## Continuance of Prayer

President Roosevelt, as he approached the moment of the "invasion prayer," suggested that the need of this tragic hour is a continuance of prayer, rather than just a single day of supplication. The President had been urged to call the nation into a single day of special prayer, but while not discounting the value of a special day, he emphasized the need of a continuous attitude of prayer.

"Because the road is long and the desire is great," he said, "I ask that our people devote themselves in continuance of prayer. As we rise to each new day, and again when each day is spent, let words of prayer be on our lips, invoking They help to our efforts."

The full text of the invasion prayer is as fol-"Almighty God: Our sons, pride of our nation,

this day have set upon a mighty endeavor, a struggle to preserve our republic, our religion and our civilization, and to set free a suffering humanity. "Lead them straight and true; give strength to their arms, stoutness to their hearts, steadfastness

to their faith. "They will need Thy blessing. Their road will be long and hard. The enemy is strong. He may hurl back our forces. Success may not come with rushing grace, but we shall return again and again; and we know that by Thy grace, and by the righteousness of our cause, our sons will tri-

"They will be sore tried, by might and by day, without rest—till victory is won. The darkness will be rent by noise and flame. Men's souls will be shaken with the violence of war.

"These are men lately drawn from the ways of peace. They fight not for the last of conquest.

They fight to end conquest. They fight to liberate. They fight to let justice arise, and tolerance and goodwill among all Thy people. They yearn but for the end of battle, for their return to the haven

'Some will never return. Embrace these, Father, and receive them, Thy heroic servants, into Thy kingdom.

"And for us at home-fathers, mothers, children, wives, sisters and brothers of brave men overseas, whose thoughts and prayers are ever with them-help us, Almighty God, to rededicate ourselves in renewed faith in Thee in this hour of great sacrifice.

"Many people have urged that I call the nation into a single day of special prayer. But because the road is long and the desire is great, I ask that our people devote themselves in continuance of prayer. As we rise to each new day, and again when each day is spent, let words of prayer be on our lips, invoking Thy help to our efforts.

"Give us strength, too strength in our daily tasks to redouble the contributions we make in the physical and material support of our armed forces. "And let our hearts be stout, to wait out the long travail, to bear sorrows that may come, to

impart our courge unto our sons wheresoever they may be. "And, O Lord, give us faith. Give us faith in Thee, faith in our sons; faith in each other; faith in our united crusade. Let not the keenness of our spirit ever be dulled. Let not the impacts of temporary events, of temporal matters of but fleeting moment-let not these deter us in our unconquer-

able purpose. "With Thy blessing, we shall prevail over the unholy forces of our enemy. Help us to conquer the apostles of greed and racial arrogances. Lead us to the saving of our country, and with our sister nations into a world unity that will spell a sure peace a peace invulnerable to the schemings of unworthy men. And a peace that will let all men live in freedom, reaping the just rewards of their honest toil.
