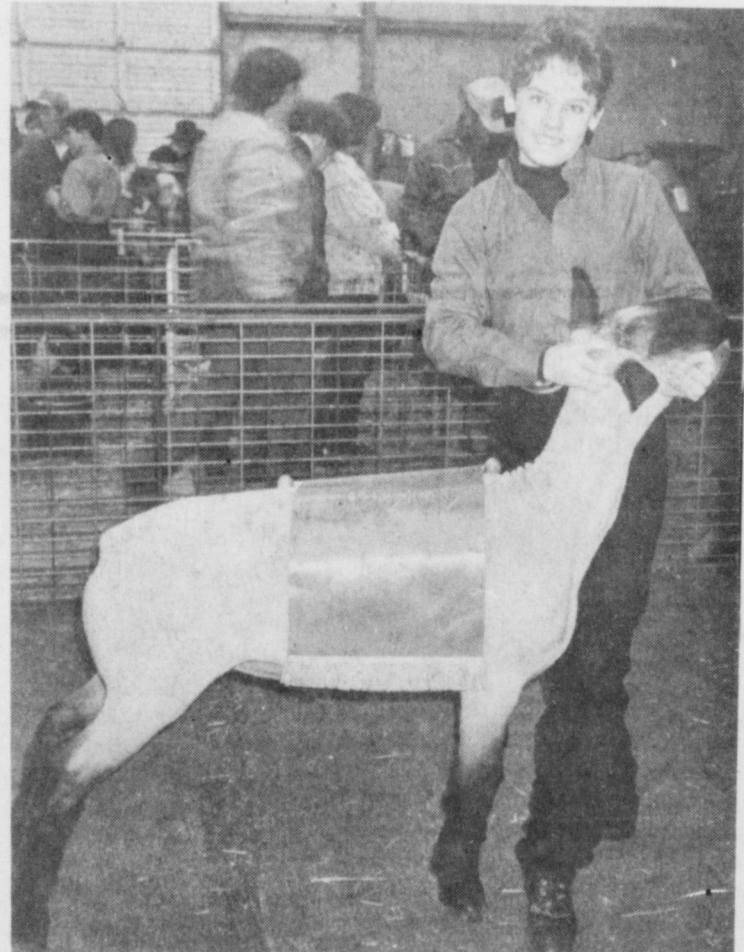

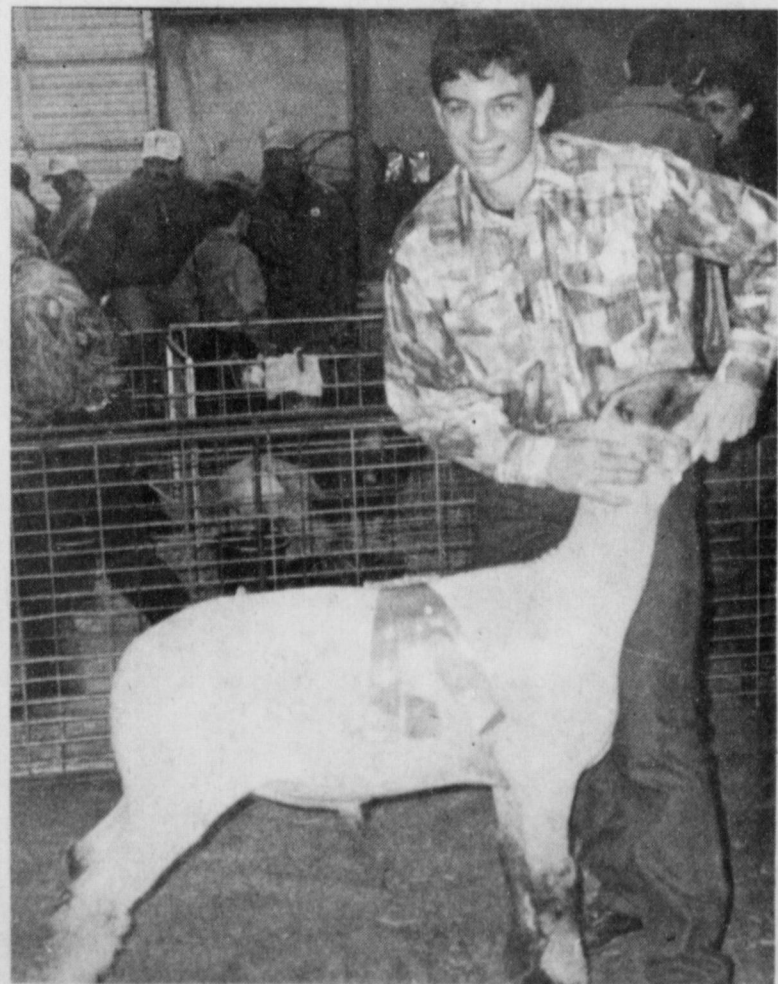

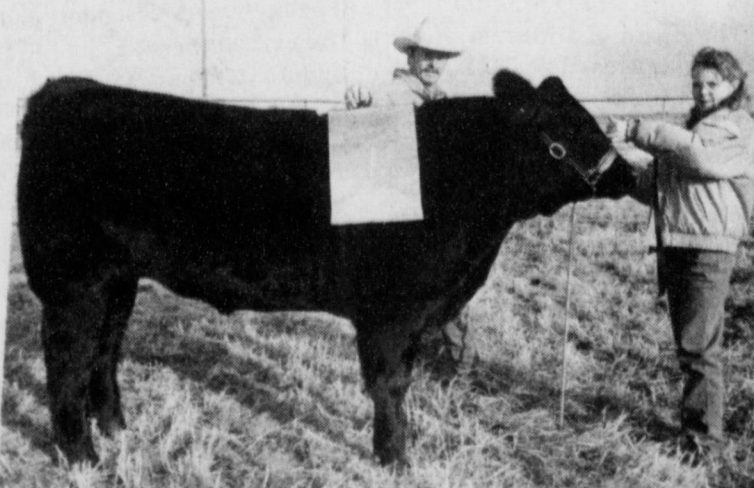

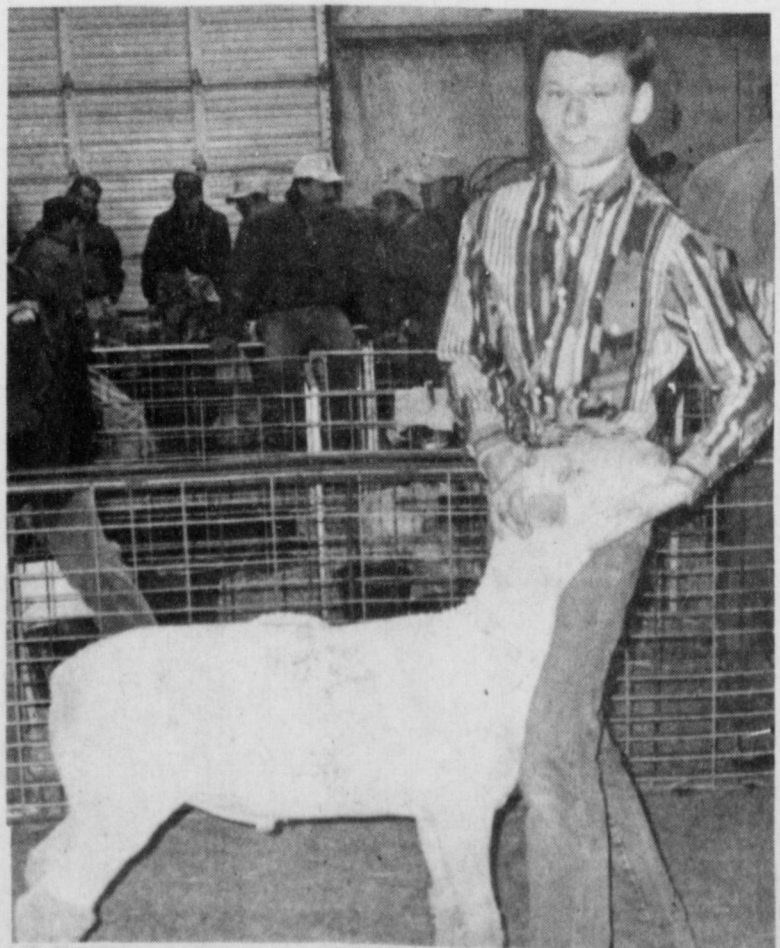

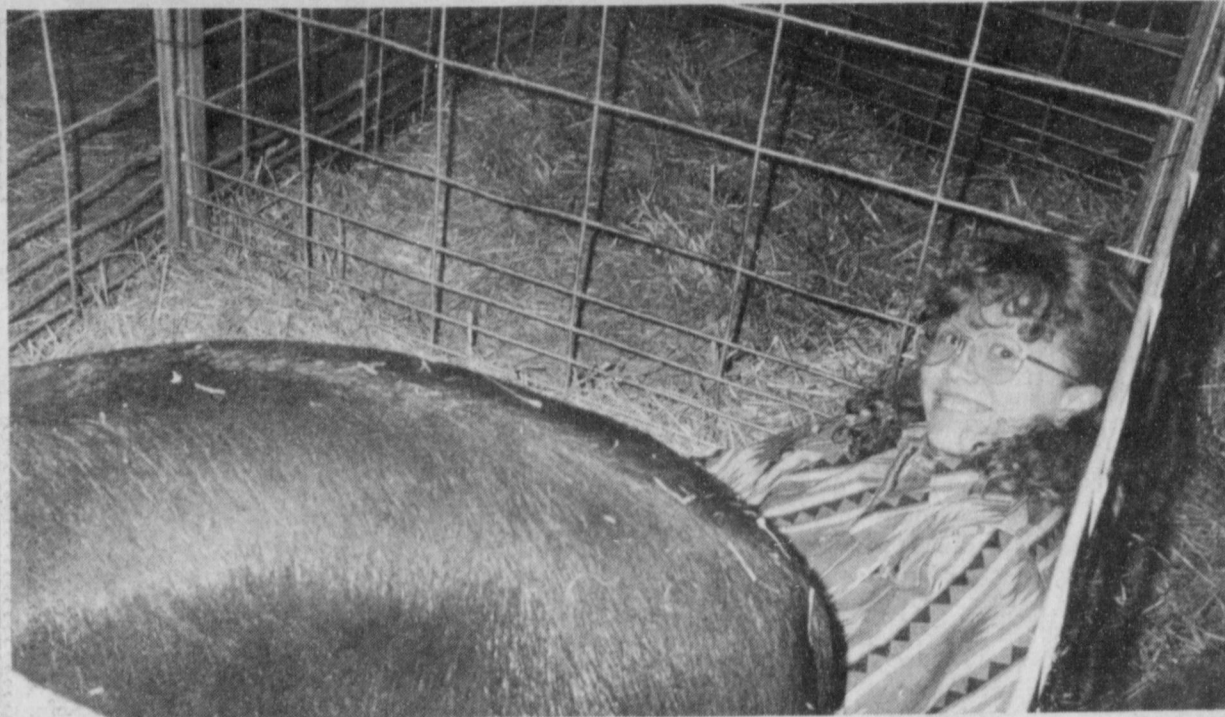

Muleshoe Educators Hear Jim Monasmith

Dr. Jim Monasmith, principal of Colville High School in Colville, Washington challenged the Muleshoe Administrators and teachers Thursday afternoon as he presented "A Vision of an Effective School for the Decade."

Mr. Monasmith outlined some changes that must occur to facilitate student learning. Students must master the following curriculum, at a high level of competency: math, history, geography, science and English. In addition, all students must be able to demonstrate the following: 1) a strong work ethic, 2) pose questions, then use higher order thinking skills to solve "real" problems, 3) team learning, 4) skills for lifetime, independent learning.

