

Class 1 Airport Recommended For Littlefield By CAA

Federal Government And Locality To Share In Cost As Post-War Plan

In connection with an application for Littlefield for development of the local airport, Congressman George Mahon has written the Mayor of Littlefield as follows:

"Last June Congress requested the Civil Aeronautics Administration to prepare and submit to Congress a postwar program for the development of airport throughout the Nation.

"The CAA has now made a report to Congress in which various airport developments are recommended. The suggested airport development for your city is as follows: Class 1 airport.

"For preparation of land (does not include land purchase) \$49,940. Lighting \$138,413. Lighting \$27,775. Radio facilities (none listed). Miscellaneous \$2,200. Making a total of \$218,328.

"Note that this estimate does not include the purchase money for the land.

"For the present this program is nothing more than a suggestion of the CAA, based on the request of Congress. Before the program could be carried out, Congress would have to enact legislation and make appropriations. Both the Federal Government and the localities will share the costs upon a basis to be fixed by future legislation.

"This information is of interest to your city, and I knew you would like to have it. We are all interested in the plans for aviation development.

Wipes Out German Railroad Station

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE FIGHTER STATION, England. — The powerful punch of the P-51 Mustang fighter plane was displayed in yet another form recently when Capt. Gerald Montgomery, Littlefield, Texas, fighter pilot led a section of four Mustangs into a dive-bombing mission with detachable gas tanks as "bombs," wiping out a German railroad station.

The lanky Texan, flying the Mustang, "Sizzlin' Liz," was escorting heavy bombers of the Eighth Air Force's 2nd Bombardment Division to the Saar Basin where targets were blasted in front of Gen. Patton's advancing U. S. Third Army. Falling to meet enemy opposition in the light rain and snow flurries, the 4th Fighter Group struck at ground installations in low-level attacks.

Capt. Montgomery flew his fighter along a railroad track until he came to a station. "I called down the other three planes in my section," Montgomery said, "and decided the most damage we could do was with our wing tanks. They were nearly empty, but there was enough gas left in them to start a good fire.

"We zoomed down and some of the tanks hit right on the roof of the station building. Then we strafed."

COMMITTEEMEN TO BE NAMED AT COMMUNITY MEETINGS SATURDAY

Delegates To Convention Also To Be Named

Sessions To Be Held In Various Cities Of County Starting Dec. 9

Farmer Committeemen who will have important roles in the War and Post-War problems will be named at AAA Election Meetings to be held in each of the 14 communities in Lamb County beginning December 9, said L. F. Bain, Administrative Officer.

Farmers will choose committeemen from each community, and delegates for the County Convention which will name three County Committeemen and alternates to serve in 1945.

Meetings will be held in Sudan, Olton, Littlefield, Spade, Fieldton, Spring Lake, and Amherst. In addition to the election of committeemen there will be a discussion of grain sorghum loans, sudan loans, conservation practices, and other programs handled by the AAA.

Every farmer should attend the meeting in his community, take part in the discussion, and vote for the committeeman that would serve his community best, Bain said.

Each producer will receive a notice advising him of the time and place of the election in his particular community.

John W. Porcher Promoted To Corporal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England.—The promotion of John W. Porcher, III, 19-year-old B-17 Flying Fortress aerial gunner, of Littlefield, Texas, from private to corporal, has been announced at this Eighth Air Force Bomber Base.

Serving with the veteran and colorful 390th Bomb. Group, Cpl. Porcher, son of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Porcher, Jr., Littlefield, has seen action with the Eighth Air Force in bombing attacks against vital Nazi targets in support of growing Allied ground operations.

Before he entered the Air Forces, Cpl. Porcher was a student at the Texas School of Technology at Lubbock, Texas.

Cpl. Porcher's group holds a presidential citation for its highly successful attack on ball-bearing factories at Schweinfurt, Germany, last year, and is a unit of the Third Bombardment Division, cited by the President for its historic England-to-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt plants at Regensburg, Germany, August 1943.

Cpl. Omer T. Vinson Is Slightly Wounded

Mrs. Omer T. Vinson received a message from the War Department last week to the effect that her husband, Cpl. Omer T. Vinson, of a Tank Division, had been slightly wounded in action in Germany.

