Houston, August 7.—Farm mort-gage loans by The Federal Land made in cash instead of bonds of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation and part cash, as has been the practice for nearly a year and a half, A. C. Williams, president of the Land Bank, announced Saturday.

With a ready market for bonds, Mr. Williams explained, there will be no difficutly in selling these bonds and putting the land bank and \$5,000,000. Commissioner's loans on a cash ba-

The interest rate on new Federa cent per annum and loans by the Land Bank Commissioner bear inter est at the rate of five per cent per annum. A temporary reduction of interest on Federal Land Bond having installments due prior-July 1, 1938, was put into effect July 1, 1935. This was the result of legislation, The Farm Credit Act of 1935, which was signed by President Roosevelt June 3, and reduced the interest rate to 3 1-2 per cent for interest payable in the one year period, commencing July 1935, and to four per cent for all interest payable in the two year period commencing July 1, 1936. In terest payable on installment dates occuring after July 30, 1938, will be at the original contract rate of the loans. These loans are repayable over a long period of time and on convenient terms.

In brief, the bill would raise from 30 to 31 per cent the tax on that portion of an individual's income between \$50,000 and \$56,000. It then would step up rates all along the line until a maximum of 75 per cent, against the present 59, was reached on that part of income over

This section of the bill is officially estimated to raise an additional \$45,000,000 a year.