He added that every classroom should be characterized by a) active

involvement of all students in the learning process, b) use of technology and people in the real world to solve problems, c) use technology to raise student and teacher productivity and to expand access to learning, d) teachers who do less telling and more supporting, "coaching" and facilitating students' efforts to learn.

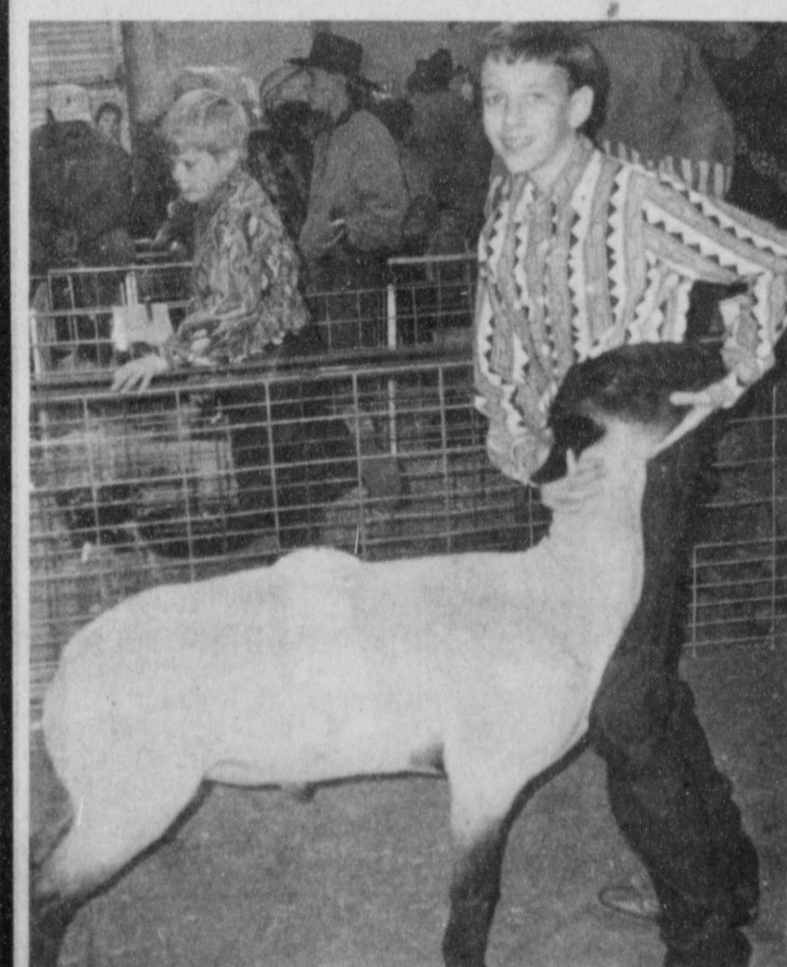

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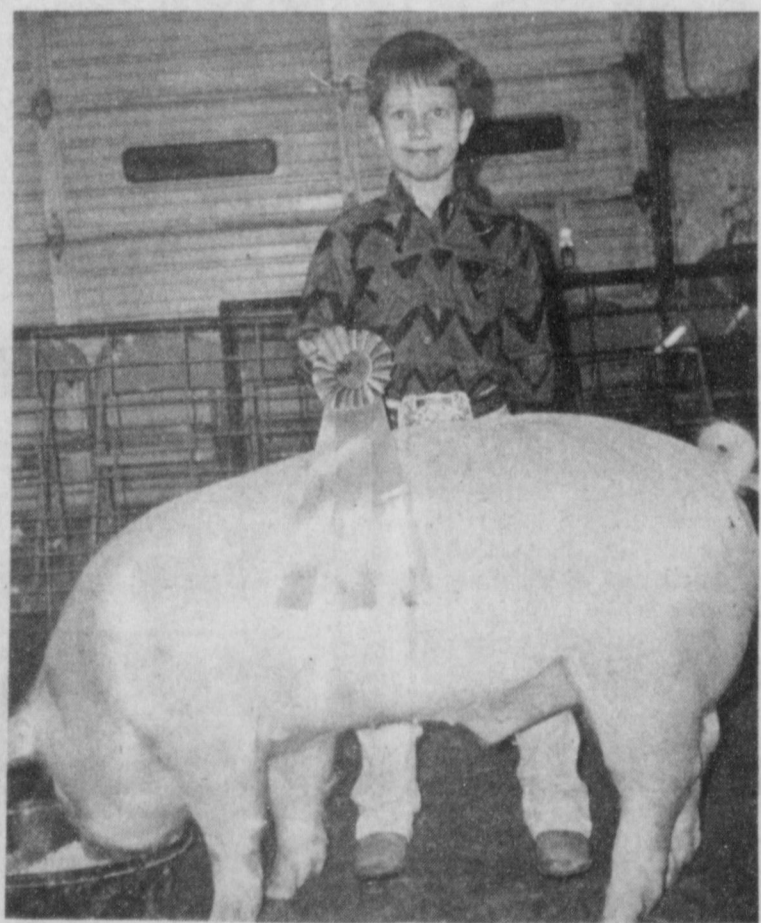