Cpl. Vinson went into the service in October, 1942, and overseas in March of 1943, going to North Africa.

He was in the invasion of Sicily, going on through Italy, France, Belgium and into Germany.

Cpl. Vinson has never been home since enlisting.

Alvin R. Gerik Awarded Citation And D. F. C.

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE LIBERATOR STATION, England. — First Lieutenant Alvin R. Gerik of Pep, Texas, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement in aerial combat it was announced recently by Major General William E. Kepner, Commanding the 2nd Bombardment Division.

He is a Navigator on a B-24 Liberator and has made 30 bombing missions over Germany. His targets include such enemy strongpoints as Berlin, Munich, Cologne and industrial installations in the Ruhr Valley.

Lt. Gerik is the son of J. F. Gerik of Pep, Texas.

He entered the service March 17, 1942, and received his commission November 13, 1943. Lt. Gerik has been overseas since March 1944.

His citation reads: "For extraordinary achievement, while serving as Navigator of a B-24 airplane on many bombardment missions over enemy territory. Displaying great

courage and skill, Lt. Gerik fighting from his gun position, has ward off many enemy attacks and has materially aided in the successful completion of each of these missions. The courage, coolness and exceptional skill displayed by Lt. Gerik on all these occasions reflect the highest credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States."

In addition to the DFC he holds the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters.

The 466th Bombardment Group (H) to which Lt. Gerik belongs is commanded by Colonel William H. Cleveland of Tacoma, Washington, and received official commendation from Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle, Commanding Eighth Air Force, for combat achievement on its first mission which was against Berlin. It was the longest initial attack ever flown by any unit in the history of the European Theatre and one of the heaviest daylight bombardments of the German capital on record.

Luther Gunnels Dies Of Wounds

Mrs. Luther C. Gunnels, who makes her home with her mother, Mrs. John Prentice of 5 1/2 miles south of town, received a telegram from the War Department Wednesday of last week to the effect that her husband, S-Sgt. Gunnels, had died November 16 as a result of wounds received in Italy.

S-Sgt. Gunnels was a Gunner in the Air Corps. He had been stationed for a time in Sardinia; and was transferred to Corsica, where he was stationed at the time of his death. He was reported to be on his 63rd mission when he was wounded. He had written to his wife dated November 15 to the effect that he would be home for Christmas, and when she received the telegram she first thought it was a message that he had arrived in the States.

Mrs. Gunnels was formerly Miss Naomi Drake. She was graduated from the Littlefield High school with the 1940 class. She and S-Sgt. Gunnels were married in Galveston.

Pfc. Jack Sparkman Wounded In Action

Mrs. Bertha Sparkman received a message from the War Department last week to the effect that her son, Pfc. Jack W. Sparkman of the 34th Infantry Division, had been wounded in action on Leyte on October 30. Following this information, Pfc. Sparkman wrote directly to his mother from a hospital in the Philippines, telling her he was shot in the left foot, but that it was healing nicely. He also stated that, so far, he had three Japs to his credit.

Sparkman entered the service in February, 1942, going overseas in April, 1944. He was stationed in New Guinea five months prior to the Philippine invasion.

Howard Crawford Missing In Action

Mrs. Howard D. Crawford, formerly of Spade, but now of Littlefield, received a telegram Tuesday to the effect that her husband, Pvt. Howard D. Crawford, was reported missing in action November 19 in Germany, and if further details or other information were received she would be properly notified.

Pvt. Crawford was with the Fifth Armoured Division. He entered the service February 11, 1944, and went overseas September 7 last. He was a construction engineer before entering the service, and was formerly of Houston, but lived here since July, 1943.

Mrs. Crawford is the former Miss Judith Cuba of Spade.

Pvt. Crawford is the son of Mrs. S. Y. Findley of Corpus Christi. He has three sisters, Mrs. J. T. Thompson, and Mrs. Douglas Poole, both of Corpus Christi, and Mrs. Olan Turlington of Henderson.

