#### **Eligibility For** 1941 Wheat Loans

A loan has not been offered on the 1941 wheat crop, but-

The wheat farmer who is deciding how much acreage to plant this fall should study the eligibility rules for obtaining a loan in 1941 if one is

A producer's share of the wheat produced on a farm will be eligible for the loan only if a 1941 parity payment can be made with respect to that share of wheat in accordance with the eligibility provisions administrator, said in a statement issued from AAA headquarters.

Which all means that wheat produced will be eligible for a loan if to come were: Mesdames Kitty Thurnone of the following provisions are violated:

(1) The acreage planted to wheat on the farm is not in excess of the wheat acreage allotment for the

farm. (2) The sum of the acreages of wheat and cotton for the farm does not exceed the sum of the allotments or permitted acreages for

such crops under the 1941 program. (3) The producers aggregate share of the 1941 acreage of wheat and cotton on all farms in the county does not exceed his aggregate share of the allotments or permitted acreages for such crops under the 1941 program on such farms.

(4) The producer's aggregate share of the 1941 acreage of wheat, cotton, corn, rice and tobacco on al farms in which he has an interest, wherever situated, does not exceed his aggreate share of the allotment or permitted acreage for such commedity under the 1941 program for such farms to such an extent as to offset substantially the performance on the farm with respect to which the loan might otherwise be made.

Eligibility for parity payments will be determined early in 1941, the administrator said, and, since those eligible for parity payments will be eligible for loans, only one determination of eligibility need be

Total cotton ginnings for the 19 counties on the South Plains, are still below those of the correspondng date for the 1939 erco, according to the report of the bureau of

Ginnings this year were 123,233 ales, or 68,567 bales under the 1,806 bales reported a year ago. However, an increase for the Oct. report was noted over that of

Six counties showed increases over the 1939 figures, four of them being west of Lubbock and in the area generally considered as having the best crop prospects in several years. Harvesting in Bailey, Cochran, Gaines and Hockley is just getting underway and should show large increases this year over last in final ginnigs

State totals show a decline 125,000 bales from 1939.

Port Bend county leads the state with 59,834 bales; Ellis is second with 59,318; Collin third with 55, 659; Neuces fourth with 53,039; Wharton fifth with 52,640, and Hunt sixth with 51,051.

Five other counties have more than 40,000 bales each, Fannin 47, 728; Hidalgo, 42.935; Navarro, 42.-359; Hill 41,682 and Williamson, 40,545.