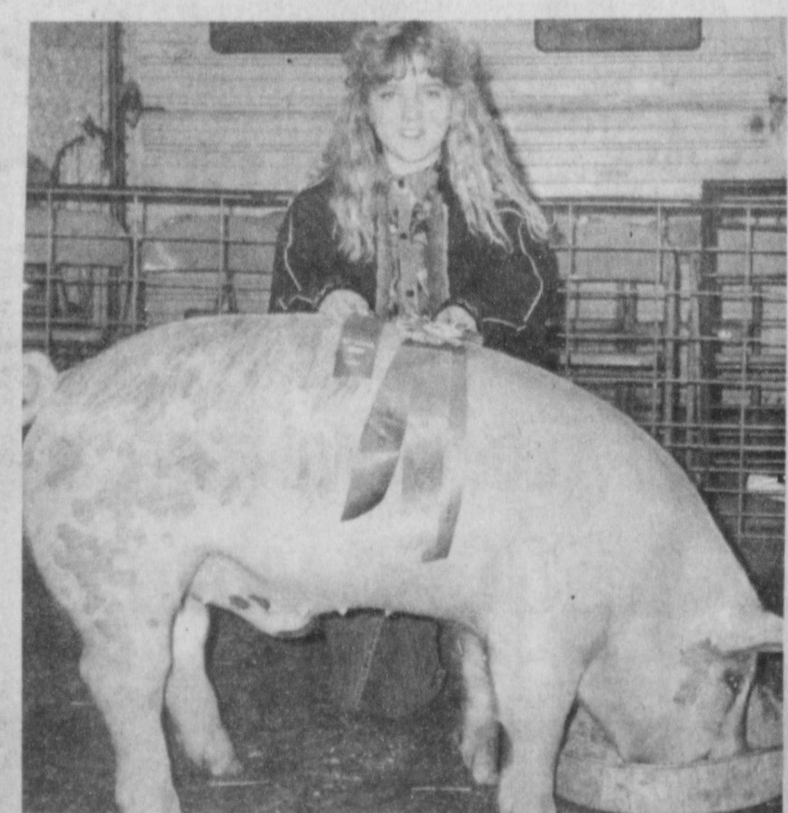

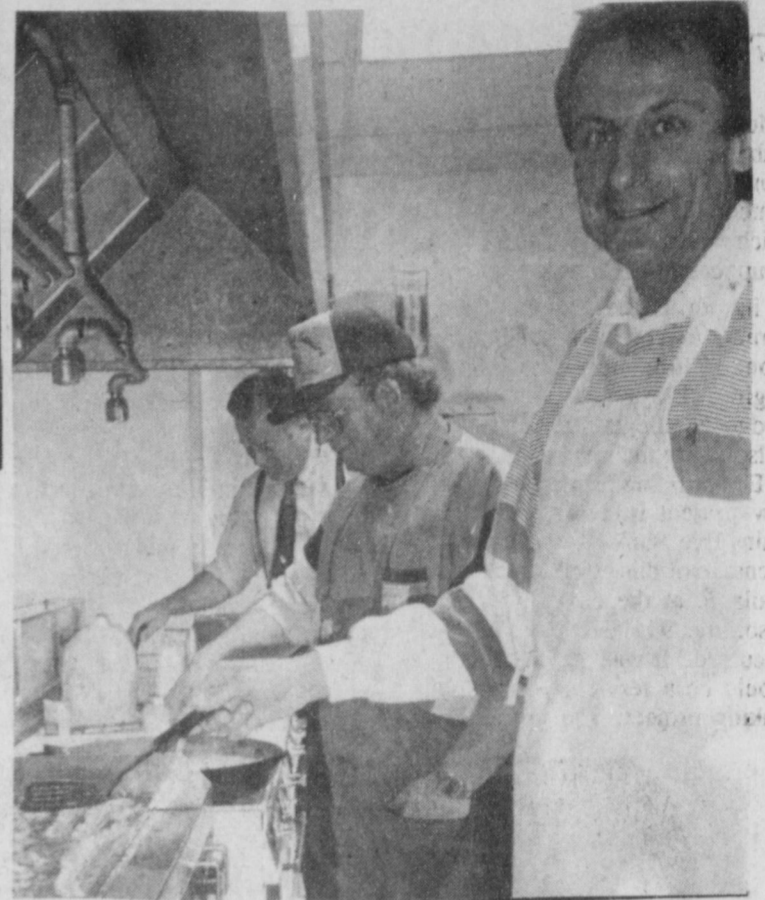

Current Insurance Status In Texas Explained

The Muleshoe chapter of Rotary met Tuesday at noon in the Bailey County Civic Center with about 55 attending.

Curtis Shelburne provided luncheon music. Richard Murphy gave the invocation. Terry Hutto led the singing. Six visitors were introduced by Randy Field, president of the group.

Field also mentioned the Fine Arts Boosters taco supper that was planned.

He showed a banner from bikers that had visited the club earlier and mentioned a letter that was sent from that group to the Rotary club. That letter is printed elsewhere in this issue.

Field also gave a report on member Kenneth Henry who is fishing in Florida. Henry caught a 37 lb. fish there recently.

Jay Messenger introduced Douglas Sanford, president of the Independent Insurance Agents of Texas, who gave the talk.

Sanford is also a member of the Society of Certified Insured Counselors and many civic and religious organizations such as the Campfire Council of Lubbock of which he was President. Sanford is a past committee member of the Citizens Advisory Council of Lubbock and a past Board Member of the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra as well as past president of Lubbock Cultural Affairs Council.

Sanford discussed changes in insurance in Texas and gave a general perspective that helped Rotary members get a varied view and a first had look at the insurance business as it stands now.

We lost 600 insurance company positions in Lubbock since 1988. The branch office of the St. Paul Insurance Company, which was their largest and most profitable in the nation for many years, has closed as well as the branch offices

of Crum and Forster, American General and Aetna Fire and Casualty," Sanford notes. Crum and Forster, which at one time had more agent representatives than any other individual stock company in West Texas, last year closed every agent West of Fort Worth except for five. These companies, as well as others such as USF&G who have completely pulled out of the state, all report negative profits for many years in Texas.

Theories as to why rates and profits went to what they did differ. The concept of a negative profit factor in setting automobile rates, combined with poor weather, such as the hails in the last few years, have made it difficult for companies to show a profit.

"Unfortunately, there are just not enough companies moving to fill the gaps that are being created," says Sanford. "Texas has gotten hit from two sides."

"As an Association our goal has been to entice new markets to Texas. We worked with our Legislators to develop new insurance rules for the state during this last legislation." Sanford was speaking of the modifications to insurance law from House Bill 2.

