Lamb County FFA And 4-H Clubs Win Honors In Plains Dairy Show

Lamb County 4-H and FFA Clubs took several honors at the annual Panhandle Plains Dairy Show held at Plainview last Saturday when a total of 160 boys in 32 FFA and 16 4-H judging teams competed and was witnessed by about 250 persons.

4-H Team Places Second
Lamb County 4-H teams placed second in dairy cattle judging Saturday morning, with a score of 844. Bailey County placed first with a score of 895; Hale third with 839; Lubbock fourth with 838 and Crosby fifth with 836.

Lamb County 4-H team was composed of Roy and Troy Young, Jerry Bryant, and James Hickman. Bill Rodgers, assistant Lamb County Agent, and 4-H Club sponsor, coached the team.

Roy Young of Spade was third high man with a score of 303 in the high individual, all breeds.

High Team In Judging
In the Milking Shorthorn division Littlefield FFA placed first with a score of 146 points. Hale county was second and Crosby county third. In the Holstein judging division Littlefield FFA placed first.

Similar Petition Is Circulated In Littlefield

The matter of the consolidation of the Spade School District with the Littlefield Independent School District which was thoroughly discussed at the March meeting of the Littlefield School Board, when members of the Spade School Board attended the meeting, was brought to a focus Wednesday morning, when a petition headed by Norvell Strawn, and bearing 40 signatures of residents of the Spade School District, asking an election was presented to County Judge Otha Dent.

It is understood that a similar petition is in circulation in Littlefield, and is scheduled to be filed with the Lamb County Judge this Thursday morning. The petitions are found in order, there is little question that the vote will be called by the County Judge, and be held in the near future. The law provides for calling the elections not earlier than 20 days, nor more than 60 days after the petitions are filed.

Under the law, the consolidation must be approved both by the Spade and Littlefield District voters, in two separate elections.

If the consolidation of the two districts is approved by the voters, the Spade school system will be abandoned, and the approximately 250 students now attending school at Spade, will be transferred to the Littlefield Schools, with bus service provided. It will mean an enlargement of the territory now comprising the Littlefield school district, and will make the local school eligible for a sharply increased faculty, under the Gilmer-Aiken school law.

The Spade Independent School District comprises 72 sections of valuable farm lands, surrounding the town of Spade, located about 12 miles east of Littlefield. If the consolidation is effected this land (for purposes of taxation) will come into the Littlefield School District.

Because of the high interest in the matter, both in Spade and in Littlefield, the Lamb County Leader is publishing a complete copy of the petition presented Wednesday, including the names of the 40 signers.

Secretary of State John Ben Sheppard of Gladewater will be one of the main speakers at the annual spring conference of the 7th district (Panhandle-South Plains) of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs here April 17-19.


Forty-nine counties are in the district, bounded on the south by Andrews, Martin, Howard and Mitchell counties, and on the east by Fisher, Stonewall, Knox and Wilbarger counties. Approximately 500 women delegates, representing all the 225 clubs in the district, are expected to attend the convention.

Sheppard, one of the most popular speakers in the State today, will talk on "Nature's Agreeable Blunders." His address will be given at 10:30 a.m. Friday, April 18. Mrs. J. W. Garman Jr. of Pampa will introduce him. Mrs. O. M. McGinty of Spur is district president and Mrs. Bryan Edwards of Lubbock, program chairman.

The speaker has been Secretary of State since February, 1950 when he was appointed by Governor Allan Shivers. Before that he was a practicing East Texas attorney and president of the bar association of his home county of Gregg. He has participated in many state-wide bar association, American Legion and Junior Chamber of Commerce activities. He is a former president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce. Social Security Expert To Be Here Wednesday, Apr. 23

As of January 1, 1951, Federal old-age and survivors insurance coverage was extended to several million people who work for themselves.

Since April 1, 1952, most of these people have acquired extremely valuable protection in the form of Federal insurance which provides for monthly old-age benefits when they retire at or after age 65, or payments to survivors in death cases at any age.

Quite a large number of self-employed people have worked previously as employees and have wage credits already established with the Social Security Administration. These wage credits will be combined with their reported self-employment income to determine eligibility an amount of benefits payable.

On the other hand, many of the self-employed and their families will receive benefits based only on self-employment income after 1950. In some cases benefits based on self-employment income alone will be payable during 1952. Persons who had at least \$400 net income from self-employment during 1951 and at least \$400 during 1952 may receive monthly payments if they

have reached age 65 and retired from active business. Persons who have reached age 75 may file a claim and receive benefits even though they continue in active business.

In death cases the survivors of a self-employed person who died on or after April 1, 1952, may be eligible for either monthly benefits or a lumpsum death payment.

Self-employed people age 65 or over who plan to retire in 1952 should consult their local social security office before making a decision. It may be to their advantage to defer retirement and the filing of an old-age insurance claim until January 1953.

For the convenience of those who live in and around Littlefield, a representative of the social security office will be at the post office in Littlefield on Wednesday, April 23, 1952, at 1:30 p.m.





APRICOT TAPIOCA PARFAIT— Low in calories

Anyone in your family trying to acquire a new slim figure for a new spring suit? Want some appealing recipes that fit a reducing diet? Here are two suggestions that look good, taste good, and go easy on calories.

For a REDUCER'S LUNCHEON PLATE peel big juicy oranges so no white membrane remains, cut into round slices, and arrange on lettuce. Next on the plate put white or pink-meat grapefruit, carefully sectioned. Add deviled eggs, shrimp and crisp cucumber slices. Leave the peel on the cucumber for a bright green note. Serve the salad with a low-calorie salad dressing. This plate will give any reducer plenty of good nutrition: The eggs and fish provide protein, the fruit offers vitamin C plus delicious flavor, and the cucumber adds crunch texture.

A dessert that will make dieters happy is a tapioca cream made with a new non-caloric sweetening solution and apricots canned without sugar. This new non-caloric

sweetening solution is a blessing because it can be cooked without losing its sweetness or leaving a bitter aftertaste.

Low-Calorie Apricot Tapioca Parfait

Ingredients: 1 egg (separated), 2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca, 2½ teaspoons non-caloric sweetening, ¼ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon vanilla, apricot halves (canned without sugar).

Method: Beat egg white stiff but not dry. Mix egg yolk with small amount of the milk in a saucepan. Add tapioca, non-caloric sweetening solution, remaining milk, and salt. Cook and stir constantly over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil—5 to 8 minutes. Stir small amount of hot mixture into egg white, stirring constantly blend in remaining mixture. Stir in vanilla. Cool. Stir once after 15 minutes. Chill. Arrange alternate layers of tapioca and apricot halves in parfait glasses, using 4 apricot halves to a serving if desired. Makes six servings—each containing only 92 calories.

The senator said that "after long and careful consideration over the months, I have concluded that I do not desire to be a candidate. . . I have never made a formal announcement of such a candidacy. I have never filed any application to have my name placed on the ticket."
