Fred Miller, 33, Ballinger, Named Head Local Schools

Served As Superintendent Of Lueders Schools For Term Of Five Years

At a meeting of the Littlefield School Board held Wednesday night of last week, Fred Miller, 33, former principal of Ballinger High school, was elected superintendent of Littlefield schools.

Mr. Miller has a long successful school career to his credit. He served last year as principal of Ballinger High school, and previous to that was superintendent of Lueders, Texas, schools for five years.

Supt. Miller and his wife and three children will arrive in Littlefield July 1.

Supt. Miller is an active Church worker, member of Balingen Rotarian club, and is active in Boy Scout work.

Elwin Matthews of Lakeview, Hall county, was sometime ago elected vocational agricultural teacher of the Littlefield High school.

Mr. and Mrs. Matthews and two sons, Jerry, 5 1/2 years old, and Olen, 18 months, will move to Littlefield Saturday, where Mr. Matthews will take over his new duties July 1.

Matthews has been teaching agriculture in the Lakeview school for the past two years.

BONDS IN AMOUNT OF ABOUT \$100,000 SOLD AT RALLY HERE

Col. E. A. Simpson Toastmaster; Good Program Enjoyed

Threatened Storm Prevents Showing Of Special Films

The Littlefield Fifth War Loan drive got off to a good start at the Bond rally here Friday night when about \$100,000 in war securities were sold. A good crowd was present, and a splendid program enjoyed.

Col. E. A. Simpson of Amarillo, veteran of World War I, was toastmaster for the evening, and delivered a very impressive address.

Sgt. Woodrow Hardy and Cpl. John T. Stangle, wounded war veterans from McCloskey Hospital, Temple, recently returned from combat service in the Southwest Pacific and the European areas, made splendid talks. They were unable, however, to show the war films as originally planned due to a threatening storm, including lightning and thunder.

Six "Bondhardiers"—service men from the Clovis Airbase, put on a special 1 1/2 hour program, which was much enjoyed, and was followed by two songs, "America" and "America the Beautiful" by Charles Signor.

Talks were also made by Pat Boone, County Chairman of War Bond Committee, C. O. Stone, chairman for the Fifth War Loan drive for the county, and J. O. Garlington, local chairman.

About 15 workers were present at the rally, and sold bonds throughout the program.

The program closed about 11:40 p. m.

Mr. Boone said that sales were lagging, and he is making a strong appeal to all residents of the county to do his or her share, reminding them that the Fifth War Loan is the biggest, and the most vitally important financial effort of this whole war.

The county chairman added that if everyone will do his part the county would go over the top at once.

A very successful bond rally was held at Sudan Friday night, and a report handed to the Leader by Mr. Boone Tuesday indicated that Sudan had gone over the top big by selling Bonds in the value of \$161,000, as against their quota of \$130,000.

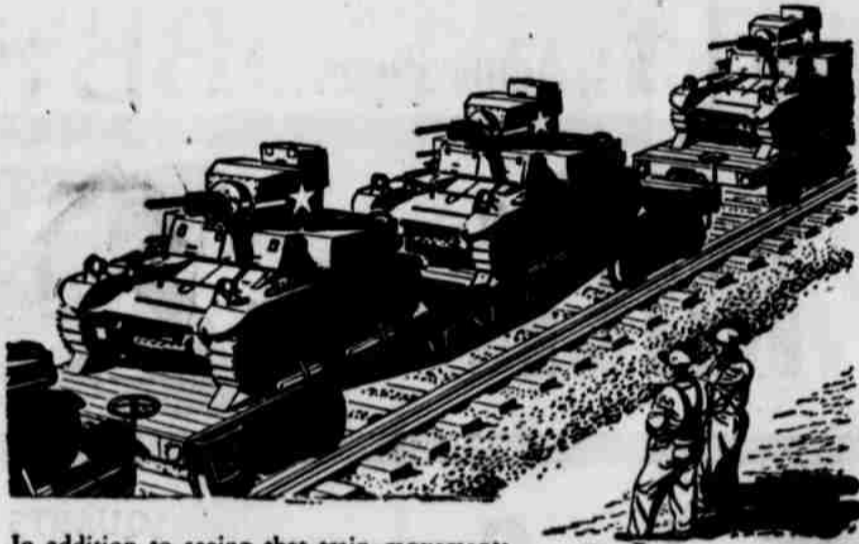

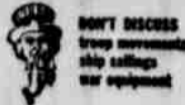

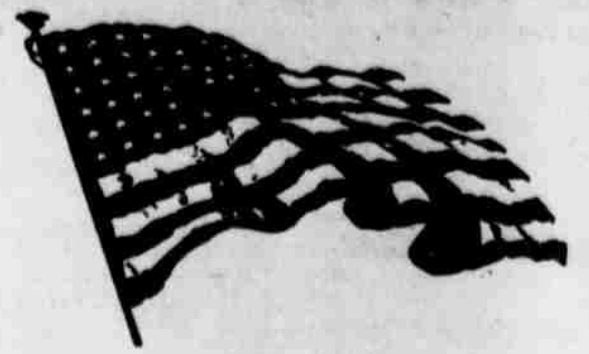

"I can truthfully state that I am thoroughly familiar with all of the duties required of the county clerk, and am fully capable of discharging those duties in a most prompt and efficient manner.

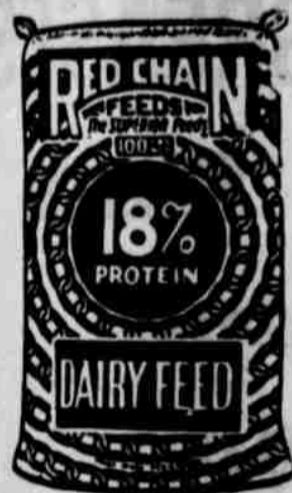
Fieldton Women Make 16 Quilts For Red Cross