Several things have been done to increase the ease of new companies moving into the state of Texas. Now these companies can use the forms they have used for many years in other states in Texas. We should also see positive innovations in the forms we are used to, such as the Business Owners' policies.

Sanford made mention of Governor Ann Richards' attempt to lower the price of insurance. He noted that there should now be more flexibility with the benchmark rates that have been recently promulgated.

There have been several positive actions from the State Board of

Insurance, such as companies being allowed flexibility in pricing to charge either 25% over or 30% under benchmark rates that the State Board sets for homeowners, personal automobile, and commercial automobile.

Other lines of insurance will be deregulated, according to Sanford.

In general, these changes will produce a positive result for insurance in Texas.

"We hope companies find it easier to make a profit at the same or lower rates than they are charging now," says Sanford.

There have been many changes to Workers' Compensation insurance also. In addition to the new Workers' Compensation law which went into effect the first of 1991, we also have the availability of deductibles starting January 1, 1992.

According to Sanford, "We foresee an increased capacity on the part of insurance companies in the next few years."

Bill Liles, member of Rotary, asked Sanford how insurance rates in Texas compare to those in other states. Sanford answered by saying that the most expensive homeowners' rates are in this region, but the auto rates are lower. Workers' compensation rates are all over the board, he said.

Richard Murphy, another Rotary member, asked a question on the no-fault issue.

Two states have passed a good no-fault insurance law. This greatly diminishes the possibility of suing the other party when you are involved in an accident. Lawyers as well as many consumers are very opposed to this because they do not want to see the right to sue lost.

Sanford noted that Property and Casualty policies are standardized to a large extent. However, when employers and individuals are seeking health insurance, every policy will be different with each company they go to. Curtis raised a question on this general topic.

Health insurance is a consumer problem and a taxpayer problem that gets tremendously expensive for the middle income person," Shelburne notes. Sanford said that of the 600 insurance companies writing health insurance in Texas, only 200 are left.

Workers' compensation considerations were asked about repeatedly during the luncheon by members who deal with those issues in their daily lives.

Stephanie Gilliam, Muleshoe High School sophomore, was named Student of the Month for December in the CAI computer lab, according to Mrs. Kim Silhan, CAI instructor. The CAI lab was established as part of the Job Training Partnership Act.

Stephanie was chosen for this honor because of her diligent performance of the skills for which the lab is designed. Her selection was based on the overall performance on the computer for the month and attitude in class.

The CIA lab is part of the student's regular classroom assignments in their math or English classes. They are referred by the classroom teacher for reinforcement of skills that are presented in English and math. The students come into the lab two days a week for 20 minutes each session; they work on the computers at their own level. This level is assigned based on testing of individual needs.

The monthly goal established for each student in the CAI lab is to achieve 250 correct answers each month.

Foster Care An Answer To Child Abuse

Muleshoe's chapter of the Lions Club met Wednesday, January 22 at noon in the Bailey County Civic Center with about 35 attending.

Richard Edwards, president of the group, called the meeting to order. He introduced six visitors. Darrell Turner, mayor of Muleshoe and Lions Club member, led the singing. Eloy led the pledge of allegiance and Gordon Wilson gave the invocation.

Edwards made mention of the new project involving the Great Plains Eye Bank. Kevin Nowak is in charge of this effort. Tickets are available at the cost of \$1 each. Also, the 911 decals idea was discussed. It was decided that this should be a service, not a money making project. The group voted

against formal adoption of the effort as a project.

Bary Moynihan of The First Baptist Church here, also a Lion, brought Phyllis Coleman, Children's Protective Services Specialist of the Department of Human Services in Lubbock.

Sexual abuse of children is one area of the field of investigation that has received considerable attention in the media in recent months, according to Coleman. Now, she believes more attention will begin to be given to making the general public aware of all forms of child abuse and neglect. Their agency plays a role and makes community awareness possible.

"Child abuse is a constant and

ever growing problem. Licensed foster homes are deemed necessary to begin efforts to deal with this massive situation." These homes serve as places that the abused children can go when they are involved in abusive home situations.

"Child welfare considerations do not always have a positive connotation for our clients. This is because those parents contacted are contacted as a result of an unhealthy situation they are creating for their youngsters," Coleman says.

It is Coleman's job to train new employees. She recently trained Randall Hamilton here in the Muleshoe office of the Department of Human Services. She continues to help him make the community aware of the way the department is meeting the needs of children and families.

Coleman showed a videotape on a child abuse hotline that is now set up. The hotline received over 66,000 calls last year. "Often children themselves as well as other individuals call the hotline," Coleman says.

"Families we investigate often become mobile as soon as they learn of our interest," Coleman says.

"We are attempting to strengthen the family in the home services we provide. Testing and counseling centers established for overstressed parents suggest appropriate disciplinary measures to these parents."

"Any caring adult can serve as a support person who can diffuse bitterness to prevent further family violence in these cases. We try not to have to place the child in foster care unless absolutely necessary."

There is, according to Coleman, a shortage of foster homes in Texas at this time. There should be several times as many homes as children who need them.

In a dysfunctional family it is often impossible to handle the behavior of the child. When a child's self-image is affected negatively by the abuse, the family sometimes can't stabilize itself. The foster home then serves as a stable alternative.

Termination of parent rights is sometimes necessary when there is a severe injury. Parents suspected of all levels of child abuse are asked to attend classes to help them regain their perspective on parenting.

Long term foster care is not always the answer when children have been abused or rejected. However, often the preparation that the foster home can offer the child is far-reaching. It touches areas like life skills and other kinds of preparation such as learning to rent an apartment and cooking and other life management skills.

Children's Protective Services is often misunderstood because CPS is narrower in its service capability

than is child welfare, according to Coleman. CPS deals only with injured children. The Department of Human Services can't respond to a call unless we can confirm abuse, she says. "Much abuse is never reported."