Sgt. J. R. White Slightly Wounded

Mr. and Mrs. J. E. White of Littlefield received a telegram Wednesday to the effect that his son, Sgt. Jesse R. White, was slightly wounded in action November 21 in Germany, and that they would be advised as reports of condition were received.

Sgt. White has been in the service two years; and overseas two months. He is with an Infantry Battalion.

Has 78 Missions To His Credit

Lt. B. D. Brown, who visited his sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Millard Johnson, here the past week, has to his credit an outstanding record of service.

Lt. Brown is a Pilot on a B-26, and spent 15 1/2 months overseas in the European area. He has 78 missions to his credit, and came through alright with the exception of a few bruises. For his outstanding achievements he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal, and 13 Oak Leaf Clusters. The Oak Leaf Clusters are awarded for each five missions or for an outstanding achievement.

Lt. Brown is the son of Mrs. Mary L. Brown of Lexington. He has been in the service about three years, and his missions took him over France, Holland and Belgium. He returned to the States in September, and is now stationed at Pampa, where he is an instructor in Advanced Twin Engine Flying.

Lt. Brown's brother, Lt. James J. Brown, is a Bombardier on a B-17; was overseas 7 1/2 months, has 30 missions to his credit and returned to the States in August last. He was also fortunate enough to receive no wounds. He is now stationed at Santa Monica, Calif.

Five Bonds Donated And Given Away During Program

C. O. Stone, Ch'rm'n 6th War Loan, Appeals To Everyone To Buy Bonds

The Bond Rally held in the Palace Theatre, Littlefield, Thursday evening was a huge success, and bonds were pledged and sold during the evening performance in the amount of \$133,825.

A splendid program was presented by a 45-man all-soldier show from the Lubbock Army Air Field, under the direction of Ashley B. Miller. Several returned heroes made interesting talks.

Bonds donated for the benefit of the drive by Pat Boone, M. M. Brittain, J. O. Garlington, L. C. Hewitt and Art Chesher were given away.

The Palace Theatre was filled almost to capacity.

Since Littlefield's quota is \$270,000 it would indicate that this city almost reached the halfway mark at the rally.

Lamb County's quota, however, is \$705,000; and according to C. O. Stone, County Chairman of Sixth War Loan, sales are rather lagging as a whole, with only nine days to go until the deadline, December 16. A report from the Federal Reserve Bank as of December 1 shows the amount sold and cleared through the bank from Lamb County at \$68,392.75. Mr. Stone points out that this is a long way from the county's quota of \$705,000. He also states that they are operating this campaign on a voluntary basis, and not making a business to business or house to house canvass. However, he says, everyone needs to shoulder his or her responsibility and get down to business on bond buying as the time is getting short, adding that "we know the people are going to make up the quota. Littlefield has never fallen down yet in the securing of her quota, or the raising of money for a worthy cause, and she is not going to fail to shoulder her responsibility now, for we are going to have to back our servicemen and buy bonds and more bonds."

With Mrs. J. H. Barnett and Mrs. Sidney Hopping in charge, a booth is being maintained in the First National Bank this week, where residents may conveniently buy bonds. Women of the city are taking turns, and each day two women are patriotically taking care of the bond sales at this booth.

Awarded Purple Heart, D.F.C., Etc.

Engineer Gunner Farrell Compton, who returned recently to the States, after being liberated from a Bulgaria prison camp, visited in Waco, during which time a Waco daily newspaper gave the following interesting account of Farrell's military record:

"Wearing ribbons for the purple heart, distinguished flying cross and air medal with two oak leaf clusters, Engineer-Gunner Farrell Compton of Waco has returned to the States after spending two and one-half months in a Bulgarian prison camp. "When he visited Waco Methodist home, where he was a former student, admiring youngers clustered about him, the braver ones asking questions, the others just staring in open-mouthed wonder at the string of colored ribbons and the gold and blue 15th Air Force insignia.

"The modest young technical sergeant didn't want to talk about his experiences during 31 missions over enemy occupied territory in the European area, said of his medals, 'They give them to everybody.'

"Although Sgt. Compton's first 30 missions were not easy and the plane came back occasionally with as many as 40 flak holes, he wasn't wounded and never was really worried, then on the 31st mission, everything happened.

