# **Be Held Soon**

Bond Issue Will Not Increase Taxes, Say School Officials

At a Monday night session, the school board set the amount of the proposed school improvement bond issue which will be put before voters in the near future. The exact date of the election has not been set, according to Dr. William N. Orr, president of the school board.

Totaling \$75,000, the bonds have been sold to three different companies, \$25,000 to each of the following: First of Texas Corporation, San Antonio; Dallas Union Trust Co., Fort Worth; Edwards Security Co., Fort Worth.

Time on the bonds is fifteen years with a ten year option; for the first five years the bonds will yield 2 1-2 percent interest, for the remaining ten years they will bear interest of 2 1-2 percent.

The Agriculture Department, reporting that cotton production outlook has declined slightly because of last month's bad weather conditions, Thursday forecast a cotton farm product."—Director P. O. Dacrop of 11,508,000 bales for 1947.

The department said the Gulf coast hurricane and other storms last month reduced the lint quality and interfered with picking for a short time, but otherwise caused ing For Profit." only slight damage.

The department said the forecast was 341,000 bales, or three per cent less than the forecast made Sept. 1.

The department said continued dry, hot weather from Alabama westward through Oklahoma reduced prospects for the late portion of the crop more than offsetting gen-erally favorable weather in Georgia and the Far Western states.





COLUMBUS, OHIO-The registered Jersey Herd owned by A. L. Berry, Amherst, Texas, has recently been classified for type under the program of The American Jersey Cattle Club, whose headquarters are here. Professor G. G. Gibson, Texas A. & M. College, an official classification inspector for the Cattle Club, made the classification of the Berry Herd.

Under the Jersey Herd Classification program animals are composed for type against the breed's score card which allots 100 points to a perfect animal. Animals are given individual rating of Excellent, Very good, good plus, good, fair or poor in accordance with number of points which they receive on the score card

The 16 animals classified in the Berry herd include 7 very good, 7 good plus and 2 good for an average score of 84.06 per cent. This score exceeds the average rating of 82.74 per cent for all animals classified in the Jersey breed and Mr. Berry is to be congratulated on the type of cattle in his herd.