Child abuse is one of the symptoms of the high stress environment in which we live. In this environment, things rather than relationships are emphasized. "We can all benefit from a successful shifting of priorities in this area."

CPS is part of the answer to mistreatment of children. "We want to work together to provide a less threatening place for our children," she says.

Texas law dictates that anyone suspecting that a child is being abused should call with as much information as possible. "We investigate the information and may file a 'reason to believe' report."

Then the department continues to have contact with the family, even though their clients are not voluntary clients.

The court always decides whether foster care is necessary. Bary Moynihan and his wife are foster parents in this area, Coleman notes.

In 1991, 50 reports of child abuse and neglect were reported in this county. However, there are no children in foster care from Bailey County at this time.

There are different types of foster homes. Foster parents are matched with foster children. The length of stay that a child may have in such a home is from 12 to 24 months.

"We believe the child has a right to grow up in a family," says Coleman.

Kenneth Evins, Lions member asked Coleman a question regarding emotional abuse. She said that such abuse is hard to validate. An impairment in the child's ability to function must be determined. Sexual abuse, abandonment and neglectful supervision are some of the categories of this kind of abuse.

Darrell Turner asked Coleman about how long records are kept on such families in question. She responded by saying they are kept for 6 months and in some cases as long as 3 years.

CPS does not divulge the sources of its information on reported cases of child abuse.

Lonnie Adrian asked the representative if she interviewed the parents or the people reporting them first. Coleman answered that it depends on the case. "We talk to as many people as necessary to find out the facts."

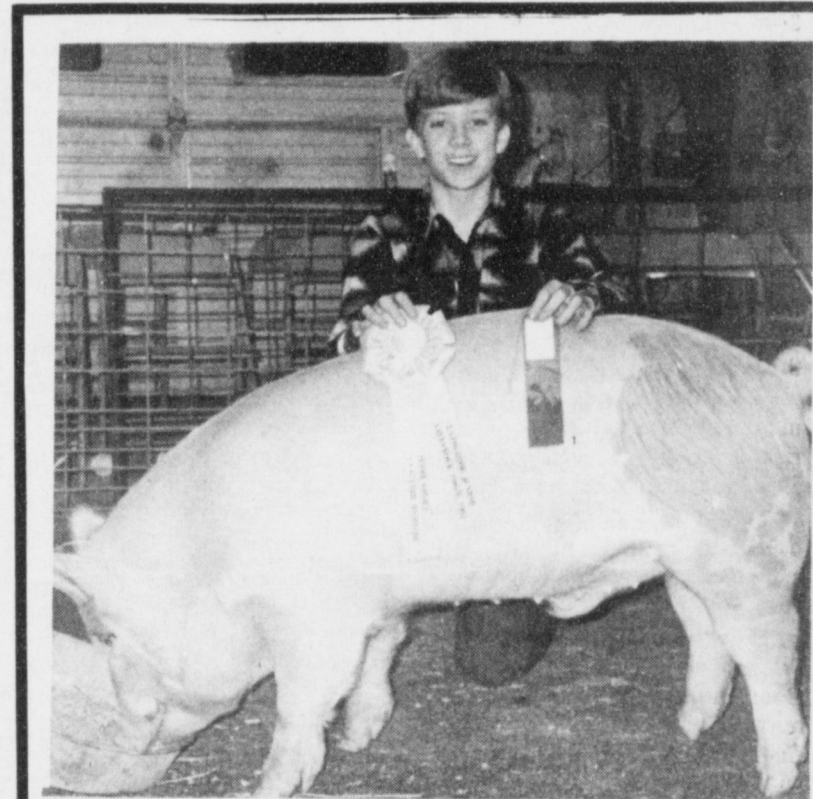

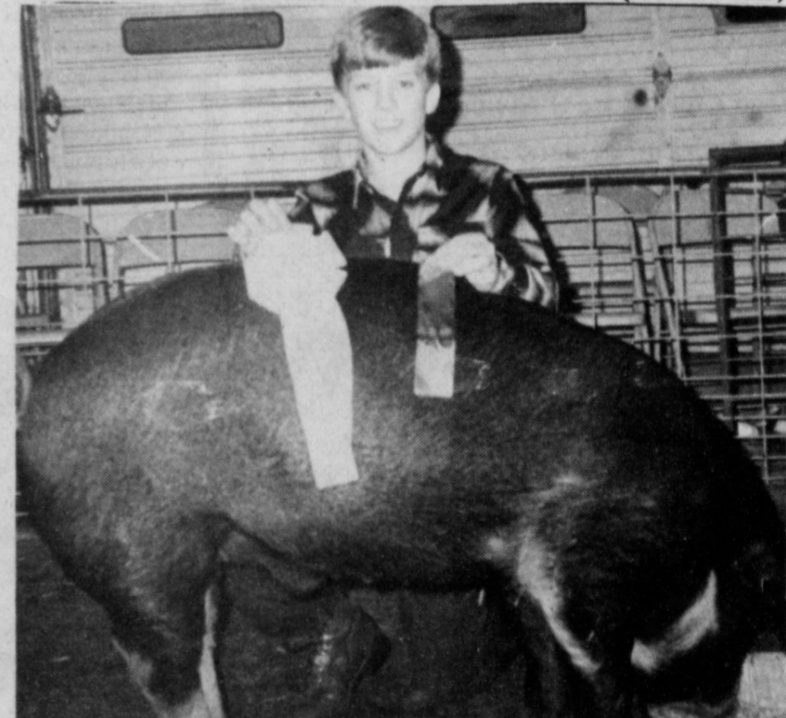

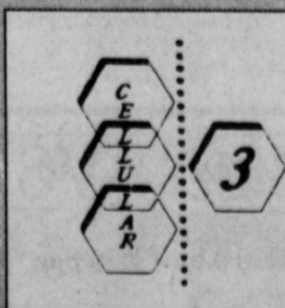

Database System Causes Problems

"Some customers are finding their calling card calls, collect calls, and calls billed to third numbers are being blocked," said Hubert Kidd, manager of Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc.