"The B-24 bomber of which he was a crew member unloaded its bombs on Georgiu, where oil from the Ploesti fields is stored, then ran into such thick flak that three motors were knocked out one after the other.

"Despite a flak wound in his right leg, Compton left his top turret gun position, and went to work to keep the one remaining motor turning over. He kept it going all right, but he couldn't do anything about the Balkan mountains, and since the plane couldn't get over or around them, the crew had to bail out.

"The sergeant came down close to a Bulgarian garrison and was captured immediately. After being tak-

en to Sofia, for removal of the flak in his leg, he was taken with other crew members to Schumen prison camp.

"In this over-crowded small camp, where 200 men were kept in a room about 60 feet long and less than half that wide, he spent two and one-half months. Their food was inadequate, bean soup and brown bread and some sort of breakfast dish which Compton says looked like "tree leaves." The ingenious Americans made playing cards from cigarette boxes, but this game was their only diversion.

"When news of their release came, the flyers didn't feel altogether safe for they knew they were to be taken through Bulgaria via train, and they were worried about the Bulgarian civilians, he said. Several of the men in this prison told Compton that members of their crews were killed by civilians when they parachuted.

"It was surprising though," the sergeant said, "when we left, the Bulgarians were really yelling for the Russians, instead of screaming 'Chicago gangsters' at us as they did when we came."

"After a trip across the tip of Greece, through Turkey, and Syria, across Egypt, through the North African desert and the Mediterranean, Compton arrived back at his air force base.

"He arrived in the States October 22, and will report to Miami Beach, Fla., for reassignment Dec. 1.

"The Bulgarians who questioned him had about as much trouble getting him to talk as his admiring audience Sunday afternoon was having. He said the Bulgarians asked him, after he had repeatedly answered "I don't know" to their questions, if everybody in America were as dumb as he. "I told them not quite everybody," he admitted.

"All of his missions except one were flown in the B-24 "Warlord" and included missions to Munich, Weiner Neustadt and Vienna, as well as targets in Italy. His first mission was the Cassino bombing.

"He is spending his furlough, visiting friends in Lubbock, where he attended Texas Technological school, Littlefield, where his father resides, and Waco, where he and three bro-

thers attended the Methodist home.

"The brothers are all in service. Alec has been in New Guinea, with the Infantry for two years; Edgar is stationed at Blackland Army Air Field, and Richard, who is with an anti-aircraft unit, recently arrived overseas.

"Sgt. Compton graduated from Waco High school in 1941, entered the service Sept. 10, 1942, received his gunner's wings, November, 1943; went overseas in March of this year."

A veteran of 32 months' duty overseas and of three of the toughest fights in Marine Corps history, Private First Class Arvin Aaron Williams, 21, now is on guard duty at the Naval Air Facility at Hitchcock, Texas.

The young Leatherneck is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James T. Williams and the husband of Mrs. Pauline Gilmore Williams, all of Earth, Texas.

Having fought at Guadalcanal, Tarawa and Saipan, Williams selected the Saipan operations as the toughest engagement in which he took part. It was on Saipan that he received a wound in the right knee.

At Tarawa, Williams said his narrowest escape from death came in hand-to-hand combat with a Jap officer. The Japs had emerged from their command post after Marines laid siege to this stronghold. The officer emerged swinging his sword and struck hard at Williams. The Marine ducked the sweep of the cumbersome weapon and cut the officer down with his bayonet.

On Saipan, Williams saw Japs

commit suicide with hand grenades placed in their bodies in preference to capture. He took part in the rescue of many natives, hidden in caves, who had been told tales of American cruelty.

Withholding Tax To Change Jan. 1

Some 30,000,000 wage and salary earners have been reminded by the Internal Revenue bureau that the rate of withholdings from their pay will change January 1.

Under the tax simplification law passed last spring, the withholding rates were adjusted to collect the entire tax of persons with wages and salaries under \$5,000.

Under the old law withholdings were calculated to take only the approximate tax, leaving a year-end adjustment to be made.

Motorists Urged To Curb Illegal Use Of Gasoline

Motorists who use gasoline illegally to travel to winter resorts face the loss of their mileage rations, the District Office of Price Administration advised this week.