It's an industry-wide problem that began January 1 when the telephone industry switched to a new database system. Calling card calls along with collect calls and calls billed to third numbers are effected.

In the past, AT&T's database processed most of what are called alternately billed calls. That system is being discontinued and replaced with 12 databases, owned by 12 different companies.

Because there are so many different players involved with this new database system, the industry is having problems getting calls approved. All companies hope to have the problems resolved in the near future. "The network does appear to be stabilizing," Kidd added.

Most calling card, collect or billed-to-third party calls are going through, but here are isolated problems. Telephone company officials suggest waiting a few minutes and trying again before simply giving-up.

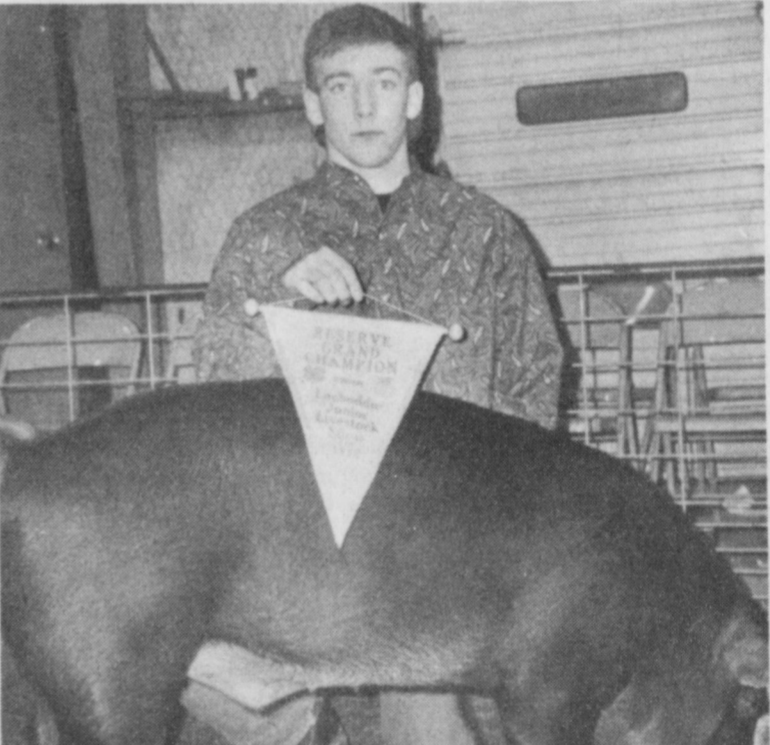
"If it's a technical problem, the system may correct itself in a few minutes," Kidd continued. "If it continues to be blocked it's probably something else. It's not a problem caused locally, but we will use our influence to get the calls through. The call blocking problem is affecting most local telephone and long distance companies nationwide."

Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc., is asking its customers to call the business office, at 272-5533 or to contact their long distance carrier, if a call is not being processed.