An enforcement program now in preparation to prevent misuse of rations provides that motorists who use their coupons illegally will be called before hearing commissioners who have the power to revoke not only the supplemental "B" or "C" rations, but basic "A" rations as well.

Administrator Chester Bowles pointed out that the millions of patriotic drivers throughout the country who are abiding by the mileage regulations and getting along on tight rations so that all may share fairly the scarce civilian supplies have every right to expect OPA to shut down hard on those who obtain gasoline unfairly for non-essential trips. "We intend to do just that," he said.

Each War Price and Rationing Board in Lubbock OPA District has been instructed to review the mileage regulations governing vacation travel to resorts and reminded that they must deny gasoline for this purpose.

Social Security Has 5th Anniversary

November marked the fifth anniversary of the opening of the Social Security Board in Lubbock. This office, located at 1311 Texas Ave., was established in November, 1939 for the purpose of rendering prompt service to people who wanted social security account cards or desired to file claims for old-age and survivors insurance.

"During the past five years, this office has issued more than 44,767 account cards to people living in nineteen counties comprising the Lubbock field office," Sam Leifeste, the manager, said. The year 1942 showed a marked acceleration in the number of people applying for account cards. Our office issued social security account cards to many people who would not ask for them in peacetime—high school boys and girls taking part-time jobs in laundries, stores, or offices to help replace workers who have been called to the armed services; housewives who never had jobs before but who feel they can do a patriotic duty and help with the war effort and older workers who had retired from the labor market because of their age, but who want to do their part now.

"Our job of course is to issue social security account cards to all those taking jobs in industry and commerce," declared Mr. Leifeste. "But I wonder if they all realize that they are doing more than getting social security account cards—that they are in a sense taking a step toward their own and their family's future security. Getting a social security account number is really taking out an insurance policy with the Federal Government, not only for the worker, but for his family."

"Since January 1, 1940, monthly benefits have been paid not only to the retired worker over 65, but supplemental benefits have gone to the retired worker's wife if over 65 and survivors benefits to widows over 65 and younger widows with dependent children. Benefits have also been paid to dependent children and to aged dependent parents of deceased workers. More than half of the 750,000 beneficiaries in the United States receiving monthly old-age and survivors insurance are women and children."

The Social Security Board believes that all persons who work for a living should be covered under old-age and survivors insurance. The Board has recommended to Congress that coverage be extended to about 20 million workers who are now unprotected by social insurance, including some 6 to 7 million farm workers and domestic workers and more than 10 million self-employed persons. The Board believes that "no important occupational group ranks lower in the scale of earnings than farm workers and household workers, even when allowance is made for what these workers receive in the form of food and shelter. For most in these groups employment is typically uncertain and broken." The Board also believes that the millions of self-employed who are now denied the benefits of social insurance are mostly operators of small farms and stores, repair services and the like.

Mr. Leifeste will be glad to arrange for a speaker from his office to attend labor, business, and group meetings to explain the provisions of the social security program to them. Information booklets can also be had from his office upon request.

Use Of V-Mail To Navy Personnel In Europe Urged

Headquarters, U. S. Naval Forces in Europe, Nov. 8.—(Delayed)—Because air-mail service to and from U. S. Naval personnel in the European Theater of Operations has recently become less frequent, post office authorities at U. S. Naval Headquarters in England today recommended increased use of V-mail.

Air-mail will continue to be slow during the coming months, they disclosed, because Naval flying over Northern Atlantic routes has been curtailed until better flying weather in the spring.

During the summer months air-mail letters between the United States and Europe averaged less than a week in delivery. More than two weeks will be required during the winter months, they said.

V-Mail, always a priority item in trans-Atlantic flights, will continue to reach its destination in the normal time of five to seven days. Authorities therefore recommended that V-mail be used by Naval personnel and their correspondents in the United States in all cases where the earliest possible arrival is desired.

The equivalent of 25 sacks of air-mail letters can be carried in one small V-mail sack, recorded on 16 mm. film. Because of the quantity of air-mail posted, much of it will have to be carried in ships during the winter.

After that the Littlefield leader took the section on down the tracks, meeting and damaging three locomotives, neutralizing a flak tower, and shooting up a number of freight cars.

cars, two barges, a truck and a flak car damaged, three oil tank cars and one railroad station destroyed.

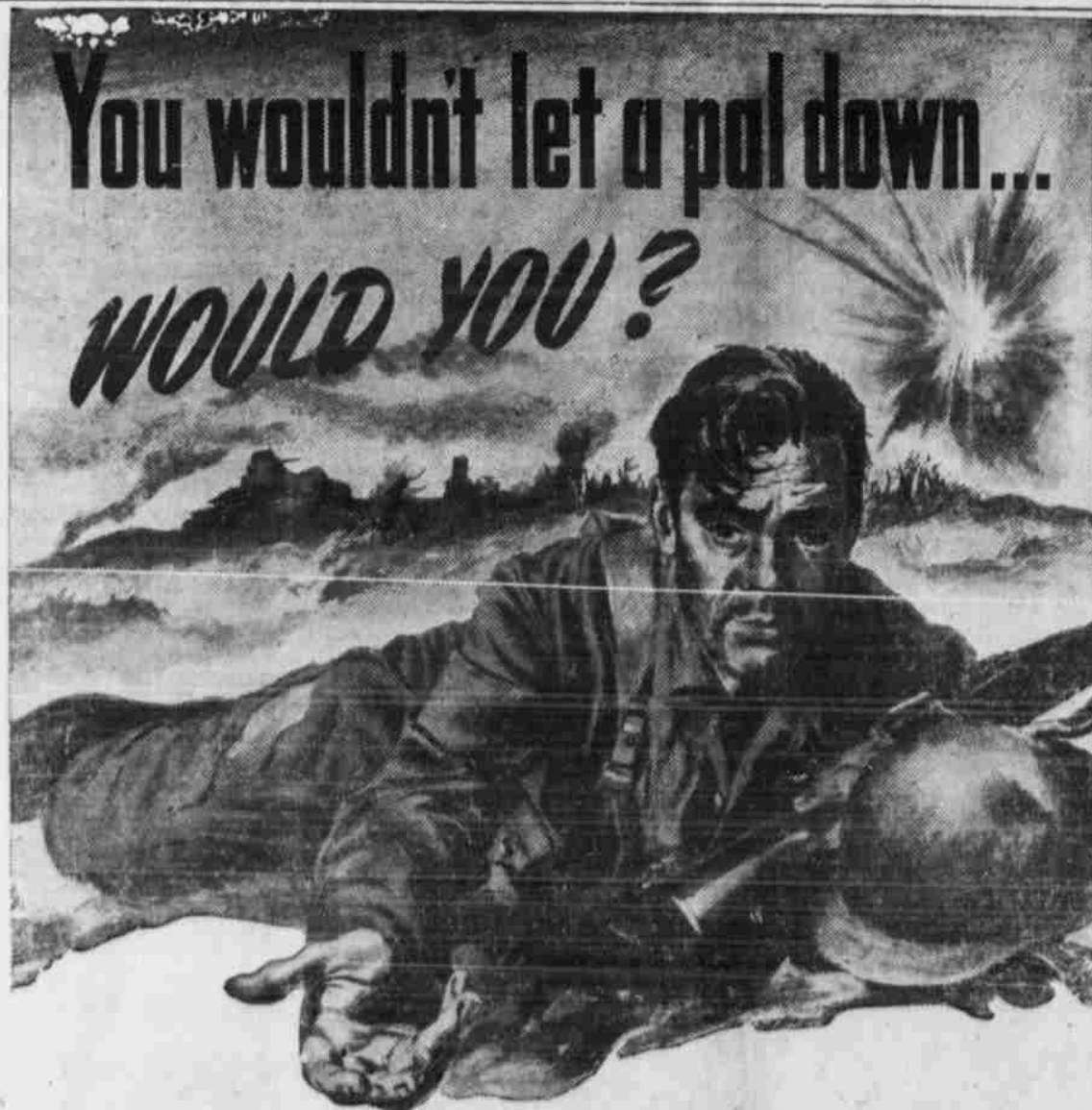