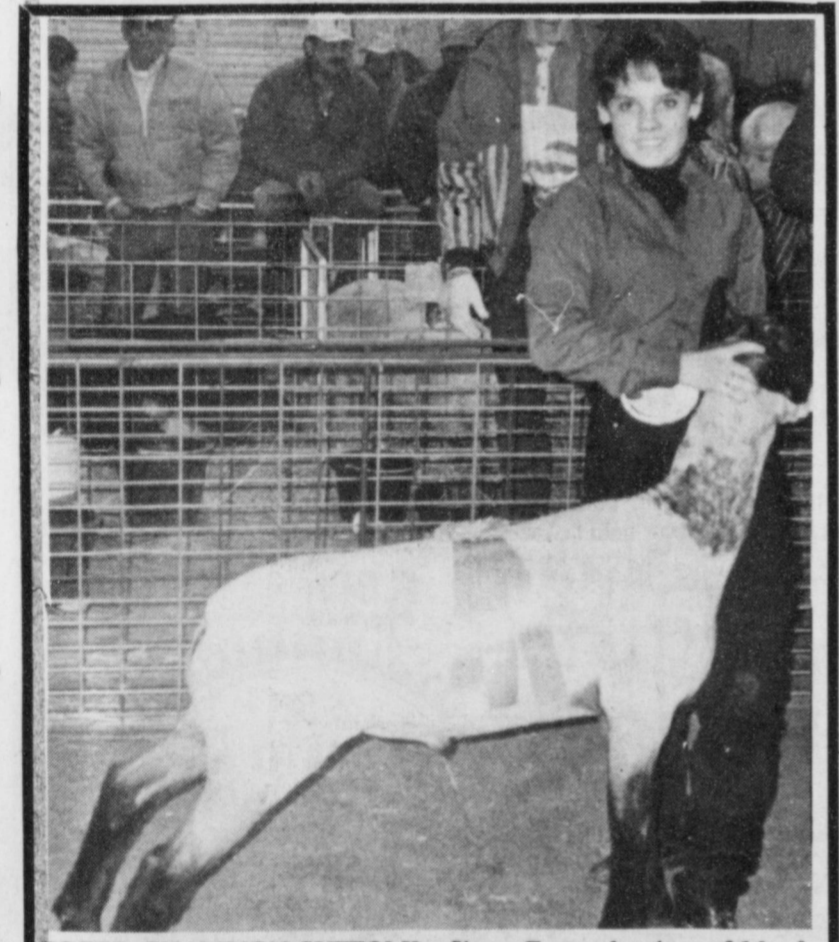

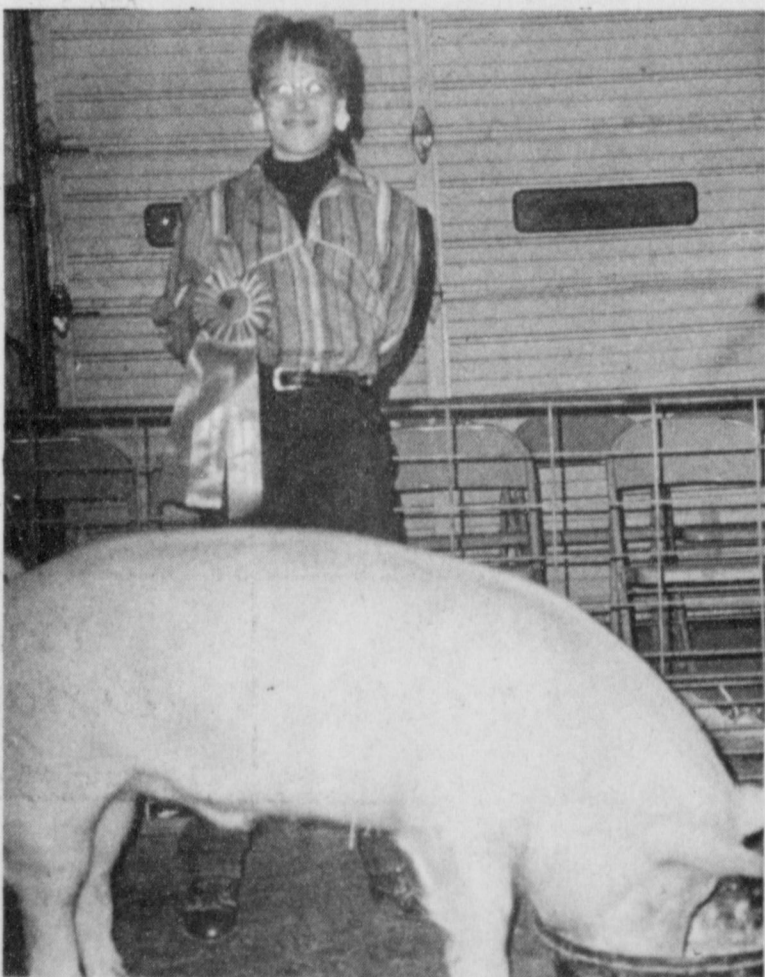

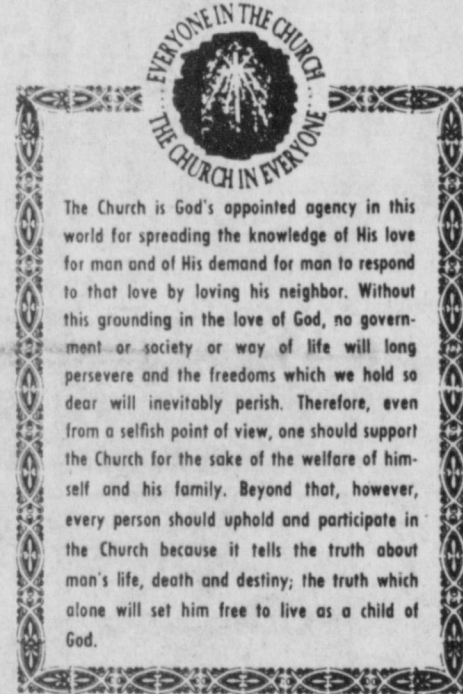

Report From State Senator Teel Bivins

I recently returned to Austin a little sooner than expected when the governor called the Legislature back to pass a redistricting bill. Since the special session didn't begin until Jan. 2, at least I was able to spend the holidays with my family. Although the Legislature's attention was on redistricting, I took the opportunity to introduce a bill I think is badly needed. My legislation would impose term limitations on state officials.

It's a sad fact in politics that many elected officials have ceased to be responsive to the voters who put them in office. Once they're elected, many officials concentrate on the next election and forget about making good public policy. Their moves are calculated to win reelection and nothing else.

Specifically, my bill would limit how long elected members of the Senate, House and Executive Department can serve in office. Let's start with the Senate. State senators serve four-year terms. The bill would restrict senators to 12

years. Then, they'd have to retire or run for some other office. Members of the House of Representatives, who serve two-year terms, also would be limited to 12 years.

Twelve years is a fair limit. It's long enough for a person to go to Austin, accomplish legislative goals and acquire seniority in the Senate or House. But 12 years is short enough time to allow others a chance to serve. Texas could only benefit from a constant influx of fresh faces and new ideas.

My bill also would limit members of the Executive Department who are elected statewide. This would affect such prominent officials as the governor, lieutenant governor, treasurer, comptroller, land commissioner and attorney general. These people would be limited to two terms in the same office. After that, of course, they would be free to run for any other position.

You'll notice this bill doesn't affect Texas officials on the federal level. In other words, U.S. senators and U.S. House members who serve us in Washington, D.C., would not be limited by this bill. I strongly believe terms of office for these people also should be limited, but that should be done with an amendment to the U.S. Constitution so that representatives from all states are affected. It would seriously damage Texas' power in Washington if the state unilaterally limited terms for its U.S. senators and congressmen while the same officials from other states were free to move up the ladder of seniority, acquiring power.

Texas' founding fathers never meant for members of the Legislature and other officials to stay indefinitely in public office. They envisioned citizen legislators who would go to Austin, serve their state for a few years and go home. My bill will make sure long-serving politicians know when to go home.

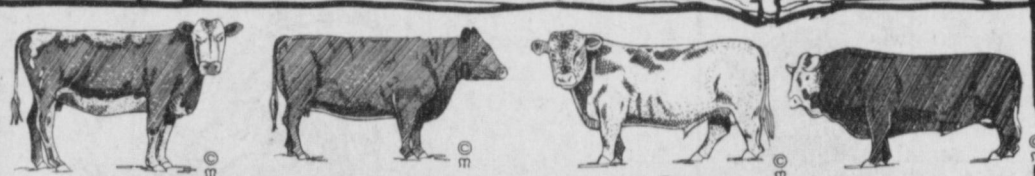
